From the Irish Representative of the controllers of Coal Mines dated 19th July 1920

Asking the Council to favour him with the views as to whether it would be advisable to suspend the operation of the Turf Maximum Price Order 1918 as to what in his opinion would be the result of suspending such an Order. Would it have the effect of raising the price of turf above the present maximum price?

Ordered that no reply be given.

From the Strabane and Letterkenny Railway Company dated 19th day of July 1920.

Forwarding Arbitrator's certificates in connection with the Council's guarantee for the half year ended 30th June 1920.

The Council discussed the closing down of the Railway which

has recently taken place and the nonpayment of the Guarantee is a protest against the action of the Railway Company eventually it was decided as the Certificate related to the half year ended 30th June last and the closing down of the line has taken place since that date to pay the amount of the present demand.

That the Town Clerk write the Railway Company protesting emphatically against the closing down which has taken place of the Railway entailing as it does an enormous loss to the merchants of the Town and the community generally not only loss but more serious inconvenience - that unless the line is at once opened again for regular traffic the Council will insist the payment of any further sums on part of their Guarantee - that the Guarantee was not given by the Council for a closed down concern.

From the Constables Lough Salt reporting that he had secured the Lough Salt-Water Main on the following dates viz 15th & 30th July 1920.

From Mr. J. H. Surveyor Mr. T. C. S. Belfast dated 30th July 1920
Forwarding plan, specification and estimate for water meter chamber and gauge well. Lough Salt Water Works.

Having regard to the fact that these works were intended to be carried out by money obtained on loan under the sanction of the Local Government Board and to the decision of the Council come to at this meeting on the letter of the Local Government Board as to the assurance asked for by the Board no further order in relation to carrying out the proposed works was made.

From the Catholic Total Abstinence Federation of Ireland dated July 1920 submitting a series of Resolutions unanimously adopted at the ordinary Quarterly Meeting of the Federation held on June 16th. What might be discussed by the Council and venturing to bespeak for them not only favourable notice but as far as may be possible the effective support of all representative and labour

From Mr A. J. Horan dated 20th July 1920.

Requesting permission to make certain alterations in the footpath in front of his premises at Market Square and enclosing photo with sketch of what he would do at his own expense.

The Council granted the application the works to be carried out to the entire satisfaction of the Urban District Surveyor.

The Town Clerk submitted copy of letter addressed by him to the Secretary of the Donegal County Council on the 12th July last that the Urban Council were desirous to know what their claims in respect of the maintenance by them of the Main Roads of the Urban District will be paid by the County Council pointing out that the County Council are indebted to the Urban Council for the sum in the sum of £300 : 10 : 7 up to 31st March 1920 also for the year ended 31st March 1919 £101 : 7 : 0 . 31st March 1920 £199 : 3 : 7 Total £300 : 10 : 7.

Read letter from the Secretary of the Donegal County Council No 824 dated 13th July 1920 acknowledging receipt of letter above reference to and stating that he would place same before the County Council at their next meeting with a view to having the matter dealt with.

The Sanitary Sub Officer reported that since date of last meeting he had inspected 30 houses and yards at Lower Main Street and found no nuisance existing

The Sanitary Sub Officer reported that Mr. W. A. Flattery Agent for Mrs. M. J. Finnegan had not complied with the requirements of the Sanitary Notice served on him respecting the repairs to premises in the occupation of Michael Blake at St Columba Terrace

Read letter from Mrs. Finnegan dated 11th August 1920 that as soon as she can get the timber from Mr. Speer she will have the work required by the notice done.

Ordered that the time allowed in the notice be extended till next monthly meeting of the Council

The Executive Sanitary Officer submitted the Sanitary Notice served on Mrs. Cathleen Mulhern on the 3rd May of March last requiring premises at Main Street owned by her and occupied by Hugh Sweeney to be put into a proper state of repair

The Council having from time to time deferred action on the notice for non compliance therewith. The Executive Sanitary Officer pointed out that the 6 months within which legal proceedings required to be commenced would expire before the date of the next Monthly meeting of the Council.

Ordered that Mrs. Cathleen Mulhern be ordered to next Petty Sessions for her default should she however begin to carry out the repairs the proceedings not to go on. In case the summons be issued it was further ordered that inasmuch as there is no summons serve for the Petty Sessions that the Sanitary Sub Officer be required to serve the summons in the case.

The Sanitary Sub Officer reported that Mrs. Cathleen Mulhern had not complied with the notice served on her on the 3rd March last under the Public Health (Ireland) Act 1878 requiring her to provide water closet accommodation for house owned by her and occupied by Hugh Sweeney at Main Street Action on the notice has from time to time been deferred.

The Council now determined not to enforce the terms of the notice

The Gas Manager reported that he had nothing special to bring before the Council. He was anxious as to a further supply of Coal as prospects don't look too pleasant owing to the unsettled state of affairs. The stock of Coal on hand will last a couple of weeks.

The Gas Manager's Collection Account was submitted & examined and showed arrears of Quarters prior to 31st March 1920. Amounting to £ 5 5s 6d outstanding.

The Rent Collector's Account up to 31st July was submitted and examined. It was found that Ellen Doherty, No 5 McClurkin Terrace, was considerably in arrear and it was ordered that she be served with a notice to quit for non payment of Rent.

The Water Manager reported Barnamugagh Reservoir as at 4' 10" Glencar Reservoir as at 8'. Part of the town was being supplied from Glencar.

The Council according to Notice considered the application of Dr. Joseph P. McQuile, Medical Officer of Health for an increase of salary on the grounds that the present salary of £8. was inadequate and £10 would be a reasonable salary.

On the Motion of Councillor John Doherty seconded by Councillor Patrick O'Donnell the salary of the Medical Officer of Health be increased to £10 per annum.

The sanction of the Local Government Board to the sanction is hereby requested.

An application from Mervyn Monagle for an increase of pay for the Horse Work of the Council was considered. The rate of wage at present paid him for man horse and carting being 12/- per day.

The Council decided on the motion of John P. Speer seconded by Councillor Tom Gallagher to increase the Rate of wage.

for Service above mentioned to 15/- per day.

The Town Clerk submitted a Advertisement issued inviting Tenders for quarrying Blasting and Piling Stones ready for Stone Breaker at the Glencar Quarry at per ton -

There was only one tender received that of James Doherty, @ 3/- per ton (24 Cubic feet) all tools to be supplied by the Council.

The Council decided not to supply any tools but to accept the tender subject to Doherty providing his own tools and further if it be found practicable for the stones to be quarried by contract with surfacemen quarrying at same time in the quarry.

The following Councillors were appointed a Committee with the Town Clerk Town Surveyor and four men Surfacemen to visit the quarry and decide the practicability of having the stones quarried by contract under the existing circumstances. Mr. Councillors John Curran, John Doherty, John P. Speer, Tom Boyle.

Report of sub committee on Glenar Quarry &c.

Meeting held Monday 16th August 1920 Councillors in attendance
Messrs John P. Green John Curran. John Doherty & Tom Gallagher

Report. - On the inspection of the Quarry the Committee found
that it would not be practicable to have stones quarried by Trotter
and at the same time for the Council's Workmen. in regular em-
ployment at a weekly wage. to be raising stones in the Quarry.
They therefore recommend. that the acceptance of James Doherty
Under for quarrying be abandoned

The Committee also found that the quarry operations have
entered into the field owned by Mr Patrick Langan brother of Mr.
James Langan who rented his land as a quarry to the Council

The Town Surveyor was instructed to prepare a sketch of the
Quarry. as it now stands showing the encroachment made. also
a sketch showing the portion of Mr Patrick Langan's field that the
Council now require to make use of as a Quarry

The Committee also inspected the Glenar Reservoir and Water
works grounds. They found a considerable amount of water in
the Reservoir but a good distance below the overflow. The
pier of the entrance gate they found had been pulled down. and
the gate left open. Little had as a result got into the grounds.

They found the place had been entirely neglected. The spring
had not been cleaned. neither had any of the back water drains
the settling basin was filled up with sediment. The whole place

presented the appearance of not having received any attention for months. The Committee directed that the grass of the place be offered for sale by proposals. They also directed that the Springs and bath Water drains be thoroughly cleaned and that the pier of the entrance gate be rebuilt.

The Report was unanimously adopted.

Housing of the Working Classes Acts and Labourers Acts during the years ended 31st August 1891, 1901, 1911, and 1919 respectively, and the total number of persons directly benefiting from the expenditure for the year 1919.

Return has been forwarded.

No 51390. 1920. dated 28th August 1920

Relative to the appointment of Mr Michael Dawson as Town Surveyor in the Letterkenny Urban District and requesting that they may be furnished with Mr. Dawson's qualifications.

