### Water Managers Report

The Water Manager reported that there had been several leakages in the service pipes during the month all of which had been made good. The Arylum Reservoir at Carnamuggagh was down almost 18 inches. That New Reservoir was still sinking but for the past month it shows a leakage of only 2 inches and if allowance is made for evaporation the leakage for the period is very small. The Glencairn Reservoir stands at  $5\frac{1}{2}$  from overflow. That if the present dry weather lasts it will try supplies very much.

Ordered that Dr. Moor be written to as to condition of the Lower Reservoir as reported.

The Water Manager made application for payment of expenses while repairing Sough Salt Main on the 16 + 17. March last.

### Gas Manager Report

The Gas Manager reported gas manufactured during the month as 169 100 C.F. according to registry of Station Meters and that the coal carbonised was 20 tons 2 Cwt. That he was anxious about lime supply and trusted that definite arrangements would be made at this meeting. That coal on hands he expected would last till the month of August next.

The Gas Manager was directed to check the registry of the Station Meters with the plates of the Gas holder and report result of the correct work at next meeting.

### Gas Managers Collection Account

The Gas Managers Collection Account was submitted examined and showed arrears of Quarters prior to the 31<sup>st</sup> March 1921 amounting to £ 57 : 9 : 6 outstanding.

### Resignation of Gas & Water Managers

The Gas and Water Manager Mr. Andrew A. Mitchell wrote that having completed twenty years service in the Council's employment and being over 60 years of age, he applied to the Local Government Board for their sanction to his resignation of the Office of Gas and Water Manager held by him under the Council. That this sanction as the Council was aware had been granted to him. He therefore respectfully tendered to the Council his resignation of both Offices to take effect from the 5<sup>th</sup> September 1921 and he requested the Council to determine the superannuation allowance to which he is entitled.

He thanked the Council for the many kindnesses extended to him during his term of office.

The Council unanimously accepted Mr. Mitchell's resignation of offices and directed that a Committee Meeting of the whole Council be held on Thursday the 16<sup>th</sup> June at 7 o'clock P.M. to (1) Draw up rules regulating the Duties of Gas and Water Managers to be appointed on the resignation of Mr. Andrew A. Mitchell.

(2) Fix salaries for the Offices of Gas Manager and Water Manager.

(3) Advertise Vacant Offices.

As regards the superannuation allowance to be granted Mr. Mitchell the Council will take the matter into consideration after the 5<sup>th</sup> day of September next the date on which the resignation takes effect.

Report of Committee Meeting

Read the following Report.

Report of Committee Meeting held on Thursday the 16<sup>th</sup> day of June 1921. In the Chair Charles Kelly Esq. Other Members present Messrs John P. Spear John Doherty

Owing to the small attendance of Members and the important nature of the business to be transacted the meeting was adjourned till Monday evening the 20<sup>th</sup> June at 10 o'clock.

Adjourned Meeting 20<sup>th</sup> June 1921

Present: In the Chair Charles Kelly Esq. Other Members present Messrs W. E. McKinney John P. Spear W. M. Gallagher John Doherty John Curran.

Water Supply.

The Committee had under consideration the Water Supply, the storage in the reservoirs owing to the long period of dry weather having greatly decreased. It was ordered that placards be posted up through out the town and hand bills distributed bringing under the notice of the public the scarcity of water that exists and the necessity for the exercise of the strictest economy in the use of public water (1) That no water be used other than for domestic purposes. (2) That no washing of motor cars, lorries &c takes place. (3) That baths in Hotels and private residences be used as little as possible and (4) That no taps be allowed to run so as to waste any water. Further that should any waste or unnecessary use be detected after the publication of the notice that the supply be cut off and the offender prosecuted.

Water Supply to Railway Companies

The Committee ordered that notice be served on the Londonderry and Lough Swilly Railway Companies and the Strabane and Kesh Renny Railway Companies determining the existing agreements for water supply to their Kesh Renny Stations as from the 1<sup>st</sup> day of October next. The Companies to be informed that on and after that date the Council will be prepared to supply water by meters at the Scale Charge.

Police Motor Cars.

The fact that the Constabulary were using the Town Water for the washing of their Motor Cars was considered and it was directed that they be written to as to the number of motor cars in use and the date of their having been first used with the object of a charge being made for the water used for washing same.

Gas Manager.

The Committee considered the appointment of a Gas Manager to succeed Mr. Mitchell on his resignation taking effect.

The question of closing down the works entirely was also discussed at considerable length. Eventually Councillor W<sup>m</sup> Gallagher proposed that the works be carried on. This was recorded by Councillor John Roberts and agreed to.

It was decided to advertise the vacant office of Gas and Water Manager at an annual salary of £175 with free house fuel and light. That the advertisement be published in the "Gas World" & Insertions and in the Dublin Independent & Insertions.

