

The Gas Manager's collection account was submitted examined and showed arrears to quarter previous to 20th Sept 1911 amounting to £110 : 18. 6 outstanding

The Water Manager reported that since last meeting he had been over the entire line of the wrought salt main and everything was in working order. The Asylum Reservoir was now overflowing into the Town Reservoir and the Town was being supplied from the latter. Glencar Reservoir was at the overflow

Read letter from Thos Ward Rosemount that his house at Rosemount had become almost uninhabitable owing to surface water of street having been turned against the gable

Ordered that the Town Surveyor have a small paved area made at the gable of the house so as to prevent the water getting into the house

Proposed by Councillor James Gibbons, seconded by Councillor John Gallagher and passed unanimously:-
That we the Pettigo Kenny Urban Council demand the release of the Irish Political prisoners interned in British jails for the past eight months, uncharged and未经 tried twenty eight of them being elected representatives of the Irish Nation. We regret their arrest and detention under the circumstances as an outrage on liberty and a criminal act on the part of the British Government.

On the motion of Councillor James Gibbons it was unanimously agreed that the services of an Technical Engineer be obtained to report and advise the Council on the best scheme for providing an electric lighting system for the Urban District

of Pettigo Kenny and that estimates and plans in connection therewith be prepared and submitted to the Council

The Town Clerk to consult with Mr J.J. Barnhill C.E. as to the engineer he would recommend the Council to employ. The Asylum Committee to be informed that the Council are taking measures to provide an electric installation for the District and that they hope the Committee will postpone the consideration of any proposal that may be submitted to them for the lighting of the Asylum by electricity until such time as the Council are in a position to lay their scheme before the Committee

The Council had under consideration the postal facilities at present existing in the Town which were unanimously voted most unsatisfactory. It was decided to make representation to the Post Office Authorities that in the opinion of the Council (1) The closing of the office to the public from 11 A.M to 1 p.m daily should be discontinued. (2) That the staff at Public counter should be increased as the number of officials at present on duty is entirely inadequate to serve the public with the result that the office is crowded for hours and the public kept waiting to be served. (3) That the outward mails be increased by a mail being despatched by the 8.15 a.m train to Strabane and the 6.45 P.M. train to Londonderry. and (4) that the several pillar boxes in the Town be cleared for each outgoing mail - at present there is but one clearance of the pillar boxes viz:- for the 4 P.M. mail for Strabane

No. 144 M 1918 this dated 21st January 1919

Drawing the attention of the Town Clerk of each
Urban District to the fact that in the absence of further
postponing legislation an election of Guardians for
Urban Districts will take place next May or June
in accordance with section 24 (b) of the Local
Government (Ireland) Act 1899

No 3638 1919 Letter from the Hoban District dated
22 January 1919. Advertising to previous correspondence and
forwarding for the observations of the Council the
accompanying further communication which has
been addressed to the Board by Mr Jones Gibson
respecting the non abatement of a nuisance stated to
be caused by an open sewer running through his
premises in the Hoban District and stating that the
Board will be glad to be informed of the result of the
legal proceedings instituted by the Sanitary Authority on
this matter as mentioned in the Town Clerk's letter of the 25th
November last.

The Town Clerk submitted copy of his letter of 25 January
last in reply to the last paragraph of the Board's letter
of which reply the Council approve.

The Council desire further to state that on the report
of the Sanitary Sub Officer who this day inspected the
premises they are fully satisfied that there is no
nuisance now existing on the premises, the work already
carried out by Mr Rodden having abated the nuisance
complained of. They also desire to state that the premises
occupied by Gibson are the property of the Council and
though there are 118 other working class lodging houses
owned by the Council in the same locality none of the

occupiers have made any complaint in the matter.

Ordered that the Town Surveyor be ordered to
lay down a sufficient number of earthenware sewer pipes
from man hole in garden occupied by James
Gibson and owned by the Council so as to convey
any surface water from Rodden's premises that may
possibly come from Rodden's premises onto the Council
property into the public sewer.

No. 57945/1918 this dated 27 January 1919
Trade Boards Acts 1909 and 1918. Variation in
the minimum time rates of wages fixed for certain persons
both male and female engaged in certain branches of
the ready made and wholesale bespoke tailoring trade
in Ireland.

No 62763 1918 Letter from the Hoban District dated
30th January 1919. Relative to statement of the liabilities
incurred by the Council in the current financial year
in respect of borrowing for housing purposes after
the passing of the Housing of the Working Classes
(Ireland) Act 1908, and stating that the items of principal
and interest paid on account of the loan of £250
cannot be allowed to recoup for the purpose of participa-
tion in the distribution of the Housing Fund for this
year as the mortgage for the loan was not perfected
till after 1st April 1918

From the Strabane & Letterkenny Railways dated
30th Jan 1919 Enclosing Arbitrator's certificate for
Half Year ending 31st Dec 1918 the full amount of
the Council guarantee £30 being payable

From the Postmaster, Letterkenny dated 13 Jan 1919
acknowledging receipt of the Town Clerk's
letter re. postal facilities in the District and stating
that the communication will receive attention

The Town Clerk submitted correspondence between
him and the Irish Fuel Controller relative to the refusal
of Mr. Peter O'Geehan a retailer of turf in the Urban
District to sell turf at the maximum price fixed
by the Council though according to this trader's
own statement he had between £30 and £100 worth
of turf stored in his premises equivalent to between
600 and 800 horse cart loads of turf.

The Council approved of the several letters
sent by the Town Clerk to the Irish Fuel Controller on
the subject and instructed the Town Clerk to inform
the Controller that the case as stated in the correspondence
fully represents their views in the matter.

Read correspondence with Messrs James McElveen
& Co Edinburgh as to cargo of gas coal the quotation
being for a parcel about 150 tons at 50/- per
ton for Silkholt & screened gas coal or 54/6 for Darham
class both net per ton delivered into the Council's work
at Letterkenny but subject to additional cost of coal
have to be placed on quay at Londonderry.

The Council ratified the Town Clerk's acceptance
of the offer.

The Council had under consideration the fixing
of the retail price of coal in the Urban District under the
Retail coal prices order (Ireland) 1917 and it was agreed to ask
the several coal merchants in the Town to meet the Council on
Wednesday evening next at 3 o'clock to consult on the matter.

The Sanitary Sub Officer reported having inspected
since date of last meeting 30 houses, yards and premises
at Rosemount. That he found a large pile of refuse in
yards of premises occupied by Const Whelan and
Thos McClinton, owner of 45 McFadden

Ordered that notices be served requiring the
removal of the refuse

The Gas Manager reported that he had only
a week's supply of coal on hand and unless he gets
some during the week the supply will run out

He had grave doubts of getting any from the
contractor owing to the unsettled state of the country

The Gas Manager was authorised to go to
Derry and endeavour to get as much coal as possible
to tide over until the cargo on order is delivered

The Contractors to be wired to day as to the
position of affairs and asking them to arrange
for immediate delivery

The Gas Manager's collection account was
submitted and showed arrears of Quarter previous
to 31st December 1918 amounting to £13:18:5 outstanding

The Water Manager reported that during the
month there had been no bursts in the Lough Salt
Hawn nor on the Glens of An. That the Ardlum
Reservoir is at present overflowing but the overflow
is not sufficient to give the Town a supply and
he has to draw off the Ardlum Reservoir as well

The Council had under consideration the electric
lighting scheme and the Town Clerk was instructed to
communicate with the following electrical engineers as to

what they would charge for preparing a scheme and advising the Council in the matter viz : - Mr H. J. Kettle Dublin and Mr Stanley Dashwood Belfast Read letter from the Donegal District Asylum Committee asking the Council to have their scheme ready for submission at the February Meeting of the Committee to

The Town Clerk was instructed to inform the Committee that the Council could not have their scheme ready for submission at the February meeting of the Committee; that they are proceeding with as much expedition as they possibly can and will at the earliest date within their power submit full particulars. That it was only at the January Meeting of the Council it was decided to provide an electric installation for the district and the scheme could not be formulated and perfected within the short time mentioned by the Committee

Dr Manus McDonagh appeared before the Council and made application for an increase in the wages paid him by the Council for horse work. say 9/- per day this sum being out of all proportion with that at present paid for horse work in the district.

