COPY MINUTES OF PROCEEDINGS OF QUARTERLY MEETING
OF TIRCONAILL COUNTY COUNCIL HELD ON 24th DAY OF
FEBRUARY, 1925.

ATTENDANCE.

The members present were:-

CHAIRMAN.

Councillor Clarke was moved to the chair.

VOTE OF CONDOLENCE.

On the motion of Councillor Boyle, seconded by Councillor McGoldrick, it was resolved - "That we desire to convey to Mr. Edward Gallen - a member of this Council - our sincerest sympathy in his recent sad bereavement caused by the death of his wife".

The resolution was passed in silence.

CONFIRMATION OF MINUTES.

Before proceeding to confirm minutes of previous meeting a letter was read from Councillor McDermott referring to minute in regard to the appointment of an Architect in connection with the rebuilding of workhouses in Tirconaille and stated that he did not second the resolution proposing that the remuneration to the architect be 5% on the outlay.

Councillor Lynch said to insert his name as seconding the resolution in lieu of Councillor McDermott. This was agreed to. The Chairman amended the minutes in this respect. The minutes were then confirmed.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

The reports of the undermentioned committees, were unanimously adopted.

SECRETARY'S ESTIMATES.

On the motion of Councillor Boyle, seconded by Councillor McGoldrick, the Secretary's Estimates in respect of financial year ending 31st March, 1926, as amended by the Finance Committee at a meeting held on 17th February, 1925 were unanimously adopted.

PROPOSALS FOR PAYMENT.

Proposals for payment in respect of salaries etc. Quarter ended 31st December, 1924, were confirmed.

TREASURERS ADVICE NOTES.

Treasurers Advice Notes were submitted and signed.

ADVERTISING THE ATTRACTIONS OF TIRCONAILL.

A letter, dated the 19th February, 1925, was read from the Ministry of Local Government regarding the proposal of the Tirconail County Council to strike a rate for above purpose and stating that there is at present no statutory authority empowering a County Council to strike a rate for this purpose. There is however a section in the Local Government Bill at present before the Oireachtas to enable this to be done.

In this connection the following Notice of Motion by Councillor Kelly (H. J.) was withdrawn:-

"That this Council instructs its Secretary to include in the coming Estimates Id in the £1 for the purpose of advertising the attractions of Tirconail".

TIRCONAILL COUNTY BOARD OF HEALTH.

On the motion of Councillor Kelly (John) seconded by Councillor Gallagher (Anthony), Mr. Manus MacCreadie, The Hotel, Milford, was appointed a member of Tirconail County Board of Health.

BROKEN DOWN BRIDGES - CROLLY BRIDGE.

On the motion of Councillor Boyle, seconded by Councillor O'Donnell (J.F.), it was unanimously resolved that the reconstruction of Crollly Bridge be proceeded with forthwith.

OTHER BROKEN DOWN BRIDGES.

It was also unanimously resolved that the work of rebuilding all the other broken down bridges in Tirconail be commenced at once.

On the suggestion of Mr. Steadman it was decided that any expenditure incurred prior to receipt of the Government Grant be paid out of Revenue and subsequently recouped to the County Council.

DAMAGE TO PROPERTY (COMPENSATION) ACT, 1923, -
DAMAGED BRIDGES -.

A letter was read from the Department of Local Government, Roads, enclosing forms upon which application may now be made for recoupment of the amount expended up to 31st January last under above Act.

The Secretary said that on receipt of letter he transmitted the forms to County Surveyors for completion.

REGISTRATION AND LICENSING OF MECHANICALLY
PROPELLED ROAD VEHICLES.

A letter on above subject was read from the Department of Local Government, Roads.

The Secretary said it was imperative that the Council's Stone Breakers should be licensed. This did not apply to the Steam Rollers.

The County Surveyors were directed to attend to the matter.

PROSECUTIONS.

A discussion arose as to the appointment at previous meeting of the Taxation Officer to appear on behalf of the County Council at District Courts to prosecute motor owners for breaches under the motor car Acts and it was pointed out that in the interests of the Council their Solicitor should conduct such cases as Law points.

points might arise from time to time that would require his assistance, otherwise the District Justice in some cases might decide against the Council, and it was also pointed out that the costs would be defrayed by the parties prosecuted.

MINUTE ----It was decided that the Solicitor to the County Council, instead of the Local Taxation Officer, appear at District Courts to prosecute in all cases against motor owners - the Secretary to furnish the former with particulars of cases in which the County Council decide to institute proceedings.

MINISTRY OF TRANSPORT GRANTS.

A letter from the Department of Local Government, Roads, stating that directions have been given for the payment of £796. in respect of Ministry of Transport Grants (Grant No.p.24) and adding that this amount together with the sum of £2,004 already paid represents the full amount allocated in respect of these Grants, the accounts in connection therewith should now be closed, was read.

HOUSING (BUILDING FACILITIES) (AMENDMENT) ACT, 1924.

A letter from the Department of Local Government enclosing a copy of above Act, was read.

On the motion of Councillor Bonner, seconded by Councillor McGoldrick, it was unanimously resolved to request the Ministry of Local Government to sanction a loan of £13,000:0:0 under above Act, said loan to be obtained from the Treasury of the County and repaid with interest within a term of fifteen years.

DISTRICT HOSPITAL BALLYSHANNON.

A letter from the Department of Local Government, enclosing, for the information of the Tirconail County Council, a copy of the Order made by the Minister on the 15th January last approving of the continuance of the District Hospital at Ballyshannon, was read.

PUBLIC ANALYST.

A letter was read from the Local Government Department, referring to the County Secretary's letter relative to the question of sanction to the appointment of Mr. J.F. O'Leary, 4 Ringsend Road, Dublin, as Public Analyst for Tirconail County and stating that no documentary evidence of qualification has yet been furnished to the Department. The Secretary said he wrote Mr. O'Leary on receipt of the Ministry's letter and received a reply stating that he was furnishing the information sought for.

LOCAL ELECTIONS.

A letter was read from the Department of Local Government relative to the further postponement of the Local Elections fixed for March 19th, and enclosing a provisional draft of the County Electoral Areas, giving the number of Councillors assigned to each area:-

CLAIM FOR INTEREST.

A letter, dated 13th February, 1925, from the Ministry of Local Government stating that the Minister will not raise any objection to the payment of the amended claim for interest, amounting to £26:11:2 submitted by the Hibernian Bank Limited in connection with money due to them by the late Board of Guardians of Dunfanaghy Union, was read, and payment ordered.

MAINTENANCE OF SESSIONS COURTS.

A letter was read from the Local Government Department regarding the maintenance of Sessions Courts at Malin, Moville, and Burnfoot, and stating that it was not understood by the Minister that they were not the property of the County Council.

PROPOSED PAYMENT TO THE WIDOW OF THE LATE Mr. M. J. CUNNINGHAM.

A letter was read from the Local Government Department, Roads, regarding the proposal of the Tirconail County Council to make a payment of £200 to the widow of the late Mr. M. J. Cunningham, and stating that the Minister cannot alter his decision already conveyed to the County Secretary. Sanction by the Minister to an illegal payment would not render it legal.

re MAIN ROAD RUNNING THROUGH LOUGHROS POINT.

A letter from the Secretary of a representative meeting in Cranogbois N.S. (Loughros Point School Area) in connection with relief grants and requesting the County Council to send one of their surveyors to inspect the main road running through Loughros Point with a view to having recommendations made for obtaining a portion of relief grants (now available), was read, and the matter referred to Mr. Caffrey, County Surveyor.

ROAD BETWEEN DUNGLOE AND DUNGLOE ROAD STATION.

A letter from the secretary, Burtonport Central Committee Cumann na nGaedeal stating that he has been directed to bring under the notice of the County Council that there is not sufficient road metal for steam rolling the road between Dungloe and Dungloe Road Station, was read, and matter also referred to the County Surveyor for his attention.

SEED SUPPLY OF OATS AND POTATOES.

Copy resolution passed by Letterkenny Rural District Council: "That application be made to the Government for a seed supply of oats and potatoes this year for this area," having been read, Councillor McGoldrick said the matter, so far as the whole County was concerned, was receiving the attention of the Government.

PROPOSED PIER AT THE THORN, NEAR LETTERKENNY.

The following resolution passed by Letterkenny Rural District Council was unanimously adopted: - "That the resolution of the Urban District Council and the residents of the district recommending the construction of a Pier at the Thorn, near Letterkenny, be approved of and that the County Council be requested to use its influence in having same carried into effect".

BREAKING OF STONES BY HAND LABOUR.

Copy resolution passed at a meeting of Killygordon Cumann na nGaedeal Committee: - "That the stones piled in this district for breaking should be broken by hand labour so as to relieve the existing acute distress," having been read, Mr. Caffrey, County Surveyor, said he had made an offer to pay at the rate of 2/- per ton.

PROPOSED BRIDGE AT THE RAMPART, DUNGLOE.

A letter from the Hon. Secretary, Cruckamore Cumann na nGaedeal Committee on the subject of the building of a suitable bridge at the Rampart, between Dungloe and Burtonport, was read, and no action taken.

A letter was read from the Secretary, Glenties Cumann na nGaedeal Central Committee relative to:-

- (1) the deplorable condition of the road leading from Millbridge through townlands of Meenahalla, Durrian, Meenanal, and Strasalla and
- (2) inquiring why not one shilling has been spent on the roads of the Glenties parish from the Road Board Grant - from the nearing of Ardara parish at the Mines to Gweebarra bridge - including the Glenties bridge.-

The matter was referred to Mr. Caffrey, County Surveyor.

COURT ARRANGEMENTS AT BUNBEG.

A letter, dated 18th February, 1925, was read from the Ministry of Local Government stating that representations have been made that the present District Court arrangements at Bunbeg involves the sittings being held on licensed premises and requesting that steps be taken immediately to provide proper accommodation.

The Secretary was directed to communicate with the District Court Clerk on the matter with a view to ascertaining if suitable premises are available in the district, and their location.

BUNCRANA PIER.

A letter from Mr. Patrick Porter, Hon. Secretary (pro-tem) Buncrana Pier Committee relative to the urgent necessity of having a small portion of the Pier, where there is a heavy run of the tide (about half a ship length) protected with timber or concrete in order that vessels can lie alongside while discharging cargo, having been read, the matter was referred to Mr. Steadman, County Surveyor, for his attention.

RATHMULLAN PIER - WOODEN EXTENSION.

A letter was read from the Office of Public Works, Dublin, submitting the terms on which the County Council could take over the wooden extension to the pier at Rathmullan. The Commissioners would grant the use of the extension temporarily to the County Council on their entering into an agreement with the Board of Works (a) undertaking to be responsible for the maintenance and repair of the structure, including the making good of all damage, however occasioned, to the satisfaction of the Board's engineer; (b) indemnifying the Board for all claims arising from the user of the extension; and (c) providing for the resumption of possession by the Board on reasonable notice, if required, in connection with the oil installation or works of development.

A deputation from the residents of Rathmullan, consisting of Messrs E. Deeny, Patrick Callaghan, and Hugh O'Donnell, came before the Council, and urged the taking over of the pier extension.

Mr. Hugh O'Donnell said that the County had already lost £150 in dues on this winter's fishing through not being able to use the extension.

The Chairman - Don't the fish go to Buncrana Pier, and we don't actually lose?

Councillor McGoldrick favoured the taking over of the structure, and suggested that the County Council be indemnified against loss by insurance.

Mr. P. Callaghan said that the extension would be a great source of revenue.

Councillor Myles said that, in the event of Lough Swilly being used again by the British Admiralty, they would want the use of that extension. "Are we," he asked, "in the meantime to maintain this pier for the British Government? That is what it means. I think our Board of Works should keep it for the British Government. It is the subject of an international agreement, and the Council should not be held responsible for it.

The Government should keep it. It's life would not be more than ten years."

Mr. Deeny ---- If it was outside Ballyshannon or Killybegs you would very soon take it over. No people have been worse treated than we have been for the past couple of years.

Mr. Steadman (County Surveyor) --- If a vessel got into difficulties and struck against the structure it would be liable to go. The taking over of the pier would be a very big item. They might have it one year and not the next.

In reply to Councillor Myles, Mr. Steadman said that it was problematical if the structure would last for over eight years. The piles are of pitch-pine.

Councillor Kelly (H.J.) proposed that this question be referred to the Irish Board of Works for consideration, and that the County Council recommend that the people of Rathmullan be facilitated in getting the use of the pier.

Councillor Myles seconded.

Councillor McGoldrick proposed that they take over the pier on the terms specified by the Government. Councillor O'Donnell (Hugh) seconded.

Councillor O'Donnell (J.F.) --- Why should we take over a rotten structure that is ready to fall down? If it was an entirely new building it would be a different thing.

The following voted for Councillor McGoldrick's amendment:-
Councillors McGoldrick, O'Donnell (Hugh), and Quigley.

For the original proposal the following voted:-
Councillors Myles, Boyle, Kelly, Lynch, O'Donnell (J.F.), and the Chairman.

The original proposal was accordingly carried.

Councillor McGoldrick proposed that they ask the Board of Works for definite terms, and point out that the reason why they did not take the structure over on the present terms was that they were too onerous. This was passed.

APPLICATION FOR A GRANT IN LIEU OF SALARY.

An application by Mr. Patrick McGeehan, ex member of the Council's Clerical Staff, for a grant in lieu of salary from the date he went off work and pending the fixing of his superannuation, having been considered, it was decided, subject to the approval of the Minister for Local Government, to allow him £20:0:0, this amount to be deducted from his pension, when fixed and sanctioned by Local Government Ministry.

TIRCONAILL MENTAL HOSPITAL COMMITTEE.

A letter was received from Councillor Anthony Gallagher tendering his resignation as a member of the Mental Hospital Committee.

The resignation was accepted.

ESTATE OF Mr. JOHN QUINN DECEASED.

A letter from P.J. Ward, Solicitor, Letterkenny, who is acting for the Executor of the Estate of Mr. John Quinn, deceased - formerly Porter of Stranorlar Workhouse - relative to the payment by the County Council of the Gratuity (£327:5:0) recommended by them on 12:6:'23 in this case.- It was decided to issue a Paying Order for this amount in name of the Executor.

re Mr. JOHN DURNEEN, DECEASED.

A letter from Mrs M. Durneen, widow of the late Mr. John Durneen, who was recommended by the County Council on 12/6/'23 a gratuity of £56:0:0 in respect of services rendered as Porter at Ballyshannon Workhouse, having been read, the secretary said that the late Mr. Durneen not having been in office at the date of the passing of the Local Government (Ireland) Act, 1919, was not entitled to a gratuity.

INCREASED JURISDICTION.

A letter from the District Court Clerk, Milford, stating that District Justice Walsh has made Milford a centre for increased Jurisdiction for the Court Districts of Drum, Milford, and Rathmullan, in consequence of which the former has found it necessary to engage a private office to transact Court business and requesting the County Council to allow him a small rent and fuel allowance, was read. It was decided not to accede to the request.

re DISEASE (FLUKE).

A Report of Sergeant, Civic Guard, Doochary, re disease (Fluke) in sheep in townland of Commeen was submitted.

EXPLOSIVES.

A letter from the Brigade Quarter Master, Western Command, Finner Camp, appending particulars of Explosives transferred to Buncrana Camp on 10/2/'25, was read.

The question of the difficulty of getting explosives for the use of the road contractors was referred to by Councillor O'Donnell (J.F.). The contractors could not get them, while their brothers in the Land Commission could get any amount of explosives.

Mr. Steadman said that he wrote and asked that a quantity of explosives be left at the different Civic Guard Barracks, but he was unable to have that done. No action was taken.

CLAIM FOR PAYMENT.

A letter from Mr. Wm. T. MacMenimen B.A., Solicitor, Ballybofey, applying on behalf of Michael Marley of Cloghan, for payment of £20:0:0 being the amount claimed by the latter in respect of repairs done to a bridge on the county road at Falgarrow in the Cloghan District, having been read, Mr. Caffrey, County Surveyor, said that Marley carried out temporary repairs to this bridge and subsequently repaired it under a contract with the County Council, he (Mr. Caffrey) was enquiring into the matter and would report to the County Council in due course.