The Town Clerk was instructed to draw up a set of rules regulating the duties of Gas Manager and submit same at next Meeting of the Council as regards the duties of Water Manager. The existing rules to apply to the new appointment.

#### Escape of Gas.

The Committee's attention was called to an escape of gas at the Corner House (Mrs Mulhern's) and it was ordered that the Gas Manager's attention be drawn to same.

The Report was adopted with the exception the advertisement for the vacant office of Gas Manager and Water Manager be issued inviting applicants to state in their applications the salary expected.

Ordered that the appointment of Gas and Water Manager take place at next Monthly Meeting of the Council.

#### Rules regulating the duties of Gas Manager

The Town Clerk submitted the following rules for regulating the duties of Gas Manager:-

- (1) To devote his whole time to the service of the Council.
- (2) To have charge of the Council's Gas Works buildings and all property of the Council kept or stored thereat and to be responsible for same.
- (3) To be responsible for the manufacture and distribution of all gas made at the works.
- (4) To be responsible for the carrying out of all renewals

and repairs including retorts benches gas mains purifiers scrubbers.

- (5) To be responsible for the accurate reading of the Gas Consumers' Meters to take same quarterly or oftener if directed by the Council and to record such readings in a book to be supplied by the Council for the purpose.
- (6) To regularly collect all gas bills on their becoming due and to lodge all monies collected by him on account of the Council with the Treasurer of the Council.
- (7) To superintend the delivery of all coke tar and lime or other articles sold by the Council and for which a ticket has been issued by the Town Clerk.
- (8) To keep such books of account as may be ordered from time to time by the Council including:-
  - (a) Gas Survey Book.
  - (b) Local receipt and parcelled book.
  - (c) Gas Manufactured Book.
  - (d) Workmen's Time and Weekly Pay sheets.
- (9) To report Monthly to the Council and oftener if required on the State of the Gas Works. Gas Manufactured Readings of Gas Station Meters Coals carbonised retorts sold and monies collected on behalf of the Council and lodged with the Treasurer.
- (10) To have charge of the Gas Stokers and other Workmen employed at the Gas Works and to see that each performs the work allotted to him.
- (11) To carry out any plumbing work or gas fitting work required by the Council and when time permits to carry out any plumbing and gas fitting work that he may be called upon to do within the town at such rate of charge as may be fixed by the Council and to account to the Council for all such works and for any monies received in this connection. Accurate accounts of works of this kind to be recorded in a book to be kept for this purpose.

- (12) To have charge of the Public lighting of the town and to be responsible for the lighting and extinguishing of public lamps at the times fixed for same by the Council
- (13) To carry out all Orders in relation to his office whether covered by the foregoing regulations or not that may be from time to time hereafter made by the Council
- The rules were unanimously agreed to by the Council

### Water Supply Railway Station Lettekenmy

The Town Clerk submitted notice served by order of the Council on the Londonderry and Sough Divilly Railway and the Strabane and Lettekenmy Railway Co. determining on and after the 1<sup>st</sup> day of October 1921 the existing agreements for supply of water to the Railway Station at Lettekenmy.

Read letter dated 25<sup>th</sup> June 1921 from the Secretary and General Manager of the L & S. Railway acknowledging receipt of notice and of the Town Clerk's letter of the 23<sup>rd</sup> June 1921 which accompanied the notice and asking to be informed as to the scale of charges in operation in the District.

Read letter dated 25<sup>th</sup> June 1921 from the Secretary Strabane and Lettekenmy Railway Co. acknowledging receipt of the Town Clerk's letter of the 23<sup>rd</sup> ult. and of the notice referred to and asking for a notice of the scale of charges for water referred to in the letter of the Town Clerk.

### Water Supply Public Motor Cars &c.

Read letters from the W. H. R. I. C. Lettekenmy dated 24<sup>th</sup> June 1921 and 30<sup>th</sup> June 1921 acknowledging receipt of the Town Clerk's letter of the 23<sup>rd</sup> ult. relative to the Public Water used for washing of Police Motor Cars at Lettekenmy and stating that there are 2 such Vehicles at Lettekenmy.

That in accordance with the Public Notices of the Council instructions have been issued that the Public Water Supply is to be used only for purely domestic purposes and that even then the strictest economy is to be observed.

The Town Clerk was instructed to obtain from the Police Authorities the date or dates when the 2 Vehicles referred to came first into use at Lettekenmy.

### Water Supply Lough Salt.

Read telegram of the 1<sup>st</sup> July inst. from the caretaker at Sough Salt that the water was escaping at a sluice valve at Lettepad. The Town Clerk reported that immediately on receipt of the telegram he directed the Water Manager to proceed to the place and have the valve repaired owing however to a conveyance not being obtainable the Water Manager did not go until the following day when the defect was made good.

The Council discussed at great length the question of the Water Supply the existing scarcity and the ways and means to be adopted to insure that the supply be maintained.

