The Correspondence read and the orders made or resolutions passed therein were as follows: -

From Ministry of Local Government, Circular letter no. L.G. 4945 dated 25/9/22. on the subject of Public Health (Foreign meat) (Ireland) Regulations stating that a label, specimen attached, will now be accepted as a certificate for purposes of said Regulations in reference to pork imported from United States of America. noted.

Letter from John Sherry, Auctioneer Bellefleur, dated 15th Sep. 22. stating that he would not undertake the work of valuation in connection with Criminal Injury claims lodged.

Clerk informed Council that he employed

Mr. Jas. Keenan, Bundoran, who made the necessary estimates. Approved.

Letter from R.H. Reid, Solicitor, dated 22nd Sept. 1922 accepting offer of Council to repair wall for which a claim was lodged on behalf of Church Representative Body.

Councillor Cusack pointed out that in order to sustain the claims, malice would have to be proved and he thought these acts were not malicious.

The Chairman believed that a national Scheme of Compensation will be formulated and in view of the altered circumstances, he put forward the following notice of motion.

"Take notice that at next monthly meeting of this Council I shall move that the resolution passed at the meeting held on 14th September, 1922 offering to defray the expense of repair of wall the property of the Church Representative Body be rescinded."

Letter dated 25/9/22 from Michael Maguire Solicitor on behalf of Trustees of St Joseph's Orphanage applying for £15 as compensation for injury done to a wall at Brandrath, Magheracaw.

Clerk was directed to inform Mr Maguire that in consequence of recent legislation governing claims for compensation, the Council cannot undertake to grant his application.

Notice dated 18th September, 1922, withdrawing Criminal Injury Claim lodged on behalf of the Richmond Clothing Company, was read.

Forms of Preliminary notice of application for Compensation for Criminal Injury were

received as follows:-

From R.H. Reid on behalf of Mrs Mollie Crawford for £36 for injury to mirror, windows, frames &c.

From R.H. Reid on behalf of Francis Lunny and Mary Anne Lunny, and John Lunny for the malicious and mortal wounding of the said John Lunny. Amount of claim £1000.

Clerk was ordered to give the claims into the hands of Solicitor.

Rates Collection.

The accounts showed that a lodgment of £50 Poor Rate had been made on 24th Sept. leaving a sum of £158-6-8 still unlodged.

A sum of £268-1-5 Town Rates for year ending 31st March, 1922 is still unlodged, and none of the current Poor Rate and Town Rates has been collected.

Clerk was directed to write Rate Collector asking him to finish his collection, as several accounts were awaiting payment, and Council was unable to meet its liabilities owing to the non lodgment of the Rates.

Consequent on the shortage of money it was decided to employ the scavenger on only three days of the week.

Proposed by Councillor P.H. Connolly seconded by Councillor John J. Carrall and passed:-

Chairman pointed out that the meeting had
been summoned to discuss the question of the
proposed closing down of the Rock Hospital
Ballyshannon, and to take necessary action

It was the unanimous opinion of the meeting
that the shutting down of this the only hospital
within a radius of twenty miles would lead to very
great hardships, and perhaps the loss of many
valuable lives, as it is the only Hospital fully
equipped to deal with surgical cases.

Proposed by Councillor J. M. Gorman, Jun. seconded
by Councillor P. Clancy and unanimously resolved:-

"That we the Bundoran Urban District Council
desire to represent to the Dail the urgency and im-
portance of allowing the Union Hospital at Ballyshannon
to remain open to such time as the Shell Hospital
is again functioning. We wish to point out that
serious results must follow especially to the poor
if the populous town and district of Bundoran
are left without adequate hospital accommodation

The resolution passed at the Councils meeting
of 30th January, 1922 asking that proper hospital
accommodation be provided was referred to by
the chairman whom the meeting now deputed to
attend to represent the Council, at the meeting of
protest at Ballyshannon this evening in connection

Council viewed the proposition with favour and directed Chk to convey the views of Council to local Government.

Letter L.G. dated 11/11/22 enclosing copy of order transferring duties of Roads Section of the Ministry of Transport to Ministry of L. Government

From Commissioners of Public Works in Ireland dated 4th Oct. 1922 informing Council that two instalments on foot of loans were due 1st May last and asking for the early discharge of the claim.

Chk stated that he replied stating that claims could not be paid till a sufficient amount of Rates was lodged.

Subject adjourned to next day.

Letter from Ministry of Industry and Commerce M. 952 dated 17th Oct 1922, acknowledging copy of resolution re Railway to Sligo and stating that the matter referred to will receive attention.

From Secretary of Home Affairs dated 15/11/22 enclosing Bill of Costs, copy Certificate of Sanation and affidavits of Credits in case of the Council to P. G. Rogers Solicitor, costs £38.10.9.

Council passed Bill for payment.