ROAD BETWEEN CLONMANY AND LENAN FORT.

In accordance with notice of motion Councillor Quigley asked the County Surveyor what progress had been made in the work of improving the road between Clonmany and Lenan Fort. What was the nature of the work being done to it and what sum had been paid in wages to the workmen and what for supervision on part of the County Officers. Mr Steadman furnished the information sought for. He explained what was done and what was going to be done. ~~and Councillor expressed satisfaction~~

TRUNK ROAD GRANT - PARISH OF GWEEDORE.

A letter from the Department of Local Government, Roads, forwarding copy of a letter from Mr. M. Doogan, Secretary, Distress Committee, Gweedore, complaining of the delay in having the portion of the Trunk Road Grant for the parish of Gweedore Expended etc. having been read, Mr. Steadman County Surveyor explained that the work regarding the two trunk roads referred to was in progress, and in regard to the direction that the Trunk road should take he was in favour of via Crolly, Gweedore Station, The Mines to Gortahork, and not in favour of the Derrybeg and Glenhola route.

re BERNARD McLAUGHLIN, FLAGMAN.

Mr. Steadman reported that he had sent word to Bernard McLaughlin to take up Flagman to No. 17 Breaker.

EXPENDITURE OUT OF TRUNK ROAD GRANT.

Councillor McGoldrick referred to the progress being made in connection with expenditure under above Grant, adding that it was possible that any balance remaining unexpended at the expiration of the current financial year might as in the case of the "Relief of Distress Grant" revert to the Government. He moved that the County Surveyors make an effort to expend all they possibly can between now and the 31st March next.

Councillor Bonner seconded the motion which was unanimously agreed to.

Mr. Steadman County Surveyor said that much delay occurred in delivery of the new road machinery which was ordered through the Trades Department. As a result the work under the Trunk Roads Scheme could not be proceeded with as soon as might have been.

This should be taken into consideration by the Local Government Ministry, Roads Department.

PROPOSED NEW ROAD IN CASHEL, MILFORD RURAL DISTRICT.

A letter from Mr. Bertram Barton, Solicitor, Portsalon, stating that he has been consulted by Mr. Thomas McGrenaghan of Cashel, Kindrum, Letterkenny, who is anxious to take over the contract for a new road in Cashel, at present held by Mr. Forrian, and before making any arrangements Mr. McGrenaghan wishes to know if the County Council will extend the time so as to make it possible for him to complete the work, having been read, the Secretary was directed to state in reply that it was a matter for arrangement between the contractor and Mr. McGrenaghan. It was decided not to vary the time for the completion of the work.

A letter was read from Mr. P.J. Ward, Solicitor, Letterkenny, applying to the County Council for permission to use as offices, at a rent to be fixed by the Council, portion of the premises let by the latter body to the District Nursing Association, Letterkenny, (now vacant) and forming part of a house held by the Council from Mrs Catherine Mulhern.

It was agreed to let to Mr. Ward the portion of the premises referred to at a rent of £10:0:0 per annum.

DISUSED WORKHOUSES IN TIRCONAILL.

A letter was read from the Department of Local Government in regard to the question of the disposal of disused workhouse buildings in Tirconail. It was requested that the Department be furnished with suggestions as to what purpose these buildings could be applied.

Councillor O'Donnell (J.F.) said that they should utilise the buildings for factories. They should start factories on a small scale.

The Chairman said he would quite agree if they could get the money.

Councillor Bonner said that they all agreed with Councillor O'Donnell's suggestion if they had the means to carry it out. If they got a number of people with sufficient public spirit they could start some kind of an undertaking.

Councillor McDermott asked if the Government was going to guarantee the loan.

Councillor O'Donnell (J.F.) said thousands were being spent in Tirconail in the "dole" and in relieving distress. There was no money being spent on productive work. He thought that if £5,000 or £10,000 were spent on factories it would be of greater value than £50,000 given for "doles" and the relief of distress.

The Chairman pointed out that he had stated in Dublin that the Government should provide one-half of the money for work for the people. In that way they could get rid of the "dole". As long as it lasted there would be no satisfaction in this country.

Councillor Lynch said Messrs Spillers & Bakers were looking for premises in Letterkenny, and another firm in the same town was looking for premises to start a bakery. Premises were wanted for a foundry and other buildings were also required.

Councillor Lynch proposed, and Councillor Gallagher (Anthony) seconded, that advertisements be inserted in the Press pointing out that the premises were available for sale.

The motion was passed.

PURCHASE OF ROAD MACHINERY.

An account, as under, furnished by Mr. Michael Flood, Diamond, Donogal, in respect of road machinery supplied to Tirconail County Council, was submitted, and payment passed subject to the sanction of the Local Government Ministry, Roads.

REBUILDING OF COURTHOUSES IN TIRCONAILL.

A letter, dated 21st February, 1925, G6951/'25 was read from the Ministry of Local Government regarding the appointment of Mr. W.J. Doherty as Architect in connection with the rebuilding of courthouses and stating that the Minister will raise no objection to the Council's proposal in the matter and adding that while, in the circumstances the Minister is willing that the work is entrusted to an independent Architect, he considers it should be possible to arrange for a more moderate rate of remuneration.

In this connection a letter from Mr. W.J. Doherty C.E. 12 Castle Street, Derry, relative to his appointment by the Tirconail Council as Architect in connection with the rebuilding of courthouses at Donegal, Buncrana, and Carndonagh, at a remuneration of 5% on the outlay and adding that he takes it vouched travelling expenses would also be allowed, was read, Mr. Doherty, who was in attendance stated that this is the rate of remuneration payable under the Rules prescribed by the Royal Institute of Architects of Ireland and that even he were willing he could not agree to any other terms.

The Council decided to allow Mr. Doherty travelling expenses (vouched) in addition to 5% on outlay, subject to the approval of the Local Government Ministry.

PROVISION OF A SOLICITOR'S ROOM IN NEW COURTHOUSES
AT BUNCRANA AND CARNDONAGH.

A Memorial signed by a number of Solicitors practising in Tirconail was submitted requesting that a Solicitor's room be provided in the new courthouses at Buncrana and Carndonagh with suitable accommodation.

The matter was referred to the Architect Mr. Wm. J. Doherty.

STATE OF THE RATE COLLECTION.

The Secretary submitted return showing the condition of the Rate Collection from which it appeared that fourteen of the thirty seven Rate Collectors in the County had not closed their accounts for the year 1923 - 1924, and consequently had not commenced their collections for the current year. In the districts of these officers sums amounting to £10,864-8-4 shown as outstanding on the 24th February, 1925 in respect of the former period. The Secretary reminded the Council that at their meeting held on the 27th January, 1925, they had decided to remove from office all Collectors who had not lodged their full warrants for the year in question by the 21st February, 1925, and the Local Government Ministry, he further pointed out, had in communication since received, strongly urged the adoption of drastic action in these cases. The Ministry, he added, called special attention to the large sum shown as uncollected in the district of Collector McGowan, and stated that this officer should be required to close his 1923 - 1924 warrant by the 31st March, 1925.

Collectors Moore, McHugh, Logue, and McGlinchey were in attendance and the two first named on behalf of all the Collectors in Glenties Rural District stated that conditions in this area were such that it was impossible for them to close their accounts at the present time. Mention was made by these officers of large sums still owing to themselves in respect of previous collections which had been closed; of the difficulties experienced not only in distraining goods but in realizing assets where seizures had been

been effected; and of the inconvenience arising from pounds not being provided. Collector McGowan, Stranorlar Rural District, who was also present, endorsed the statements of the two collectors named.

Councillor McGoldrick, T.D. said that in view of the statements now made by these officers, and which appeared to him to be in accordance with the facts the Council had no option but to extend the time for the completion of the past year's collections in their districts, but, having regard to the Council's financial position any further concession should be made only on certain conditions.

He accordingly moved:-

That the Council's previous decision to remove from Office Collectors who failed to close their accounts for the past year by the 21st ultimo be not enforced but that the time for the completion of their accounts be extended to the 30th April next, subject to the Collectors entering into agreements through the Council's Solicitor to lodge their full warrants on or before that date, the books for the current year not to be issued meanwhile and that any Collector who fails to comply with the foregoing be automatically dismissed at the end of the period mentioned. This was seconded by Councillor Gallagher (Anthony) and passed unanimously.

The Collectors present expressed their willingness to enter into the agreements mentioned.

SANCTION OF COLLECTORS POUNDAGE EXCEPT IN THE CASE OF
COLLECTOR MANUS J. O'DONNELL.

The Secretary submitted letter from the Local Government Ministry sanctioning payment of poundage fees to Collectors who had already closed their warrants for the year ended the 31st March, 1924 and the first moiety of the current year's rates. The Ministry refused to approve payment to Collector Manus J. O'Donnell for the half year ended the 30th September, 1923 until he has closed his warrant for the half year ended the 31st March, 1924.

Mr. P.J. Ward, Solicitor, Letterkenny, who appeared on behalf of Mr. O'Donnell stated that the latter was tendering his resignation as Collector that day in order to take up another position and he wished to point out that in addition to lodging his full warrant for the half year ended September, 1923 Mr. O'Donnell had placed to the credit of the County Fund £1,539-3-2 in respect of the half year ended March, 1924. He therefore, asked the County Council to request the Local Government Ministry to reconsider their decision in the case.

On the motion of Councillor Gallagher (Anthony), seconded by Councillor Bonner, it was unanimously decided to recommend the Local Government Ministry to authorise payment of poundage to Mr. O'Donnell for the half year ended the 30th September, 1923.

INCREASED POUNDAGE TO COLLECTOR MCGINTY.

The Secretary submitted letter dated 14th February, 1925 from the Ministry of Local Government stating that the latter, if the Tircenail County Council so agree, will be prepared to sanction an increased poundage of 1/- to Collector Charles McGinty in respect of future warrants, if he lodges one third of the first moiety and arrears on or before the 1st August, and in addition to having lodged a sum equal to the full amount of the first moiety and arrears by the 30th September, he lodges one third of the second moiety on or before the 1st January in each year and closes the full amount of his warrants as required by his bonds - his ordinary rate to remain as at present 100.

Mr. McGinty who was in attendance stated that it would be extremely difficult to comply with the conditions governing the proposed

proposed increased remuneration, and he requested the Council to recommend the Ministry to alter their terms by substituting the 31st August and 31st January for the 1st August and 1st January as the respective dates for the payment of one third of the first and second moieties of the rate commencing with the year 1924 - 1925.

The Council on the motion of Councillor McGoldrick T.D. seconded by Councillor Bonner, decided to recommend the Ministry to sanction the alteration in dates specified.

POUNDAGE FEES TO ex-COLLECTOR DUNNION AND COLLECTOR MCGOWAN.

The Secretary submitted letter from the Local Government Ministry sanctioning payment of poundage fees to Messrs Dunnion and McGowan in respect of their collections and lodgments of rates for the three half years ended 31st March, 1923 as recommended by the County Council in May 1924.

Ex-COLLECTOR MCGLINCHY'S SUPERANNUATION.

The Secretary submitted letter dated 9/2/25 from the Local Government Ministry sanctioning the superannuation allowance of £41:10:6 to Mr. Francis McGlinchey, ex-Rate Collector, in view of the Council's testimony that he was a whole time officer.

It was decided to strike off as irrecoverable and refund to Collectors the rates on derelict buildings and on ruins and such other items as appeared from the evidence furnished to warrant the adoption of that course, the remaining sums to be refunded and carried forward for subsequent collection, subject to the sanction of the Local Government Ministry.

PERSONAL SECURITY : COLLECTOR E. J. DOHERTY.

The Secretary informed the Council that Collector E. J. Doherty had failed to provide Personal Security under the Public Bodies Order, 1904 as required by the Council and by the Local Government Ministry, and had ignored communications addressed to him in the matter from both the Council Office and from the Council's Solicitor. It was decided to extend the time for the completion of Personal Bond in this case to the 30th April, 1925, subject to the sanction of the Local Government Ministry.

PAYMENT OF POUNDAGE FEES.

The Secretary informed the Council that the following Rate Collectors had closed their accounts for the periods specified:-

It was unanimously decided to recommend the Ministry of Local Government to sanction payment of ordinary poundage fees in the above cases.

ADDITIONAL REMUNERATION : COLLECTOR DEEMY.

The Secretary informed the Council that Collector Michael Deemy had closed his accounts for the year ending the 31st March, 1925 on the 17th February, 1925. This the Council considered highly satisfactory, and they again requested the Local Government Ministry to sanction payment of additional penny remuneration in respect of this Collector's warrant for the year ended the 31st March, 1924, as recommended by the Council at their meeting held on the 23rd September, 1924.

POUNDAGE FEES ON ARREARS OF RATES COLLECTED AND LODGED - COLLECTOR O'KANE.

The Secretary informed the Council that Collector O'Kane collected and lodged rates for the year ended the 31st March, 1924 amounting to £30:1:9 which had previously been refunded but which were referred to him for subsequent collection with the approval of the Local Government Ministry. It was decided to allow him the usual poundage, amounting to 15/- on these arrears, subject to the sanction of the Department named.

re COLLECTOR MANUS J. O'DONNELL.

The Secretary submitted letters from the Local Government Ministry regarding the contemplated departure of Mr. Manus J. O'Donnell from the County to take up another position and the proposed appointment of his brother as Deputy Collector under the terms of the Public Bodies Order, 1904. He also submitted letters returned from Collector O'Donnell's sureties in the matter. ^{Received}

Since the receipt of the foregoing communications, and subsequently to the issue of the Agenda for that meeting, the Secretary stated he had received a communication from Mr. M.J. O'Donnell tendering his resignation as Collector. Mr. P.J. Ward, Solicitor, Letterkenny, who appeared on behalf of Mr. O'Donnell requested the Council to relieve him of all further responsibility in respect of arrears of rates in his district for the half year ended the 31st March, 1924 amounting to £699:19:2. This the Council declared to do, notwithstanding the existence of a Personal Bond in the case, subject to the sanction of the Local Government Ministry.

The Council also directed the Secretary to advertise the vacancy at the existing poundage rate with the view to a new appointment being made at next Council meeting to be held on 24th March, 1925.

re COLLECTOR Wm. HOLMES'S APPOINTMENT.

The Secretary submitted letter from the Local Government Ministry regarding the undertaking given by Mr. Wm. Holmes - recently appointed Rate Collector - to reside within the Collection District as soon as he can obtain a house therein.

re PROPOSED APPOINTMENT OF Mr. NEIL BLANEY AS POOR RATE COLLECTOR.

The Secretary submitted letter from the Local Government Ministry refusing to sanction the proposed appointment of Mr. Neil Blaney as Rate Collector in the County. The Ministry's decision was based on Mr. Blaney's action in attending ^{at the meeting} ~~Executive~~ ~~Meeting~~ in Dublin contrary to orders, and subsequently taking his discharge from the Army to join the opponents of the State. The Ministry stated that following a raid by National Soldiers on Mr. Blaney's premises after the outbreak of hostilities Arms and ammunition were found, and Mr. Blaney was court-martialled and sentenced to death. This sentence was afterwards commuted to seven years penal servitude.

The Chairman said that having regard to the terms of the Ministry's letter, the Council had no option but to order a new appointment.

Councillor Boyle said this matter had been discussed by the General Council of County Councils, and it was agreed that no person should be penalised for the action he took in connection with events following the Treaty. Mr. Blaney should not be penalised and the County Council should adhere to their decision.

Councillor Gallagher (Anthony) agreed. The Council were not dealing with Mr. Blaney directly. They had sureties responsible for the custody of Public Money.

Councillor McGoldrick T.D. said the Ministry would not sanction Mr. Blaney's appointment, and it was a question of whether the Council were going to have a Collector or not.

Councillor Boyle moved that the Local Government Ministry be again asked to sanction Mr. Blaney's appointment.

Councillor Gallagher (Anthony) seconded the motion.

Councillor McGoldrick T.D. moved as an amendment that the position be re advertised with the view to making a new appointment at next Council meeting.