The cutting off of the supply to the Village of Kilmacrenan.

and all others supplied outside the Urban boundary was fully gone into also the curtailing of the hours of supply to the Town. The question of Waste of Water was fully discussed finally it was agreed that a house to house inspection of the Town be made and of all fields supplied from the public mains to ascertain if any waste or misuse of Water is occurring that Mr. Patrick McParaghlan Sanitary Sub Officer be appointed to accompany and assist the Water Manager in the inspection that the inspection begin on the following morning and that they immediately report the result thereof to the Town Clerk. A Committee meeting of the whole Council to be convened to consider the report should same be found necessary.

#### Water Supply to Asylum.

Read letter from W. J. Martin dated 14<sup>th</sup> June 1921

Notifying that the Water supply in the Reservoir is running very low and stating that all possible precautions to prevent waste at the Asylum have been resorted to. Bathing operations have been suspended and the Water is being used only for the purposes of absolute necessity etc.

#### Scouring Lough Salt Water Main

The caretaker Lough Salt reported having scoured the Water Main on the 6<sup>th</sup> & 12<sup>th</sup> day of June last

#### Water Supply to Military at Asylum.

The Council had before them the fact that the public Water was being used by the Military at the Asylum.

Ordered that the Town Clerk write the Military Authorities with a view of obtaining payment for the Water so used.

#### Water Managers Report

The Water Manager reported that during the month there had been a good many minor leakages in Water services also one very large one in the Lough Salt Main that all had been attended to

At Kilmacrenan there was still one street fountain to repair and the Kilmacrenan Main going towards the Chapel showed signs of leaking that notwithstanding the Lough Salt supply having been shut off for fully 24 hours and the Water used at the recent outbreak of fire in the town the Asylum Reservoir stood at 4' 10" and the Glenear Reservoir at 4' It would however take great watching

that he had repaired the Hose pipe and had now 280 yards of hose pipe in order.

The new reservoir is still losing level of Water 2' 2" from overflow.

#### Water Manager's Expenses Lough Salt Main

The Water Manager Mr A. Mitchell claimed £1: 5: 0 in respect of expenses while engaged at repairs on the Lough Salt Main on the following dates June 20, 25, 27 & 28 and July 2<sup>nd</sup> viz 5 days @ 5/- a day.

The Gas Manager reported advising the securing of a cargo of Gas Coal. - that the stock of lime on hand will last only about another fortnight that the Gas manufactured during the month was 153,700 cft and coal used 19 tons that he had tested the Station Meter with the Gas Holder and same was almost 7% fast

The Town Clerk reported steps taken by him to secure a <sup>supply</sup> cargo of lime but without effect

It was ordered that Mr Hugh Bartley convey be written

to and asked to supply.

### Gas Managers Collection Account.

The Gas Managers Collection Account was submitted examined and showed arrears of Quarters prior to the 31<sup>st</sup> March last amounting to £57:9:6 out standing

### Reports Sanitary Sub Officers.

The Report of Work performed by the Sanitary Sub Officers since date of last Monthly Meeting was submitted and showed that 30 Houses Yards and premises had been inspected and no nuisances found to exist

### Rate Collectors Bond.

The Town Clerk reported that the Poor Rate and Town Rate Collector Mr Neil Jones having failed to get an approved Guarantee Society to join with him in the prescribed form of Bond. he called upon him to submit to this Meeting of the Council the names and addresses of at least two solvent Sureties who are willing to enter with him into the required Bond.

Read letter from Mr Jones dated 4<sup>th</sup> July 1921 giving the names of his proposed Sureties viz James M<sup>o</sup> Menamin Kirkstown and Hugh M<sup>o</sup> Kendrick Kirkstown

The Council considered the sum of £500 covered by the former Bond was not now sufficient and they decided that the security be increased to £1500 and that at least two solvent Sureties join with the collector in a Bond for this amount. The collector to at once furnish the names and addresses of his proposed Sureties for the approval of the Council should he not within the next few days get the Guarantee Society with which he is at present negotiating to secure him in this amount.

### Water Supply.

The Water Manager and Sanitary Sub Officer reported that they had made a very exhaustive inspection of the Water Supply through the whole town including taps, baths, W.C.s and lavatories and found all to their satisfaction unless the places referred to in list attached. These consisted of washrooms being required in some 13 cases.

The report was considered satisfactory and it was ordered that the owners be called upon to have the defects referred to repaired.

### Watering of Streets

The Committee ordered that an experiment of pumping water from the river Swilley at Oldtown bridge be made for the purpose of watering the streets and the Chairman, Town Clerk and Water Manager were appointed to make arrangements for the carrying out of the experiment.

### Gas Works Station Meter

It was ordered that Messrs James Melne & Co. should be written to asking for particulars of the repairs carried out to the Gas Station meter and pointing out that the Gas Manager has reported to the Council that the meter is registering 7% fast.