Application dated 31/10/22 from Michael Travers for payment for services as Beach Guard during part of Summer season.

Proposed by Councillor J. O'Gorman seconded by Councillor John Doherty (Jnr) and passed:-

"That £3 be paid Michael Travers for services as Beach Guard during part of Summer season"

No. 1.C. From O.C. Ballyshannon Command, 1st Northern Division O'Leary na h'Ceann, Finer Camp dated 13/10/22. on the subject of Excessive Speed of motor vehicles.

Motor Speed

Councillor O'Gorman, said that an accident in which a military motor car was implicated, occurred in East End since that letter was received.

The Chairman pointed out that it was the duty of Council to safeguard life at all costs.

Chk was directed to write military authorities that Council were pleased with letter, but regret that an accident occurred recently. Also that it is the opinion of the Council that more careful supervision as to speed of cars and qualification of drivers is necessary.

Notices of application for Criminal Injury to Motor Car, one for £300 and the other for £48-19 were received for on behalf of John Muller Bundoran.

Ordered that Solicitor be instructed to defend these claims.

Councillor O'Gorman, pointed out that an expert valuer should be employed to give evidence in these cases.

Chk stated that Sir Connell County Council had an assessor appointed for County.

Chk was directed to communicate with county council for information on the subject.

Chairman proposed "That the resolution passed at meeting held on 14th September, 1922 offering to defray the expense of repair of wall the property of the Church Representative Body be rescinded"

He explained that his action was the result of a change in the law governing payment of compensatory claims, made since the resolution was passed, and that he has no personal or private motive. He did it in the interests of Rate payers. Council agreed.

Councillor Connolly seconded and the motion was passed.

Chairman directed to write explanation to Solicitor

It was pointed out that an Inspector under the Food & Drugs Act would be necessary.

Councillor Connolly stated that during the summer months milk and butter exposed for sale was often of an inferior quality.

Chairman pointed out that no lodgment of Rents or Rates had been made since last September when only £50 was lodged as Poor Rate.

Councillor J. O'Gorman, proposed:-

"That Solicitor be instructed to inform Collector's Sureties, that the Council will take action at next January Session to receive all rates due up to the end of September, 1922"

On the suggestion that meeting should adjourn for attendance of Rate Collector, Councillor O'Gorman withdrew his proposition.

The Chairman ^{said} announced that he regretted a sad accident occurred at the Cliffs near the horse pool in which the Rev. D. McManus, C.C. Blacklion lost his life. He thought some thing

ought to be done to afford protection to the public

Mr O'Gorman suggested that place should be lighted.

The Chair pointed out that as the accident appeared not to have occurred upon the public road, the owners of the property adjoining the cliff ought to be asked to afford protection to the public:

Lamps on Cliff Road
Chairman was directed to write Messrs. Myles & Co. requesting them to erect two lamps on Cliff Road; and also to write Solicitors, agents, for the Hamilton Estate, requesting that suitable protection be provided for the public on their property.

Proposed by Chairman seconded by Councillor O'Gorman, and passed in silence:-

"That we the Bundoran Urban District Council hereby offer our deep sympathy to the relatives of the late Rev. Denis McManus, C.C. Blacklion Ecclesiastical Inspector of Kilmore, whose death occurred at Bundoran as the result of an accident at the sea cliff".

We also tender to the parents and relatives of ^{the late} Master Pat. Jas. Jos. McManus, our sincere sympathy in their sad bereavement, occasioned by his death while on holidays with his uncle Mr E. Daly Town Clerk Bundoran."

unfair to the Sureties, the Ratepayers and to the Collector himself, as he ran the risk of losing his poundage fees. If Collector was able to show that he is unable to get in the rates after taking the proper steps to do so, there might be some valid excuse.

Collector asked "How far will Council back me up?"
Councillor Connolly asked "Have you not got an order from the Council?"

Collector said yes, but some say I have no authority.

Councillor Connolly said that "The Council have given you the fullest power."

The Chairman pointed out that the Collector had his warrant for collection, and the Council will give him its moral support. He should lodge at least £1000 before end of month. Collector said that he would make a house to house effort, and lodge a substantial amount of Rates before 1st December, 1922.

Chase asked for an order from the Council on the matter, and what the reply should be to the Commissioners of Public Works and others who demand payment of moneys due by Council.

The Chairman stated, and the Council agreed that the reply should state that at a meeting of Council, the Rate Collector was directed to proceed vigorously with the collection of Rates, and we defer a more definite reply pending result of special effort to lodge a substantial portion of outstanding balance.

A quorum of members not being in attendance Clerk adjourned meeting to 23rd November 1922.

Minutes of adjourned Half Yearly meeting held on Thursday 23rd November, 1922.

The minutes of last Half Yearly meeting were read and signed.