The Town Clerk submitted copy of his letter of the 31st August 1920 in reply that the only evidence of Mr Dawson's qualifications before the council at the time of his appointment was the letter of the Local Government Board. No 125/ m/ 1918. dated 14th November 1918 addressed by the Board to Mr Dawson informing him that a the examination of Candidates for Assistant Surveyors in Ireland held on the 29th & 30th October 1918 he qualified at the examination in the subjects prescribed in the Board's Order of the 31st March 1913 with regard to Assistant Surveyors. That the council considered this letter sufficient evidence as to Mr Dawson's Qualifications.

for the office of Town Surveyor should however the Board require further proof it will be supplied.

Circular Letter to Local Authorities on the subject of bonuses and stating that in accordance with the report dated 8th May 1920 presented by the joint Committee of the National Council for the Administration and Legal Departments of the Home Civil Service the Treasury has recently authorised for Permanent Civil Servants a further revision of the Scales of bonuses - A copy of the table showing the revised scales is appended and it was requested that a reference to this table may be substituted for reference to previous scales in the earlier Circulars.

No 53198. 1920. dated 2nd September 1920.

Stating that they have approved of the Council's proposal to increase from £8. to £20 a year the Salary of Dr. J. P. McFirley, as Medical Officer of Health of the Urban District.

From the Office of National Education Dublin dated 23rd August 1920
Requesting to be furnished in the form enclosed with Particulars as to the persons appointed by the Letterkenny Urban District Council acting as the Local Authority under the Irish Education Act 1892 to be members of a new Committee for the Urban District of Letterkenny from the 1st January 1921.

Ordered that the appointment of the New Committee be placed on the Agenda for Next Monthly Meeting.

From the Donegal County Council

No 894 dated 2nd September 1920 Referring to the Town Clerk's letter of the 12th July last relative to the Urban Council's claim in respect of the Maintenance by them of the Main Roads in the Urban District and stating that the County Council at their recent meeting directed Mr. Headman County Surveyor to go

into the claim and issue a Certificate as required by Clause 5 agreement between the County Council and the three Urban District Councils in the County.

From Local Government Department - Dail Eireann dated 31st August 1920 Forwarding Copy of Resolution adopted by the General Council of County Councils in re. the Belfast-Pogrom, as follows:-

As the imposition of religious and political tests as a condition of industrial employment in any part of Ireland has been declared illegal this council calls upon all Public bodies here represented and upon Local Authorities everywhere throughout Ireland to take immediate steps to cease trading with the City in which such an illegal test is now attempted to be enforced. This council further recommends that business be discontinued throughout Ireland with the branches of the banks which finance firms who apply or permit to be applied such illegal tests and firms which expel or permit to be expelled employees who refuse to submit to such illegal tests.

This Cession of trade and the Withdrawal of support from the Banks indicated are to be maintained until such time as the victimised employees are unconditionally re-employed. On the receipt from the local Labour leaders and the authentic representatives of the persecuted people a White List of firms which have refused to permit their employees to be illegally expelled from their works. the council will recommend that business with such firms be resumed.

The council unanimously adopted the resolution.

From the Minister of Labour, Dail Eireann - Re formation of Conciliation Boards to meet when required for the purpose of discussing and arriving at an amicable settlement of such questions as the advance of wages length of working hours and other questions that may arise between employers and employed

such conciliation Board to consist of two or more representatives of the local Board and two or more representatives of the officials or employees - a neutral chairman to be appointed who shall be agreeable to both parties.

The council unanimously approved of the scheme.

From Dail Eireann - Ministry of Labour Relative to Members of the R.S.L.C. who obeying the voice of Conscience have found they have a country to which they owe a duty and are discarding the uniform of the Army of Occupation and asking the council both as a council and as individual men and women to do their utmost for these men.

The council unanimously decided to carry out the wishes of Dail Eireann in the matter.

From Mr Samuel Roulston dated 12th August 1920 asking the council to lay down a metal pipe at Gateway leading to his premises at Main Street so that a Road Vehicle can have access to the premises without danger to itself.

Application granted.

Correspondence with Messrs James McKelvie & Co. Dublin as to large of lps coal and that they would send parcel via Londonderry at the first available opportunity.

From the County Donegal Railway's joint Committee dated 21st August 1920.

Acknowledging receipt of letter of the 14th August intimating that the council protested against the closing down of the Strabane and Letterkenny Railway and assuring the council that no one regrets more than the management the necessity that has forced them to discontinue the running of trains between Strabane and Letterkenny involving as it does serious

loss and inconvenience to the General Public - That the present situation has brought about - As the Council must surely be aware by the action of certain evil disposed persons in Letterkenny and the surrounding District who apparently desire to stop all traffic on the Railway On the night of the 28th July the engine returning from Letterkenny to Strabane was fired at by persons concealed behind a hedge a short distance from the line the rifle bullet narrowly missing the driver and fireman and on the following night an attempt was made to overturn the engine travelling from Letterkenny to Strabane large stones being placed on the track for this purpose As a consequence their engine men have absolutely refused to further imperil their lives by running trains and keeping open railway communication between Strabane and Letterkenny and in face of this refusal they had therefore no alternative but to close the line for public traffic and it was feared it must remain closed until such times as normal conditions are restored or sufficient military protection is offered for the Railway and the Staff concerned

Suggesting that the Council representing as it does the Ordeal elements of the population and wielding such a wide influence should pass a resolution at their next meeting protesting against and condemning the outrages perpetrated on an offending Railway men engaged in the performance of their ordinary and legitimate duties

The Council considered the foregoing letter as an attempt to get away from the real cause of the closing of the line for traffic From enquiries by certain Members of the Council made in the locality in which the alleged shots are stated to have been fired the Council considered that no such firing actually took place and the closing of the line must be attributed to some other cause best known to the Management.

The Council learned from one of its members Mr W G McKinney that he was refused the use of the spur line to Port Ballyraine Quay for storage of his Coal there although the Derry Swilly Railway

Company were ready and willing to have the wagons to the Quay.

This spur line was constructed in connection with the Quay at Ballyraine and its use should not have been refused to Mr W G McKinney under the circumstances stated

The Record of Work performed by the Sanitary Sub Officer since date of last Meeting was submitted examined and showed that 35 houses and yards had been inspected Thalut Cottage Row he found the yard occupied by Michael Doherty and Francis Boyle in a very neglected condition Pile of Refuse and Nuisances Ordered that Notices be served and 7 days allowed to abate the Nuisances

The Gas Manager Reported that Since last Meeting a Parcel of Gas coal 59 : 11. 1 had arrived of far better quality than had been supplied for a considerable length of time Another lot should be ordered immediately Order has already been placed

The caretaker Lough Salt reported having scoured the main on the 12th & 25th August 1920.

The Gas Manager's Collection Account was submitted Examined and showed Arrears of Quarters prior to 31st day of March amounting to £ 55 : 8 : 4 outstanding

The Rent Collector's Account was submitted and Examined It was ordered that Rose Bonar Tenant of No 5 Rosemount Terrace be written to for payment of Rent due by her and failing a satisfactory reply that possession of the House be taken over from her

The Town Clerk reported having let House No 13 Rosemount Terrace to James Molloy at the Weekly Rent of 2/-

The Council ratified the letting

The Water Manager reported that he took up duties temporary on the 13th August last. On the 16th August the Reservoir at Lismagh stood at 5 feet. On the 8th September the water level was 8 feet 9 inches. Glencar Reservoir and surroundings he found on the 15th August last in a scandalous condition and reported same to the Town Clerk. Since then the Surface men have made a good job of the place. The Settling basin requires to be cleaned out which would be done during the week. He has discovered some very heavy leaks and had them repaired. One on the Main at High Road.

That he had visited a considerable number of houses including Urban Council property. He found the houses in a disgraceful condition as regards sanitation. Some of the WCs choked full of solid matter, broken WCs and some of the other WCs in a filthy condition. To put all in order it would take a couple of weeks at least with assistance which he applied for.

That his promise to carry out the duties of Water Manager would expire at the end of month and asked that arrangements be made to have a permanent Water Manager appointed.

Ordered that the Water Manager have the necessary assistance for putting the Urban houses in proper order. Further Ordered that the Sanitary Sub Officer be directed to inspect the premises.

The Town Clerk submitted a document signed inviting Proposals for grass at Glencar Reservoir and reported that he had not received any proposal nor was he likely to do so. Ordered that the Town Clerk give liberty to any person to take the grass who agrees to take same for the cutting and clearing up of the place before the 1st day of November 1920.

The Executive Sanitary Officer reported having issued Summons against Mr. Catharine Mulhern for non compliance with the Sanitary Notice served on her respecting repairs to

dwelling house owned by her and occupied by Hugh Sweeney Main Street. That the case was entered for hearing at the Sessions Petty Sessions on the 14th September but owing to two Justices not being in attendance was adjourned for 14 days.