### Road Nuisance

Read letter from John McCay Post Road dated 11<sup>th</sup> July 1921 complaining that a horse is allowed to roam along the Glebe lane to the danger of passengers.

Ordered that the complaint be referred to the police.

## Rate Collectors Bond.

The Rate Collector Mr. Neal Jones wrote submitting the following as willing to join with him in a Bond to the Council in the sum of £1500 for the collection of the Rates by John Wellinson, James Gibbons, John Harris, Joseph Murray, all of Kettlekenney, Peter Jones and Hugh McIndrick, both of Kishston, Bellekenney.

The caretaker Lough Salt reported having scoured the mains on the 4<sup>th</sup> 18<sup>th</sup> & 29<sup>th</sup> days of July last.

### Water Manager's Report.

The Water Manager reported that during the last month there had been a decrease of leakages in water services that the storage in Arglun Reservoir is beginning to increase somewhat. On the previous day the level of water stood at 5' 9" that the Glenac reservoir is well down. The town reservoir at Camanuggagh is now at 2' 3 1/2" from overflow still showing a small loss.

### Water Waste Inspection

Mr. Patrick McManagham Sanitary Sub Officer applied for payment at the rate of 10/- a day for the 3 days he was engaged making the inspection of the town to detect waste of water with the Water Manager. Total amount claimed £ 1. 10.

### Gas Manager's Report

The Gas Manager reported having received from Samuel Morrison the Londonderry 30 tons Coal - a house coal. fairly good as regards gas production but very poor in other qualities. Candles and calorific power being low. Coke heavy and dull for on purification and too slow in carbonization. He strongly advised procuring another cargo of screened ballstone at once.

The lime supply was putting him in a quandary. The gas manufactured during the month was 157,500 Cf. and the coal carbonised 18.8.

The Sanitary Sub Officer reported that Mr John P. Speer had not complied with the requirements of the Sanitary Notice served on him requiring a water supply to be laid on to two W.C.s in premises at McAuley's Yard owned by him

Mr Speer stated that his agent Mr C. A. Flattery was to have seen to this for him evidently he had not done so, and he (Mr Speer) now undertook to have the works called for carried out

### Appointment of Gas & Water Manager

#### Gas & Water Manager - Appointment Accepted

Read letter from Mr Michael Kelly Gas Manager Tim dated 21<sup>st</sup> September 1921 that he was most grateful to the Council for their kind consideration of his application that he accepted the position of Gas & Water Manager at the Salary offered viz

£150 per Annum, with free house fuel and light - He asked to be informed on what date he would have to take up duties.

The Town Clerk stated that after corresponding with Mr Kelly it had been finally settled that he would take over charge from Mr Mitchell the retiring Manager, on Wednesday the 19<sup>th</sup> inst.

#### Street Nuisances and Loose Stones.

Councillor John P. Steer owner of McFetigan's and Hanlon's premises informed the Council that he had given directions to his agent Mr C. A. Flattery to have the defects made good but as it now appeared his directions had not been attended to he would now himself see that the requirements of the notices are carried out.

In the case of Mr Harley's premises owner Mrs M'Carry unless the works are forthwith carried out legal proceedings to be taken.

The Council called upon Mr. Mitchell for an explanation of the very serious loss, but he was unable to give any explanation beyond stating that he now believed the Consumers' Meters were not registering correctly - The Council expressed great dissatisfaction at the manner in which the Gas Works have all along been managed by Mr. Mitchell to the serious loss to the Ratepayers of the Urban District

Gas Manager's Superannuation Allowance.

Read Council's Opinion (Mr. Albert D. The Water Manager Mr Michael Kelly reported that he visited the Glencair reservoir on the 6<sup>th</sup> inst and found 10 feet of water in same. also that he visited the Asylum reservoir at Carnamuggagh. the water stood at 9 feet. and was overflowing into Lower Reservoir. That the water fountains and street hydrants were in good working order. That the water supply was cut off from the Court House, until such times as the pipes are repaired.

### Securing of Rough Salt Water Mains

The caretaker Joseph Salt reported having secured the Mains on the following dates viz. 10<sup>th</sup> Oct. 24 Oct. and the 4<sup>th</sup> Nov.

### Gas Manager's Report.

The Gas Manager Mr M. Kelly reported that he took up duty on Friday the 21<sup>st</sup> October. That he found the Gas Plant in good working order. He had since completed the setting of four retorts. That the yield of gas per ton of coal carbonised was 9,500 cft. To bring the works to a paying concern, it is absolutely necessary to install an Exhauster and engine this would result in an increase yield of gas per ton of coal by 3,500 cft and would also prolong the life of the retorts and enable him to use Oxide of iron for purifying instead of lime. He could also manufacture a cheaper and more suitable gas for incandescent lighting.