Ordered that the application be placed on the agenda for next meeting of the Council and also the consideration of the rescinding of the resolution of the Council passed at their meeting on 6th May 1918, as follows "That no new work be undertaken by the Council, no bonus nor any increase of salary be granted by the Council during the period of the war

Councillor Philip Carroll gave notice that at next monthly meeting he will move that the Council purchase a horse cart and harness for doing the horse work of the Council and that one of the surfacemen be placed in charge of the horse

of Bernard Cranmer and Alfred Bradley and stating
that when the Council takes into consideration the high cost
of living and the wages these men are at present in receipt of
they will agree that the present request is a very reasonable
Application refused

From the Poor Board of Guardians forwarding copy
of a resolution passed by them at their meeting on 26th
February 1919 regarding the treatment of the Political prisoners

On the motion of Councillor John Gallagher seconded
by Councillor John Ward the resolution was adopted

From the Director of Cross Channel Transportation re
correspondence relative to the commandeering of Mr.
Peter O'Geehins turf which he refuses to sell at the price fixed
by the Council

The Council unanimously undertook on the turf being
commandeered to dispose off the turf at the fixed price, handing
the proceeds after deducting expenses to Mr. O'Geehins. It was
further decided that Mr. John Curley be appointed to sell
the turf and that his wages be at the rate of 1/- per hour.

That he attend at Mr. O'Geehins premises on Monday from
10 A.M. to 2 P.M. On Wednesday from 10 A.M. to 1 P.M. and
on Saturday from 2 P.M. to 8 P.M.

From Messrs E. J. Dashwood or J. C. E. and Alfred W.
Browne on 1. m. 1. Belfast relative to proposed hydro electric scheme
for lighting the Town of Letterkenny and the Asylum. The
Engineer's charge for drawing out scheme for the work was

to be based on a fee of three guineas a day and travelling expenses. Should the scheme be adopted and a complete specification prepared the charge for this and for supervision to be 5% on the cost of carrying out the contract and in this case the preliminary charges mentioned would not be made

The Council decided to obtain a report and scheme on the terms stated.

From Messrs James McElveen & Sons Edinburgh correspondence re. parcel of coal ordered and delivered ex. S.P. Foardia the quality being of such inferior quality as to be unsuitable for gas production. In the opinion of the Gas Manager the coal is anthracite coal and that some mistake in the shipment must have occurred.

The contractors held that no mistake occurred and that the quality is the same as that supplied in Sept last.

In his report the Gas Manager stated that the coal has turned out most unsatisfactory for gas purposes and has caused a great deal of uneasiness, worry and excessive expenses. He trusted a decision would be arrived at at this meeting as to its disposal.

The Council directed that another cargo of Silketon gas coal be ordered from Messrs McElveen & Sons and that in the meantime the Gas Manager endeavour to get locally sufficient coal to keep going until the arrival of parcel now ordered.

It was unanimously decided to sell the cargo of inferior coal, there being a great scarcity of fuel in the district and the Council fixed the price at £3 per ton for ton lots smaller lots at 3/3 per cwt.

The Sanitary Sub Officer reported having inspected 30

houses and yards at Main St and Port Road and found the following nuisances existing viz:- In yard of Daniel Diver Main St a pile of manure too close to back door also an open drain emptying into sewer at Back door.

Ordered that notices be served requiring the nuisances to be abated.

The Gas Manager's collection account was submitted examined and showed arrears amounting to £39.19.8 quarters prior to 31st Decr 1918 outstanding.

Ordered that the Town Clerk apply to Mrs Sweeney and Miss McManagle for payment of their gas bills.

The Water Manager reported that he is at present engaged at scraping of the Lough Salt Spur and has scraped from the tunnel at the lough to the hatch box at reducing valve, as a result the water at present being delivered into the Reservoir at Barnamuggagh has been appreciably increased. That the reservoir now stands at 6 feet 1". the overflow takes place at 9 ft. That the town is presently being supplied from both Lough Salt and Glencar. He expected when the scraping is completed that the flow from Lough Salt will be greatly increased. That he had removed the pendulum from the reducing valve which gives the water a free run.

The Rate Collector Mr John McClean submitted schedule of uncollected rates on vacant houses for half year ending 31st March 1919 and claimed repayment from the Council of same under Article 92 of the Public Bodies Act 1909 amount £51.12.9 be struck off as recoverable for rates as stated in the schedule and refunded to the collector.

An application from John Collins, a workman usually employed by the Council for an increase of wages while employed on the rough salt pipe track was submitted.

The Council fixed the rate of wages at 1/- per day.

The Council had under consideration after consultation with the local coal merchants the fixing of prices for coal in the Urban District under the Retail Coal Prices Order 1917. The Council fixed the following maximum prices. For best selected English or Scotch house coal, sales of 10 cwt or more in bulk or in bags delivered into cellar per ton 6⁵. 1^d, sales of quantities less than one ton from road vehicles per cwt 3/3.

The Town Surveyor, Mr. Path Dawson, made application for payment to him of £10 for measuring and plotting gardens at Ballymacool Town in April 1918 and for the measuring and replotting same in January 1919.

Ordered that the amount claimed £10 be paid to Mr. Dawson in full of all claims in connection with the above.

The Gas Manager Mr. A. A. Mitchell for payment to him of £2. 2. 0 being railway fares and subsistence allowance for attending at London on 6 different dates in connection with coal supply for the Gas Works.

Payment ordered.

The following item appeared on the agenda paper to consider the question of rescinding the resolution of the Council passed at meeting of 6th May 1918. That no new works be undertaken by the Council, no bonus nor any increase of salary be granted by the Council during the period of the war.

No action taken thereon by the Council.

The Council considered the application of James Spolmaga for an increase in the wages paid to him by the Council for horse work.

Councillor P. Whately Jun proposed and Councillor John Gallagher seconded that James Spolmaga's wages for horse work be at the rate of 12/6 a day and be retrospective as from the 3rd day of February 1919.

Councillor John McElwee proposed and Councillor Philip Carroll seconded as an amendment that the wages be 12/- per day.

Voting - For the Amendment: Councillor McElwee & Carroll (2) For the Motion: Councillors P. Whately Jun, John Gallagher & John Ward (3) The Chairman did not vote.

The motion was declared carried and the wage fixed at the rate of 12/6 per day.

Electric lighting

The report of Mr. Alfred W. Brown M.I. Mech. E. and Mr. E. S. Dashwood M.I.C.E. dated 1st March 1919 on the proposed electric lighting of Petticreevy was read and stated that they had made preliminary inspections and visual survey of the various water powers in the vicinity of Petticreevy in order to advise the Council as to what in their opinion is the best position in which to place

(1) A hydro electric plant capable of lighting the Town (both houses and streets) the Tynham, the College and allowing a surplus for other buildings and future extensions.