The Council extended the time allowed. Mr. M. J. Finnegan to have the repairs required by Sanitary Notice respecting house at St Columba's Terrace ^{owned} occupied by her and occupied by Michael Blake carried out until next Monthly Meeting of the Council.

Ordered that the Wall of bridge at Vale Lane damaged be repaired by the Surface men under the directions of the Town Surveyor.

Councillor Tom Boyle proposed and Councillor John Curran seconded the following Resolution which was unanimously agreed to:—

That we hereby tender our sincere sympathy with the Lady Mayorress and relatives of the Lord Mayor of Cork and also with all the relatives of all the Irish political prisoners at present undergoing hunger strike in defence of their principles. We ask not mercy for the brave man, but demand justice from an alien Government in the name of common humanity and an impartial administration of what remains of their law. We also call for the immediate withdrawal of the Army of Occupation in the interest of the common peace as three fourths of the electorate have voted for a Republican form of government which at present is administering the law of this country copies to be sent to the Lady Mayorress and relatives of all the prisoners through the Deputy Lord Mayor of Cork for transmission to relatives.

The Office Keeper Mrs R. Dane appointed on the 5th July.

Cost resigned or her leaving the Court House on the 3rd day of September 1920.

Acknowledging receipt of letter of the 31st August - regarding the proposed appointment of Mr Michael Dawson as Town Surveyor and stating that evidence should be furnished as to Mr Dawson's training and experience to show that he is qualified to discharge the duties of Town Surveyor. The fact that he passed the examination for Assistant Surveyor is not sufficient.

The Town Clerk states that Mr Dawson had supplied certificates from the County Surveyor and the former Town Surveyor and that these had been forwarded to the Local Government Board.

No 446225 / 1920. dated 10th September 1920.

Circular relative to the admission of Poor persons to Certain Dublin Hospitals for treatment and drawing the special attention of the Council to the fact that the Managers of certain hospitals, as mentioned still continue to admit by agreement patients sent to them by Sanitary Authorities &c.

Correspondence with Messrs James McElveen & Co Edinburgh from 11th September to 1st October 1920. Relative to a supply of gas Coal and the proposed arrangements for delivery.

From Mr Patrick Mcgranahan Sanitary Sub Officer dated 4th October 1920 Application for an increase in his Salary as Sanitary Sub Officer, bowsheds and Dairies Inspector and Sheep Act Inspector. That he had no increase since 1914 and for one year a sum of £5.

Ordered that application be placed on the agenda for next Monthly Meeting of the Council.

The Record of Work performed by the Sanitary sub

Offices since date of last meeting was submitted examined and showed that 50 Houses, Yards and Premises had been inspected.

He reported the following nuisances as having been found to exist:

Viz:- At McClint's Terrace Water flowing in rear of the Council's bottage causing a nuisance. Toilets kept in water closets of houses occupied by Glen Doherty No. 5 and Mrs Mc'Cudden No. 1 at Rosemount Terrace. Yard of house occupied by Charles Train No. 6, in a dirty state. Pile of refuse on street deposited by Constable Joseph Pratt. At Ballymacool Terrace. Toilets kept in water closets of house occupied by William J. White (No. 4) and yard in a dirty state. A pit of house occupied by Sipri Birney No. 25 full up.

He further reported the Pans. of water closets broken in the houses occupied by the following tenants of the Council No. 14 Rosemount Terrace. James McDavid No. 8 Ballymacool Terrace. Patrick Vaughan No. 12 Ballymacool Terrace. Mary Ward No. 17 Ballymacool Terrace. Sarah Curran - a waste of water in the following houses No. 1 Rosemount Terrace. Charles White and no water to closet & No. 12. Rosemount Terrace. George Black.

Ordered (1) That Notices be served on the Occupiers of the houses reported as having toilets kept in the water closets requiring their removal and the cleaning and unearthing of the houses within 7 days. (2) That Notices be served on the tenants of the houses of which the pans of W.C.s are broken requiring them to replace the broken pans or that legal proceedings will be taken against them for damage for injuries to the council's property and for recovery of possession of the houses (3) That the Surveyor construct a drain at rear of cottage at McClint's Terrace so as to carry off the water complained of and thus abate the nuisance referred to (4) That Constable Pratt be noticed to have the refuse deposited by him at Rosemount removed within 24 hours (5) That the Council's Workmen remove the house refuse from Cottage No. 25 Ballymacool Terrace occupied Sipri Birney (6) That the Water Manager have the required repairs to the Water Supply to

houses referred to carried out (7) That Notices be served on the occupiers of the houses whose yards are reported as dirty requiring the cleaning up and removing of all refuse within 7 days.

The Town Clerk submitted replies received by him to letters addressed to Glass Merchants and Dealers asking them to attend or send representative to Glass Market at Sette Kennedy if established. All the Particulars written to expressed their willingness to attend or send representatives provided the market is established.

The Town Clerk was instructed to consult with the local representative of the Department of Agriculture as to the most suitable date for the opening market and to write to the Owner of the Market Mrs Boyd. Asking her to advertise the opening of the Market.

From the undertakerough Salt Water Works reporting that he had cleaned the main on the following dates Aug 10th & 23rd September last.

The Town Clerk reported having received a wire from Mr. David Taylor Kilmaheran on the 20th September last - Whipping a dangerous break on the Rough Salt Main - That he immediately despatched the Water Manager to repair the break.

On the Water Manager's return he reported that the break was the cover of a man hole at Kilmaheran Bridge and that same was dangerous to traffic. He had temporary repair carried out when at Kilmaheran the Water Manager made an inspection of part of the village supply and found a great waste of water taking place. On receipt of this report the Town Clerk wrote Mr. Patrick Boyle the Hon Sec. of the local Water Committee pointing out the places where the waste was found to exist and stating that if the waste is allowed to continue the council will take strong action in the matter and asking to be informed when matters complained of are

Get right -

No reply was received by the Town Clerk to this letter
Ordered that Mr Doyle be now written to that the Council are surprised that he had not replied to the Town Clerk's letter and asking him for a reply by return whether the waste found to exist has been stopped and to intimate to Mr Doyle that unless he finds a satisfactory reply and an assurance that the like will not again occur the Council will direct the supply to the village to be cut off.

From Dail Riúream (Department of Trade and Commerce) dated September 1920. Inclosing a copy of a scheme for combined purchasing by Local Bodies which was recommended by the Local Government Commission and approved by Dail Riúream at its last Session

The Executive Sanitary Officer reported that the Sanitary Case against Mr Catherine Mulhern was before the Magistrate at Letterkenny Petty Sessions on the 20 September last but on the application of Defendant's Solicitor was further adjourned to the 26th day of October next.

The Executive Sanitary Officer reported that nothing had been done to comply with the requirements of the notice served respecting repairs to house at St Columba's Terrace Occupier Michael Blake. Owner Mrs Finnegan.

Ordered that Mrs Finnegan be written to that unless the works are carried out before the next Monthly Meeting of the Council a summons will be issued against her without further notice.

The Inspector under the Shops Act reported that the provisions of the Shops Act in regard to the weekly half holiday are being duly observed in the district.

The Inspector of Cowsheds and Dairies reported having inspected 23 cowsheds and yards and the state of Dairy utensils used in connection therewith. All were found clean with the following exceptions as regards cowsheds: Viz:- Daniel McMenamin Southwell Terrace, John Doherty Post Road

Ordered that Notices be served on the Defaulters requiring them to clean and linewash the cowsheds within seven days.

Ordered that Notice be published requiring Owners of Dairy cowsheds or Milk Shops in the Urban District to register under the provisions of the Order 1908

The Gas Manager reported that since last meeting a cargo of Coal had been loaded for the Council but unfortunately the coal controller directed same elsewhere and as the Stock's was very low under present circumstances the out look was very ominous at most he had about 3 weeks supply on hand. That he was asked to connect up a gas supply to a shoemaker named Ward but deemed it advisable to have a deposit as security.

The Council ordered that a deposit of £1 or security for the payment of the Gas supplied be given before connection made.

The Gas Manager also reported that the meter at St. Columba's College had not recorded since the 31st March last and that the meters of the following consumers require to be replaced: Viz John Ward George Simes Dr. Patterson Mr. Patterson John Gallagher Patt' Doherty Dan McDevitt and Miss Fleming. That there are meters at the following place that are not in use and could be utilised Viz Presentation Bros School, Iris School Hugh Kelly, Mrs Mallon's & R. Dobson.

Ordered that the College Authorities be at once furnished with an account based on the average consumption

As per conditions on which Gas is supplied That the meter not in use at the places mentioned be taken away and used to replace the defective meters referred to in the Gas Manager's report.

The Gas Manager's Collection Account was submitted & examined and showed arrears outstanding amounting to £61. 7. 11

Ordered that Mr John J. Gallagher be written to for payment of the amount of his account failing which proceedings be taken.

