On the motion of Councillor John Carty seconded by Councillor P. Connolly this resolution was adopted.

The state of the Rates Collection was considered extremely unsatisfactory.

The Council ordered that the Rates Collector be called upon to give an explanation

The Rates Collector - Mr Michael Mulhern was also present.

Rates Collection Collector's books showed that since last meeting £86.5.3 Poor Rate and £50.14.4 Town Rates had been lodged, leaving £110.10.3 Poor Rate and £49.19.11¹/₂ Town Rates still outstanding in respect of Half Year ended 30th Sept. 1921.

The Rate Collector explained that many Ratepayers believed that no rates should be paid, and he had great difficulty in collecting.

He took legal proceedings against some defaulters and got decrees.

The Chairman pointed out that Dail Eireann decreed that all rates must be paid and it was the business of the

Council to see that this decree should be carried out.

Mr O'Gorman, said some Councils published a list of defaulting rate payers and he thought it had good effect.

Chairman said if Council made an order to publish a list the order should be carried out. It was agreed not to publish the list.

Chairman suggested that a few defaulters be proceeded against and that if protection were needed in distraining, the services of the J. R. P. could be requisitioned.

Council agreed to this suggestion.

Councillor Harte said that the Council should back up the collector in every legitimate way.

The Rate Collector stated that he would work to collect arrears of rate and also the rate for the current Half Year.

He was directed to publish notices demanding payment of all rates forthwith.

It was decided to further adjourn the meeting to 23rd February, 1922, to examine the progress made in the rate collection, and the proceedings ended.

Mr. M. Mulhern, Rate Collector was also
present.

In reply to Councillor O'Gorman, the Collector
said he got decrees for a number of defaulting
rate payers, and a few paid him the rates
owing. In order to qualify for payment of
poundage he had to advance a large amount
from his private account. He said it was
difficult to realize the amount of the decrees.

The Chairman agreed that the execution of
the decrees was a difficulty, but he had
means to enforce the law, and the services of
the Irish Republican Police could be got.

Councillor O'Gorman pointed out that the
non-payment of rates put the Council in a
a very awkward position, and he thought that
action might have to be taken against the Rate
Collector's sureties.

The Collector said that he would have the
old balance outstanding lodged before the
end of February.

Town Surveyor reported that a wooden
shed was in course of erection, near the sea

front, on grounds occupied by Mr. Tho. Harrison
Amusements Caterer, in Drumacrin Bundoran

Councillor O'Gorman said a large number of
the structures were unsuitable and unsightly
and proposed "That steps be taken to have
all the temporary buildings removed from the
grounds occupied by Thomas Harrison"

Mr. Pat. Connolly seconded the resolution.
After much discussion Councillor J. Carty
moved "That the buildings be not removed"

Councillor Jas. Murphy seconded, subject
to the condition that the buildings should be
approved of by the Council.

After a long debate Councillors O'Gorman
and Carty withdrew their propositions and
it was moved by Councillor O'Gorman, second-
ed by Councillor Connolly and passed

"That J. Harrison be given notice to remove
the building now in course of erection with-
in twenty one days from date of notice".

Clerk suggested that a Solicitor be
employed but no order to employ a solicitor
was made.

Clerk was directed to request the Great
Northern Railway Company to have their
premises adequately lighted when necessary,
sufficiently long before the departure of the
first train as an accident occurred recently
to a lady in consequence of the platform
being in darkness.

Councillor Harte applied to have the

The Chairman said that no rate payer should be deprived of any convenience for which he paid.

The following copy of a resolution from the Bundoran Labour Union was agreed to "That two members be appointed by Bundoran Labour Union and two members be appointed by Bundoran Urban Council presided over by an independent Chairman To ensure that the grants received from Dail Eireann on behalf of the unemployed in this locality be equally distributed to the most deserving cases with a view to have all work completed which has been neglected for the past year."

Clerk informed Council that the necessary

Council decided to adjourn further consideration of this matter to 16th March 1922.

Proposed by Councillor John Carty seconded by Councillor Pat^h Connolly and unanimously resolved:-

The Chairman pointed out that Bundoran might be considered as a large shop, in which all property owners and others had an interest, and believed that the offer of the deputation should be considered sympathetically.

Councillor Carty asked whether the deputation had the voice of the ratepayers.

It was pointed out that the Committee represented by the deputation consisted of the majority of the largest ratepayers.

Councillor Harte enquired how the money was proposed to be spent and regretted that a good many Councillors were absent.

Councillor Carty & asked was it not too late to begin this year and Councillor Connolly said he thought not.

Councillor R. F. Flood, J. R. C. S. I. proposed "That the Council make efforts to secure a loan of £1000 to be devoted to purposes of the Public Health Acts 1878 to 1911 (Ireland)"

Councillor Pat^r Connolly seconded and the Chairman declared the motion carried with Councillor John Carty dissenting in the interests of the Ratepayers.

One member of the deputation suggested that control of the strand should be got Councillor Connolly enquired whether the

foreshore was out of the control of the Admiralty and the Chairman said he thought so.

Mr J. Bonlan thanked the Council for their patient hearing and the deputation withdrew.

Proposed by Councillor Pat^r Connolly seconded by Councillor John J. Carroll and unanimously resolved:-

"That Clerk be directed to instruct Mr. P. E. Rogers, Solicitor, to take the necessary legal steps towards compelling Mr. Thomas Harrison, Amusements' Caterer, to have the structure recently erected by him, removed in Downland of Drumacree, removed"

Mr B. Doherty, Contractor pointed out that a road made of similar material outlasted other roads, and was a saving to the Ratepayers.

Public Lighty.

The Chairman, referring to the last contract for

 the National Forces smashed over two thirds of

The Inspector said arrangements were being made to give protection to collectors and he realized the difficulties owing to absence of courts and the state of the country, but the idea that Dail Eireann will discharge these liabilities is a mistaken one. He pointed out that in some parts of the country the names of those in arrears of rates were published.

Councillor Gorman Esq, said that the publication of the names was discussed several times by this Council, but no action was taken, and it was now necessary in fair play to the Collector's Service to take drastic action.

The inspector said he would interview the collector at his office.