(2) Should the water supply prove to be sufficient the above plant should be capable of being extended so as to supply power for the driving of industries thus enabling the Town to offer facilities to manufacturers anxious to establish

such industries in the future, enable existing manufacturers to run their plants at the lower rates than they can at present and add to the prosperity and employment of the citizens

The places visited, inspected visually and considered wereough Salt,ough Tastan, fergy River, Leron River, Geal River and Dow Mills. After dealing with each of the places referred to the Engineers concluded that the best positions for this proposed hydro electric plant are at Milltown Barrack and Milltown Kilmacrennan and from an Engineers point of view the balance was slightly in favour of the latter

They recommended a generating plant of 100 volts A.C. at either Milltown Barrack or Milltown Bridge Kilmacrennan the current to be transformed there up to 1000 volts and transmitted by overhead cable to the centre of the Town transformed down again to 100 volts and distributed through the Town at this pressure. A transformer would be installed at the Tynham and the pressure there for distribution would also be 100 volts.

Size of plant. They estimated the size of the plant required for lighting the Town and Tynham in the first instance as:- One 22 K.W. turbine generator and Governor and one 11 K.W. turbine generator & Governor allowing for the following of lights Petticreevy Town 1080, Tynham 550 - Total 1630. Cost of plant in the neighbourhood of £8,000 and cost of the purchase of the water rights to be added to this figure cost of operation. Estimated at per annum £180. Income at from £1400 to £2250.

Councillor John Gallagher proposed and Councillor Patrick Doherty Jun seconded the following Resolution
That the electric lighting scheme, ^{from now} Kilmacrennan be this day provisionally adopted and that a public meeting

of the Local Government electors of the District be called for Wednesday the 13th Inst at 8 o'clock in the Court House, after having to endorse or reject this Resolution and that all Local Government electors of the District present at said meeting be entitled to vote on the question.

The Presentation Brothers made application to the Council for permission to plant trees at Sartag Hill the property of the Council in order to beautify the place. A deputation of ratepayers, and Mr William Kelly, Solicitor on behalf of the local Rate Payers Association appeared before the Council, and sought information as to the Receipts and Expenditure of the Council and different heads during the financial year ended the 31st March last. The information sought by the deputation was published. They also discussed generally the management of the affairs of the Council, and in particular the Gas undertaking. The Town Clerk submitted the Gasworks Revenue Account for the financial year ended 31st March 1919 on which a deficit of £853.19: 2 on the year working was shown to exist. This deficit arose from the following causes (1) The Exceedingly high price of Coal, (2) The very inferior quality

of the Coal obtained, the fuel of gas per ton being only 4293 c.6 and (3) The price charged for gas under the existing exceptional circumstances being too low.

The Council ordered that the price of gas be advanced as from the 1st day of April 1919 to 17. per 1000 c.6. Gas for power to be advanced to 14/7 per 1000 c.6. These prices to remain in force until altered by the Council.

The Council further ordered that in future any Quarry refuse or rubbish not required or suitable for the maintenance of the shafts or roads is to be publicly offered for sale by tender.

From Messrs Brown & Dashwood, acknowledging receipt of letter and instructions to prepare Plans, Estimates and Specifications for the proposed Hydro-Electric scheme for Letterkenny, and that this will have immediate and best attention.

Letter addressed to the Chairman of the Council from Mr J. Allen O'Brien, Solicitor, dated 29th March 1919 re Council's application for sanction of the Local Government Board to loan the Electric Scheme was ordered to be marked "Read", and to be so acknowledged.

The Record of Work performed by the Pantong Post Office was submitted, examined and showed that since date of last monthly meeting 50 hours and premises had been inspected.

The Pantong Post Office reported that the following posts had complied with the requirements of the Pantong Notice served on them viz.: Mrs A. H. Tadder, Constable Wheeler, Thomas McGeerk and Daniel Dine.

The Pantong Post Office reported that Mr John L. Gallegher had not complied with the Pantong Notice served on him respecting premises in the occupation of Daniel Dine - Main Street.


It was decided not to adopt the Act.

The Town Surveyor reported that he expected the Donegal County Council stone breaker within three weeks and owing to the present state of labourers he wished the Council to decide as to rate of wages and hours to be allowed off as it will be necessary to engage 10 or 12 men also some 3 or 4 carts to remove stones to County road.

A long discussion took place as to the carting of the rough stones to the Pentry Hill to be there broken, or whether the breaking should be carried out at the Quarry. Eventually it was decided to get as many of the rough stones broken at the Pentry Hill as possible, and when these were broken that the stones breaker then go to the Quarry and break the remainder there. The Council fixed that the rate for Carting was not to exceed 18/- per day per horse cart and man, and that the wages for the labourers was not to exceed 6/8 per day. Should these terms not be accepted work not to be proceeded with. Working hours 7.30 am to 6 pm with one hour 000 for dinner.

An application by Mr. David McAnally for a rate and supply to his hotel garage was considered.

The Council granted the application, Mr. McAnally to pay annually to sum of £1:10:0 for the service. No water cars other than the property of Mr. McAnally to be wasted at the garage.



The Council adjourned till next meeting the consideration of the Housing Scheme for the Urban District.

The Town Clerk read the Notice concerning the Special meeting of the Council.

The Minutes of last monthly meeting were read and signed.

The following Letter from the Local Government Board was read

N^o 20550/1919, dated 9th May 1919. Relative to the resignation of the Poor Rate Collector in the Urban District and forwarded for consideration copy of a letter which the Board received from the Litterenny Ratepayers Association when the question of the remuneration of the Collector to be appointed comes before the Council. A form of query (in duplicate) to be filled up respecting the person appointed was enclosed.

The Council dealt with the question of the remuneration to be allowed to the new Collector at their meeting on the 5th May current.

The Council proceeded to appoint a Poor Rate, Town Rate, Rent and Special Rate Collector, in room of Mr John McClean resigned at a remuneration of £1 per week for collecting the Poor Rate and Town Rate, 1/- per week for collecting Rents Antizans Dwellings and £3 per annum for collecting the Special Rate Tax as advertised in the local newspaper.

There were 3 applicants for the office viz Mr Neil Toner, Ballaghfergus Letterkenny, Mr Alf. Browne, Rate Collector Donegal County Council, Letterkenny, and Mr John Harker, Carpenter, Letterkenny.

Councillor Philip Carroll proposed and Councillor Patrick Doherty, Jun^r seconded; - That Mr Alf. Browne be appointed.

Councillor John Ward proposed and Councillor Henry Gallagher seconded; - That Mr Neil Toner be appointed.

Councillor John Ward proposed; - That Mr John Harker be appointed. There was no seconder to this proposal.

Voting.

For Mr Neil Toner; - Councillors Henry Gallagher, John Gallagher, John Ward and James Gibbons (4)

For Mr Alf. Browne; - Councillors Patrick Doherty Jun^r, Robert McCloskey, Patrick Doherty Jun^r and Philip Carroll (4)

There being an equal division of votes the Chairman, Councillor James Gibbons gave his casting vote in favour of Mr Neil Toner, who was declared duly appointed.

Electricity Undertaking.

Read Correspondence with Mr Alfred J. Brown (Messrs Dashwood & Brown) relative to arrangements made with the Council as to charges in the event of plans and specification being prepared for the above and stating that same is somewhat obscure. That he had discussed the matter with Capt. Dashwood and they had agreed that the usual professional charge of 1½% on cost of plans and specification (plus out of pocket travelling expenses) and if the scheme is proceeded with and installed 2½% for supervision of erection and testing (plus out of pocket travelling expenses) would be preferable.