Councillor Bonner seconded the amendment.

VOTING.

FOR THE MOTION ----- Councillors Boyle, Gallagher (A.), and McDermott. - 3.

AGAINST ----- Councillors Clarke, Myles, McGoldrick, Kelly, Lynch, and Bonner. - 5

Councillor O'Donnell (J.F.) did not vote, and Councillors Quigley and O'Donnell (Hugh) had left the meeting.

The Chairman declared the amendment carried.

re ex-COLLECTOR HUGH BROWNE.

The Secretary submitted a further report to the Council regarding the failure of Mr. Hugh Browne, former Collector of Poor Rate for No.26 district, to lodge sums amounting to £508-5-4 which it was alleged were paid to him in respect of rates for the year ended the 31st March, 1924, but for which official receipts were not issued. The payments in most cases were alleged to have been made by either Cheque or Bank draft. The Secretary added that his inquiries had not as yet been completed, but he anticipated being in a position to submit a full statement at an early date to the Solicitor to the Council as directed by the latter at their previous meeting.

A SPECIAL MEETING OF THE COUNTY COUNCIL WAS HELD ON THE

SITUATION ARISING FROM THE FIRE IN COUNCIL OFFICES AT LIFFORD.

ATTENDANCE.

The members present were:-

Councillors Bonner, Clarke, Gallagher

McFadden, McGoldrick, McShane, O'Donnell (Hugh), O'Duffy and  
Phelan.

CHAIRMAN.

Councillor Clarke was moved to the chair.

SECRETARY'S REPORT.

The Secretary reported that when he was called to the building at three o'clock on the morning of the fire his office was a mass of flames. When he communicated with Derry Fire Brigade he understood they would be able to come in half an hour, but they did not arrive for two hours, having had a breakdown on the journey. At that time the main building was doomed. Had they been able to come in half an hour Mr. Black's office and many important documents could have been saved. The Strabane Brigade were communicated with, and some members of it arrived on the scene. They could only look on, their hose being of no avail in the absence of water hydrants in the town. Valuable assistance was rendered both by the Civic Guard in Lifford and by the Royal Ulster Constabulary from Strabane.

The fire evidently started in the flue in his office. An examination showed that the flue had been defective for a considerable time, and had been patched up with old crockery pipes. The insurance assessors had also come to the conclusion that the fire was the result of a defective flue. The building was insured for £7,500, and the furniture, fixtures, stationery etc. for £1,000. The insurance had been trebled three months ago.

The property of the Tuberculosis Committee, which was also damaged, was insured for £150 and that of the Insurance Committee for £200. The Carnegie Library was insured for £2,500. There was no extinguishing apparatus of any description on the premises.

The secretary said he notified the Insurance Company on morning on which fire took place on opening of Telegraph Office at Lifford.

Councillor Bonner said it was fortunate for the Council that the secretary in December last had drawn their attention to the inadequacy of the insurance on the County Buildings.

The chairman remarked that in the matter of assistance the name of their secretary stood out in bold relief.

The chairman said it was very gratifying to think that such useful assistance had been rendered from across the Border. That was a sort of neutral territory, and it was pleasing to know that on such an occasion no one considered what side of the Border anyone belonged to, but everyone did his best to help.

Councillor McGoldrick said this is the spirit of true Christian Charity.

The secretary added that there was ample room in the Grand Jury Room for the officials to carry on their work

#### NATURE OF COUNCIL'S LOSS.

Councillor Myles inquired the nature of the Council's loss.

The Secretary said practically all the records, apart from the rates records, had been lost. These included all the minute sheets since the beginning of the Grand Jury, the paying sheets, all statutes, local government regulations, sanctions, communications, and road contractors' bonds

#### RECONSTITUTION OF THE POSITION.

Councillor McGoldrick moved that the secretary be given instructions to reconstitute the position as far as possible, procuring documents where possible from the Local Government Department, and that the Council consider the question of the reinstatement of the building and the claims for insurance. Councillor Bonner seconded the proposal which was passed unanimously.

Councillor O'Duffy referring to the question of reinstatement, said this was not the time to go to the expense of erecting new buildings. The money received from the insurance company should be devoted to the relief of the rates, which were at the moment very high.

The Chairman ruled that the matter was not in order.

Councillor O'Mahony said the Chairman had ruled very drastically on the point.

Councillor A. Gallagher suggested that the money should be applied to the former loan for purchasing seed potatoes.

#### FUTURE PRECAUTIONS.

Councillor Myles said the Council should take some precautions against the Courthouse being burned. He therefore moved that the Secretary be authorised to make such provision as he thinks fit to cope with any fire that might take place in the Courthouse. That he get a number of fire extinguishers and one length of Canvas Hose, and that he take steps to have a water hydrant erected convenient to the building; also that the Stranorlar Rural District Council be requested to assist the County Council in the matter of the erection of a Water Hydrant.

Councillor Bonner seconded the motion which was passed unanimously.

#### VOTE OF THANKS.

Councillor McGoldrick proposed that the thanks of the Council be tendered to the Civic Guards, Royal Ulster Constabulary, and Derry and Strabane Fire Brigades, the Secretary, and all who assisted at the fire, adding that notwithstanding provisional barriers, Christian charity still abounded, and had been well exemplified on this occasion all round.

Councillor Gallagher (Anthony) seconded the motion which was unanimously passed.

APPOINTMENT OF AN ASSESSOR.

The Secretary said it would be necessary to appoint some person as Assessor in addition to the County Surveyor. He had received a communication from a Belfast firm offering to act as the Council's Assessors in regard to the Insurance Claim arising out of the fire.

Councillor O'Duffy said the rates of the County were already high enough. He saw no call for an assessor when the Council had their own surveyors.

Councillor Bonner pointed out that this work required a great amount of technical knowledge, and the money would be well spent.

Councillor Bonner moved that the matter be left in the hands of the Secretary, in conjunction with Mr. Steadman, County Surveyor, to appoint whatever firm of Assessors they think proper.

In the event of the Secretary finding any difficulty in making such an appointment that he summon a meeting of the Standing Committee for the purpose.

On the motion of Councillor Phelan, seconded by Councillor Mahony it was unanimously decided that an Assessor be appointed from the Free State.

The Secretary said the firm in question had offices both in Belfast and Dublin, and that a Belfast firm was acting for the Insurance Company.

OFFICIALS SALARIES.

Councillor McDermott said he thought that in view of the high rates of the county a reduction should be made in the salaries of some of the officials - a reduction for a couple of years - and the money thus saved applied to the relief of the rates, which would enable the Council to get a little on its feet again, instead of being harmful to the officials a reduction in their salaries would do some of them good.

The Chairman ruled that the matter was not in order.

On the minutes of previous meeting being submitted for confirmation Councillor Quigley took exception to the words "and Councillor Quigley expressed satisfaction" in Minute (page 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ ), re improving the road between clonmany and Leenan Fort, and said he did not express satisfaction.

The chairman, with the consent of the Council, amended the Minutes in this respect by striking out the words complained of. The Minutes were then confirmed.

PROPOSED BOATSLIP AT BALLYWHORISKEY, FANNET.

In accordance with notice of motion duly given Councillor McGoldrick moved - "that an application be made to the Irish Land Commission to have a small boatslip constructed at Ballywhoriskey, Fannet," - adding that this was a matter of urgent necessity. As far as he understood the Council had no funds to do the work themselves and it was their duty as County Councillors, - in view of the number of people effected, and the serious character of the distress that existed generally - to take immediate steps to preserve the fishing industry.

Councillor O'Mahony seconded the motion which was passed unanimously.

re PROPOSED APPOINTMENT OF A MEMBER OF THE COUNTY COUNCIL.

A notice of motion in the name of Councillor Kelly (John) "That a member of the County Council be appointed in place of Mr. Wm. Gallagher, resigned," having been read, Councillor Gallagher (A.) said that owing to the close proximity of the Local Elections it was scarcely worth while to make any appointment.

Councillor McGoldrick moved that Mr. James Greene, Glenvar, be appointed in the place of Mr. Gallagher. They had no County Councillor in the Rathmullan area, and it was absurd that they had not.

Councillor Gallagher (A.) said that he represented this area. The chairman ruled that the Council were not in order until Councillor Kelly (John) moves his motion. The latter Councillor not being present the matter was postponed.

re BURNING OF PORTION OF COUNCIL OFFICES AT LIFFORD.

A telegram was read from Councillor O'Donnell (J.F.) which was received late for submission to the Council at a special meeting held on the 3rd March, on above subject, and pointing out that while temporary Offices were available at the Mental Hospital, Letterkenny, he hoped that no further cost be incurred in the provision of Offices.

Councillor O'Donnell (J.F.) said that they should not expend any money while those premises at Letterkenny were available.

The Chairman said the Council had not decided what they were going to do. Meanwhile the clerical work was being carried on in the Courthouse.

re APPOINTMENT OF PUBLIC ANALYST.

Letter dated 25th February, 1925, was read from the Department of Local Government stating that the documents submitted by Mr. J.F. O'Leary, who was appointed Public Analyst by the County Council, do not furnish sufficient evidence that he possesses the necessary qualifications for the appointment as required by the advertisement issued by the County Council on the 3rd October last.

A letter was also read from Mr. O'Leary, 4 Ringsend Road, Dublin, regretting that his qualifications did not fulfil the requirements of the Ministry. He referred to their circular of the 11th January, 1922, under which the appointment was made. On that occasion he satisfied the requirements.

Regarding the new qualifications that are required he wrote to the Ministry but got no satisfactory reply.

On the motion of Councillor Mahony, seconded by the Chairman, it was unanimously decided to re-advertise the position.

FOOD AND DRUGS ACTS.

On the recommendation of the Chief Superintendent, Garda Siothchana, Letterkenny, the following Sergeants were appointed Food and Drugs Inspectors:-

Forms of appointment were submitted and signed by the Chairman.

COURT ARRANGEMENTS AT BUNBEG.

A letter, dated 18th February, 1925, was read from the Local Government Ministry stating that representations have been made that the present District Court arrangements at Bunbeg involves the sittings being held on licensed premises, and requesting that immediate steps be taken to provide proper accommodation.

The Secretary said that, as directed at the previous meeting, he communicated with the District Court Clerk on the matter with a view to ascertaining if suitable premises were available in the district and their location, he (the Secretary) received a reply referring him to Messrs Doogan, Meenderrygamph and Daniel Coll, Magherclogher. He wrote to them and received replies which he read.

Councillor McDermott said an advertisement should be issued inviting quotations from those in a position to rent suitable premises for a District Court, to include rent, providing fuel, and keeping premises clean. Councillor Gallagher suggested that in addition the Secretary write the local Clergy and Civic Guard requesting them to furnish particulars of suitable premises. This was unanimously agreed to.

APPOINTMENT OF Mr. J.J. CAFFREY AS ASSISTANT SURVEYOR.

Letter dated 2nd March, 1925, was read from the Local Government Ministry, Roads, stating that the Minister cannot see his way to sanction the appointment by Tirconail County Council of Mr. J.J. Caffrey as Assistant County Surveyor; also copy resolution passed by Killybegs Cumann na nGeadeal appealing to the County Council and Ministry of Local Government, Roads, to reconsider this matter and have Mr. Caffrey's appointment sanctioned.

Mr. Maguire, solicitor, who represented Mr. Caffrey, asked the Council that the Ministry be requested to reconsider their decision.

Councillor Myles - I propose that we ask the Department to reconsider their decision. I think this is a rather funny thing. We had this matter up before us at a recent meeting, and the voting was carried through, with the result that Mr. Caffrey was appointed. Now we have got a letter from the Department saying he is not sanctioned, and they give no reason whatsoever. It is for us to send this matter back. We are at least entitled to know why our decision is not justified.

Councillor McCool seconded the motion.

The Secretary mentioned that he had just received a letter from the Ministry stating that while in ordinary circumstances they were not disposed to sanction the appointment of an assistant surveyor whose father was County Surveyor in the same county, they had, on representations being made to them by Mr. Caffrey, jun., reconsidered their decision to sanction the appointment in view of the fact that Mr. Caffrey had stated that his training had been directed towards qualification for the position of Surveyor.

This letter was considered satisfactory, and the discussion ended.

BONUSES.

A circular letter, dated 3rd March, 1925, from the Local Government Department on above subject, was read.

APPOINTMENT OF ASSISTANT SHERIFFS.

Replying to a communication in connection with the appointment of Messrs T.Corr and J.T. Prout as Assistant Under Sheriffs for County Donegal, the Minister of Justice replied stating that one-half of the salary of Messrs Corr and Prout was payable by the State Exchequer and the other half by the County Council. The appointments, unless renewed, would expire in June next, and the salary (inclusive of bonus and expenses) of each assistant was at the rate of £500 per annum. The duties of Messrs Corr and Prout were confined to the enforcement of Court judgments. The reason why two assistants were appointed for County Donegal was that the county had the largest volume of unexecuted Court judgments in the Free State, amounting to 700, and the Minister was being pressed to put an end to that state of affairs.

Councillor O'Mahony said he did not see why the County Council should pay these officers when they were not required. There was never any demand for their appointment. The Sub-Sheriff had said that if he had a few extra bailiffs that was all he required. The people of the county were harassed enough without two gentlemen being sent down from Dublin to lift decrees. The County Council did not want them. There were decree lifters enough without them.

Councillor Gallagher (A.) said it was a question of creating two positions.

Councillor Bonner said the Minister had the power to make the appointments and, they having been made, the Council were powerless for the present.

It was decided to intimate that the Council would not favour the reappointment of these two officials when their appointments expired

RATHMULLAN WOODEN PIER EXTENSION.

Further letter, dated 11th March, 1925, from the Office of Public Works, Dublin, with reference to the County Secretary's letter of 6th instant and stating that prior to its receipt another communication was received by the Parliamentary Secretary Professor J.M. O'Sullivan, from Mr. P.J. McGoldrick, T.D., relative to the terms upon which the Board would be prepared to grant the use of the wooden extension to the Pier at Rathmullan to the Fircoronaill County Council. In view of the various points raised in these two letters the Board are having a careful engineering examination made of the extension after which they hope to be able to reply to the County Secretary in detail, was read, as was also the reply here referred to.

Councillor McGoldrick said that he would like to get more definite information as to what their liability in the matter was.

The Chairman - I think they should have replied giving us the information we asked for.

Councillor Myles - I think the Board of Works evaded the question altogether. There was no direct answer to the question we asked them.

Councillor McGoldrick said that they required to know what their liability in the matter was.

Councillor O'Mahony - Didn't they say that it was unsafe for drifters, and it is for drifters you want it?

Councillor O'Donnell (J.F.) - And if made suitable it will mean much expense.

Councillor Myles - It is an admitted fact that the people of this district should have some facilities. The Board of Works had to maintain the extension under the Treaty for the British in the event of certain things happening. I don't think it would interfere very much with the Board of Works' liabilities if they gave us the use of this pier free. The only question I can see that is likely to cause any trouble is the drifters bumping against the extension. From the reports I have had I don't think it is a suitable pier for drifters.

Councillor McGoldrick - I am still of the opinion that we are in duty bound to take over this pier. The district has no facilities at the present time, and the Board of Works will not give any facilities. We must first see what are our liabilities. I would ask them to clearly state what our liabilities will be.

Chairman - You are not bound to take it over at so many thousand pounds.

Councillor Gallagher (A.) - If it was in order it would be another matter.

Councillor Myles said he did not think anyone would agree that there were twenty years' life in this extension.

On the suggestion of the Chairman it was decided to write the Board of Works stating that the County Council are of opinion that the use of the extension should be given for the benefit of the people of the neighbourhood without placing any responsibility on the County Council owing to the present financial state of the Council, and that in the event of the Board of Works not agreeing to this that they clearly state what the County Council's liabilities will be.

Councillor Bonner said he thought it would be only a waste of time to send that letter. Their Government were bound to maintain their pier along with several others around the coast, for the purpose of supplying oil to the British Navy. There was no use in winking at the facts. The Government were not going to hand over that pier in any manner the Council liked. If they wanted to facilitate the people let them put a proposal before them that they would accept. They would make absolutely no progress if they continued on the lines they had adopted.