The Water Manager reported that since last meeting all the Urban houses had been examined and repaired - All were now in good order with the exception of 3 Whspans which are required and are on Order. That some of the Whspans are kept pretty clean but unfortunately two are some kept in a very discreditable state through foul houses being made of them and not kept clean. That the break at Kilmacrennan reported by Mr Taylor was caused by a heavy Motor lorry had same repaired temporarily and recommended Railway Sleepers instead of stone flags. He reported the waste at Kilmacrennan already referred to in the minute. He further reported holes tanks at Kilmacrennan as overflowing - That these were odd holes here and there which will be put right. That as the stipulated period has now expired during which he was to act as temporary Water Manager he desired the Council to make some arrangements and if possible relieve him of this duty.

The Council adopted the suggestion of the Water Manager and ordered that Railway Sleepers be got as covering for the man hole at Kilmacrennan.

Having regard to the satisfactory manner in which Mr Mitchell has looked after the Water Supply they decided they could not at present relieve him of these duties.

The Council now ordered that the stanchness of the Town Reservoir be now ascertained seeing that same was overflowing and directed the Water Manager to

have the test carried out by stopping all inflow and out let.

The Town Clerk reported that the Rate Collector Mr Neil Jones had within the time prescribed by the Public Bodies Order 1904 lodged with the Council's Treasurer the First Moneys of the Rates for the current financial year.

The Rate Collector Mr Neil Jones submitted Schedule of uncollected Rates for the half year ended 30th September 1920 and claimed Repayment from the Council of same. Under Article 92. of the Public Bodies Order 1904 for the reasons stated in Schedule - Amount £17. 19. 8

The Council recommended that the amount £17. 19. 8 be struck off as unrecoverable and refunded to the Collector.

The Schedule with the revised receipts to be forwarded to the Local Government Board with the Council's recommendation for the ruling of the Local Government Board.

Irish Education Act 1892

Ordered that a Special Meeting of the Council in Committee be summoned for Monday 11th day of

October 1920. at 7 o'clock p.m. to consider the financial position of the Gas Works and the undertaking generally.

Ordered that the question of increasing the Rents of the Working Class Lodging Houses the property of the council be placed on the agenda for next monthly meeting of the Council.

The Town Clerk submitted copy letter sent by him to Mrs Rose Bonas Tenant of 5 Rosemount Terrace demanding payment of the rent due by her to 25th September amount £6: 1: 6. and threatening proceedings for recovery of the amount due and also for recovery of possession of the house.

The Committee had before them the Gas Manager Mr. Mitchell and he was called upon for an explanation as to the loss especially as he undertook at the beginning of the year to make the Works pay if the price per 1000 ft³ of gas was fixed at 17/- The only explanations put forward by the Gas Manager were the advance in the price of coal the very inferior quality of the coal obtained and the increase in the working expenses sanctioned by the Council. He stated that with coal of a proper quality he believed in the coming 6 months he would retrieve the loss sustained in the half year just ended.

The Committee unanimously decided to record that they are not satisfied with the manner in which the Gas Manager carried out the Working of the Gas undertaking during the half year ended 30th September 1920.

The Committee decided that the price of gas for lighting purposes be advanced to 20/- per 1000 ft³ and for power to 15/- per 1000 ft³ as from the 1st day of October 1920.

The difficulty of obtaining coal and the low stocks on hand were under consideration and correspondence with Messrs. James McElvie & Co. Dumbarton as to the supply was read.

The Coronation was instructed to phone Messrs. Morrison & Co. Londonderry next morning and try and arrange for delivery of a parcel from them to tide over till the arrival of a cargo from McElvie & Co. The closing down of the Works from an economic point of view was discussed but it was considered better if at all possible to keep the Works going even if worked at some what of a loss.

Read letter from Mr. John J. Gallagher Machine Works dated 10th October 1920 relative to letter received from the Council demanding payment of his account which he called a "disputed account". He proposed to pay on the average. He wanted the meter tested.

The meter in question was tested by the Gas Manager in the presence of Mr. Gallagher and found to be registering correctly.

The Council however agreed to have the meter tested as required by the Act Mr. Gallagher to pay all expenses in connection with the

The question of having the Strabane and Pettigo Railway reopened for traffic was under discussion.

From Mr Chas Mc Taggart Motor Garage Sellekenny dated 18th October 1920 Complaining of water flowing in through his Garage from the Urban Council Houses.

The Water Manager reported the water was from a burst Water pipe which had now been repaired and the cause complained of removed.

From Mr H. Forbes, County Donegal Railways Joint Committee dated 4th October 1920. Relative to the Closing down of the Strabane and Sellekenny Railway and the Council's conclusions as to the reason for same.

The Town Clerk was instructed to inform Mr Forbes that they have nothing to add or detract from their letter to him of the 28th September last on the matter.

From Mr P. Doyle Kilmacrenan dated 11th October 1920 Relative to Waste of Water at Kilmacrenan reported to the Council by the Water Manager and stating that the defective pipe was that day being repaired and promising to be as they always were most careful about waste of water.

Mr David Taylor Kilmacrenan also wrote about the reported waste of water at his premises.

The Town Clerk was instructed to ascertain if a suitable Caretaker residing near the Waterworks could be got and if so to employ one.

The Gas Manager reported that owing to the stock of coal being exhausted the Works were closed down on Sunday night the 24th October last. That the last three Wagons of coal received from Morrison & Co. were like a pure and undiluted waste of money. He found it hard to advise what to do to attempt to carry on or not. In case the Council decided on renewing the new works would require to be set.

Ordered that the new works be put in and Coal obtained

and Works reopened at earliest possible date.

The Town Clerk reported having written the following tenants of the council requiring the broken Windows in houses occupied by them to be replaced or that proceedings would be taken against them for injuring the council's property Viz James Mc Laird No 14 Rosemount Terrace Hugh Boner No 10 Ballymacool Terrace Mary Ward No 12 Ballymacool Terrace and Sarah Curran No 17 Ballymacool Terrace.

James Mc Laird appeared before the council and stated that he had used every care and that the Pan was not broken through any act of his and that the pan must have been originally defective.

The council decided to make good all the existing defects but from the present to hold the Tenants responsible for any damage to the houses.

Read letter addressed to the Chairman of the Council from Dailireann - Department of Local Government dated 20th October 1920.

That by a recent Decree of An Dail a Royal of Belfast Merchants and Traders has been declared and vigorous steps have been taken to render the Decree as effective as possible and suggesting that the Council form an effective Working Committee and that no time be lost in setting up the Committee &c.

Councillor John Doherty proposed and Councillor W M Boyle seconded that a Committee be appointed

After considerable discussion it was agreed that the Munster and Leinster Bank be invited to open an Office in Site Kenney and the Town Clerk was instructed to write the Munster and Leinster Bank accordingly. The following resolution was also unanimously agreed to

That we record our most emphatic protest against the Belfast Program. Condemn same in the strongest manner possible and call for the immediate reinstatement of all the expelled Catholic Workers.

The application of Mr Patrick McGranahan Sanitary Sub Officer for an increase in the salaries of the offices held by him under the Council came before the Council.

After full consideration of the application it was proposed by the Chairman (Councillor Charles Kelly) seconded by Councillor Wm G. McKinney and passed unanimously that the Salary of Mr. McGranahan as Sanitary Sub Officer be increased from £6 to £10 per annum.

The sanction of the Local Government Board to the proposed increase is respectfully requested.

Councillor William Boyle proposed
Councillor John Curran Seconded and

It was unanimously Resolved :—

That we the members of the Seton-Kingsbridge Urban District Council deeply deplore the deaths of the Lord Mayor of Cork Terence McSweeney Fitzgerald and Murphy who have died as the result of hunger strike in defence of the lofty ideals enunciated by President Wilson in his fourteen points as the basis on which the European War ^{recent} was concluded. The ideals they died to uphold that night should survive. Might will be strengthened by their deaths. They died for Ireland and Ireland must now pay homage and posterity their lofty ideals to which they ungrudgingly gave up their lives. Ireland mourns the loss of her martyred sons, but their spirit and memory will outlive the might and power of their murderers.

Councillor John P. Skeer said as a Unionist and one who did not believe in the cause for which the late Lord Mayor of Cork laid down his life still he admired the courage and fortitude which enabled him to endure his prolonged suffering of starvation even unto death. Out of his feelings towards him, his widow as a wife and mother he moved that a letter of sympathy be sent by this Council to her in her time of sorrow and bereavement seconded by Councillor Charles Kelly and unanimously agreed to.

The trespassing of animals in the Cemetery at Oldtown and the malicious breaking of locks put on the entrance gate was before the Council.