The Town Clerk submitted his reply sent Mr Brown which stated that the Council were under the impression that no charge of 5% covered the completion of the plans and that the plans Estimate and specification required for lodgment with the Local Government Board on application for sanction to the loan came under the preliminary proceedings for which £3:3:0 per day were to be paid and in case of the scheme being carried to completion these preliminary charges were not to be paid. His pending this matter being definitely settled it would be as well not to proceed further with the plans at the present.

The Council agreed with the foregoing reply, and instructed the Town Clerk to inform Messrs Dashwood & Brown that the plans Estimate and specification are to be considered as preliminary work for which they are prepared to pay at the rate of £3:3:0 per day for the number of days required to complete same. They are also prepared to pay out of pocket locomotion expenses, items to be properly touched and a sum of 10/6 per day to cover hotel expenses when staying in Letterkenny and District engaged in the work. These preliminary professional charges are in the event of the scheme being carried to completion to revere in the 5% charge which is to be calculated on the amount of the contract price.

The following were appointed, a Committee to visit and inspect the Gasworks, Mr Chairman, Councillors P. McCloskey and John Gallagher and the Town Clerk.

Copies of the Circular circulated among the Councillors.

No. 1247/1919 Mss., dated 6th May 1919.

Re. Housing of the Working Classes Act 1908 and stating that the proportionate amount of the Housing Fund on the 31st March last payable to the Council in respect of the liability incurred by them is £32 9 0.

Amount has been lodged to the credit of the Council.

No. 20094/1919, dated 7th May 1919.

Fowarding copies of the Auditor's report and of the abstract of the accounts of the Donegal County Anti Technical Instruction Committee for the period ended 30th September 1918.

No. 16687/1919 Mss., dated 7th May 1919.

Stating that the Treasury have decided that the Control exercised during the War on their behalf by the Capital Issuance Committee over the raising of new Capital in the market need no longer be maintained except as regards issues for Capital purposes outside the United Kingdom.

No. 25199/1919, dated 26th May 1919

Stating that they have had before them the report of the Committee respecting the appointment of Mr. Reid Tore as Post Rate Collector in Lt. Kenry Urban District, and that the Board have approved of the appointment for the current year's collection on the terms set out in the query form; and adding that the Board will consider the permanent appointment of Mr. Tore at the close of the financial year.

That the Bonds of this Office should be submitted for the Board's approval in due course.

The sum £1000 submitted the Warrant authorising Mr. Tore to collect and levy the Post Rate and Town Rates for the year ending 31st March

1920. No Harbours were sealed and agreed on behalf of the Council and the Town Clerk was instructed to hand same to Dr. Tovey on his Bond being produced.

No. 26582/1919 dated 31st May 1919

Transmitting copy of a letter with which they have been furnished by Dr. Charles Kelly, Letterkenny, on the subject of the danger to public health arising from the consumption of milk and meat from tuberculous cattle and requesting the observations of the Council on the matter.

The Council are not aware of any cases of bovine referred to in Dr. Kelly's letter.

Ordered that a copy of Dr. Kelly's letter be sent to Local Government Board to Central Butcher in the District.

From Messrs. James Hartnett & Co., Limerick dated 17th May 1919.

Inowing Notice for a quantity of Gas Coal shipped to the Sawmills per to os. "Tadla" 113:15:1 & 53/10 per ton delivered into works plus charge for same placed on Quay at Derry.

To Mr. Charles Kelly, Letterkenny, dated 31st May 1919.

Stating that there is a fair prospect at present that a number of factory owners may be induced to start an establishment here and inquiring if town water could be made available by extending the distribution system into his mill premises. It was possible that employment would be given to upwards of 200 men.

The Town Clerk to write to Dr. Kelly that the Council would be willing at all times to facilitate any proposal for the advancement of the town and to enquire the practicable quantity of water required.

From the Dublin Citizens Association dated 23rd May 1919

Forwarding copy of Resolution passed at Conference of representatives of the Dublin County Council, Rathmines, Portlaoise, Kilgstown, Blackrock, Killiney Urban District Council and Dublin Board of Guardians on the 8th April last:-

(1) That the Law of Settlement should apply to Ireland.

(2) That the Government should be urged to increase the Capital Grant to Asylums, also the Grants to Poor Law Unions be granted proportionate to the increased cost of maintenance.

On the Motion of Councillor Philip Carroll, seconded by Councillor John Gaultier the resolution was unanimously adopted.

No record of work performed by the Pavement Park Officer since date of last meeting was submitted & examined and showed that 40 hours work and premises had been visited and inspected and no nuisance found to exist.

The Gas Manager reported since last meeting the arrival of a small car of 6 tons coal and with the exception of 3 wagons he was fairly well satisfied with same. He made application for 14 days leave of absence.

Leave of absence granted.

The Gas Manager's Collection Account was submitted and examined and showed arrears previous to quota ended 31st March 1919 amounting to £58:8:7 outstanding.

The Waterman reported that since last meeting the storage reservoir had fallen 3 feet. Part of this was accounted for by the trade used in extinguishing fire at Mr. Robert Boal's premises on Sunday the 1st June. That this fire occurred at mid-day and with the assistance of willing volunteers, both police and civilian, was speedily got under control, extinguished and the premises saved.

The Glensar reservoir has about 6 feet storage. Both sources of supply are at present being used. That a burst on pipe from the Palace Grounds to the Convent had occurred and was giving some trouble in locating owing to the depth at which the pipe is laid under the embankment.

The Town Surveyor reported that he had examined the Concrete Kerb at Kilmacroney Road at Mr. O'Clunes premises, that there are four or five small breaks in concrete 1½ feet to 3 feet in length and it is possible for surface water of roadway to sink into masonry of Mr. O'Clunes property. Mr. O'Clune informed him that this Concrete Kerb was laid down at his expense. He since last meeting the Donegal County Council Stone Breaker arrived in District. He had it set up in Castlemarket where there are at present over 230 loads of quarried stones for breaking. He only 4 men exclusive of the surface men were sent in attendance prepared for start work; but not at the Haggis the Council Committee appeared and had decided on. They asked 10/- per day but might have taken 8/- per day. Happened at the Labour Exchange and handed in application for 10 men @ 6/- per day for at least 12 days. As there did not appear any likelihood of getting men on the following morning and as the Breaker was being idle at a half rate he sent it away. When the breaker comes to locality again it may be possible to get men to attend at the Haggis decided on.

Ordered that the Town Surveyor have the required repairs carried out to Kerb at Kilmacroney Road.

Ordered that the cutting of the rough stone from Glencar to Peatby Hill be done only by the Council's Contractor Mr. Macintosh Morris until next monthly meeting when the Surveyor is to report the number of loads cutted during the month.

The Council decided not to fix any scale of charges for water used in washing motor cars. The Water manager to see that no washing of cars takes place.

The Council had under consideration the rents payable by the Tenants of the Working Class Lodging Houses in Ballymacool Terrace, Rosemount Terrace, and McElroy Terrace, and it was resolved unanimously that in consequence of the amount charged on the Council in respect of the rates on said Dwelling Houses having been increased from 8/6 to 14/6 in the £ per annum, that in pursuance of the powers conferred by the Finance

of Rent and Mortgage Act (War Restrictions) Act 1915 that the rents of these houses be increased as follows:-

Ballymacool Terrace 25 Houses N°1 to N°15 both numbers inclusive Weekly Rent increased to 2/- N°16 to N°20 both numbers inclusive Weekly Rent increased to 3/- N°21 to N°25 both numbers inclusive Weekly Rent increased to 3/3. These rents include the sum of 3/- per week for garden allotment provided for each house which the Council now make it compulsory on each Tenant who has not already taken the garden allotted to his house to do so.