Clerk reported that he lodged on 15th Nov. 1922, at Bail £147-7-6, amount paid by Incomell Co. Council in respect of main Road Maintenance for year ended 31st Mar. 1922 under agreement with Council.

The following Report for Half Year ended the 30th September, 1922, of Town Surveyor was read.

Roads.

During the past Half Year, the main Roads and District Roads were fairly well maintained notwithstanding the increasing traffic of heavy motor vehicles.

Road haulage of heavy loads is becoming very general and the roads bear evidence in every part of the country of the severe strain to which they are subjected.

It is not unusual to meet loaded lorries

weighing in all more than twelve tons, travelling over twelve miles per hour, on water bound macadam roads. Under such conditions water ordinary roads will break up in a short time.

If, as is likely, these heavily laden vehicles get more numerous, their destructive effect on the roads will be extremely severe.

More modern methods of road construction must be adopted, and a large percentage of the extra cost involved, ought to be borne by the users of these heavy lorries.

In some cases national necessity caused injury to the foot paths and road surface.

At some places too, a large quantity of heavy stones was thrown into the roadway for the purpose of stopping traffic.

The scavenging of the streets has been fairly well attended to but it has been found necessary owing to shortage of funds to reduce the number of working days of the scavengers to three per. week.

Footpaths - The flagged footpaths and paved crossings are still in need of repair. Part of the unemployment grant of £200 allocated to the Urban District was to have been expended on this work, but though the Provisional Government approved of the scheme submitted, the amount has not been lodged with the Treasurer of the Council.

Water Supply - On 8th July, 1922, the main water supply pipe was maliciously broken, and

Road to sea
at Central Hotel
Councillor Harte objected to the repair of Road at Central Hotel, connecting main Road with back on the grounds that, Cliff Road was more in need of repair.

Councillor O'orman, pointed out that this Road to the sea was the most used by the public and ought to be repaired. He thought that seven shillings a ton was too low a price.

Chairman pointed out that wages might fall.

The Council, except Councillor Harte, agreed that the road at Central Hotel should be repaired.

Councillor Harte requested that a note of his objection be recorded.

Council decided that Contracts extend for one year only.

Councillor J. O'orman (Sen) proposed, "That Town Surveyor's Report for Half Year ended 30th September 1922 be adopted, it having first been amended by the specification of thirty tons extra metal in respect of main Road between Bundoran Bridge and Sandhill Gate, and twenty tons extra metal in respect of main Road between Bundoran Bridge and Urban Boundary at Finney"

Councillor Clancy seconded and the motion was passed.

It was decided that the spreading of road metal and other work connected with rolling in the stones be undertaken by the Council, in consequence of the difficulty of getting Contractors to attend satisfactorily to this work, and that the matter be left in Surveyor's hands.

Proposed by Councillor J. O'orman (Sen) seconded by Councillor Harte and passed:-

"That Clerk issue notices for Contractors, who are to supply the required amount of metal, keep water courses clear, where scavenging is not done, fill pot holes, and ^{take} the roads in charge for one year, the Council to supply all labour connected with the rolling in of the metal on the roads."

Proposed by Chairman, seconded by Councillor J. O'orman, and passed:-

A letter dated 20th February, 1923, from Mr Michael
Maguire, Solicitor for Ballyshannon Rural D. Council
was read, stating that a ^{special} meeting of Ballyshannon
Rural District was called for 28th inst and that he
would place letters received from Bundoran Council
before it, and that the local Government Department
will not permit the Ballyshannon R. D. Council
to remain inactive in the matter.

Councillor O'orman, said that it is up to
this Council to do its duty, as representatives of
the rate payers who are owners of the Houses of the
working classes. The Council should take legal
proceedings to recover arrears of rent, and if
it failed then it had discharged its obligation.
He would like to see every tenant in a com-
fortable house, rent free if possible and for
years worked in the interests of the labourers,
but it was an injustice to the Rate payers
that the very small rent of one shilling and

three pence per week would not be paid for
houses and plots worth three times that rent.

From the letter which the deputation had read
it was clear that Ballyshannon Rural Council
was pressed for payment, and Bundoran Council
should take action.

The Chairman pointed out that Income Tax
Authorities were not asking the full amounts due.
He asked that deputation be now heard.

Arrears
wiped out
Michael Daly, spokesman of the deputation, said
he was instructed by the Tenants of Working
Class Houses to state that, they were prepared to
pay Ten shillings per month each for a year
on condition that all arrears be wiped out by
the Council, and the houses repaired.

Clerk stated in reply to chairman that the
sum due at end of January 1923 in respect of
rent and arrears amounted to £405-18-0.

Mr O'orman said that the tenants offer could
not be entertained, let them make it before a
District Justice.

Councillor Carty considered it a very decent offer.
Chairman pointed out that the Urban Council