The Town Clerk was instructed to ascertain whether Manus McMonagle would undertake to watch against trespass by animals and find out the owners if such trespass took place and if so to fix his remuneration.

Ordered that the matter be placed in the hands of ^{the} Council's Solicitor for proceedings against Mr. Coon.

The Town Clerk reported that he had appointed Francis McCannie of Oldtown on the 14th December 1920 caretaker of the cemetery at Oldtown at the remuneration of One Pound per annum.

The Council ratified the appointment.

From Dr. Mc Moon P.M.S. Asylum dated 18th December 1920 Relative to the Water Supply from Sough Salt and stating that when the weather is suitable he must try and locate the leak in the town reservoir and get it repaired.

The Executive Sanitary Officer reported that the Case of the Council against Mr. Catherine Mulhern for Non Compliance with a Sanitary Notice served on her as owner of premises in the occupation of Mr. High Sweeney at Main Street was heard by the Magistrates at Petty Sessions on the 9th December last when the Defendant was fined £6. and £3. 3 Expenses and ordered to repair the premises within 3 months.

The Sanitary Sub Officer reported that the Sanitary notice served on Francis Boyle and Michael Doherty requiring the removal of refuse had not yet been complied with. That one of the Occupiers Francis Boyle had left the premises since the date of service of notice.

Ordered that a fresh Notice be served on the present Occupier and time extended in the other case as the occupier

had been to Hospital for treatment.

The Sanitary Sub Officer reported that the requirements of the Sanitary Notice served on Joseph Hanlon Main St have been complied with and the complained of nuisance abated.

The Record of Work performed by the Sanitary Sub Officer since date of last Meeting was submitted & examined and showed that 33 Houses, yards and premises had been visited and inspected.

He reported that the house occupied by Mrs Bridget Collins Daniel Boyle and Catherine Sennow and owned by Mrs Mary Ramsay. Situate at Main Street were without water to the W.C.s and the latter were in consequence out in a Sanitary condition.

Ordered that notices be served.

The Gas Manager reported the arrival of a cargo of Gas Coal on the 10th December last that the quality was far superior to any received for years. He complained of the irregular manner in which the Contractor for lime is keeping up the supply. He was handicapped in the matter of getting power to quarry the stones but now states that he has got a supply and will be able to do better in the future.

The Gas Manager's collection account was submitted & examined and showed arrears of Quarter's prior to 31st December last amounting to £83: 3: 9. outstanding.

The Water Manager reported that during the past Month there has been less service leakage than usual. That on the Sough Salt Main a joint at one of the Scouring Valves had burst blowing out which caused a large waste of water and reduced the inflow to the reservoir at Barnamugagh in consequence of which the storage fell considerably about a week's supply.

being lost. The level in Daykin Reservoir was now 5 feet. That he tried to supply the Town from Glenar Reservoir which was up to the overflow, but could not as the main is almost blocked.

Ordered that the Town Clerk communicate with Mr Barnhill Esq. Londonderry, and ascertain from him the particulars of the scraping device used by him when scraping the Glenar Main for the Council.

The Water Manager Mr Andrew A Mitchell claimed £1 : 0 : 0 for expenses when engaged at repairs to the Sough Salt Main on the following dates Sept 9th Oct 28th Dec 27 & 28. Viz 5/- a day.

Payment of the Amount claimed Ordered.

Read from Mr Mann McMonagle Main Street dated 3rd January 1921 complaining of a dangerous chimney on house occupied by him Owner of Hugh McCay Church Hill.

Ordered that the Town Surveyor inspect the premises and if the chimney is found to be dangerous that the usual Notice be served.

From Mr James McQuarrie letter Remmy calling the attention of the Council to the state of the masonry wall at the rear of the Council's houses at Mr Clark's Terrace. That the wall was at present almost level with his laneway and one part ready to fall. That he got a cow hurt by falling over the wall. He suggested that the Council's Surveyor should examine the wall.

Ordered that the Surveyor examine the wall and report to Council.

The Gas Manager made application for payment of 10/- expenses going to Derry on the 24th October last relative

to procuring Coal
Payment Ordered.

Ordered that the same number of Public Lamps as were lighted last year be now put into commission for the remainder of the season and that a lamp post be transferred to replace the one knocked down at the Post Office. The lamps now put into use to be extinguished not later than 10.30 each night.

Councillor Edward McDaid proposed and Councillor John P. Speer seconded and it was unanimously passed: - That a letter of condolence be sent to the Very Rev John Bannon Doherty P.P. Ardara on the death of his brother Mr Patrick Doherty sent who was a Member of the Council for a period of 33 years during the greater part of which he filled the office of Vice Chairman.

The Council considered the present price charged for coke too low, having regard to the price of coal, and increased the price 4/- per cwt from this date.

Housing Minutes

The Council had under consideration the rents of the Working Class Lodging Houses, the deficit that has to be borne by the rates and the repairs that are now absolutely necessary, to be carried out to the houses.

The Town Surveyor was directed to make out a detailed estimate of the cost of the repairs to each house and to submit same at a Special Meeting of the Council to be held on Wednesday the 19th day of January 1921 at 9 o'clock P.M.

The Rent Collector's account for the month of December 1920 was submitted examined and showed that £35; 7; 4 had been collected and lodged during the Month.

The Council had under consideration the Arrears of rents due by the tenants and it was decided that any tenant in 2 weeks arrears of rent be served with a Notice to Quit to be followed by proceedings for recovery of possession of the house. Except in cases where special arrangements have been made for the payment of the rent the Rent Collector to serve all such Notices to Quit.

A letter was received from Ellen Doherty tenant of No 5 McClusks Terrace in reference to the Notice to Quit served on her for non payment of rent she enclosed £1 - one sh. of the arrears and asked that no proceedings be taken against her.

The Council left the matter in the hands of the Town Clerk.

From the Strabane and Derry Railway Company. dated 8th January 1921. Forwarding Certificate of the Arbitration for the Half Year ended 31st December 1920. in connection with the Council's guarantee. Amount certified £30 Payment Ordered.

From Messrs James McKelvie & Co. Edinburgh - Correspondence re cargo of Bulk Coke Gas Coal. and forwarding Sale Note for 160 tons @ 67/- per ton net delivered into the Council's Gas Works.

The Council ratified the Ordering of the cargo.

From the Armagh Chamber of Commerce. dated 1st February 1921 Resolution as follows:—

Seeing that the Government consider that an increase must be made in the Telephone charges. we approve of the decision of the Postmaster General to abolish the Flat Rate and to make a charge of 1/- for each local call. and we would further approve of the Annual Rental being fixed at the sum of £5 and the Charge for Trunk Calls. being increased by 50 percent. But we most emphatically protest against the proposed increases. of Annual Rental and charge for Trunk Calls as such increase would make it absolutely impossible for Provincial users to retain their Telephones. And we hereby.

To inform the Postmaster General that in the event of the Annual rental and charge for Trunk Calls. being increased as proposed Provincial Telephone holders (and small users generally) will be obliged to surrender their Telephones as the proposed increase would put the Telephones out of the reach of the Ordinary business man. and professional Classes generally. That a copy of this Resolution be sent to the Postmaster General. Chancellor of the Exchequer. Chief Secretary for Ireland and to our Representatives in Parliament. The Resolution was unanimously adopted.

From the Letterkenny Rural District Council dated 10th January. 1921. Stating that they will not object to the Urban Council Supplying Water to Mr Charles Kelly's premises at Salaghanane. within their District.

From Mr J. S. Barnhill M. T. B. R. Derry. dated 5th February 1921 giving the Council full information as to the scrapers used by him in 1914. for scrapping the Glencar Water Main and of the good results then obtained.

The Council decided that a supply of scrapers be obtained and the Water Manager have the scrapping carried out.

From the Caretaker Lough Salt reporting that he had scoured the main on the 13th and 28th days of January last.

From the R.M.S. Asylum dated 31st January 1921

That he visited the Reservoir on the previous Sunday eve. and found that the Water is just one foot below the Overflow. Notwithstanding the large quantity that is coming in from the Asylum private field combined with that coming from Lough Salt.

As the Reservoir has not been full for several months past notwithstanding the great quantity of rain that has fallen it goes to show that there must be a great waste of Water somewhere and as far as he can find out there is no waste in the Asylum at all. Consequently the waste must be in connection with the Town and he is still of the opinion that the only way to determine this is to put Meters on the Service pipe to the Town and to the Asylum and ascertain the quantity of Water consumed by each. He reported that the leak in the Town Reservoir has been repaired.

The Water Manager reported that since last meeting up till end of last week there had been very few service breakings on Street On Friday and Saturday last he observed three on Port Road and notified Owners to have same repaired on Saturday on at Messrs Mc Birney and Mallaghans also one at Broads and Dr McKinneys. That both Asylum and Glencar Reservoirs are overflowing. That Dr Moore had repaired the New Reservoir but same would have to be tested as to its tightness when up to overflow. Since 27th December last Asylum tank has risen from 2 feet 3 inches to overflow. By 1 foot which showed that he had given due attention.