Rosemount Terrace, 15 Houses N°1 to N°15 both inclusive. Rent increased from 2/- to 2/6 Weekly.

McElroy Terrace 8 Houses N°1 to N°4 both inclusive Weekly Rent increased from 2/3 to 2/9. N°5 to N°8 both inclusive Weekly Rent increased from 2/6 to 3/-.

Ordered that notice be served on each Tenant of the foregoing houses that under the increase of Rent and Mortgage Act (War Restrictions) Act 1915, the Council propose to raise the existing rent to the amount above stated on account of the increase of rates and that each Tenant shall notice to Council and deliver up possession of the house and premises at the end of the week of his or her tenancy which will end at the expiration of four weeks after the service of such notice upon him or her.

Ordered that the Town Clerk be, and he is hereby authorised to sign on behalf of the Council all such Notices as aforesaid.

The Council decided to formulate a scheme for the erection of 50 houses under the Housing of the Working Classes Act and the members present voted the Town Clerk, and Town Surveyor were appointed a Committee to select sites, and report to next monthly meeting of the Council. It was also decided to advertise for suitable sites - Orders to be submitted at next monthly meeting.

The Town Surveyor was directed to take cedar repairs carried out in
Yard of House No 1 Rosemont Terrace and to gate leading to garden of
House at Ramelton Road

Ordered that a statement of the Gasworks account be submitted
to the Council after the 30th September, 31st December and 31st March in
each year.

Next Monthly Meeting of the Council to be held on Monday the 7th
day of July 1919.

From the Commissioners of Valuation dated 28th June 1919 acknowledging the receipt of lists of documents requiring revision in the Urban District.

From the Registrar of Petty Sessions Clerks Office. dated 11th June 1919. acquainting the Council that the proportion of Surplus Money. arising from the sale of Licences under the Dogs Regulation (Ireland) Act 1865 amounts to £ 4. 14. 4 for the Urban District for the year 1918. and that the Lord Lieutenant has directed that this sum should be paid over to the Treasury of the Council.

Amount has been lodged to the credit of the Council.

From Mr. Wm Kelly. Solicitor Letterkenny dated 27th June 1919 Forwarding Preliminary Notices of Application for Compensation for malicious Injuries at the instance of Constable Michael Keraghty who claims £400 compensation and Constable John Osborne Lumley who claims £300 compensation.

Ordered that the Notices be handed to Council's Solicitor Mr Edward McFadden with instructions to defend.

Read Reports from the R.I. Constabulary dated 28th June 1919. In reference to the claims for compensation by.

Constable Michael Heraghty and John O'Gumally under the Criminal Injuries (Ireland) act. 1919.

Reports to be passed to the Council's Solicitor

From the Surface men employed by the Council namely James Conran, Tormain, Bernard Conampsie, and Michael Bradley, asking the Council to consider the wages they are being paid, and applying for a "Living wage."

Ordered that the application be placed on the agenda for next Monthly Meeting of the Council.

Read correspondence with Mr Charles Kelly Steam Mills letter referring as to the quantity of water required for proposed Factory at his Mill premises in Sallaghgrane. That the Factory Owners consider 9 gallons of water per day per head represents the quantity, and that about 200 workers would be employed.

The Council on the foregoing estimate of 1800 gallons per day, unanimously agreed to let Mr Kelly have the Water supply for the annual sum of £5 per communication pipes, busters &c to be supplied and laid down at his own expense. Mr Kelly to obtain the consent of the Letterkenny Rural District Council to the Urban Council supplying water to the premises which are situated in the Rural District.

From the Director of Cross Channel Transportation P. 96/19. Dated 5th July 1919 Re Coal Prices. Referring to his letter of the 15th March last regarding the fixing of coal prices and asking the favour of an early reply.

The Council decided not to take any further steps in the matter for the present.

The Medical Officer of Health reported under date 4th July

1919 that a nuisance exists in the yard at the rear of Langan's Meat Shop. In the yard within about 10 yards from the house is a piggy. This is kept in a most filthy condition as is the yard around it. In hot weather there is a most offensive smell and recommended that the pigs be removed from the yard and the piggy thoroughly cleaned, as well as the yard around it. That if the present state of affairs were allowed to continue much longer during the hot weather it would be liable to give rise to an outbreak of fever.

The Executive Sanitary Officer reported that on receipt of the notice owing to the urgency of the matter he had notice served on the occupier Mr. W. H. Knipe requiring the recommendations of the Medical Officer of Health to be carried out within 48 hours.

The Sanitary Sub Officer reported service of the notice on Mr. Knipe on the 5th July 1919 and that he was complying with the requirements.

The Sanitary Sub Officer that since date of last meeting he had inspected 40 houses and yards at Main Street, Castle Street and Church Lane. At Castle Street in yard occupied by Mrs Boyle and Madge Doherty he found an open channel full of stagnant water and mud - very unsanitary - and no closets.

Notices to be served and 14 days allowed to abate the nuisance complained of. No order as to closets.

The Cowsheds and Dairy Inspectors Report was submitted - He reported on 33 cowsheds. That the following sheds required to be lime washed:- Owners - John McElhinney, William Curran, James Roche all of Main Street and John Doherty Port Road.

Notice to be served on Owners and 14 days allowed to lime wash sheds.

The Water Manager reported that the reservoir at Barranmugagh stands this day at 4' 11" being a decrease in storage since his last report Glenvar Reservoir has 4' of storage the water is being

turned off the town every night with the view of economy. An exception will have to be made this week. A burst occurred at service pipe at cottage at Ballymacool Terrace that this was being repaired.

Having regard to the foregoing report the council had under consideration the water supply given by them under agreement to the village of Kilmaheran and in order to investigate whether such supply materially affects the delivery of the rough salt main into the Reservoir at Barnamugagh it was unanimously agreed that owing to the scarcity of water at present existing in the Urban District to turn off the rough salt water from the Village of Kilmaheran for a period of 2 days and 2 nights and that during that period investigations be made to ascertain whether the supply to the Village of Kilmaheran materially affects the delivery of the main into the reservoir at Barnamugagh. The Letterkenny Rural District Council to be notified accordingly and seven days allowed before the water is turned off Kilmaheran.

The Water Manager to attend at Kilmaheran for the 2 days and 2 nights during which the water is turned off so as to prevent any interference with the valves and to be paid in respect of this service 25/- Water to be turned off at 3 o'clock in the evening.

The Sites Committee reported having met and agreed on recommending certain sites for houses and that they instructed the Town Surveyor to have in readiness a rough sketch showing the sites recommended to the council.

The Town Surveyor submitted a rough sketch showing the position of the proposed sites at field of the Presentation N.W. A street to be formed from Leck View to Presentation Monks gate at Recreation Ground. A street to be made from Mrs Finnegan's houses at St Columba's Terrace to 2 houses owned by the council at Ramelton Rd. and a line of houses erected from the West side of Ramelton Road from Mr Daniel Kelly's property to Murrac-a-Bro Avenue. Councillor John Ward considered

that at the "lower end" of the town at least half of the houses should be erected. After discussion the Town Surveyor was instructed to examine the Shelling Hill and Back Road. Also a site for 2 houses at Main Street offered by Mrs Susan Martin for £100. and to submit a report and sketch at next Monthly meeting of the Council.

The Town Clerk submitted the notices served on the council's tenants under the Increase of Rent and Mortgage Interest (War Restrictions) Act 1915 of increase of Rent on account of Increase of Rates.

It was ordered that proceedings under the notices be gone on with in the event of the tenants refusing to pay the increase demanded by the notices.