That the chimney of the retort house was in a most dangerous state there were two large cracks running to the top this is greatly against the proper heating of retorts if any portion

of the chimney should fall. it will break through the purifier and cause an explosion and a complete stoppage of gas. This should be seen to at once - That his expenses in removing from Grain to Letter Kenny amounted to £8:0:0.

The Report was adopted.

The Council unanimously agreed to pay Mr Kelly the amount of his expenses £6:0:0. in removing from Grain to Letter Kenny.

The Council unanimously agreed that an Exhauster and Engine should be provided and directed the Town Clerk to make enquiries as to the probable cost of installing same. They also decided to have the Chimney Stack repaired and that Mr James Orr Johnston be asked to tender for the works. On receipt of tenders the Town Clerk to convene a special meeting of the Council to consider same.

### Price of Coke.

Read letter from Mr John J. Gallagher dated 7<sup>th</sup> November 1921 offering at the rate of £2:0:0 per ton for all coke at present at the works.

The Council unanimously declined the offer.

The Council fixed the price to be charged for Coke from this date until further orders at the rate of £4 per ton.

The Town Clerk reported that lamp post at Kelly's Haberdashery shop had been knocked down and broken by Brigadier General Owens on the 20<sup>th</sup> September last through the negligent driving of his motor car.

### Town Surveyor's Report

The Town Surveyor reported that during the past month the usual surface work had been carried out on the Main Roads and Side Roads. Main Roads had been darned in places where most needed and on the side streets water gables and outlets had been cleaned out. That as the contractor for repairs to the Urban House had not completed the work he had not certified for any payment this month. As instructed at last monthly meeting he submitted an estimate for erecting paling on the fence between the Council's property at Ballymacool Terrace and Mr Diver's lands.

Fence finished with barbed wire £4: 15: 0. with plain black wire £4: 5: 0.

The report was adopted and it was agreed to have the fence repaired with barbed wire - half the cost to be borne by Mr Diver work to be carried out by the Surface men.

### Letter from the Chairman of the Council

Read letter dated 21<sup>st</sup> November 1921 from Mr Charles Kelly Chairman of the Council regretting that he was unable to be present at the Meeting the object of which had his full sympathy  
Fever and District Hospital

Councillor John P. Speer proposed and Councillor William Gallagher seconded the following resolution which was unanimously passed:-

That we the Members of the Letter Kemy Urban District Council are greatly concerned on account of the report of the Medical Inspector of An Dail that Letter Kemy is not to have a District or Fever Hospital although it was recommended for both by the Inghinall County Council

He would draw the attention of the Local Government Department to the following facts:- Letter Kemy is the most central as well as the Capital town of the County. It is an Urban area with a population of 2500 and has all modern conveniences such as Sewerage System an inexhaustible Water Supply (second to none) and a Gas Supply all under the control of the Urban Council. The Fever Hospital which was recently renovated is an ideal building for a District Hospital or a Fever Hospital. It is equipped with water closets Baths Civan presses &c. There are four Medical Doctors in practice in the Town. Letter Kemy has had the advantage of a Fever Hospital since the year 1839. And to deprive the District of its services would now be a retrograde step. The Hospital was built largely by private subscriptions collected locally, and the closing of the Institution after 82 years existence will inflict a serious hardship on the District. Letter Kemy it is pointed out is more central than Stranorlar the proposed site of a new Fever Hospital for the County.

We understand the surrounding Districts of Letter Kemy Rural Dumbanagh and Milford are unanimously in favour of Letter Kemy as the site of the Fever Hospital and District Hospital.

Taking the foregoing facts into consideration we consider we are fully entitled to a Fever Hospital and District Hospital and we respectfully call upon the Local Government Department to give the matter very serious consideration.

### County Home.

As regards the County Home we desire to point out that Letter Kemy is more central than Stranorlar and we consider a very small outlay would suffice to make the present Workhouse buildings suitable for the County Home. The same advantages apply as regards Sewerage water and light as stated in regard to the Fever Hospital all these will have to be provided should Stranorlar be retained as the site for the new County Home and County Fever Hospital.

### Delay in forwarding Minutes of Proceedings

Dail Nreann Social Government Department dated 22<sup>nd</sup> November 1921 Drawing attention to the fact that there is considerable delay on the part of Local Officials in forwarding Minutes of proceedings of the Authorities with which they are connected and pointing out that this laxity of officials interferes with the work of the Department. That to ensure matters on the Minutes receiving prompt attention by the Ministry it is essential that the Minutes should reach the Department not later than four days after the date of meeting.

### Superannuation of Surface Men.

Read letter No 17. 5144/21 dated 24<sup>th</sup> Nov. 1921 from Dail Nreann Local Government Department acknowledging receipt of the Town Clerk's letter of the 19<sup>th</sup> November last. on the subject of Superannuation of one of the Council's surface men, Michael Bradley, and stating that as the Law stands at present it does not contain any provision under which employees of Urban Councils such as Surface men, could be granted a pension but the matter is being considered with a view to legislation on the subject and suggesting that it might be helpful if the Urban Council placed their views before the Donegal County Council with the object of having the question discussed by the General Council of County Councils.