Ordered that Application be made to the Local Government Board for their sanction to a loan of £300. for the purpose of providing meters Meter Chambers and Gauge Wells for the Lough Salt Water Works as recommended by Mr J. H. T. Swiney M. C. E. Belfast.

Form of Application for Sanction of Local Government Board to loan of £300. duly filled up signed by the Chairman Counter signed by the Clerk of the Council and ordered to be forwarded to the Board.

Reports of Medical Officer of Health.

Report dated 31st December 1920. That he inspected a sewer in the Basement of the "Cornel House" at present occupied by Mr. Mulhern and found a hole in its upper surface. Sewer gas was escaping rendering the house dangerous to health and liable to give rise to infectious disease and recommended that a new joint be inserted.

The Executive Sanitary Officer reported that on receipt of the notice having regard to the urgency of the matter he at once served a Notice on the Owners of the Premises requiring the Sewer pipes to be properly repaired so as to prevent the escape of any sewer gas.

The Sanitary Sub Officer reported that the Owner of the premises immediately complied with the requirements of the Notice.

Report dated 9th February 1921. That a nuisance exists at Cottage Row caused by a large accumulation of refuse and by defective and filthy Water Closets and recommended that the refuse be removed at once and the Water Closets put in proper working order.

Ordered that Notices be served on the Owner and occupier requiring the recommendations of the Medical Officer of Health to be carried out in 7 days.

Report dated 4th February 1921 that a nuisance exists at Major's Lane, in a yard at rear of Messrs O'Briens & O'Donnells caused by a very large heap of refuse, in one part with liquid manure scattered around. That a dry closet in his opinion was too near the houses and he recommended that the large heap of refuse be removed and that the yard be cleaned and all liquid manure taken away. That the dry closet be transferred to another part of the yard, farther from the houses.

Ordered that the notices be served on the Owners and Occupiers and 4 days allowed to carry out the Medical Officer of Health's recommendation.

Report dated 4th February 1921 that a nuisance exists in houses in Lower Main Street occupied by Drs Lennon & Dan Boyle and Mr Collins. That the houses are in a frightful state for want of thatch. The water coming through the roof when rain falls so that the walls are damp and mildewed and it is almost impossible to breath in some of them. That the 3 Water Closets at back are all out of repair and he recommended that the necessary repairs be carried out to the closets and the houses thatched at once.

Ordered that Notices be served on the Owners and 14 days allowed to carry out the necessary works.

Report dated 4th February 1921 that a nuisance exists at James Wilkinson's garage in Church Street. Liquid Manure is percolating through the wall from Mr Thring's yard and it is very unhealthy to work in it and he recommended that a small portion of the wall outside on the ground adjacent be cemented to keep the fluid from percolating through the wall.

Ordered that Notice be served on Mr Joseph Thring and 14 days allowed to carry out the works recommended.

Reports of Sanitary Sub Office

The Sanitary Sub Office reported that Mr Charles Flattery Agent for Mrs Mary Ramsay had not complied with the requirements of the Sanitary Notice served on him to have the dwelling house occupied by Bridget Collins and owned by Mrs Ramsay properly repaired and thatched.

Ordered that a summons be taken out against Mr. Flattery for his default unless the works are commenced within 7 days.

The Record of Works performed by the Sanitary Sub Office since date of last Monthly Meeting of the Council was submitted & examined and showed that 30 houses and yards at slate Row, Bellymacool Terrace and Lower Main Street had been inspected - He reported that the Ashpits of the Council's houses required to be cleaned out. - Ordered that the Ashpits be emptied as usual.

The Gas Manager reported that the last cargo of coal turned out pretty fair all through and expressed the hope that the one now coming would be as good. That he had to cut off the main leading to the Market Square as it had been badly fractured through heavy motor traffic the main will have to be renewed during the summer and laid at a reasonable depth and course changed owing to a sewer having been built since original main was put in. Street lamps as ordered had been lit but three were broken by stone throwing. That the lamp post in McKinney's yard would suit to replace broken one at the Post Office and that Mr D. Wallace could put a new base on the one knocked down by Mr Lason. That there was but little demand for coke of which he had some 8 or 10 ton on hand. He had also 800 gallon kerosene tanks.

The Gas Manager's Collection Account was submitted examined and showed arrears of Quarters prior to 31st Dec 1920 amounting to £64. 17. 3. still outstanding

The Rent Collector's Account for the month of January 1921 was submitted examined and showed that the amount of rents collected during the month was £45. 13. 0

The Town Surveyor reported that he had inspected the wall at rear of Mr Clark's Terrace. Adjoining Mr James McKendrick's lane way. That the wall is 60 feet in length and varies in height from 2 to 5 feet from level of new lane to level of Mr McKendrick's lane. To make the work permanent it would require to be built of masonry and would cost about £30 to build it in lime mortar or the wall could be built dry and the coping set in cement and be a fairly good work. the latter could be carried out by the Council's own men. The Council considered it would be better to have the wall built with lime mortar and as it is a nearing well. that Mr McKendrick be asked if he is willing to join in the work and pay half the cost.

The Town Surveyor submitted his estimate and specification for the street improvement by Macadam of the Main Roads of the District and the Council approved of same

The application of the Council for Sanction of the Local Government Board to a loan of £3000 for carrying out the works was signed by the Chairman of the Council Counter signed by the Clerk of the Council and ordered to be forwarded to the Board

The Town Surveyor submitted specification for carrying out of repairs to the Working Class Lodging Houses the property of the Council

Ordered that Tenders be invited for carrying out the Works.

Proposals for the privilege of grazing the Quarry field at Glencairn were opened and considered the offer of Mr Duffey Cottage Row. of £4. 15. 6. being the highest was accepted subject to solvent security being forthcoming and bill payable at 1st November 1921.

The present site of the Hydrant at Recreation ground being in the opinion of the Council unsuitable it was ordered that the Town Surveyor submit a report recommending a suitable site

Report of Committee Meeting.

The following Report of Committee Meeting held on Wednesday the 16th February 1921 was read.

In the Chair : Charles Kelly Esq JP. Other members present:
Councillors Wm H. McKinney, Wm Doyle, John Doherty, John P. Spies and Edward McHale

The Committee investigated a complaint made to the Chairmen on the Council that there was a considerable escape of gas at the Cathedral for some time and that notwithstanding the matter having been brought under the notice of the Gas Manager the required repairs had not been carried out.

The Gas Manager explained that he had made a temporary repair and had been waiting the arrival of certain couplings on order in order to complete permanently the required repair - that these couplings had arrived the previous Saturday and the work

were now carried out. The escape he described as so small that the gas would not light when a match was applied to the place.

The flushing of the Town Water Main was under consideration and the good results obtained from the scouring fortnightly of the South Salt Main referred to.

Ordered that the Water Manager flush say once a month the Town Main at slate Row.

The Town Clerk was instructed to write the Town Clerk Omagh and ascertain at what periods they read their Gas Meters.

The Cost of quarrying road metal in the Council's Quarry, was under discussion and contracted unfavourably with the tenders received some time ago for this Class of Works. Pending the result of Council's application for sanction to a loan of £3000. for street improvements the matter was allowed to drop.

The Report was unanimously adopted

Reports of Sanitary Sub Offices

The Record of Work performed by the Sanitary Sub Office from date of last meeting was submitted and showed that 27 premises had been visited and inspected. He reported having found the house at Port Road occupied by Mrs Margaret Farrell and Mrs Elizabeth Spratt (Owners as defined by Public Health Act); Mrs Catherine Mulhern in a delapidated condition owing to want of thatch and lime-wash also that there was an insufficient closet.

Ordered that the Notice be served on the Owners as above mentioned and one month allowed to have the premises properly thatched and lime-washed — A Report to be obtained from the Medical Officer of Health as to the insufficient closet.

The Sanitary Sub Office reported that Daniel Kelly had complied with the Sanitary Notice served on him requiring defective Water Closets in connection with dwelling houses occupied by Michael Doherty and Samuel Meehan to be put in proper order.

The Sanitary Sub Office reported that the following parties had not complied with the requirements

of the Sanitary Notices served on them viz:- James O'Donnell Robert Doherty (Occupier) Anthony and Terrial Gallagher (Owners) Charles Flattery (agent for Mrs Mary Ramsey) and Joseph Purcell (Occupier).

The Executive Sanitary Officer informed the Council that as regards the Notice served on Messrs Anthony and Terrial Gallagher they had placed the carrying out of the works in the hands of a Contractor. The Council extended the time allowed by the Notice in this case.

Ordered that the other cases referred to the parties in default be summoned to Petty Sessions.