Next monthly meeting of the council to be held on Monday the 11th day of August 1919.

The Town Clerk read the notice convening the Special Meeting the Business to be transacted thereof being to consider letter from the Local Government Board, No 27 568/1919, dated 2nd July 1919, requesting the Council to investigate the charges in the letters forwarded to them by Mr William Kelly, Solicitor on behalf of the Urban District Ratepayers Association and decide whether the Council investigate the charges as requested or apply to the Local Government Board to hold a Sworn Enquiry into the charges.

The Sanitary Sub-Officer reported that since date of last meeting he had visited and inspected 20 houses yards and premises at Lower Main Street and found no nuisances.

The Shops Act Inspector reported that the Shops Act requirements were being observed in the District.

The Gas Manager reported that he required another cargo of coal and was loath to ask same owing to the abnormal price the last 6/- increase means a power, and he was seriously thinking it would be almost hopeless to carry on. Further Stokers are very discontent as to Wages. He had formed the opinion that there would be more difficulty in securing coal this Winter than last. He asked the Council to give the whole matter very serious consideration. Ordered that quotations be asked for a cargo of coal, and Order placed for same.

^{Collection}
The Gas Manager's account was submitted examined and showed arrears of quarters previous to the 31st March last amounting to £47-0-1. outstanding

The Water Manager reported - That as decided at last Monthly Meeting of the Council the Water Supply to Kilmacrennan was cut off for the space of 2 days and 2 nights that he remained at Kilmacrennan during that period and Mr. Patrick Fisher took observations as to the quantity delivered into the Reservoir. That the pipe at discharge did not show any apparent increase; but the velocity of the water must have been considerably increased as during the period Kilmacrennan was cut off the storage in Reservoir increased by 2 inches. That the Larnanagh Reservoir now stood

at 2' 5" this it had maintained for some days past that there was no storage in Glencar at present.

The Town Clerk reported that on the 1st August he wrote to Mr. P. Boyle, M.P. Kilmacrenan pointing out the serious state of the Water supply and the effect the shutting off of Kilmacrenan had on the storage in the Reservoir and requiring the local Committee at Kilmacrenan to make arrangement for the turning off of the water each evening at 6 o'clock until 4 o'clock the following morning failing this the supply might be discontinued indefinitely.

Read letter from Mr. P. Boyle undertaking to have the requirements of the Town Clerk's letter carried out.

The Town Surveyor reported that on Thursday morning last the Donegal County Council Stone Breaker started to break stones for the Urban Council at the latter market before starting work the labourers attending claimed they should be paid 12/- per day. After consultation with the Chairman of the Council and the Town Clerk it was decided to pay 12/- per day. That on Saturday last the labourers intended to take a half day. this would have thrown the breaker idle after some persuasion they agreed to continue work that evening; but have since given notice that in future they will take the half day of Saturdays whilst attending breaker.

The Council ratified the wages of 12/- per day for labourers work at the stone breaker and further ordered that the 3 surface men in the employment of the Council are to be paid at this rate also for the time they are engaged at the work in connection with the stone breaker.

The Committee appointed to meet the delegation from the Donegal Power and Lighting Company reported having

met the delegation on the 28th July last and having discussed with the delegation the subject of Electricity supply for lighting and power purposes for the Urban District. The Committee ascertained from the Delegation that the company would not sell to the Committee any rights they may have as regards Water, Power, or otherwise that they would not purchase from the Council the Council's interest in the existing Gas Works. The delegation offered to sell to the Council electricity at 6^d per unit for light and 2^d per unit for power in addition to this besides the cost of house installations there would be a charge of 8/- per annum for each metre supplied alternately they offered to supply electricity in Bulk £60,000. Units per annum Minimum quantity to be charged for whether used or not £150 & exceeding 60,000 units per annum 2^d per unit. The Council would have to cable the District and make the House Connections which the company estimated would cost £15 00. The Council considered the terms offered by the company prohibitive inasmuch as they would have to pay 60,000 units per annum whether used or not and taking the consumption of gas in the town as a standard far less than half this quantity would be sufficient for town purposes.

The Council decided to go on with their application to the Board of Trade for a Provisional Order under the Electricity Acts and that the Solicitor to the Council and the Electrical Engineers be urged to get the necessary legal and engineering works completed as early as possible. The following were appointed a delegation to appear before the next meeting of the Donegal County Council on the 26th August in relation to the County Council's resolution giving permission subject to the County Surveyor's report to the Donegal Power & Lighting Company to erect poles on the Old County Road from Kilmacrenan to Letterkenny Asylum in order to supply light and power to the Asylum.

Committee and to request the County Council not to enter into any agreement granting Wage leave until their application to the Board of Trade has been finally dealt with by the Chairman Councillors Robert McClure & John Gallagher, the Town Clerk and the Council's Solicitor.

The Town Clerk reported having interviewed the Council's tenants in reference to the Notices served on them under the Increase of Rent and Mortgage Interest (War Restrictions) Act 1915 of Increase of Rent on Account of Increase of Rates. That the tenants had entered into a Combination to pay only such an increase if any as would be agreed to at a Meeting of the tenants called for the purpose and on the advice of a solicitor whom they had employed. That at the Meeting referred it was unanimously agreed that each tenant was to pay an increase of 3^d per week. That on behalf of the Council he understood that this increase would be accepted by the Council.

The Council unanimously agreed to accept the increase of 3^d per week per house and thanked the Town Clerk for having effected a satisfactory settlement in the matter.

The Town Clerk reported having let House No 5 at Bellymead Terrace to Hugh Doherty at a Weekly Rent of 2/9 being an increase of 6^d per week in the former rent and House No 4, Rosemount Terrace to Daniel Doherty at a Weekly Rent of 2/6 being an increase of 6^d per week on the former rent.

The Council ratified the lettings.

The Town Surveyor submitted maps showing alternative sites for the erection of 50 Working class Houses. Ordered that the marked maps be forwarded to the Local Government Board that they may arrange

for an Inspection of the proposed site in accordance with regulations.

Applications from the Surface Men and Gas Workers for an increase of Wages and from the Office Keeper for an increase of salary were before the Council.

Ordered that all applications be placed on the Agenda for next Monthly meeting and that should any increase be then granted on the applications that such increase is to be retrospective and as from this date.

The Council proceeded to investigate the charges made by the letter Renny Ratepayers Association. The following letters relative thereto were read:

The charges contained in Mr Kelly's letter to the Local Government Board of the 26th April 1919. as follows:-

On the 7th inst. (4th April 1919) a deputation from the association attended a Meeting of the Urban Council when certain queries were put to the council and its officials by the Members of the deputation relative to some of the grievances of which the association had reason to complain. Having regard to the replies then given the Association feel that nothing

less than a sworn Inquiry at the instance of your Board will meet the circumstances.

It was admitted at the meeting on the 7th inst by Mr Patrick Dawson the Urban District Surveyor that he had allowed a quantity of stones to be removed from the Urban District Quarries and placed on a road or roads under the control of the Donegal County Council and for which his son James Dawson is the contractor. Mr Dawson stated that he looked upon the material as "Brock" but he admitted that it was put on his son's contract roads as good material.

The Ratepayers Association consider that upwards of eighty tons of mauld stones were so removed and the County Surveyor for the County of Donegal can prove that he passed the material as sufficient for his purposes.

No tender was asked for the material by the Urban Council and as there was a scarcity of material in the District the association are of opinion the Urban District Ratepayers thereby suffered a considerable loss. Apart from the monetary loss the Association think such a transaction was irregular and that it calls for serious inquiry. If an inquiry be granted it may transpire that this was not the first occasion on which Urban District Material was used for roads in the County District.