The Council decided to bring the matter before the Donegal County Council as suggested being unanimously of the opinion that the Law in this respect, should be amended.

### Malicious Injurious Claims Irrecoverable Rates &c.

Read letter No. 17452/21 dated 26<sup>th</sup> November 1921 from Dail Nreann Local Government Department acknowledging receipt of Minutes of proceedings of the Council on the 4<sup>th</sup> November last and referring to the report of Council's Solicitor on "Malicious Injurious Claims" and drawing the attention of the Council to their attitude on such matters - that the defence of such actions in English Courts can only mean waste of public monies in costs besides acquiescing in the contention that the Administration of English law is tolerated in Areas governed by the Irish Republic

A copy of Circular No 40 dated 11<sup>th</sup> March 1921 relating to the Allegiance of Officials of Public Bodies issued from the Department for Home Affairs was enclosed for consideration by the Council.

That with reference to the decision of the Council concerning irrecoverable rates communication with an English Board would be inconsistent with the Council's resolution of Allegiance to Dail Nreann that the Vouchers and sheets relating to rates struck off, are to be preserved for submission to the Auditor from the Department.

The Council desires to state that as regards the defence of Malicious Injurious claims referred to there were orders and dealt with prior to the Council having declared its Allegiance to Dail Nreann - There is one adjourned case outstanding and the Council now orders that no further defence be prosecuted and that the Council's Solicitor be instructed not to appear on behalf of the Council at the adjourned hearing of the claim.

As regards the irrecoverable rates no communication in reference to same was made to the English Board so the subsequent resolution of Allegiance to Dail Nreann was held to alter that decision.

The bills and Vouchers were forwarded to Dail Nreann Social Government Department for their ruling thereon.

by him in the last letter the assessor stated that in view of the fact that the lamp post will be in a much better condition after the repairs than it was before, he would be glad to know whether the Council will make a reduction in the claim against General Owens, and also a reduction in the item for gas lost.

The Council decided that no reduction can be made in the amount of the claim and that payment of same forthwith be requested.

The Town Clerk reported that a public lamp post was knocked down at Mr. McIlvenna's on the 11<sup>th</sup> Nov last by a Motor Lorry driven by Sergeant Sprack. R. F. L. the motor lorry being owned by Mr. David Wallace. Seth Kenny stated that he furnished a claim against the Inspector General R. F. L. to District Inspector Walsh. The Record of Work performed by the Sanitary Sub-Officer since date of last meeting was submitted examined and showed that 40 houses yards and premises at Main Street had been inspected.

He reported a defective W.C. on premises occupied by Daniel Diver, Owner Mr. John J. Gallagher.

Ordered that notice be served on the Owner and 7 days allowed

to carry out all necessary repairs.

#### Report and Resignation of Town Surveyor.

The Town Surveyor Mr. Michael Dawson reported that during the month of November the streets had been darned in places where most needed, and that owing to the bad state of some parts all available material will have to be used. That he had directed the surfacemen to apply a coating of cinders from the Gas Works in some of the side roads and crossings. The repair of footpaths ordered at last meeting he was unable to get done as the surface men were employed at other important work, and one man was off work for the past three weeks. He suggested that the Council should employ a man for the work as the surfacemen will not have time to carry out same.

That the fencing between Council's property at Malymacool Terrace and Mrs. Diver's land ordered at last meeting had been erected.

That he was sorry to notify the Council that his services with them would terminate at the end of December, as he had procured an appointment as Surveyor in County Fermanagh.

The Council unanimously congratulated Mr. Dawson on his appointment and accepted his resignation of Office of Town Surveyor to take effect on the 31<sup>st</sup> December, 1921.

#### Report of Cowsheds and Dairies Inspector

The Inspector of Cowsheds and Dairies reported having visited and inspected 20 Cowsheds and yards and found all in Clean Order.

#### Report of Shops Act Inspector

The Inspector under the Shops Act reported that the provisions of the Act were being observed throughout the District.

#### Report of Water Manager

The Water Manager reported having visited the Reservoirs at Glencair and Larnamuggagh the previous day. The Glencair Reservoir was overflowing and that at Larnamuggagh stood at 8 feet.

That there was a stoppage in the water main between Market Square and Town Hall. This would be put in order as soon as the necessary material arrived. That there was a waste of water

in Mr Mulhem's field caused by defective fittings that he cut off the supply until repairs were carried out that several water fountains were out of repair during the month all of which were made right

That the lid of water fountain at Rosemount was broken on Friday night last. That the water and gas at this place are causing unnecessary work.