Report of Town Surveyor.

The Town Surveyor reported:— That as instructed by the Council he had notified the Surface men that a greater effort on their part is required in their work on the streets and in the quarry. That the mud has not been removed off the streets as promptly as he wished after being gathered in heaps by the Surface men. It was allowed to lie in heaps on the main streets during the previous two Sundays.

He asked the Council's instructions on the matter.

He further reported that a large quantity of the Gas yard refuse. Cinders &c. would be required for the footpaths, crossings &c.

Ordered that the Cart man Manus McMonagle be informed by the Town Surveyor that he must hurry up the work of removal of the street refuse.

Ordered that henceforth the sale of cinders at the Gas Works be discontinued.

Shops Act

The Inspector under the Shops Act reported that the provisions of the Act are being observed throughout the District.

Sough Salt Water Supply.

The caretaker Sough Salt reported that he had scoured the Sough Salt Main on the 11th and 25th February last.

Water Manager's Report

The Water Manager reported that during the month he visited a good many places in town and found leakages which after notifying parties they had got repaired. That he had still other places to look to.

That as instructed at last meeting he had the main pipes in Town flushed. That both reservoirs at Barnamugagh are overflowing and level is within a foot of overflow. That the new reservoir at Barnamugagh can now be tested as to its being thoroughly water tight as if it is it will remain level with overflow the surest test of all.

Ordered that the New Tank be tested as suggested by the Water Manager.

The Town Clerk was instructed to find out from the Asylum Authorities if they would allow their fire extinguishing appliances to be used so as to supplement the Town appliances in case of fire occurring in the Town.

Gas Manager's Report

The Gas Manager reported the arrival since last meeting of a cargo of coal of fairly good quality although still containing a considerable amount of slack.

That he had a very large quantity of coke on hand and that there was not much demand for same.

The Town Clerk submitted letter from Omagh Town Clerk stating that their price for Coke was £4 per ton.

The Council unanimously decided to reduce from this date the price charged for Coke £4:10 per ton to £4—per ton.

The Gas Manager was directed to investigate an alleged escape of gas in the Technical School.

The Gas Manager's Collection Account.

The Gas Manager's Collection Account was submitted examined and showed arrears of Quarter's prior to 31st December last amounting to £40-14-7 outstanding.

The Town Clerk was instructed to interview the Trustees of the Literary Institute in reference to the outstanding account for gas used in the Hall.

Rate Collector's Account

The Town Clerk reported that the Rate Collector Mr. Neil Jones had closed his Collection Account for the financial year ending 31st March 1921 and claimed repayment of £17:19:5 from the Council in respect of rates on Vacant premises for the half year ended 31st March 1921. The Schedule of the un-collected rates was submitted examined and the Council recommended that the amount £17:19:5 be struck off as irrecoverable and refunded to the Collector. The Schedule with the unissued receipts to be forwarded to the Local Government Board. with the Council's recommendations for the ruling of the Local Government Board.

Water Supply.

Asylum & Town Reservoirs.

From Mr. A. J. Moore P.M.S. Donegal District Asylum dated 18th March 1921. complaining that the overflow pipe from the Asylum Reservoir to the Town Reservoir has been stopped up and when accidentally discovered the water was beginning to overflow.

That he had the obstruction removed - That it was most fortunate that this was discovered in time otherwise the whole bank might have been washed away into Mr. Glennings field and great destruction caused amounting to hundreds of pounds.

At first he thought this was maliciously done but since he learned that Mr. Mitchell (the Council's Water Manager) had told one of the Asylum Attendants that he was going to close the pipe and remove the obstruction next morning and asking that the matter be brought before the Council etc.

Ordered that Dr. Moore be informed that the stoppage of the pipe was carried out by their Water Manager on the orders of the Council in order to test the stanchness of the Town Reservoir.

That this has now been found not to be stanch as the water lowers at the rate of 3 inches in the 48 hours and request that the Town Reservoir be made water tight as until this is done it cannot be taken over from the Asylum Committee by the Council until this work is completed and the Reservoir taken over by the Council they have the right to joint use of the Asylum reservoir under paragraph 3. of the Agreement of the 22nd February 1909. The Council consider it is time the Town Reservoir is made stanch as they are most anxious to take over same.

Scouring of Lough Salt

The bare takes Lough Salt reported having scoured the Water main on the 11th & 25th days of March last

Water Manager's Report

That since last Meeting there had been a considerable number of breakages in Services most of which had been

repaired. Those breakages are caused by the heavy Motor Traffic which also has caused breakages on gas mains. The Lough Salt reservoir is full and Asylum reservoir within 1/2 ins. of overflow. That in his previous report he doubted the stanchness of the New Reservoir at Barnamugagh and his doubts have been confirmed. During the past month he had it twice overflowing and when overflow ceased it fell at the rate of 1/2 inches in the space of 34 hours which is a heavy leakage. and he is doubtful if even this reservoir will be made stanch. That the Street Fountain at Recreation Ground had been changed to Castle Street a new pipe will require to be laid from same to carry off spill as at present it is watering the street. That all fire plugs have been examined and are in Working Order but there seems to be a decrease in pressure from the Technical School downwards. That the fire plug at town boundary, Ballaghgraine is the terminus of the Water Main and as it flares with an upright bend it cannot thoroughly scour the main. He recommended that it be put on as a branch and have straight piece with scouring valve on end which would ensure a free blow out. He also recommended another fire plug at Railway Tavawn as the distance between nearest plug and Railway is too far. That the hose pipes have been tested and three lengths are faulty these can be repaired and if possible he will do it himself. That he had compared the Town hose with the Asylum hose and that the connections fit each other. That there was a break on the long Salt Main during the Month which was made good. He hopes his application for remuneration will be as promised liberally responded to.

Ordered that the recommendations of the Water Manager as to alterations as to the Water Main at the Urban boundary at Ballaghgraine and the provision of a fire Plug at Railway Tavawn be adopted and the Works carried out.

The Town Clerk informed the Council that the street hydrant removed from Recreation Ground gate to Castle Street had been erected there on private property without the consent of the Owner of the property having been obtained.

Fire Fighting Fitting Apparatus

From Mr R. H. Moore, R.M.S. Asylum, dated 31st March 1921 acknowledging receipt of the Town Clerk's letter of the 30th March 1921, and stating that he was quite aware the Asylum Committee will be only too glad to help the Urban Council in any way in the case of fire.

Gas Supply Technical School.

From Mr John Kilberry Vice-principal Technical School Letter-Kenny, dated 24th March 1921, Relative to the Gas Supply to the Technical School, and stating that after the opening of the present session the gas emitted fumes but as many of the local consumers had from time to time been favoured with the same extra commodity the school did not receive preferential treatment. Towards the end of October the council temporarily discontinued the gas supply which was not resumed until well nigh Christmas. Shortly after resumption an employee of the council called upon his tour of inspection and finding a slight leakage in the vaults above the meter effected the necessary repair giving an assurance the school gas fitting were then staunch. Since then he had no cause of complaint.

Recently the gas manager and an assistant made another inspection when a leakage was registered which they could not first then perceive through the senses or locate. The manager suggested it might be advisable to have the fittings overhauled.

However the advanced state of the session and the approach of summer time modify any necessity for overhauling during the present academic year - Work of that magnitude if necessary could be more conveniently and effectively performed during Summer Vacation.

The Council decided to thank Mr Kilberry for his

letter and to suggest it might be to the advantage of the Committee if the service pipes were seen to inasmuch as the gas manager reports that the meter registers a leakage at the rate of 366 per hour.

Gas Manager's Report

The gas manager reported that since the station meter was put in action on 7th March 1921 the gas made from that date up till the 2nd April 1921 as shown by meter was 265300 C.F. and Coal consumed for same period was 31 tons out 600^t being equal to 8500 C.F. per ton of coal.

That he tested station meter with holder and he reckoned it was about right just a slight percentage fast.

Gas Line

Proposals for gas line for the financial year ending 31st March 1922, were submitted the offer of Mr Robert Wylie of £7 per ton being the highest was accepted.

Gasworks Accounts.

The Town Clerk submitted the Gasworks accounts for the financial year ended 31st day of March 1921. Showing a loss on the year's transactions of £620:18:2. The loss was occasioned principally by the advance in the price of coal, the average price of which during the period referred to was £3:10:10 per ton as compared with £2:17:11 per ton in the previous year, and the reduction in the price charged for gas from 25/- per 1000 C.F. to 17/6 per 1000 C.F.

Increase in Price of Gas.

Ordered that the price to be charged for gas for all purposes be increased to 25/- per 1000 C.F. as from 1st day of April 1921 until further Order.

Reports of Sanitary Sub Office

The record of work performed by the Sanitary Sub Office since date of last meeting was submitted examined and showed that 30 houses and premises yards had been visited, all inspected and no nuisances found to exist.