The field in which the quarry is situated is set to one of the Urban District Workmen at a yearly sum of 8 Shillings. The Association consider that it should be let for at least £2 : 0 : 0 per year and at all events by auction.

The Council admit they get their printing and Stationery as well as several other requirements such as Brushes Shovels Picks &c without inviting tenders and the Association desire to point out that in their opinion a saving could be effected if Tenders were called for. The Association believe that the Urban Council are paying one of their members for land for the use of dumping

refuse and they think if advertisements were issued dumping grounds could be obtained without any serious cost and perhaps at a mere nominal payment as the refuse is in many cases of value for top dressing lands. The foregoing are amongst some of the causes of complaint which the Association wish to bring under the notice of your Board. The Rates at present are 14/- in the pound and the cost of gas 18/- per each 1000. cubic feet. The Council admit that last year the Gas Works were run at a loss of £800. and during the two previous years also at a loss. The Association believes that a strict investigation of the manner in which the Gas Works are managed and of the disposition of Tar and other products would be most useful. The Association will therefore be much obliged if you consider the matter and let me know when and where an Inquiry will be held so that the necessary witnesses may be summoned.

The Council having called upon the Town Surveyor for a statement in writing as to the charges preferred against him he submitted the following -

Gentlemen: At your meeting held on the 14th Oct. 1918 in my report I mentioned that the Quarry at Glencar was becoming blocked with refuse and small stones. That the Platform for piling quarried stones for breaker was becoming larger than was necessary and I stated it was possible some Road Contractor would remove this if they got it free for the carting. Your Council decided that I should make arrangements with any contractor and have the Brock referred to removed. My son who is a road contractor had about 80 loads or so carted to his contracts in allowing him to remove the stuff I was acting as I understood on the authority of the Council.

Interrogated by the Council as to statement that this was not the first occasion on which Urban District

Material was used for roads in the County District Mr. Dawson replied that on one occasion and one only about 2 years ago he took a load of about 38 tons of broken stones the property of the Urban Council but that this quantity of like quality of broken stones was within a short period carted at his expense to the Urban District from his quarry at New Mills. There was no secret made of this transaction at the time.

Councillor Robert McClure M.P. Proposed:- That the council accept Mr. Dawson's explanation as satisfactory being satisfied that the Urban District Ratepayers suffered no loss, and seconded by Councillor John Ward, and passed unanimously. As regards the Renting of the quarry field at 4/- per annum. to the Foreman Surfaceman. the council regard it as a very small perquisite for him at the time of letting the $\frac{3}{4}$ part of the field was covered with piled broken stones and with quarrying operations in progress would be dangerous to have cattle grazing on. The wages of this foreman is only 6/- per week. more than the other surface men. and not adequate for the extra duties he has to perform. Before the council got this field for quarry purposes the utmost that could be got by the owner for the entire field for grazing was £2 a year.

Printing Stationery &c. - The Council have been getting their Printing &c. from the County Donegal Printing Company Ltd being the only Printing firm in the District that pays the standard wages fixed by the Typographical Association for the District and in doing so they have acted in accordance with the Fair Wages clause resolution which they adopted years ago. In case the other printing firm in the District elects to pay the standard wages to their employers the council will invite them to tender for any printing that may be required.

Brushes shovels picks &c. In purchasing these without

Contracts the council consider they have acted in the best interest of the Ratepayers as in their opinion the council consider it is the cheapest way as they get the articles at current price besides the quantities of these articles required are but small and the Cart would not average 10/- a week for the year. Contracts for materials are always taken when works requiring considerable outlay are being carried out.

Rent for Dumping ground. The person from whom the council at present rents the Dumping ground is a member of the council but was not when the council took the land from him the Annual Rent paid by the council is £4; 0: 0 this sum was paid by the council for a former dumping ground in the same locality obtained after advertisement the owner of which asked for an increase of rent which the council declined to give he then served notice to quit on the council and the council took the present Dumping Ground at the same rent.

Gas Works. The loss in this Department is the result of war conditions. The abnormally high price paid for coal. The inferior quality of the coal obtainable and also from the fact that the council did not advance the price of gas in proportion to the advance in the price of coal always hoping that the abnormal conditions would soon terminate. The disposition of products like Gas &c. is properly regulated and sells for no improvement.

Edinburgh as to supply of large of Gas coal in which they offered to supply a quantity of Silkestone Gas coal at price same as last viz 53/10. plus 6/- per ton authorised by the Coal controller making the price 59/10 per ton delivered into the gas works.

The Town Clerk stated that he had, after consultation with the Chairman place order for, para at this price which order the Council ratified.

Mr Charles Kelly wrote under date 18th August 1919 offering to sell the Old Barrack property adjoining the Gas Works to the Council for the sum of £100 free of rent.

No action taken or offer.

Read Constabulary Report dated 9th August 1919 on the alleged malicious injury to a drum belonging to the Duke of Devonshire Brass Band. Letter Runny.

Ordered that the report be handed over to the Council's Solicitor Mr Edward McFadden.

From the Pembroke Urban District Council dated 28th July 1919 Forwarding Copy of a Resolution unanimously entered into at a Meeting of the Council held on the 21st July last as follows:- That having carefully considered the financial conditions of the proposed Irish Housing Bill this Council is of opinion that the subsidy of 25/- and 27/6 in special cases, for each 20/- of rent collected will be wholly inadequate to meet the liability falling on Urban Authorities and we recommend that the financial conditions laid down in the English and Scotch Bill whereby the liability of local authorities is limited to 10/- in the £ should be extended to Ireland.

The Resolution was unanimously adopted.

The Sanitary Sub Officer's dairy showing work performed since last Meeting of the Council was submitted and showed that 20 houses, yards and premises had been inspected. He reported a nuisance on premises occupied by Michael Higgins - Owner Mrs G. Mulhern.

Notice to be served on Owner, and 14 days allowed to abate

nuisance complained of.

The Inspector of Dairies and cowsheds reported that the cowshed of John Doherty Port Road was in a filthy condition. Ordered that Notice be served on the Owner and 14 days allowed to have the cowshed properly cleaned and lime-washed.

The Shops Act Inspector reported the Shops Act was being fairly well observed in the District.

The Gas Manager reported that a cargo of coal delivered since last meeting was of wretched quality and he had come to the conclusion that unless better is provided in future it would be more advantageous to close the Works. It was really heart breaking to have to do with such material he was thankful however that he got such a small quantity viz. 57^{tons. cwt.} 16^{lb.} & he was doing his utmost to make the best of it but at the same time it was, entailing extra labour. That there was a quantity of slack on hands he would like disposed of.

Ordered that quotations for another cargo of Salford Gas coal be invited and that tenders for the slack be advertised for.

The Gas Manager's collection account was submitted & examined and showed arrears of Quarters previous to 31st March last amounting to £. 43: 6: 1. outstanding

The Water Manager reported that since last meeting the delivery from the high Salt Main into the Reservoir at Barnamugagh had been restored to normal. The storage now stands at 1' 11". There is a burst in the lead main pipe between the Palace and the Convent this pipe is at such a depth owing to the ground having been filled up. since pipe was laid that he considered it would be better to have a new piece of pipe laid at a depth of about 18" for say a distance

of 10 yards. this would be more economical and should a burst again take place. would be easily repaired. Glencair reservoir at outlet stands 18" high.

Ordered that the repair to lead main pipe as recommended be carried out.