Councillor McGoldrick asked that the standing orders be suspended in order to introduce a Deputation from the Buncrana Urban Council and Pier Committee in regard to the present condition of the above Pier.

Mr. Porter headed the deputation and pointed out that the extension was in a very dangerous state, and unless something was done there would shortly be no pier. Mr. Steadman would tell them what would be required. The County Council got £100:3:3 in dues for nine weeks' fishing there. Before the war they took in £500 for the County Council. Mr. Porter then gave details of the amount of money expended in the county as a result of the pier being used for the fishing. There was £1,890 paid out in wages in the season.

The Chairman - Who made the pier?

Mr. Porter - The Government. In reply to a further question by the Chairman, he said that the pier was a valuable asset, which they got free of cost.

Councillor Mc.Dermott - Will that pier be the property of the Tirconnaill County Council?

Councillor McGoldrick - Yes.

Councillor O'Donnell (J.F.) pointed out that within the past twelve or fourteen years the Council had expended £1,500 for the construction of a pier at Buncrana. He would like to know how many boats using the pier were owned by the local people, or how many local people used the pier. Was it for the Scotch fleet that they were going to tax the ratepayers of Donegal? Wasn't it time enough to come to the rescue of the Scotch fishing fleet when they provided for their own? There was not one crew from Buncrana. They would not go out to fish. They were too well off there. From Buncrana to Killybegs they had 2,000 fishermen standing idle for the want of boats, gear, nets etc.. Would any sensible man give away the ratepayers' money for the support of a Scotch fishing fleet?

Councillor McGoldrick - I made the matter perfectly clear that it was not the ratepayers' money. It is to borrow money on the security of the fees with a view to doubling the amount of the fees.

Councillor Quigley said they should subscribe to get a fishing fleet of their own. He would subscribe £500 himself for that purpose, and let every other member of the Council do the same, and they would soon have a fleet.

Councillor Myles said he would like to know if any estimate of the amount required was made out.. He hoped the day was not far distant when they would have their own fleets of fishing boats. It did not matter whether they were Scotch fleets or Hindoo fleets as long as the people in the district were benefiting by their use of the pier.

Councillor O'Donnell (J.F.) - They spend very little of it here.

The Chairman pointed out that the ports of Belfast and Derry were kept up by the vessels coming from other places. He proposed that the matter be adjourned until the next meeting, the County Surveyor in the meantime to prepare a report embodying particulars of the repairs required and the estimated cost.

Councillor O'Donnell (J.F.) said that if they spent £100,000 they would not make it a proper fishing place. If they had a fleet the same as the Scotch fleet they could manage.

Councillor O'Mahony seconded the Chairman's proposition, which was agreed to.

On the motion of Councillor Gallen it was decided that a return be furnished showing the average Dues collected at this Pier for a number of years.

Councillor McGoldrick said £500 was given in dues to the County Council to relieve the rates. He proposed that they capitalise one half of this amount on which they could borrow £5,000 to be expended on the pier, the money to be repaid in 25 years. By carrying out the improvements they could increase the industry, so that the dues would reach £1,000 per annum. On that course being adopted the ratepayers would not be asked to pay anything.

Councillor Quigley seconded the motion.

Councillor Gallen thought a notice of motion would require to be lodged before the latter proposal could be considered. The Chairman and other Councillors concurred.

Councillor McGoldrick in consequence withdrew his motion.

COAST ROAD FROM DUNGLOE TO CROLLY.

Letter dated 5th March, 1925, was read from the Department of Local Government, Roads, regarding the classification of the coast road from Dungloe to Crollly and stating that the application by the Tirconail County Council will be placed before the Roads Advisory Committee for consideration in due course.

Letter dated 5th March, 1925, was read from the Department of Local Government, Roads, stating that the addition of years for superannuation purposes to an Officer's service should only be allowed in the case of specially meritorious service and requesting to be furnished with a statement showing what special considerations warrant the addition of years in the cases of:- Messrs Michael and Edward O'Callaghan, late Assistant County Surveyors to the Tirconail County Council.

Mr. Wm. Kelly, Solicitor, Letterkenny, who appeared on behalf of the Messrs O'Callaghan, said that Michael O'Callaghan had 36 years unblemished service to the Council and had to retire owing to failing health. Mr. Edward O'Callaghan had given 24 years service, and his health was completely shattered in the service of the Council.

It was decided to reply accordingly to the Local Government Ministry, Roads, and at the same time to state that the County Council unanimously adhere to their previous decision on the matter as contained in page 8 of Minutes of Proceedings of meeting of County Council held on 25th November, 1924.

Letter dated 6th March, 1925, was read from the Department of Local Government, Roads, stating that the Minister has sanctioned the appointment by Tirconail County Council of Mr. M.J. Dawson as Assistant Surveyor at a salary of £175 and bonus of £40:10:0 per annum together with an allowance for travelling expenses at the rate laid down in circular letter R/106 of the 26th August, 1924, and adding that the allowance for travelling expenses is subject to revision.

RENT OF PORTION OF LETTERKENNY WORKHOUSE.

Letter dated 9th March, 1925, from the Local Government Ministry enclosing a cheque for £100:0:0 in respect of rent of portion of Letterkenny Workhouse which has been let to Messrs A.A. Watt & Company, Derry, having been read, it was decided to accept the amount as one year's rent from the date on which the premises were taken over by Messrs A.A. Watt & Company.

DAMAGE TO PROPERTY COMPENSATION ACT, 1923.

Letter, dated 11th March, 1925, was read from the Ministry of Finance pointing out that the second moiety (24,020:5:1) of the amount payable to the Exchequer for the current financial year under the provisions of the Damage to Property Compensation Act, 1923 is due for payment by 15th instant.

Councillor Myles said the Minister of Finance owed the Tirconaille County Council between £30,000 and £40,000 in Grants and he objected to the money now claimed being paid until this matter of grants due to the Council was settled, and the money paid. He moved accordingly.

Councillor Gallagher (A.) seconded the motion which was passed unanimously.

Limited for £281:19:6 for the supply of the necessary local standards and sub-standards required under the Weights and Measures Acts, and accounts from the Superintendents Garda Siochana, Sligo and Letterkenny for 11/7 and £3:2:0 respectively, in connection with the transport of the Weights and Measures sub-standard supplied. Payment was ordered.

DISUSED WORKHOUSE BUILDINGS IN TIRCONAILL.

Letter dated 16th March, 1925, from the Department of Local Government in regard to the question of the disposal of disused Workhouse buildings in County Tirconaille, and stating that the Minister will bear in mind the views of the County Council in this matter, but he would point out again that in view of the opinion of the Attorney General referred to in his letter of the 13th ultimo, it would be necessary to comply with the procedure laid down in the State Lands Act which involves obtaining the approval of the Dail and Senate was read, and consideration postponed for the present.

SUPERANNUATION ALLOWANCES.

Mr. MICHAEL DEENY.

A claim by Mr. Michael Deeny, Creevary, Rathmullan, for a superannuation allowance for services rendered as Collector of Poor Rate in Tirconail County, was submitted. Mr. Wm. Kelly, Solicitor, Letterkenny, appeared on Mr. Deeny's behalf and stated that the latter was an existing Officer under the Local Government (Ireland) Act 1898. Length of service 38 completed years. His average salary and pensionable emoluments for the three years terminating on the quarter next preceding the date of his resignation was £131:17:7. He therefore asked the Council to add 2 years to length of service and grant him an allowance equal to two-thirds of the latter amount.

It was unanimously decided that, subject to the approval of the Local Government Ministry Mr. Deeny be granted an allowance equal to  $\frac{19}{30}$  of his average salary and pensionable emoluments = £83:10:5.

Mr. PATRICK McGECHAN.

A claim by Mr. Patrick McGechan, 149 Main Street, Strabane, for a superannuation allowance for services rendered as a member of Tirconail County Council's Clerical Staff, was also submitted.

Mr. Wm. Kelly, Solicitor, Letterkenny, appeared in support of Mr. McGechan's claim and stated that the latter had 25 completed years service. His average salary for the three years terminating on the quarter next preceding the date of the termination of his position was £287:13:4. He asked the Council to add 8 years to length of service and grant him a yearly allowance equal to  $\frac{11}{20}$  of the latter amount -- £158:4:4.

Councillor Gallen said added years was a matter for consideration.

On the motion of Councillor Phelan, seconded by Councillor McCool, it was unanimously resolved to add 8 years to length of service.

It was further unanimously resolved, on the motion of Councillor Clarke, seconded by Councillor Bonner, - "That Mr. Patrick McGechan who has devoted his whole time to the service of Tirconail County Council, and who was at the date of the termination of his position incapable of discharging the duties of his office with efficiency, be granted an annual allowance of £158.

re TREASON FELONY BILL.

A resolution adopted by the Kildare County Board of Health condemning the above Bill because it must only result in turmoil and bloodshed, was considered.

Councillor Gallen proposed that it be adopted.

Councillor Phelan seconded.

The Chairman said it was a political matter and should not be discussed, he therefore proposed as an amendment, a direct negative.

Councillor Gallen said it was a question of right. This Bill has been opposed by every section in the Dail and the strangest opposition came from one of the Chairman's own friends, Major Bryan Cooper.

Councillor Lynch seconded the amendment.

Mr. Caffrey, County Surveyor, reported as follows:-  
Gentlemen,

I beg to state that the Fordson Roller has been at work on the roads in the Rosses for the past three months. The work it is doing compares favourably with that of any of the other rollers. Unfortunately, owing to the nature of the roads in this neighbourhood and the smoothness of the wheels of the Roller, it will not be practical to have a van to work in conjunction with this machine. The driver is willing to continue on without either flagman or sleeping van, provided the County Council increase his wages to enable him to pay his lodgings. As this will mean a considerable saving to the County Council I would suggest that consideration be given to the application.

On the motion of Councillor Mahony, seconded by Councillor O'Donnell (Hugh), it was unanimously resolved that the Driver of this machine be paid 10/- weekly in addition to his present salary to enable him to pay his lodgings.

ROAD BETWEEN LEENAN FORT & CLONAMNY.

A letter was read from Revd. James MaGuire P.P., Clonmany, complaining about the state of above road.

Councillor Quigley also complained that the road was not properly repaired. The road was hard in centre and soft at sides and in some places narrow. Shore gravel was used in the repair and this class of material would not sink into the road surface with the result that when a horse and cart were employed only half loads could be drawn. Motorists and cyclists also experienced difficulty in using this road.

Mr. Steadman explained that he had experienced very great difficulty in obtaining £2,500 from the British War Office in respect of the damage to the road between Bunrana and Clonmany and Clonmany and Leenan. There were conditions attached to that grant, and if the Council had taken cognisance of them they would not accede to Mr. Quigley's proposal at a former meeting that £750 should be spent in the district of Leenan. The major portion of the money was granted for the repair of other parts of the road to which infinitely greater damage had been done than at Leenan. Mr. Steadman added that he proposed expending £400 on the road at Leenan.

Tirconaill Mental Hospital, and Mrs Bridget Gallagher, Meenlaragh  
regarding rates due by the latter for period ended 31st March, 1924.

Mrs Gallagher in her letter stated that she refused to pay her  
rates in consequence of her having to pay the expenses in con-  
nection with the conveyance of her daughter (Kate Gallagher) to  
the Mental Hospital at Letterkenny in July, 1923. This expend-  
iture, she contended, should be borne by the County Council.

decided not to accede to the Collectors application.

re PAYMENT OF FEES TO DEPUTY COLLECTOR BROWNE.

Letter, dated 4th March, 1925, from the Local Government  
Ministry refusing to sanction payment of poundage fees to Deputy  
Collector Browne in respect of No.26 Collection District in view of  
the fact that a large sum is still showing as outstanding in the  
area for year ended the 31st March, 1924, was read.

RATE COLLECTION.

The Secretary submitted letter dated 12th March, 1925, from the Local Government Ministry regarding the rate collection in the County. It was decided to defer further consideration of the matter until the April meeting of the Council, up to the end of which month the collection period had already been extended for certain Districts, subject to the Ministry's sanction.

POUNDAGE FEES ON ARREARS OF RATES COLLECTED AND LODGED : COLLECTOR DEERY.

The Secretary informed the Council that Collector Michael Deery collected and lodged rates for the year ended 31st March, 1924, amounting to £21:2:10, which had previously been refunded but which were referred to him for subsequent collection with the approval of the Local Government Ministry. It was decided to allow him the usual poundage, amounting to £1:1:2, on these arrears, subject to the sanction of the Department named.

SCHEDULES OF UNCOLLECTED RATES.

The Secretary submitted schedules of uncollected rates furnished by Collectors Philip Cassidy and Joseph Gorman for the half-year ended the 30th September, 1924, and it was decided to strike off as irrecoverable and refund to these Collectors the amounts claimed except item No. 363 on Mr. Cassidy's return, the receipt for which has not been furnished.

REFUND IN RESPECT OF HOLDING THE VALUATION OF WHICH WAS REDUCED ON APPEAL.

The Council authorised the Secretary to refund proportionate amount of rates paid in respect of the Butt Hall, Ballybofey, the valuation of which had been reduced on appeal by the Commissioner of Valuation.

PAYMENT OF POUNDAGE FEES.

The Secretary informed the Council that Collectors Philip Cassidy and Joseph Gorman had closed their collections for the half-year ended the 30th September, 1924, and it was decided to recommend the Ministry of Local Government and Public Health to sanction payment of ordinary poundage in these cases. The Secretary further stated that Collector McNulty had lodged his warrant for the year ended the 31st March, 1924 for No. 32 District, less £3:7:2 on a holding which had been returned for revision, and the result of which he had now made known to the Collector. The Council also decided to pay ordinary poundage on this collection subject to the Ministry's sanction, but conditional on Mr. McNulty lodging the sum specified forthwith.

ARREARS OF RATES : INVER DISTRICT.

The Solicitor to the Council reported with reference to the collection of arrears of Rates in the Inver District that his predecessor had been unable to obtain service of about 500 processes which he had issued, owing to conditions then prevailing in that area, and these claims had now been passed on to him for recovery of the amounts. He stated that recently he went into these Demands with the former Collector, who was unable to furnish him with the names of present occupiers. He (Mr. McMullin) now asked the Council to direct the present Collector - who was under no obligation to collect these arrears - to furnish him with.

with the names of the present occupiers of holdings in respect of which these arrears had accrued.

The Council directed the Secretary to request the present Collector to furnish the information sought for to Mr. McMullin.

ALEXANDER WEIR AND COMPANY LIMITED  
V  
DONEGAL COUNTY COUNCIL.

The Solicitor to the Council submitted a report in this case stating that Wm. Doherty of Cornashesk, Road Contractor, assigned to Messrs A. Weir & Company, Limited, Auctioneers, Strabane the sum of £20 - payable on foot of a road contract of which due notice of the contents was given to the Council, subsequently the Northern Banking Company Limited, Raphoe, - to whom Doherty owed a certain amount, - marked Judgment against Doherty, and then obtained in the High Court of Justice in Saorstad Eirean an order to garnishee the money payable to Doherty by the County Council. The Garnishee Order was duly served on the Council and Mr. Wm. Black, Acting Secretary to the Council at the time, thought the Garnishee Order, by reason of being an Order of the High Court, took precedence to the assignment to Messrs Alexander Weir & Company Limited and when the money became payable to Doherty he (Mr. Black) forwarded the Paying Order for £20 to the Solicitor for the Northern Banking Company Limited.

Messrs A. Weir & Company Limited now claim payment from the Council and threaten proceedings in default of immediate settlement.

ADVICE.

"Messrs A. Weir & company Limited ought to have been paid the money which was paid to the Northern Banking Company Limited. They are entitled to succeed on proceedings brought against the Council to recover same, as the Council is responsible for the acts of its servants in the matter. Messrs Weir & Company should therefore be paid the amount before costs are incurred." This was agreed to.

CONTRIBUTION TO RAMELTON DISTRICT NURSING ASSOCIATION.