Ordered that Notices be served on the following requiring the removal of refuse from common yard of premises at Rosemount. Miss Annie Pearson Drang Doherty, Charles Drain and if notices not complied with within 7 days summonses to be issued

Rent Collector's Accounts

CorrespondencePensions (Increase) Act 1920

From the Local Government Board letter No 6868/1921 M/s dated 12th April 1921 drawing the attention of local Authorities to the terms of the Pensions (Increase) Act 1920 and forwarding copy of Treasury Order applying the provisions of the Act (a) to pensioners in receipt of pensions granted under the Petty Pensions Clerks (Ireland) Acts 1858 to 1907 and (b) to pensioners in receipt of pensions lawfully granted by any local Authority in Ireland.

Rate Collector's Security

Read letter from the Local Government Board No 10048 1921 dated 22nd April 1921 acknowledging receipt of letter of the 18th April relative to the security of Mr. Neil Jones Rate and Rent collector and stating that if an approved guarantee society cannot be found to undertake to issue the authorised form of bond the Board would be prepared in the circumstances to accept personal security as prescribed by form 55 Article 87 of the Public Bodies Order 1904.

The Town Clerk stated he had on receipt of the letter called upon the collector to furnish the name of an approved guarantee society that will secure him in the authorised form of Bond.

Medical Officer of Health (locum tenens)

The Town Clerk reported having wired the Local Government Board on the 18th April last that Dr. Walter Little Kenney appointed by the Guardians locum tenens for Dr. McGinley Dispensary Medical Officer of Health Little Kenney District refused to act as Medical Officer of Health in Urban District and asking the Board to take steps to insure his acting as urgent sanitary cases exist in the Urban District.

Read letter from the Local Government Board No 10017 1921 dated 19 ult. acknowledging receipt of telegram and stating that the subject thereof would be duly considered by the Board.

The Town Clerk further reported that Dr. Walter was now discharging the duties of Medical Officer of Health in the Urban District.

Sanction to loan for Water Meters

From the Local Government Board letter No 10552 dated 26th April 1921 sanctioning the loan to £300 applied for by the Council for the purpose of providing Water Meters repayment to be spread over a period of ten years.

The Town Clerk reported having applied to the Commissioners of Public Works for the loan in question.

From the Office of Public Works No. 5202/21 dated 30th April 1921 acknowledging receipt of application for the loan and stating that same would be laid before the Board.

Loans Street Improvement Works + Water Meters

Read letter from the Local Government Board No 10552 1921 dated 26th April 1921 Stating that they have had before them the report of their Engineering Inspector Mr.

Price on the inquiry held by him into the applications of the Council for sanction to loans of £3000 and £300 for the purposes respectively of carrying out Street Improvement Works and providing Water Meters and informing the Council that they are in communication with the Ministry of Transport on the subject of the first mentioned loan. That the Board's formal letter of sanction to the loan of £300 accompanied this communication.

Street Improvement Works

From the Ministry of Transport (Ireland) No 4 R 4. 95/ Letter from Mr. D. L. dated 27th April 1921 acknowledging receipt of letter of the 25th April 1921 enclosing Copy Specifications and estimate of the cost of proposed Works, for the improvement of the Main Roads within the Urban District of Letterkenny and stating that the matter is receiving the attention of the Department.

Gas Manager's Resignation Sanctioned

From the Local Government Board No 6074 / 1921 dated 30th April 1921 Informing the Council that they have sanctioned under section 8 of the Local Government (Ireland) Act 1919. the resignation of Mr A. A. Mitchell of his Office of Gas and Water manager to the Council.

The Gas and Water Manager has not yet tendered his resignation of Office to the Council.

Raised Valuation Lists - Appeals

From the Commissioners of Valuation No 20032. dated 31st March 1921. Requesting that any appeals received against the Revised Valuation lists issued on the 1st March last may be forwarded.

The Town Clerk reported that he had informed the Commission that no such appeals had been received.

I Estimate and Demand by Donegal County Council

From the Secretary of the Donegal County Council No 583 dated dated 15th April 1921. Enclosing Estimate and Demand by the County Council of the County of Donegal upon the Urban District Council in respect of the financial year ending 31st March 1922. the amount demanded being £ 1801:1:9

Han Asylum Fire Hose.

From Dr R. H. Moon P.M.S. Donegal District Asylum dated 16th April 1921. Stating that the Committee of Management will be glad to give what assistance they can in the way of lending their fire extinguishing appliances should such emergency unfortunately arise.

Water Meters Asylum Supply

From Dr P. H. Moore R. M. S. Donegal District Asylum dated 30th April 1921 suggesting that the only possible way of accurately testing the supply of water coming into the Asylum would be to put the meter for the Asylum pipe where it comes through the boundary wall inside.

The Council agreed that in this matter they can only act as advised by their Engineers.

Scouring Lough Salt Main

The Bartabes Lough Salt reported that he had scoured the Lough Salt Main on the 8th and 22nd April last.

Importation of Canadian Butter

From the Armagh Rural District Council dated 8th April 1921 copy Resolution as follows:— That some united action should be taken by Irish Local Authorities before it is too late to oppose the importation of Canadian Store Butter to Great Britain and prevent the injury which would result to an important Irish industry. Councillor Patrick O'Donnell proposed the adoption of the Resolution. Councillor John Curran seconded— Passed unanimously.

Alleged dangerous Condition of Road at Loughsalt

From Mr James McFettrigan Member dated 15th April 1921 stating that the Lough Salt Water main track at both ends of the tunnel is in a very dangerous condition to the Public. That he is the Road Contractor and repaired this on several occasions but will not be accountable for any dangers that may occur in future.

The Water Manager reported the ends of the tunnel were not on the County Road and were in good order.

Report of Medical Officer of Health

The Medical Officer of Health reported that on the 28th April last he inspected the premises occupied by Mr. Patrick Gallagher Lower Main Street (Owner Mr. Catherine Mulhern) and found a serious sewerage obstruction in connection with a Cellar Water Closet and recommended that the pipe leading from the Water Closet be opened up.

Ordered that notice be served on the Owner and 7 days allowed to carry out the works recommended so as to abate the nuisance.

Reports of Sanitary Sub Office

The Record of Work performed by the Sanitary Sub Office since date of last meeting was submitted examined and showed that 30 Houses Yards and Premises had been inspected and no nuisances found to exist.

The Sanitary Sub Office reported that Mr. Charles Mulhern had not complied with the Sanitary Notice served on his respecting premises at Ramelton Road in the occupation of Mrs. Elizabeth Spratt and Mrs. Farrell.

Ordered that the Owner Mr. Catherine Mulhern be written to that unless the specified works are commenced within 14 days a Summons will be issued for her default.

The Sanitary Sub Office reported that Mr. Charles Flattery had not taken any steps to comply with the Notices served on him as agent for Mrs. Mary Ramsay respecting premises at Main Street in the occupation of Bridget Collins, Daniel Boyle and Catherine Lennon.

Ordered that Mr. Flattery be notified that unless the works specified in the Notices are commenced within 14 days a

Summons a summons for his default will be issued against him without further notice.

Town Surveyor's Report

The Town Surveyor reported that since last Monthly meeting he found it necessary to change the tailing around the Glencar Quarry, taking in about 10 perches more for quarrying.

Shop Act Inspector's Report

The Shop Act Inspector reported that the Act was being duly observed throughout the town.

Water Managers Report

That during the past month there had been a good many leakage in the Water Services all of which had been made good.

That the Asylum reservoir the previous day was within 3 inches of overflow and auxiliary supply owing to dry weather being almost stopped - That the Town Reservoir had fallen to 14" below overflow this showing a good decrease in leakage at the level and that the defect is seemingly near the top surface. That the Glencar reservoir was within 18" of overflow.

Gas Manager's Report

That the Gas Manufactured during the Month was 195300cf. Coal carbonised during same period 28 tons & cut.

That owing to the long day light the consumption at present was very small and he had been seriously considering whether it would not be advisable to cease gas making till the month of August more especially as he can barely keep furnace going as it should to keep the heats. His requirements were 5 Petrols and the usual bricks &c in connection.

with building same.

The Council decided not to close down the Works as suggested by the Gas Manager as by doing so they would be seriously affecting local industries that have gas engines.

The Inspector of Cowsheds and Dairies reported having inspected 31 Cowsheds. and yards and Dairy utensils used in connection therewith and found all clean and in good order.

Town Surveyor's Report.

The Town Surveyor reported that owing to scarcity of Coal he did not consider it necessary to have an application made for the service of the County Council Stone Breaker when passing through the Urban District during the Month.

That the surface men are working as usual in the Quarry also at necessary Surface work and clearing Vermets &c. The Foreman had been instructed at all times to keep the streets free from rolling stones and when necessary
