The Master reported that on the recommendations of the Visiting Committee the 5 large pigs weighing 9 cwt 3 qrs and 20 lbs. were sold to Messrs. Rowston & MacLaughlin ^{@ 1/- per cwt.} and the amount realized less 5/- carriage viz. £40. 8. 8 lodged to the credit of the Union.

In the case in question the apprentice is a good man and has over two years service and the Guardians approved of 3/- per day, the rate he usually gets.

It was decided not to take new tenders.

Quotations from Messrs. John Goke & Co, and Messrs. Crockett & Guy for supplying 100 gal. Portable Boilers were under consideration and were ~~deferred~~ deferred for inquiry.

On the motion of Mr. Scott, seconded by Mr. E. Kearney it was Resolved that the Seal of the Union be affixed to the Bond of Mr. Robt. Scott for supplying the Workhouse with Butter.

Mrs. James Doherty of Turmore, Aughaglasson, brought in the boarded-out child, Madge Mahon which is delicate, as she is unable to support ~~her~~ for £4 a year, the money allowed.

On the motion of Mr. Cole seconded by Mr. Scott it was decided to keep the child in for a week and to increase the allowance in this case to £10 a year, subject to L.G.B. approval, on account of the child's feeble & infirm condition.