On the recommendation of the Tuberculosis Committee the Council unanimously decided to contribute £25 per annum to above Association for the part-time services of their Nurse in connection with Tubercular cases in the district, subject to the approval of the Ministry of Local Government.

TRUNK ROAD SCHEME : KILLYGORDON DISTRICT.

The Secretary on bringing before the Council a letter received from Mr. Matthew McGranaghan, Secretary for the Killygordon Branch of the National Union of General and Municipal Workers in regard to the class of men employed under the above scheme.

The Chairman remarked that all the communications, if read, would take up a long time, and suggested that Mr. McGranaghan make a statement instead.

Mr. McGranaghan insisted that the communications be read, and called for an investigation as to how the Trunk Road Scheme was being worked.

The Secretary explained that the workers employed on the Trunk Road Scheme at Kilton had ceased work, their reason being that they were ordered by Mr. McGranaghan to do so, who alleged that part of the work was being done by a Mr. Harpur, who should not have been engaged, as he was a large farmer and contractor, and not entitled to be employed on relief works. Mr. McGranaghan had called

had called on the workers not to work while Harpur was employed there. The result was that the machinery was taken away. Mr. McGranaghan then wired to the County Surveyor, who, after inquiries, sent the machinery back, and Mr. McGranaghan arranged to have the workers ready to start work on the arrival of the machinery. The workers turned up with their carts ready to do the work, but the machinery was not there. Mr. McGranaghan was claiming that the workers should be paid for the day they were there when the machinery had not turned up.

Mr. McGranaghan said that the secretary should also have stated that part of the complaint was that Harpur was working free on relief work.

Mr. Caffrey, County Surveyor, said he had sent a foreman to get the work started, and when he arrived there he was asked to join a labour union, but he refused, as he was only going to stay for a few days. The foreman left the district, and he (Mr. Caffrey) saw Mr. O'Flaherty, a member of the Council, and Mr. McGranaghan who decided to start work at once. Mr. Caffrey went to Stranorlar, and told the man in charge to return with the machinery. One of the workmen at the steam roller took ill, and this man and his flagmen had to leave to go to the hospital. The driver of another roller started work on the following Monday morning. The men were now at work, and there was no friction. There was no necessity for an inquiry.

Mr. Patrick Kelly, R.D.C., Ballyarrell, Killygordon, who was present, said that the machinery was standing idle for eight days, and he contended that whoever was responsible should be made pay the damage.

Mr. Callaghan, Deputy Surveyor, said that Harpur was the contractor for portion of the road concerned.

Councillor Bonner said that altered the situation. Mr. McGranaghan could not revolutionise the whole system in operation in the county since this grant came into force. It was obvious that Harpur was not giving his services gratis. As a County Councillor he (Councillor Bonner) would take strong exception to Mr. McGranaghan interfering in his district under such circumstances.

Councillor O'Donnell (J.F.) said that Mr. McGranaghan had taken up too much of their time.

It was decided to accept the statements of the County and Deputy Surveyors that there was no need for an inquiry.

BLIND PENSIONS ACT, 1920.

Letter dated 5th March, 1925, from the Local Government Department drawing the attention of the County Council to the provisions of section 2 (I) of the Blind Pensions Act, 1920, regarding the making of arrangements for promoting the welfare of blind persons resident in the county, and stating that the Minister would be glad to receive the views of the Council on the subject, having been read, Councillor Gallen said that Inspectors recently sent round deprived a good many people of pensions with the result that they have to seek maintainence from Tironaill County Board of Health.

It was unanimously resolved on the motion of Councillor McGoldrick, seconded by Councillor Gallagher (A.) that the above Act be construed so that those partially as well as completely blind be entitled to the benefits provided thereunder. Further, that any person who holds a Certificate of the Dispensary Doctor for the district in which he resides that he is unable, in consequence of failing sight, to perform any work, should also be entitled to a pension.

Caffrey took up duty on the 14th April, 1925, as Assistant County Surveyor in the place of Mr. Edward O'Callaghan, resigned, and that he is residing at Buncrana, as arranged; also that Mr. M.J. Dawson took up duty on 13th April, 1925 in the place of Mr. Michael O'Callaghan; that so far he has been unable to get a house at either Creeslough or Dunfanaghy, the location for his residence, either place being the most central for the area he has to look after, it is very important that he should get into residence at one of these places at the earliest date possible.

HEAVY MOTOR TRAFFIC.

Mr Steadman reported as follows:-

GENTLEMEN,

The damage caused to the roads by the traffic of heavy lorries and the consequent large increase in the cost of maintenance is a matter requiring consideration.

The roads until eight or nine years ago had been gradually made up to carry a class of traffic very different from that now prevailing. In fact a cart carrying a ton was considered to be quite a heavy load, nevertheless these same roads without further strengthening were suddenly called upon to carry lorries weighing 5 tons with loads of from 5 to 6 tons and travelling at a rate of 15 to 20 miles per hour. The result of such traffic is apparent to everyone and the additional demand on the ratepayers for coping with the injury arising is a serious matter.

When a railway is contemplated the people comprising the Company expecting to gain thereby, have not only to make the track or road but maintain same. This has to be done in addition to providing the Rolling Stock.

If a railway were relieved of the annual outlay on maintenance, in the same way as the owners of heavy lorries who use our roads, it would be able to reduce freights from 50% to 60%, a benefit that would be felt, not only by a few, but by the entire community.

Contrast these conditions with those that prevail in the case of owners of heavy lorries - they merely supply the Rolling Stock and the ratepayers are, under the existing state of affairs, called upon to find the money for, not only making an adequate track or road, but in addition they are called upon to maintain it. This annual maintenance through suddenly subjecting roads to traffic of a nature they were never constructed to carry means, that the ratepayers are called upon to find three or four times the money for maintenance that was required for the same roads prior to 1915 and with it all there is the greatest difficulty to get even as fair a surface as formerly. And for what return? Merely that a small fraction of the Community, (the owners of heavy lorries and those availing themselves of such transport), might gain somewhat in the matter of convenience, for nothing else is passed on to the community as lorry freights are usually sufficiently high to cover both railway freights and terminal charges.

The railways are in existence and they provide a track suitable for the carrying of heavy traffic moreover they are struggling as I have shown against unfair conditions.

Steps should be taken that would result in all heavy traffic being carried by railways - not a very difficult matter - and so relieve the ratepayers of a heavy burden for which they get no recompense. If this were done freights could, as a condition, be lowered. Traders would only require light motors or carts at terminals and short lengths only of roads leading to stations from towns would receive extra traffic.

Such short lengths could be speedily dealt with and the Trunk Roads when put in order by the annual Grants coming to the County, supplemented from the rates, could be kept in fair order for longer periods with a much smaller outlay than is at present required. A scheme worked out on some such lines would lead to the improvement and maintenance of roads with considerable relief to the ratepayers. Struggling railways would be aided by receiving all heavy traffic and the State would not be called upon to provide grants to anything like the same extent to help such railways tiding over annual deficiencies.

The owners of light motors from whom the Motor Tax in the main is derived, and from which tax Grants are made to County Authorities for road improvement, are not receiving the benefit they should owing to the destruction caused by heavy lorries. Moreover the tax on heavy lorries is nothing like in proportion to the damage caused by them.

In brief if the owners of heavy lorries were called upon to make and maintain a track or road such traffic could not exist.

It only exists through the ratepayers being required to provide these facilities.

In densely populated highly industrial countries other factors enter but even there much is to be gained by at least the long distance heavy traffic being diverted to the railways.

It was decided to postpone consideration of the matter until next meeting. The question being of public interest the Secretary was directed to send Report to the Press.

BRIDGE & CULVERT IN TOWNLAND OF THREE TREES.

Mr Steadman reported as follows:-

GENTLEMEN,

To make sure of the full extent of the complaint made by Councillor McNally at last meeting I called upon him when in that direction and found that in addition to the bridge I inspected another culvert in need of some repairs. These I will arrange to get carried out in the course of a week or so when I get through with the work connected with my District Council meetings.

LENAN ROAD.

Mr. Steadman, County Surveyor, reported as follows:-

GENTLEMEN,

I inspected the Lenan road complained of at last meeting and found that the gravel had in some places been spread too thickly. I have had this rectified by removing portion and distributing same on other portions of the road requiring repair.

The traffic, I noticed, is using this section of the repaired road in preference to an alternative route which would indicate that there is nothing that can reasonably be complained about.

CLERKS IN COUNTY SURVEYORS DEPARTMENT.

It was unanimously resolved to request the Local Government Ministry to sanction the continuance to 31st December next of appointment of Messrs Dan Kelly and Patrick McDermott as clerks in County Surveyors Department.

SCHEME OF POLLING DISTRICTS & POLLING PLACES.

A letter, dated 22nd April, 1925, F18249/1925, Tirconail County, was read from the Local Government Ministry in regard to the Scheme of Polling Districts and Polling Places as recently arranged by Tirconail County Council, and stating that the latter body should give this draft scheme a most detailed examination.

The Secretary was directed to state in reply that the Council in formulating the scheme had in view the necessity of affording ample facilities to all electors to record their votes, especially those aged and infirm, who would be unable to travel long distances; that in the limited time now available the Council felt they could not reconsider the scheme and therefore requested the Ministry to approve of it.

It was decided that in the event of the Ministry being unable to do so the Secretary be authorised to make arrangements to carry out the forthcoming Local Elections in accordance with the scheme hitherto in force in Tirconail.

On the suggestion of Councillor Gallen the Secretary, as

On the motion of Councillor Bonner, seconded by Councillor Mahony, it was unanimously resolved to ask the Minister for Local Government to approve of a superannuation allowance of 25/60ths of his average emoluments, plus 3 added years.

TIRCONAILL COUNTY BOARD OF HEALTH.

A letter dated 25/4/'25 was read from the Secretary, Tirconail County Board of Health appending statement showing the state of the Board's a/c on the 31st ultimo and requesting the Council to make a grant of £7,500 to cover liabilities on the latter date. The Secretary was directed to state in reply that the County Council, owing to the lack of funds, are not at present in a position to accede to the Board's request.

OVERDRAFT.

On the motion of Councillor Mahony, seconded by Councillor Gallen, it was unanimously decided to request the Local Government Ministry to sanction an overdraft of £40,000 being obtained from the Treasurer of the County.

APPLICATION FOR PERMISSION TO USE WASTE GROUND.

An application by Mr. Joseph Robinson, Stranorlar, for permission to use a small piece of waste ground in front of his house in Stranorlar, was considered and permission refused.

RUBBER WASHED ASHORE.

A letter from Mr. Wm. Grant, Assistant Officer, Cloughfin, Clonmany, re square block of rubber washed ashore, weighing about 4 stone, and requesting to know what to do with it, having been read, it was decided to refer him to the Custom Authorities.

VALUATION OF DAMAGE TO LAND.

A letter was read from Mr. P.M. Ward, Ramelton, enclosing valuation of damage at Frablin Quarry. It was decided to defer consideration of the matter until the valuations also made by Messrs Dawson, Assistant Surveyor, and McCrea, Auctioneer, had been received.

re BRIDGE AT THE RAMPART.

A letter was read from Mr. Edward Sweeney, Secretary, Cumann na nGaedeal Committee, Cruckamore, Dungloe, regarding the bridge at the Rampart, between Dungloe and Burtonport. The matter was referred to Mr. Caffrey, County Surveyor, for a report.

BUNCRANA PIER.

A letter from Mr. C. Moran, Harbour Master, Buncrana, stating that Fender Piles are urgently required for the Pier, having been read, Mr. Steadman, County Surveyor reported as follows:-

GENTLEMEN,

I inspected Buncrana Pier and found that considerable damage had been done to the fender piles; also fastenings and other parts of the structure - this has been brought about through the unreasonable use of the pier by the fishing boats, it indicates that no control or authority has been exercised by the Harbour Master to insure, as is his duty, that the boats taking advantage of

of this pier approach same with some degree of care and caution. Unless steps are taken to secure that a Harbour Master enforces proper control, similar to that exercised by Harbour Masters in other places, I fail to see how, in the near future, a heavy outlay can be avoided. I have put in hands some of the most urgent repairs necessary but not to any large extent.

It was decided to inform the Harbour Master that he must enforce proper control at the Pier in future otherwise the Council will be compelled to take serious notice of his neglect of duty in this respect.

PROPOSED LOAN OF £5,000 FOR BUNCRANA PIER IMPROVEMENTS.

With regard to the Council's proposal at their previous meeting to carry out improvements on the pier at Bunrana, the County Surveyor, Mr. Steadman reported that he had not yet completed his investigations. He added that unless the harbour master enforced proper control over the fishing boats using the pier very heavy expenditure would be necessary.

Councillor McGoldrick said that it was very necessary in the interests of the ratepayers who wanted relief to develop the resources of the county. He therefore proposed that this County Council apply to the Local Government Ministry for sanction to a loan of £5,000 to be obtained from the Treasurer of the county on the security of the £500 per annum which they would at least get as Dues at Bunrana Pier every year (if the fishing industry was developed they would bring the dues up to £1,000 per annum), said loan, with interest, to be repaid within a period of 25 years.

Councillor Kelly (H.J.) seconded the motion which was passed unanimously.

It was decided that the County Surveyor's Report and estimate be considered at next meeting, meanwhile, that the Secretary prepare a Return of the dues collected at Bunrana Pier for submission at meeting.

RATHMULLAN PIER.

A deputation from Rathmullan appeared before the Council in regard to the proposed taking over from the Board of Works of the Rathmullan Wooden Pier Extension, but as the Council had not received a reply from the Board regarding certain points on which they desired information it was decided to postpone consideration of the matter until next meeting.

LOUGH SWILLY RAILWAY AND DREDGING OF BURTONPORT HARBOUR.

Councillor O'Donnell (J.F.) drew attention to the promise of financial support to the Derry and Lough Swilly Railway Company. He said that the Free State Government had made an offer of £7,000 towards the working of the line. He understood that a deputation of the directors went to the Northern Government, who gave them a promise of another £7,000. The people of West Donegal, for whom the line from Letterkenny to Burtonport was built, were very much concerned about the working of this railway. They were afraid that unless something was done, within a year or two the railway would be scrapped, as motor cars and motor lorries were taking its place. The County Council should do something to try and keep the railway opened. He had received a letter from the West Donegal Sand and Mineral Syndicate asking that something be done to make the harbour at Burtonport safe for vessels to come in there. Councillor O'Donnell (J.F.) added that they got a promise some time ago that dredging operations would be carried out at Burtonport, and he proposed that the Board of Works be requested to send a

a dredger to Burtonport at the earliest possible moment.

The Chairman - Do you want to put that on the rates of the county?

Councillor O'Donnell (J.F.) said that there was no necessity to put the expense on the rates. There was almost £12,000 to their credit in respect of the original grant. The work was on foot in 1920, when the project was stopped owing to the state of the country. They wanted the work started.

The Chairman said he quite agreed with the proposal, but Councillor O'Donnell could have got to the matter quite easily without referring to the Railway Company.

Councillor O'Duffy seconded the proposition which was passed unanimously.

#### CONDITION OF A ROAD.

Councillor O'Duffy drew attention to the condition of the road near Dunfanaghy which, he said, was impassable at the present time, he wired Mr. Steadman but received no reply. It was a main road from Letterkenny around to Burtonport. People coming from devotions on Sunday had to wade to their knees in water. He moved that immediate steps be taken by Mr. Steadman to have the road put in proper order.

Mr. Steadman, County Surveyor, said he did not neglect to take action in regard to a telegram he had received from Councillor O'Duffy about the road in question. He passed on the wire to the Assistant Surveyor responsible. He was doing his best, and he recognised the urgency of the matter just as much as Councillor O'Duffy.

Councillor Mahony seconded the motion which was passed unanimously.

#### CONDITION OF A ROAD AT BLOODY FORELAND.

Councillor McGoldrick directed attention to the road at Bloody Foreland, and urged that it should be put in good condition.

Mr. Steadman said the difficulty of it all was the want of money. The road is hardly able to bear a cart not to mention those heavy vehicles. He would however have some repairs carried out as soon as possible.