The Lighting and Water Committee reported having met on the 25th August 1919 and considered the question of the water supply to the Town Asylum and Kilmacrennan. The Committee directed that the supply to SetterPenny until further orders be from 7. A.M. to 8. P.M. daily. That the supply to Kilmacrennan be limited to 3 hours every alternate day. from 9 A.M. till 12. noon until such time as the Council's Reservoir at Carnamugagh is again at the overflow, and that the local Committee at Kilmacrennan shall be notified to this effect. The Report was adopted.

Read letter from Mr. P. Coyle. Kilmacrennan. Sec. Local Committee that the local Water Committee agreed to the terms of the Council but instead of the hours. 9 to 12. noon they had made same. from 11 am. to . 2 P.M. which they hoped would make no difference.

The Council agreed to the change of hours.

The Town Surveyor reported - That since last meeting he got all stones broken. at battle Market and also in quarry field. It was not possible to get sufficient carts to remove stones from quarry as they were broken. The Breaker was engaged breaking 13^{1/2} days. and had broken during that time approximately from 470 to 500 tons and about 50 tons of screening. He had some carts at present time carting from quarry to convenient depots on side roads and Main Roads so that when it becomes necessary to spread material the carting will cause little delay. Some time ago the Council passed for repairs only. a gate leading to gardens at rear

of artigian Dwellings Ramelton Road. The carpenter John Hartin states it is impossible to repair same. He (the Town Surveyor) considers a new gate necessary. As a carpenter trying to place new timber on rotten ledger would be throwing both time and timber to loss. He had given surface men orders to repair all loose tiles with concrete formed. from screening and cement. also to repair the gravel footpaths and inside gravelled portions of concrete. footpaths with screening spread after the inside portions have been made up. with hard filling from quarry.

The report was adopted.

The Council decided not to proceed with the repair of the gate and that the provision of a new gate be deferred.

Ordered that the windows of a house occupied by John Cullen be repainted.

Re. Electricity Undertaking

The Deputation appointed by the Council to appear before the County Council at their meeting on the 26th August last reported having so attended and that the County Council had acceded to the request of the Urban Council and deferred until the 1st January next. the operation of the resolution granting Way leave to the Donegal Power and Lighting Company. to erect poles along the Old County Road from Kilmacrennan to SetterPenny in order to supply light and power to the Asylum Committee.

Read correspondence with Mr. Thomas Duncan Glasgow and Messrs James McElvie & Co. Edinburgh as to supply of a parcel of Limestone Gas Coal. The former was not at present in a position to quote. The latter offered a further delivery unless there is an immediate further increase by the coal control or in transport charges—on the same terms as last May—5⁹/₁₀ per ton delivered free into the Council's gasworks.—

Ordered that a cargo be ordered on the terms stated

From Mr. Tom Kelly Solicitor dated 20th September 1919 on behalf of Mr. James Gibson tenant No 15 Rosemount Terrace and asking that 2 panes of glass broken deliberately on the 13th & 19th inst be repaired by the Council and asking the Council to take steps to put an end to this class of conduct.

The Council decided to have the paues put in and that the Police be asked to have a watch over the locality to prevent the Council's property being injured.

From Mr. Patrick McGeaghan Sanitary Sub-Officer &c. dated 6th October, 1919. Applying for an increase of Salaries in respect of the Offices held by him under the Council. That his Salary as S.S. Officer was but £6 per annum. As Inspector of Dairies and Cowsheds &c £5. and as Shops Act. Inspector £5 full total £16. He considered that the Council would have no hesitation in arriving at the conclusion that he was under paid.

Ordered that the application be placed on the Agenda for next Monthly Meeting of the Council.

The Medical Officer of Health reported that nuisances exist at the houses No 2 & 4 St. Columba Terrace occupied by Sergeant O'Brien and Mrs Barr, respectively. In both houses the floor of a room on the ground floor is almost completely rotten and half the Boards are entirely missing exposing the clay. It was the worst case he had seen or heard of. Sergeant O'Brien's is particularly bad and his suite of furniture is practically ruined on account of it and he recommended that the Council take immediate steps to have new floors put in these houses as their present condition is a source of grave danger to the health of the inhabitants.

Ordered that notices be served on the owner and one month allowed to carry out the recommendations of the Medical Officer of Health.

The Sanitary Sub-Officer reported work done by him since date of last Monthly Meeting - He had visited and inspected 20 houses, yards and premises and reported 2 cases of nuisances to the Medical Officer of Health.

The Gas Manager reported that there was nothing special to report on since last meeting. He was greatly afraid that unless the Railway Strike collapsed the stock of Coal will run out. The utmost he could reckon on was a 4 weeks supply.

The Gas Managers Collection Account was submitted examined and showed arrears of quarters previous to 31st March 1919 amounting to £47. 2. 11. outstanding.

The Water Manager reported that since last Monthly Meeting the Lough Salt main has been in good order. no burst having occurred. The water this day stands at 5' 9" in the Lannanagh Reservoir Glencar stands at 1' 6" That as soon as the water rises in Lannanagh Reservoir it will be necessary to again start the scraping of the Lough Salt main beginning at Jordrum this being the place where the last scraping ceased. That it will be necessary for the Council to name someone to assist him as the man who used to do so is now fully employed at the Gasworks.

Ordered that tenders be invited for the scraping of the Lough Salt Main from the Lough to the Reservoir at Lannanagh.

The Council Ordered that the Public Samps at the following places in the District be lighted during the Winter:— Main St. — At Roulston's Surveyors, Kelly's, McClure's and Tewson, at the Palace, and the Town Clock, for Market Square, and that the best burners possible be provided for the Samps.

The Town Surveyor reported that several Residents on Railway Road complain of the offensive smell from manhole on Main Street at the junction of Roads near Railway Station and asked that a Timber Cover should be placed inside the manhole. Ordered that the Medical Officer of Health be asked to make an inspection and report on the matter.

From Mrs Annie McCarrig, drawing the attention of the Council to a choked drain from pump at Cottage Row, so a result from which the Water is flowing into her yard and causing a nuisance and asking the Council to have the defect remedied. That she cannot understand why the Council neglects the street of Cottage Row Government Terrace and McCarry's Terrace have been coated and Cottage Row left undone. That this Row became Town Property when Mr. McPhenna was a resident of them.

Ordered that the Town Surveyor have the drain referred to repaired by the Surface Men, so as to convey the water into the Main Sewer of the Street.

The Rate Collector Mr. Neil Jones submitted Schedule of uncollected rates for the half year ended 30th September 1919 on Vacant houses and claimed repayment from the Council of same under Article 92. of the Public Bodies Order 1904. Amount £31: 19: 11

The Council recommended that the amount £31: 19: 11 be struck off as irrecoverable and refunded to the Collector. The Schedule with the unissued receipts to be forwarded to the Local Government Board with the Council's recommendation for the ruling of the Local Government Board.

The Council had before them offers for an old condemned weighbridge at the Gasworks. The Cheap Cash Store Ltd. offered 10/- and Mr. John Ward offered 15/- The offer of the latter being the highest was accepted.

After much discussion the council decided that the scraping be carried out by direct labour. as hitherto and the Town Clerk was authorized to employ the necessary labour to assist the Water Manager in the work. The scraping to start as soon as the reservoir at Larnanmaggagh is at the overflow.

It was unanimously resolved that a letter should be addressed to the Directors of the several Irish Banks expressing the hope that they will see their way to avert the threatened serious disorganization of the business of the County by agreeing to recognise the Irish Bank Officials Association and that the council are confident that the recognition of an association such as this composed of gentlemen known to all cannot be hurtful to any Banking Institution but would tend rather to promote the good feeling that ought to exist between employers and employed.