#### Lough Salt Water Supply.

Recd letter from Dr M. Mason, Lincinnell Mental Hospital dated 30<sup>th</sup> Nov. 1921 drawing attention to the supply coming from Lough Salt. That it is not what it should be and stating that something should be done to increase the flow otherwise the outlook for next spring and summer was bad. That now was the time to work at the Lough Salt pipe if the supply has to be cut off at any time

The Water Manager was directed to have the entire main from Lough Salt to the Reservoir scraped as soon as possible

#### Scouring of Lough Salt Water Main

The caretaker Lough Salt reported having scoured the main on the 21<sup>st</sup> November and on the 2<sup>nd</sup> December last

#### Report of Gas Manager.

The Gas Manager reported that during the month of November 1921, 41<sup>9</sup>/<sub>20</sub> tons of coal were carbonized yielding 397.140 C.F. of gas an average of 9,500 C.F. per ton. The new setting of 5 retorts was working most satisfactorily showing the skill and care taken by the retort setter Mr M. Blake. That he had the ground almost complete for laying the foundation of the floor for the Inhaler's House that he had discovered a large leakage in an old disused gas service and by all appearances this was going on for some considerable time. Six of the street lamps sanctioned at last meeting had been put in commission - that nearly all the gas rentals have been collected. The gas lamp at Rosemount was broken the previous night and is not at present lit

Ordered that the gas lamp referred to be repaired

#### Gas Manager's Collection Account.

The Gas Manager's Collection Account was submitted and showed arrears of Quarters prior to 30<sup>th</sup> September 1921 amounting to £48:6:0 outstanding and of Quarters ended 30 Sept 1921 £20:12:6.

#### Gas Engine and Inhaler

Invitations for supplying a Gas Engine and Inhaler were submitted and examined and on the recommendation of the Gas Manager the Council accepted the tender of Messrs Firth Blackley, Sons & Co Ltd Church Tenton Leeds. to supply same in accordance with specification and drawings for the sum of £160 nett delivered free at Ketterkenney Station

#### Street Improvement Works.

The Council had before them a tender from Mr W<sup>m</sup> Holmes Drummond, M.C. Ham. for carrying out the proposed Street Improvement Works in accordance with the specification of the Town Surveyor for the sum of £2000. provided the Council secure him the service of the Donegal County Council's Stone Breaker and Roller in accordance with the agreement. as to hire of Steam Roller and Breaker in assistance between the County and Urban District Councils

The Town Clerk was instructed to communicate with the County Council on the matter and ascertain if the Breaker and Roller can be got as provided by the existing agreement.

The consideration of the tender is deferred until this information is obtained

#### Note of Condolence.

On the Motion of Councillor John Doherty seconded by Councillor John Curran the Town Clerk was instructed to convey to the relatives of the late Alderman Thos. Barry through the Cork Corporation the Council's sympathy and condolence.

The County Surveyor (Mr. Steadman) wrote that he thought that the Urban Council could count upon a Stonebreaker and roller - in from 6 to 8 weeks time if he could manage to get them sooner he would acquaint the Council

Since date of last meeting two further tenders for the Street Improvement works had been received all the parties tendering were now in attendance and Mr. William Holmes whose tender had been before the Council at last meeting was now represented by his Solicitor Mr. C. A. Flattery who contended that his client's tender had been accepted by the Council at the previous meeting or at least provisionally accepted

The Chairman pointed out that Mr. Holmes' tender had not been accepted at last meeting and suggested that as there were two other tenders since received that fresh invitation for tenders be issued. Owner Mrs Katherine Peoples, Tully gar. Ordered that Notice be served on the Owner of the Premises and one month allowed to carry out all necessary repairs.

The Inspector under the Shops Act reported that the provisions of the Act were being observed throughout the District.

### Town Surveyors Report

The Town Surveyor reported that during the quarter ended the 31<sup>st</sup> December 1921 the streets and roads in the

Urban District had received the usual attention at this period of the year. In places that had been applied as much material as could be afforded and although it is nothing like what is required it will be a great help until a proper coating can be applied. That on the side roads the water tables have been properly opened and razing done, and a coating of Chinkers from Gas Yard, applied as darning here and there. That on a couple of occasions the mud was not removed from the streets promptly and it was found necessary to employ an extra cart to have same carried out.

#### Reports of Medical Officers of Health

The Medical Officer of Health reported:-

(1) That on the premises at High Road occupied by Samuel Doyle (Owner Mrs. Finnegan) water is streaming down the walls in both apartments. There is mildew on the walls of the parlour and the house is unfit for human habitation and he recommended that the house be immediately thatched

Ordered that Notice be served on the Owner and one month allowed to carry out the recommendations of the Medical Officer of Health.

(2) That he inspected premises occupied by Mrs. Pat Gallagher (Glen Bar) Water is running down the walls of the kitchen and Pantry

owing to defect in the roof which is flat and recommended that this roof be repaired so as to prevent water percolating through.