#### COUNTY COUNCIL'S ROAD MACHINERY, etc..

Councillor McDermott asked Mr. Steadman, County Surveyor, (a) how many rollers, breakers and trucks were employed in carrying out the work on the trunk roads; (b) who are the actual owners of these machines and their respective addresses; (c) how much money is expended on them; (d) by what authority was the work discontinued from Lifford to Ballinalecky (this work was arranged by the County Council and the Department's engineer, and £1,700 authorised to be expended); (e) who is responsible for stopping the work from the Hollands to Lifford.

Mr. Steadman - So far as the North Division of the county is concerned, the answers to Councillor McDermott's queries are as follows, exclusive of county plant: - (a), 4 rollers, 5 stone-breakers, 2 lorries or waggons; (b) Mr. J. McMenamin, 18, Dungiven Road, Derry; Mr. J. Tracey, 13, Meehan's Row, Derry; Mr. H. Cummins, Coleraine; Messrs. G. Gregg, Larne; Mr. T. Ellis, Derry; Mr. Sherrard, Derry; (c), hire of a roller is £2 per day and coal, breaker £2:15 per day and coal, lorry - dependent upon the number of journeys made and the rate per ton, which depends on the distance (it might be taken at about £3 per day); (d), it appears to have been by the authority of the men engaged in the carting of the stone, backed up by others, who should, as a matter of

of prudence, have made more than one-sided inquiries if they were able to render any advice; (e) I am not aware of any road scheme having been formulated for work between Hollands and Lifford, hence the question of stoppage does not arise.

Councillor McDermott said that the relief schemes should not be for the great capitalists to the disadvantage of the poor.

Councillor O'Duffy said he was under the impression that the work was going on. Within earshot of Mr. McDermott's house there were rollers and machinery working.

Councillor McDermott - Did you inquire how many lorries are lying down there? Some of them are lying there like lumber on the road.

Mr. Steadman said that near the Swilly Bridge there were two rollers, and the material for the road had to be broken by stone-breakers and then carted down to the place where the roller was working. He put on a second roller in order to hasten the work, and as they were not getting anything like sufficient material by means of the carts he employed a motor lorry that was working on an adjoining job near Newtoncunningham. When the lorry arrived the carts drew off from the work. A little further on a stone-breaker was brought to a standstill, and things took on an aspect that Mr. Kelly deemed it advisable to withdraw the plant from the road. The men, he understood, wanted the work to go on at a slower rate, and did not wish any other plant employed. Mr. Steadman added that he then went to another of their works - a trunk road work - taking with him a lorry. The lorry was held up. He had a talk with the men who related to him some of the things he had already mentioned. He told them that if they interfered in any way with the County Council plant they would only weaken any case they might put forward before the County Council. The Council were paying 8/- a day for carting, and it turned out a very dear way. The proposition he made to the men was that they were free to cart away as heretofore at the rate of 8/- and cart as much as they were able, and that the lorry would be used to supplement the supply so as to keep the roller going. But he was met with a blank refusal. That happened on Saturday, and he asked them to carry on for the two days - Saturday and Monday - and keep the plant employed in as much as they had to pay for it. He ordered a waggon himself, and proceeded to have it loaded, but the men would not allow the waggon to be loaded. If that kind of action was to be tolerated all he could say was, "Good-bye to all attempts at carrying on work on any economic basis." If the men had a grievance they had no right to take such high-handed action.

Councillor Gallen said the matter had been put before him in a different light. The men were employed at 8/- per day, and they were drawing three loads per day; and that they were required to draw four loads per day. That was the origin of the trouble, he was informed. He thought the matter could easily be settled.

In reply to questions, Mr. Steadman said the cost of the transport of the stone by the lorry worked out at about 2/- a ton, including the men employed to load and unload it. Taking the three loads brought down by each cart the amount would not exceed 35 cwt., and certainly not more than two tons.

Councillor Bonner inquired if the Trunk Road Grant would revert to the Government if not expended within the financial year.

Councillor McGoldrick said he believed that Mr. Steadman was quite right and quite justified in taking the steps he did in order to get the work done quickly. If it was not done before the end of the financial year the danger was that the money would revert back to the Department if it was not expended.

Subsequently.

Subsequently some of the men concerned appeared before the Council. Mr. Steadman said he was prepared to pay them at the rate of 3/- per ton (24 cubic feet) for drawing the road material.

The men expressed satisfaction and said they would proceed with the work.

Councillor McGoldrick moved a direct negative, the Chairman seconded.

COUNTY COUNCIL V NEIL DOHERTY, GREENCASTLE.

In this case a letter was read from the defendant as was also a letter from Messrs Roberts & Sons, Derry, from whom the car was purchased.

Councillor Bonner explained that Mr. Doherty paid the Duty on an old car which is now useless and that he (Mr. Doherty) was of opinion the Duty could be transferred to a new car which he subsequently purchased.

It was decided under the circumstances to direct the Council's Solicitor to withdraw the prosecution.

COUNTY COUNCIL V PAT McGLINCHEY, STRANORLAR.

In this case the explanation given for failure to pay Licence Duty at proper time was considered satisfactory and proceedings withdrawn.

The Council's Solicitor reported that the above-named had paid £6 costs of prosecution.

The Solicitor to the Council submitted reports conveying Result of Prosecutions in cases recently ordered by the Council.

re MOTOR PROSECUTIONS.

A letter dated 24th April, 1925, R/MT/7, was read from the Ministry of Local Government stating that under section 39 of the Local Government Act 1925 the Garda Siothchana can prosecute in respect of Excise offences under the Finance and Roads Acts 1920, but this does not affect the powers and duties of the County Council to prosecute in the case of Excise offences.

The power of the County Council to mitigate a penalty imposed as a result of legal proceedings instituted by them is not affected by the Act of 1925 but the Council have power to mitigate a penalty imposed as a result of legal proceedings instituted by the Garda Siothchana.

AGRICULTURAL GRANT.

A letter dated 23rd April, 1925, was received from the Ministry drawing attention to the Budget speech of the Minister for Finance, from which it would be noted that the Agricultural grant was being doubled, and that legislation would be introduced to enable the benefit of the increased grant being allowed to agricultural ratepayers in the present year of assessment. Arrangements should be made accordingly to amend the rate-books, demand notes, and receipts already prepared so as to allow a further deduction in respect of lands equivalent to the full normal amount of the agricultural grant in addition to the allowance already made. The Ministry consented to the temporary employment of such suitable necessary clerical assistance as may be requisite for the purpose. The Minister expects that the substantial benefit to agricultural ratepayers now afforded by the Government will be reflected by a prompt recognition on their part of their civic responsibilities in the payment of all rates due. The Minister, when recommending the issue of instalments of the grant, will have regard to the position of each county as shown by the rates at the time collected and outstanding.

The Secretary stated that as the Council having already made a reduction of £56,000 in the current year's estimate on the assumption that the ratepayers could not afford to pay a higher "General" rate than 10/- in the £ the additional grant should not be applied to a further reduction of the rate on agricultural land. The reduction already made will place the Council in a serious financial condition. To mitigate this, to some extent, he recommended that the Estimate be increased by the amount (£21,000) of the Grant and that this sum be allocated to the following services:-

In reply to the Chairman, he said that the County Council based the estimates on the capability of the people to pay, and not on the amount required to run the County Council.

Councillor McGoldrick, T.D., said that he did not see eye to eye with the secretary's recommendations. They did cut down the estimates undoubtedly, as the secretary stated. They did so with a view to insisting upon the bedrock of economy being reached during the coming year. Now this unexpected money that they were to receive on account of the agricultural grant should, according to the secretary, be placed opposite this money that they had cut off the estimate, and that it should not be given to the agricultural interests in the community. He proposed that this grant be given to the agricultural community, and that it should not be sent to the various institutions to make up what is expected to be a deficiency in their funds for the coming year. The grant should be given, he added, in addition to what they had taken off the rates for the benefit and relief of the agricultural community. It was absolutely imperative that the rates should come down, and that the institutions that are empowered to levy rates must learn to understand what is the reasonable capacity of the ratepayers to pay in these distressful times. Councillor McDermott seconded.

In reply to Councillor McDermott, the Secretary said that this was an additional agricultural grant, which had been given this year for the benefit of the ratepayers.

Councillor McDermott asked would the grant come.

The Chairman said that it would.

Councillor McDermott - It is a case of live horse and you will get oats.

Councillor O'Mahony - You must give the oats time to ripen.

Councillor Gallen said that the County Council decided on reducing the estimates of the County Board of Health, but no explanation was given as to how such a reduction was to be made. It was absolutely futile reducing the estimate if they did not point out to those running the institution how they are to proceed.

The Chairman said that as far as he knew there was no effort whatever made to show under what heads the reductions were to be made. They simply wiped out three figures without going into details at all.

Councillor Gallen pointed out that last year Mr. O'Farrell insisted on reducing the estimates by £4,000, though according to the facts at his disposal he should have increased them by £5,000.

Councillor McDermott said that they should collect their debts.

The Chairman explained that last year they cut down the rates by one half. Now that deficit had to be paid in seven instalments, which would be added to the following years' rates. The cutting down of the rates this year would leave an enormous deficit for the following years. He did not think that the matter was gone into accurately at the time. It was simply done by a stroke of the pen.

The Chairman then proposed as an amendment that the Council accept the recommendations made by the Secretary. Councillor Boyle seconded.

The Chairman said it was stated at a previous meeting that he had no casting vote, at any rate he would put the motion to the meeting.

The motion was accordingly declared carried.

MAKING OF RATES.

Proposed by Councillor Bonner, seconded by Councillor Clarke and unanimously resolved - That the Council of the County of Tirconail hereby make Rates on the property Rateable thereto in the several Rural Districts in the County under the provisions of the Local Government (Ireland) Act 1898, and of Acts incorporated therewith, for the service of the year ending the 31st day of March, 1926, leviable in two half-yearly moieties, together with arrears, provision being also made for the repayment of the Seed Loan.

And it is further resolved - That the Warrants for the collection of the first and second moieties, together with arrears of previous Rates and Seed Loan, as above specified, be signed and sealed with the seal of the Council and issued to the Collectors for the several Collection Districts; also that the annual Estimate and Demand upon Bundoran, Buncrana, and Letterkenny Urban District Councils in respect of the above financial year be signed and the seal of the County Council affixed thereto, and that as required by Article 97 of the Public Bodies Order, 1904 the Secretary of the Council be authorised to appoint Deputies for the various Rural Districts for the purpose of examining the books of the several Collectors of Poor Rate for those Rural Districts in respect of the Financial year ending 31st March, 1926.

ASSESSMENT OF INCOME TAX.

Consideration of Demands for payment of Income Tax on the Interest accrued on the County Council a/cs. and in respect of Harbour Dues collected - Period:- Years ended 5th April, 1921, and 1923 respectively, was deferred until next meeting.

APPOINTMENT OF RATE COLLECTOR FOR  
No. 29 COLLECTION DISTRICT.

Before proceeding to consider applications for the position of Rate Collector for above Collection District a letter, dated 22nd April, 1925, GI4686/1925, was read from the Local Government Department on the subject, pointing out that further delay in making the appointment could only prejudice the very unsatisfactory position as regards rate collection generally. The Minister has given his reasons for not sanctioning the appointment of Mr. Neil Blaney. Preference should be given to ex-Service men.

Mr. Blaney said that he wished to withdraw his application, and he would be grateful if they would give him permission for doing so. He felt deeply grateful to the proposer and seconder of the motion that he be appointed. He was fully aware of the fact that if he complied with certain regulations under the old Local Government Act he could secure that appointment by an overwhelming majority. He was not, however, prepared now, or at any future date, to sacrifice principle to expediency. (Hear, hear). The regulations of that Act were an insuperable barrier to him accepting the position. He felt bound in honour to withdraw his application. He was aware that there were a great number of members of the County Council who, though he did not comply with those regulations, would give him their undivided support. That also was a deciding factor in urging him to withdraw, as he did not think it would be fair on his part to seek the support of those who, by supporting him, might jeopardise their means of livelihood. He felt bound to take this line of action, and he begged to thank all those who had supported him in the past, and who would support him again under certain conditions. Mr. McAteer also withdrew his application.

The Chairman asked Councillor Gallen if he would vote, and he replied that he would not. Councillor Gallen added that he had no complaint to make with the majority of the members, but there was one man who seemed to be dictator and grand high humbugger.

Councillor Lynch suggested that the names be sent to the Ministry, and that they be requested to make the selection.

It was decided to re-advertise the position, appointment to be made at next meeting.

APPLICATIONS FOR SUPERANNUATION ALLOWANCES -  
MULHERN AND DUNNION.

An application for a superannuation allowance for services rendered by Mr. Michael Mulhern, Bundoran, as Poor Rate Collector, was submitted. Mr. Michael Maguire, Solicitor, Ballyshannon, appeared on behalf of the applicant and handed in a memorial signed by certain substantial ratepayers in Bundoran (Rural) Electoral Division supporting Mr. Mulhern's application, accompanied by a medical certificate to the effect that Mr. Mulhern was in impaired health at the time he ceased to act as Collector.

On the motion of Councillor Kelly (H.J.), seconded by Councillor Bonner, it was decided to consider Mr. Mulhern's application for a pension at meeting to be held on 16th June next.

It was also decided that an application by Mr. Francis Dunnion for a superannuation allowance for services rendered as Poor Rate Collector be considered at same meeting, meanwhile, that five weeks' notice be given to each member of the County Council of the proposal to consider both applications.

CHANGES OF NAMES OF OCCUPIERS IN RATE BOOKS.  
ACT 23, VIT., Cap. 4, Sec. 6.

On the motion of Councillor Mahony, seconded by Councillor Gallen, it was unanimously resolved that changes of names of occupiers notified to the Council Office be made in the current year's Rate Books under the above Act.

COLLECTOR HOLMES'S APPLICATION FOR INCREASED POUNDAGE.

An application by Mr. Wm. Holmes, Poor Rate Collector, for an increase in his poundage from 6d to 1/- in respect of his collection for the year ended the 31st March, 1925, and previous arrears was submitted. No action was taken in the matter.

COUNCIL'S SOLICITOR TO APPEAR ON BEHALF OF  
COLLECTORS FRIEL AND J.B. O'DONNELL.

Collectors Friel and John B. O'Donnell requested the Council to instruct their Solicitor to appear in court on their behalf in certain cases for recovery of uncollected rates. The application of the former related to arrears due on a vacant house, the owner of which resided in Northern Ireland, the present occupier refusing to meet the claim. The application of Collector O'Donnell related to eight or ten cases of arrears in No. 13 District for which he had only been appointed Collector last year. The Council acceded to both applications.

COLLECTOR E.J. O'DOHERTY'S PERSONAL SECURITY.

The Secretary submitted letter dated the 25/3/'25 (GI3161/1925) from the Local Government Department regarding the failure of Collector E.J. Doherty to complete his Personal Security. Communications in the matter were also read from the Collector and the Council's Solicitor. The latter stated that the bond had now been completed, and would be forwarded to the Council in due course. The Council decided to take no further action in the matter.

LETTER FROM LOCAL GOVERNMENT MINISTRY re  
COLLECTOR MICHAEL O'DONNELL.

The Secretary submitted letter from the Local Government Department enclosing copy of a communication addressed by that body to Collector Michael O'Donnell regarding the unsatisfactory state of his collection. Regarding the Collector's complaint that the Council's Solicitor had not assisted him in the recovery of sums due by persistent defaulters, the Secretary stated that he had been in correspondence with their legal adviser who informed him that proceedings in a number of cases would be instituted without further delay. The Council approved of the adoption of this course.

APPOINTMENT OF COLLECTOR E.C. O'DONNELL.

The Secretary submitted letter dated the 3/5/'25 (GI4818/1925) (Tirconnaill County) from the Local Government Department sanctioning the temporary appointment of Mr. Edward C. O'Donnell as Rate Collector for No. 30 Collection District in the County.

ADDITIONAL PENNY POUNDAGE FOR YEAR  
31/3/'24 - COLLECTOR DEERY.

The Secretary submitted letter from Local Government Ministry dated 24/3/'25 (GI3177/1925) refusing to sanction an additional penny poundage to Collector Michael Deery in respect of his warrant for the year ended the 31/3/'24.

On the motion of Councillor Bonner, seconded by Councillor Kelly (H.J.), it was unanimously decided to recommend the Department to re-consider their decision and to approve of the proposed payment. Collector Deery, who was present, stated that the uncollected rates which were included in his lodgments represented 75% of his fees since 1919.

INCREASED REMUNERATION TO COLLECTOR MCGINTY.

The Secretary submitted letters dated the 24/3/'25 and 2/4/'25 (GI3162/1925 and GI4655/1925) from the Local Government Department agreeing to an extension of dates in relation to proposed increased poundage for year ended the 31/3/'25 to Collector McGinty but refusing to sanction a similar variation of their original order as regards subsequent years. The Secretary pointed out that Mr. McGinty had not the requisite proportions of his warrant lodged by the specified dates to permit of increased poundage being allowed for the past year; and in this connection he submitted letter from Collector McGinty stating that he had been unable to comply with the Department's conditions owing to the late date on which his warrant was issued. In view of this fact, it was unanimously decided, on the motion of Councillor Mahony, seconded by Councillor Bonner, to recommend the Department to sanction the increased poundage in this case for the period in question.

SCHEDULES OF UNCOLLECTED RATES.

The Secretary submitted schedules of uncollected rates for the following Collection Districts:-

It was decided to strike off as irrecoverable and refund to Collectors the rates on derelict buildings and on ruins, and such other items as appeared from the evidence furnished to warrant the adoption of that course. All other items were disallowed. The foregoing ruling in the cases of Collectors J.B.O'Donnell and McGlinchey is conditional on their closing forthwith their collections for the respective periods specified.

PAYMENT OF POUNDAGE.

It was unanimously decided to recommend the Department to sanction payment of ordinary poundage to all collectors who had closed their accounts by the 30th April, 1925 in respect of years ended the 31/3/'23, 31/3/'24 and 31/3/'25, the recommendation in regard to the first mentioned period applying only to the case of Robert Mulhern, Ardfarna, Bundoran, who lodged the balance of that year's arrears on the 28/5/'24.

COLLECTORS CLAIM FOR POUNDAGE ON THEIR ORIGINAL WARRANTS FOR YEAR 31/3/'25.

Arising out of entry in Minutes of Proceedings of Tirconail County Council on the 24/3/'25, the Secretary submitted letter from Collector John Gillespie, Ballyshannon, Secretary of the Tirconail Poor Rate Collectors' Association, requesting the County Council to receive a deputation on behalf of the Association in regard to the Collectors claim for payment of poundage on their original warrants for the year ended the 31/3/'25. The Council having acceded to this request, Mr. Gillespie on behalf of the deputation, asked the Council to furnish to the Local Government Department the statement requested by the latter showing the earnings

earnings of the Collectors for each of the past five years.

On the motion of Councillor Myles, seconded by Councillor Kelly (H.J.) it was decided to furnish return in question to the Department.

CLAIM FOR POUNDAGE BY ex-COLLECTOR McCOLE.

A claim by Mr. James McCole, ex-Collector of Poor Rate, for poundage on £1,588:4:6 rates collected and lodged for the half year ended the 31st March, 1922, was submitted. Mr. P.J. Ward, Solicitor, Letterkenny, appeared on behalf of Mr. McCole.

The Council decided to adhere to their previous decision to defer consideration of the matter until the completion of the collection of the arrears of rates in the district now in progress.

COLLECTION OF THE RATE.

The Secretary submitted letter dated the 24/3/'25 (GI3I92/1925) from the Local Government Department reluctantly sanctioning the Council's proposal to grant Collectors to the 30/4/'25 to close their collections for the year ended the 31/3/'24, but only on the distinct understanding that if they failed to do so the Council's decision to remove them from office will be immediately enforced, and the Collection Books forthwith taken up.

The Secretary mentioned that notwithstanding the assurances previously given on behalf of the collectors concerned to have their full warrants lodged within the time specified, the collections up to the present had not been completed in nine districts excluding districts No.26 and 30 for which new collectors had been appointed.

Messrs P.J. Ward and Wm. Kelly, Solicitors, who appeared on behalf of the nine Collectors referred to, and all of whom were present, asked that the Council's order automatically dismissing them be altered, and that the time limit be extended by another month. Both Solicitors stated that these Collectors were doing their best to close their accounts.

The Chairman pointed out that the Council could not go back on their resolution in the matter.

Councillor McGoldrick T.D. stated that these Rate Collectors had gone a considerable way to meet the requirements of the Council, and he thought they might defer dismissing them.

The Chairman said he thought there was no other way out of it.

Councillor McGoldrick T.D. said that the Local Government Department were not the supreme body, they might sanction or refuse to sanction the Council's decisions but the Council should use its own discretion.

The Chairman pointed out that Councillor McGoldrick suggested the passing of the original resolution.

Councillor Bonner asked what kind of a situation would arise if that resolution were acted upon.

The Chairman reminded Councillor Bonner that he had supported Councillor McGoldrick's resolution.

Councillor Bonner admitted that he did, but now that a great effort was being made to comply with it they should give the Rate Collectors an opportunity of completing their task. They should not, at the same time, give the Rate Collectors the idea that the Council was not going to enforce their decision.

There were some Collectors who had done their best, and if they sent men down from the Ministry they could not do any better.

On the motion of Councillor McGoldrick T.D., seconded by Councillor Kelly (H.J.), it was decided to extend the time for completing the collections by another month.

COUNTY OF TIRCONAILL : SHEEP DIPPING, etc.

A meeting of the SPECIAL COMMITTEE appointed by the County Council for the purpose of:-

- (1) formulating a Sheep Dipping Scheme, and
- (2) considering the question of inspection of sheep at fairs by the County Council's Veterinary Inspectors,

was held in the Courthouse, Lifford, on Thursday 14th May, 1925.

ATTENDANCE.

The members present were:-

Councillors Clarke, Gallen, Lynch and O'Donnell (Hugh).  
Messrs Daniel McGlinchey, Cloghan, and John McLoone, Glenties, representing sheep owners in the County, were also present.

CHAIRMAN.

On the motion of Councillor Lynch, seconded by Councillor Gallen, Councillor Clarke was moved to the chair.

ORDERS.

The following orders prescribed by the Department of Agriculture and Technical Instruction for Ireland were submitted:-

- Sheep Dipping -(Ireland) Order of 1915.
- " " " " -(Ireland) Order of 1915 amendment Order 1924.
- " " " " -(Appointment of Inspectors) Order of 1915, &
- " " " " -(Local Regulations) (Ireland) Order of 1916.

SCHEMES.

Copies of Sheep Dipping Schemes in force in Counties Galway, Roscommon, Tyrone, and Derry were submitted and read by the Secretary, subsequently the Sub-Committee proceeded to draw up a Scheme for Tirconail.

SHEEP DIPPING SUB-INSPECTORS.

Mr. McGlinchey said that so far as sheep owners were concerned they considered Sheep Dipping Inspectors served no purpose and that the supervision of the Dipping of Sheep should be carried out by the four Veterinary Inspectors in the service of the Council in conjunction with the Civic Guard.

The Chairman said that under the Sheep Dipping (Appointment of Inspectors) (Ireland) Order of 1915, it was obligatory on the County Council to appoint Inspectors temporarily to enable proper supervision to be maintained on behalf of the local authority with a view to securing the effective dipping of sheep in their district under the principal Order.

On the motion of Councillor Gallen, seconded by Councillor Lynch, it was decided to recommend the appointment of 10 Sub-Inspectors, one for each Rural District in the County, as originally constituted.

REMUNERATION.

It was also decided to recommend that each Sub-Inspector be paid the sum of £25 for properly supervising the dipping of sheep within his area under the supervision of the Council's Veterinary Inspectors during the dipping periods - 1st June until 15th November. In the event of a sub-Inspector, on the report of a Veterinary Inspector, not performing his duties satisfactorily the Council to have the right to withhold payment to such extent as they may deem necessary.

DIP AND BATH.

It was recommended that sheep owners supply their own Dip and all labour, cartage etc. and pay 1d for each sheep dipped in the Council's bath - the Inspector to be responsible for the cars and custody of the bath.

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO DIP.

Notices of intention to dip received by the Civic Guard under article 3 of the Sheep Dipping (Ireland) Order of 1915 shall forthwith be transmitted by them to the Dipping Sub-Inspector for the district instead of to the Clerk of the Local Authority.

CERTIFICATES.

Each Sub-Inspector to be supplied by the Council with a stamp and this stamp must be affixed to each certificate of Dipping, else the certificate is not complete and will not be accepted as a proof of having the work done - all stamps to be the property of the County Council and returned to the County Secretary at the end of the Autumn Dipping period.

Where stamps have been used for the purpose of deception, they shall be recalled and the Sub-Inspectors concerned immediately dismissed.

The Civic Guard to be requested to see that all those exposing sheep at fairs for sale have Sheep Dipping Certificates bearing the stamp of the Dipping Sub-Inspector.

DUTIES OF VETERINARY INSPECTORS.

(1) To examine and report, free of charge, all outbreaks of infectious Diseases of Animals in his District (as included in schedule under the Diseases of Animals Acts) and take the necessary steps to safeguard all stock and stamp out the disease.

(2) To visit each sub-Inspector in his area at least once during each Dipping period and make an inspection of the Council's Baths.

(3) To make a yearly report in the month of November and place same before the County Council, giving details of outbreaks of disease, how dealt with, and results, and also reporting on the sub-Inspector's care of the baths and general.

DUTIES OF SUB-INSPECTORS.

(1) To superintend Sheep Dipping as far as possible, keep an accurate account of his work and monies (if any) received, including total number of sheep, dipped during the summer and autumn dipping periods under the heads - Dipped in owner's bath and Council's bath respectively, and at the expiration of each of above periods furnish the County Secretary with a return embodying this information, and accompanied by amount of fees received; stamp certificates for all who have dipped their flocks under his supervision, report to the Veterinar Inspector if he suspects any

any sheep of having scab, and also make inquiries and report to the Council on any suspected cases of infectious diseases in any animals in his area and the names and addresses of sheep owners who neglect or refuse to dip.

(2) To supervise personally all dippings for scab in his area as ordered by the Inspector.

The sub-Inspector shall be responsible to the Veterinary Inspector for the health of the stock in his area as far as reports are concerned, and the Veterinary Inspector shall be responsible to the County Council.

re SCAB IN SHEEP.

In cases of an outbreak of scab in sheep, the owners will be obliged under penalty to report same to the sub-Inspector who will immediately report to the Veterinary Inspector, and if on examination, it is found that scab exists, the Inspector will issue the necessary isolation orders and take steps at once to have the sheep dipped, under the special supervision of the sub-Inspector as often as he (the Inspector) thinks necessary and at the necessary intervals.

PROSECUTIONS.

In the event of any sheep owner refusing or neglecting to dip his flocks the County Council will institute proceedings against him according to law.

INSPECTION OF SHEEP AT FAIRS.

The Veterinary Inspectors in the County, appointed under the Contagious Diseases of Animals Acts, shall be directed to attend the fairs during current year as arranged for year 1924, for the purpose of inspecting sheep to ascertain if they are free from sheep scab.

The foregoing Scheme is to be taken as applicable to present year only. It is hoped that next year, as a result of the working of this Scheme, a more comprehensive one will be formulated.

CHAIRMAN.

On the motion of Councillor Bonner, seconded by Councillor Mahony, Councillor Clarke was moved to the chair.

MINUTES.

The Minutes of previous meeting were confirmed.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEE.

The Reports of the undermentioned Committees were unanimously adopted.

FINANCE - Meeting held 19th May, 1925.

PROPOSAL - " " " " 19th " " "

In this connection the report of the Sheep Dipping Committee meeting held 19th May, 1925, was also adopted with the following amendments:-

- (a) Baths to be conveyed from one Dipping centre to another at the expense of the County Council, and not to be a charge on sheep owners.
- (b) Dipping centres to be fixed by Sub-Inspectors.

SUB-INSPECTORS.

On the suggestion of the Secretary it was decided to re-appoint the Inspectors who carried out the duties during the Sheep Dipping periods last year.

REBUILDING OF A WALL.

On the motion of the Chairman it was decided that the County Surveyor be directed to have the County wall at Infirmary, Lifford, rebuilt. Mr. Steadman said he would have the work carried out under Sudden Breach Order.

BURTONPORT HARBOUR IMPROVEMENTS.

A letter dated 15th May, 1925, was read from the Office of Public Works, Dublin, relative to the improvement of Burtonport Harbour - estimated cost £10,800. Of this sum £8,500 will be made available by the Ministry of Finance for the carrying out of the proposed works, provided that the County Council will agree to provide the balance (about £2,300) of the contribution promised by them for the 1914 Scheme, and maintain the works when completed..

In this connection, in accordance with notice of motion duly given, Councillor O'Donnell (J.F.) moved - "That the Tirconail County Council do hereby agree to provide the balance (about £2,300) of the contribution promised by them for the 1914 Burtonport Harbour Improvements Scheme, making the total amount £10,800, and that the Council

Council will agree to maintain the works when completed." That a loan of £2,300 be obtained from the Board of Works, or otherwise and repaid, with interest, within a period of 20 years, and that the works, when completed, be maintained by the Council.

Councillor Bonner seconded the motion which was unanimously passed.

COURTHOUSE AT LIFFORD.

In accordance with notice of motion Councillor Bonner^{moved} - "That Mr. William Doherty, Architect, Derry, be instructed to submit estimates to the Council showing:-

- (a) the amount of expenditure necessary to reconstruct the Courthouse at Lifford to make it suitable for County Council Offices and
- (b) the amount of expenditure necessary to rebuild the County House for the same purposes.

Councillor O'Donnell (Hugh) seconded, and Councillor McGoldrick T.D. supported the motion.

Councillor Mahony proposed as an amendment that the matter be left to the new Council for consideration. Councillor Gallagher (Anthony) seconded.

A vote was taken on the amendment.

TRUNK ROAD GRANT - £450,000

PROVISIONALLY ALLOCATED TO TIRCONAILL CO. COUNCIL £21,060.

A letter dated 29th April, 1925, was read from the Local Government Ministry, Roads, stating, for the information of the Tirconaill County Council, that the sum of £21,060 has been provisionally allocated to the Council from the Trunk Road Grant of £450,000 for the improvement of Trunk Roads.

A letter, dated 22nd May, 1925, was also read from the Local Government Ministry, (Roads), stating that the Minister at present can make no alteration in the existing classification of Trunk Roads, but he will raise no objection, if the Tirconaill County Council so decide, to expend some portions of the Grant of £21,060 recently notified, on the improvement of the following roads:-

1. Ardara Road Station via Killybegs, Carrick to Glencolumbkille, back by Mallinmore.
2. Dungloe to Crolly via Burtonport, Kincasslagh & Annagry.
3. Crolly via Dore School, Middletown, Brinlack, Knockfola, Meenacladdy, Derryconnor and Gortahork

and adding that the application of the County Council for a revision in the classification of some of the Trunk Roads will be considered with the question of the general revision of the classification of the roads of the Saorstát.

It was unanimously decided that one-half (10,530) of the former amount be allocated to the Northern and Southern Divisions of the County respectively.

Mr. Steadman submitted a scheme recommending that the proportion of the grant for his division be allocated as follows:-

Having regard to the allocation of the Grant to Trunk Roads in each Rural District suggestions were made by certain members of the Council regarding roads which should be included in the schemes. After a prolonged discussion, in which several Councillors took part, it was decided to approve of the allocation of the Grant by the County Surveyors to the respective Rural Districts in the County and to leave the selection of the Trunk Roads on which the Grant is to be expended to the County Surveyors. The latter Officials were authorised to transmit their schemes, when completed, to the Ministry of Local Government (Roads) for approval.

ROAD BETWEEN CLADY AND LIFFORD.