Ordered that notice be served on the Owner and one month allowed to carry out the recommendations of the Medical Officer of Health.

### Reports of Sanitary Sub-Officer

The Sanitary Sub-Officer reported:—

(1) That he had since date of last Monthly Meeting visited and inspected 48 Houses yards and premises.

(2) That in Cottage Row he found a pile of refuse in yard occupied by Michael Doherty James Donnell and Samuel Mehan.

Ordered that notices be served on the Occupiers and seven days allowed to abate nuisance.

(3) That he found a broken sewer at the Council Co-operative Store Owner Mr Alexander Wallace.

Ordered that notice be served on the owner and 7 days allowed to abate nuisance.

(4) That he found a defective sewer from premises occupied by Pat Gallagher at Market Square running at rear of Wallace's Garage into John Wilkinsons yard and on to the Street at Market Square. Ordered that notices be served on the owners and 7 days allowed to repair the sewer and abate the nuisance.

### Scouring of Lough Salt Water Main

The caretaker of Lough Salt reported having scoured the Lough Salt Water Main on the 13<sup>th</sup> + 27<sup>th</sup> days of January, 1922.

### Water Managers Report

The Water Manager reported having the previous day visited the reservoirs at Glencar and Barnamuggagh. — That the

Glencar reservoir was one foot below the overflow that the Barnamuggagh reservoir was overflowing. That during the month he was two days at Lough Salt investigating the cause of failure of water this he found was an air lock which occurred during sludging operations. To remedy this he sludged the Main from the Lough to the reservoir at Barnamuggagh. That he intends during the present month to scrape the Main from Lough Salt. That the water is now shut off from the town from 8 P.M. until 6.30 P.M. That he relaid 50 ft. of 34 lb. piping for the supply of water to 8 Cottage at Rosemount the old service was completely choked up. Fire-plugs and water fountains were in good working order with the exception of one fountain on the High Road damaged by a Cart or Motor this will be put in order during the coming week.

The report was adopted.

### Gas Managers Report

The Gas Manager reported that during the month of January last there were 458 490 c.f. of gas manufactured. Coal carbonised 52 1/2 tons. That he located a large leakage of gas in an old disused service that supplied McCarry's Hotel at one time. This leak must have been going on for some considerable time judging from the appearance of the earth. That the cause of the weak gas at the Asylum complained of by Dr. Moor, R.M.S. was a defect in the Siphon box on the Asylum Service Main and also a section of one of the Service pipes leaking this he pointed out to Dr. Moor who got the Siphon box and air pipe put in order. On account of the blacky state of coals at end of Coal Shed the yield of gas per ton carbonised had fallen to 8,700 c.f. during the month.

The report was adopted.

### Gas Manager's Collection Account.

The Gas Manager's Collection Account was submitted examined and showed arrears of Quarters prior to 31<sup>st</sup> Dec. 1921 amounting to £ 51: 15: 7. outstanding. This sum included £ 2: 10: 0 charged in error to the Most Rev D. O'Donnell No 100 and 2/- also charged in error to Mr W<sup>m</sup> Kelly, Solicitor (No 119) These sums the Council ordered to be written off as irrecoverable.

Read letter from Mr Joseph Burns (No 17) Complaining of the amount £ 6: 15: 0 charged to him for Gas during the Summer months 1<sup>st</sup> April 1921 to 30<sup>th</sup> September 1921. He stated that during the period the Gas was not lit on his premises except a branch on a Saturday night during April and September. His usual bill would be from 15/- to 21/- He was quite agreeable to pay the average of his bill that Mr Mitchell former Gas Manager had removed the Meter and replaced it by a new one.

The Council went fully into the figures and were satisfied that Mr Mitchell must have made a mistake in charging Mr Burns with £ 6: 15: 0 for the six months stated. They left the settlement of the dispute in the hands of the Town Clerk.

### Gas used at Council's Meetings

Ordered that as the Gas used in the Little Penny Loan Fund Office was all consumed at Meetings of the Council that the Bill for same be paid out of the General Account of the Council.

Ordered that a special Meeting of the Council be summoned for consideration of the Tenders for Monday the 13<sup>th</sup> February inst at 7 o'clock p.m.

The Shops Act Inspector reported the provisions of the Act are being observed in the District.

Ordered that the Surfacemen carry out necessary repairs to Street at M<sup>o</sup>Clures Terrace.

The Council duly notified Mr Holmes of the acceptance of his tender they sold to him the quantity of stones they had quarried at their quarry 460 tons for the purposes of the contract.

He entered on the works has a large staff working and is at present well forward with the quarrying and breaking of the stones.

Under the foregoing circumstances the Council do not consider they would be justified in inviting fresh tenders for the works and they are fully satisfied that if they did so no tenders would be received in response to such invitations furthermore they would be liable for damages for breach of contract at the suit of Mr Holmes.