Councillor Gallen drew special attention to the Trunk Road between Clady and Lifford which he said was in a very bad state of repair owing to the traffic, under the Customs Regulations having been diverted from the Strabane Clady Road to this road. He moved that when the latter road was being repaired under the Trunk Road Scheme the footpath be done away with so as to give additional width to the road. This was agreed to and Mr. Steadman was directed accordingly.

HEAVY MOTOR TRAFFIC.

Councillor McDermott drew attention to the damage done to County roads by heavy motor traffic. He thought immediate action should be taken to remedy this matter.

ROAD BETWEEN CROAGHAN AND GAMBLE'S ROCK.

Councillor Gallagher (Anthony) submitted a memorial form residents in Milford Rural District regarding the repair of above road.

It was unanimously resolved, on the motion of Councillor McGoldrick, that when the County Council are in a position to deal with roads generally this road receive specially attention.

RATHMULLAN WOODEN PIER EXTENSION.

A further letter dated 1st May, 1925, 7407/'25, was read from the Board of Works on the subject of the taking over by Tirconail County Council of the Wooden Pier Extension at Rathmullan.

On the motion of Councillor McGoldrick, seconded by Councillor Bonner, it was resolved that this County Council take over said Pier

In this connection letters were read from the Hon. Secretary, Rathmullan Pier Committee, and Mr. Edward Deeny, Pier Hotel, Rathmullan. The latter, who was present, said that £94 or £95 had been granted by the British Admiralty for damages caused to the old stone Pier at Rathmullan. It was suggested that this sum should be expended on the wooden extension in repairing the flooring.

On the motion of Councillor Bonner, seconded by Councillor McGoldrick, Mr. Steadman was instructed to inspect the wooden extension and submit a report and estimate to the next meeting. It was further resolved that the Council's Harbour Master be authorised to collect the dues from the present date.

BUNCRANA PIER.

As directed at a previous meeting Mr. Steadman submitted a report on the repairs necessary to be carried out at above Pier, and said as they would be of a recurring nature the best thing would be to secure a loan of £2,000 to be gradually paid off by means of dues collected at this Pier.

Councillor McGoldrick T.D., considered the security of the dues would be sufficient to raise the loan of £5,000 already agreed upon at previous meeting, and by expending that amount the revenue of the port would be doubled, and the rates of the county would be relieved. Although he was in sympathy with the development of the fishing industry all round, he felt that it was not altogether fair to ask the ratepayers of the county to bear the expenses necessary for the development of the industry. The industry was a national asset and ought to be used for national purposes, and he thought that the harbours should be in the control and custody of the State.

Mr. Steadman's report was adopted.

With regard to that portion of Mr. Steadman's report re the Harbour Master's failure to carry out his duties in certain respects this matter was referred to the Buncarna Pier Committee to make whatever recommendations they deem necessary

GREENCASTLE PIER.

Councillor Bonner inquired if the County Surveyor had any report in regard to the pier at Greencastle.

Mr. Steadman said that the difficulty complained of by the fishermen at Greencastle was that they were unable to reach the pier for berthing purposes when the tide was low. This was due to a bank of sand at the outside of the pier head. If a sum of £400 could be obtained a channel might be cut through this bank about four feet deep, but the prospect of such channel being maintained afterwards without recurring expenditure was not in his opinion encouraging. Possibly the Fishery Commission might, if the matter were brought under their notice, aid in the matter, as they would doubtless be able to control suitable plant for economically carrying out work of this nature.

Councillor Bonner proposed that the Secretary be directed to ask the Board of Works to send their dredger along, adding that there is sufficient water at the port for the fishing boats, but when they get to the nose of the pier there is a bank, and they cannot get over that bank unless at high tide. They should have some immediate relief. It is a very urgent matter, as the fishing season will begin in about three weeks' time. Councillor Quigley seconded the resolution which was unanimously passed.

HOUSING ACT, 1925.

A circular letter, dated 7th May, 1925, was read from the Department of Local Government, enclosing, for the information of the Tironaill County Council, copy of the Housing Act, 1925, which passed into

SUPERANNUATION OF Mr. PATRICK MCGEEHAN.

A letter, dated 7th May, 1925, was read from the Local Government Ministry regarding the superannuation of Patrick McGeehan of the County Council's Clerical Staff, and stating that the Minister sees no reason for altering his decision in the matter.

It was decided to pay Mr. McGeehan, forthwith, his superannuation allowance from 27th January last, being the date on which the Secretary's Report, re office staff, was submitted to the Council, and to recommend the Minister for Local Government to sanction payment from date of Mr. McGeehan's suspension, viz.: - 1st December, 1924.

PURCHASE OF ROAD PLANT.

A letter, dated 9th May, 1925, was read from the Ministry of Local Government, Roads, stating that in future, before any commitment is entered into for the purchase of Road Plant by the Tirconnaill County Council, whether out of Loans or Revenue, particulars of the Plant proposed to be purchased should be furnished to the Department.

ADDITIONAL AGRICULTURAL GRANT.

A letter, dated 28th April, 1925, was read from the Local Government Ministry on the subject of the "Agricultural Grant" and stating that the Minister intends introducing a Bill seeking the authority of the Oireachtais for power to direct the application of the increased Grant for the relief of agricultural land from rates in such manner as he may consider proper where the increase would show a surplus on the method of normal allocation, and where a Council may not have made full provision for their estimated requirements in this year's rates the Minister also proposes to seek power to direct the application of the increased Grant towards meeting the deficit in current expenses or otherwise as he may think proper; also letter dated 16th May, 1925, from the Local Government Ministry stating that having regard to the information furnished by the Secretary, Tirconnaill County Council, in response to the Ministry's circular of 28th ultimo the Minister directs that the increase in the Agricultural Grant be applied towards meeting the deficit in the amount provided in the rates for current expenses.

On the motion of Councillor McGoldrick T.D., seconded by Councillor McDermott, it was unanimously resolved that this Council adhere to previous resolution to apply the increased Agricultural Grant to the benefit of the agricultural community and not to apply it to meet the deficiency in the funds of the Council for the current year.

In this connection a resolution passed by Inishowen Rural District Council protesting against the proposal of the County Council to expend the additional Agricultural Grant in any way but as intended by the Government, to give relief to the rates on agricultural land, was read.

SUPERANNUATION TO Ex-COLLECTOR DEENY.

A letter, dated 22nd April, 1925, was read from the Local Government Ministry in regard to the claim for compensation for superannuation of Mr. Michael Deeny for services rendered as Rate Collector in Tirconnaill County and inquiring if he devoted his whole time to the service of the County. The fact that Mr. Deeny was an existing Officer under the Local Government (Ireland) Act 1898 is not in itself sufficient to warrant the grant of a pension unless he devoted his whole time to the service of the County.

Mr. Wm. Kelly, Solicitor, Ramelton, appeared on behalf of Mr. Deeny and said that his client was appointed almost forty years ago, and

A letter, dated 13th May, 1925, was read from the Department of Local Government, Roads, with reference to previous correspondence relative to Limits of Expenditure, and stating that the Minister is advised that by reason of the repeal of Sub-Section (2) of Section 27 of the Local Government (Ireland) Act 1898, and the transfer of the road business of Rural District Councils under the Local Government Act 1925, it is no longer necessary to make an Order sanctioning the Limits of Expenditure applied for.

LOAN OF £13,000.

A letter, dated 14th May, 1925, from the Ministry of Local Government, Housing Department, sanctioning a loan of £13,000 for the purpose of the Tirconail County Council's Local Assistance Scheme under the Housing (Building Facilities) Act, 1924, was read.

CLERKS IN COUNTY SURVEYORS' DEPARTMENT.

Letter from the Department of Local Government, Roads, stating that the Minister will raise no objection to the Tirconail County Council retaining Messrs Dan Kelly and Patrick McDermott as Clerks in the County Surveyor's Department at a salary of £3 per week each up to 31st December next, was read.

APPOINTMENT OF PUBLIC ANALYST.

Applications were received from the undermentioned persons for the position of Public Analyst for County Tirconail, but regretting they could not accept a salary less than £100 per annum:-

Mr. Wm. J. Doherty, Architect, 12 Castle Street, Derry, wrote intimating that, as directed by the County Council at their previous meeting, he had forwarded Plans of Donegal, Buncrana, and Carndonagh Courthouses to the Minister for Local Government for approval. He called at the Local Government Ministry's Offices on 6th May, 1925 and learned from the Chief Engineering Inspector that it was the Board of Works who would deal with the plans, he (Mr. Doherty) on same

same date lodged the plans with the latter body and had not since heard from them on the matter.

A claim for a gratuity by Mr. Charles L. Callaghan, Stranorlar, for services rendered as Clerk of Stranorlar Union from 29th December, 1919, was submitted.

Mr. J.F.A. Simms, Solicitor, Strabane, appeared on Mr. Callaghan's behalf.

On the motion of Councillor Boyle, seconded by Councillor Gallagher (Anthony) it was unanimously resolved, subject to the approval of the Minister for Local Government to grant him a gratuity of £444, being the amount which the County Council at a meeting held on 12th June, 1922, recommended should be paid to this ex-Official.

GRATUITY - NURSE McMENAMIN (DECEASED).

A letter was read from Mrs Margaret McMenamin, Glenfin Street, Ballybofey, regarding the compensation for her daughter who acted as Nurse in the Workhouse, Stranorlar, from 1st September, 1919.

Councillor Gallen said this was a case deserving special consideration.

McFadden & Coy., Solicitors, Letterkenny, enclosing Bill of Costs, amounting to £14, due to them by the Guardians of Letterkenny Union having been read, the Secretary said he had a letter from the ex-Clerk of above Union requesting that the Bill of Costs be sent to him to certify it as a copy of the original furnished.

It was decided to defer consideration of the Bill until the certificate had been attached.

IMPROVEMENT OF LAND : NEW DRAINAGE SCHEME.

Mr. John McIntyre, Town Surveyor, Letterkenny, appeared before the Council and submitted a memorial from certain ratepayers and farmers living in the townlands of Rossgier etc., Stranorlar Rural District, and Dispensary District of Castlefin, requesting the County Council to foster a scheme under the new Drainage Act now before the Dail to apply to the memorailists' holdings in said Drainage area. Estimated cost. of improvements £583. This sum to be obtained by a loan.

A map indicating lands to which proposed scheme is applicable was also submitted.

Councillor McDermott, one of the memorailists, explained to the Council the benefits that would be derived from the scheme if approved.

On the motion of the Chairman, seconded by Councillor Gallen, it was unanimously decided to adopt scheme.

TREASON BILL.

A resolution passed by County Dublin County Council condemning the Treason Bill was read.

CLAIM FOR POOR RATES.

A claim for £1:4:2 Poor Rates due by the Guardians of the Ballyshannon Union on lands attached to Kinlough Dispensary was considered and payment approved.

RECEPTION AND MAINTENANCE OF CHILDREN NOT EXCEEDING 3 YEARS OF AGE IN THE COUNTY HOME.

A letter, dated 20th May, 1925, from the Local Government Ministry, giving notice to the County Council of the Minister's intention, after the expiration of the period of one month, provided for in Section 5 (2) of the Local Government (Temporary Provisions) Act, 1923, to amend and modify the County Scheme so as to provide for the reception and maintenance in the County Home of children not exceeding 3 years of age, and to direct that such amendment and modification shall take effect as from 1st July, 1923, was read.

OVERDRAFT.

The Chairman declared Mr. Dorrian, Junior, duly appointed Rate Collector subject to the sanction of the Local Government Ministry.

PERSONAL SURETIES.

Mr. Dorrian submitted the names of John Friel, Farmer, Rosskill, & John Gallagher, Hotel, Letterkenny, as his Personal Sureties in the sum of £79:0:0. These were accepted by the Council as satisfactory.

RATE COLLECTION.

The Secretary submitted a letter, dated the 9th instant (G224I3/I925 Tirconail County), from the Local Government Ministry regarding the unsatisfactory state of the rate collection in the County to the 30th ultimo. The letter pointed out the large sum then outstanding which compared unfavourably with the condition of the rate collection at the corresponding date last year. The Council's attention was also called to the failure of certain collectors to close their accounts for periods ended the 31st March, 1924, particular mention being made of James McGowan, Patrick J. McHugh and Edward J. Doherty, in whose cases special reports were requested by a specified date. In the remaining instances, the Ministry reluctantly sanctioned the Council's proposal extending the time for the completion of the 1923 - 1924 collections to the 30th instant.

The Secretary informed the Council that, on receipt of the Ministry's letter, he had communicated by registered post with all the collectors whose accounts to the 31st March, 1924 had not been closed, acquainting them of the position, of the number, the following have since lodged their full warrants for the periods specified.

In the last mentioned case, the cheque for the outstanding rates, which was endorsed "good" by the Bank on which it was drawn, was handed in this morning by Mr. Doherty. The Collecting Books and Warrants for the year ended the 31st March, 1925 had been despatched to Collectors McGlinchey (No. 14) and McHugh (No. 15 & 18), but it was for the Council to decide whether a similar course should be adopted in the case of Collector Doherty who had not lodged the arrears in question within the time stipulated by the Ministry.

As regards Collector McGowan, the Secretary reported that he had not as yet closed his accounts for the year ended the 31/3/'24. He had attended once only at the deputy checker's office for the examination of his accounts since the 22nd ultimo, as a result of which he lodged £206:11:2 in respect of an ascertained collection of £225:4:6. This officer's record was unsatisfactory, and no adequate reason for the non-completion of his collection had been furnished.

Mr. Wm. Kelly, Solicitor, Letterkenny, on behalf of Collector McGowan, asked the Council to allow this collector to continue in office to the 16th prox, which he understood was the date fixed for next Council meeting. His Personal Sureties, for whom Mr. Kelly stated he also appeared, were in favour of this further extension being allowed. While he was not in a position to give a definite undertaking, he could at least assure the Council that every effort would be made in the interval to lodge the full warrant, and the Collector would undertake to conform with the requirements of the Public Bodies Order, 1904 as regards his accounts.

COUNCIL'S RULINGS ON ABOVE MATTERS.

The Council decided, subject to the approval of the Local Government Ministry, to allow ordinary poundage to:-

The Council also decided to issue to the last named his books and warrant for the year ended the 31/3/'25.

In the case of Collector McGowan, the Council further decided to recommend the Local Government Ministry to allow him to continue in office to the 16th prox., on the terms stated by his Solicitor.

COLLECTION DISTRICT No. 16 - ROGER LOGUE.

Mr. Wm. Kelly, Solicitor, on behalf of Collector Logue, informed the Council that this officer would be unable to close his collections for periods ended the 31st March, 1924 on the 30th instant, as already fixed by the Council. This officer experienced considerable difficulty in collecting rates in the district, especially amounts assessed on certain islands. He was, however, prepared to lodge forthwith the full levy for the year ended the 31/3/'24, but a similar undertaking could not be given as regards previous arrears charged in his warrant.

The Secretary stated that he had received a report from the Deputy Checker, Mr. McNelis, stating that Mr. Logue had exhibited considerable slackness in the discharge of his duties, and that if he had set about his work in a proper manner, the whole collection could be completed in a fortnight. Mr. McNelis further stated that the Arranmore, Iniskeeragh and Inisfree Islanders whom he recently called upon, appeared anxious to discharge their liabilities. The Secretary added that he had called the attention of Mr. Logue to this matter, and received from him the following reply:-

"I beg to contradict the statement of Mr. M'Nelis, deputy checker. He stated that he travelled the islands of Inisfree, Iniskeeragh and Arran, and that the people were all anxious to pay their rates. Mr. M'Nelis called in Arran, one day last week, canvassing for county councilships at the forthcoming elections but he did not call in Inisfree or Iniskeeragh. Of course, when he forwarded the report to the County Council Office he was not aware that I had all the ratepayers in Inisfree before the Court three months ago, and the Justice adjourned all the cases to enable them to put their grievances before the County Council. At the last Court in Dungloe a letter was handed to the Justice on behalf of the islanders, and a further adjournment was granted. I objected to this, and asked for a decree, but the Justice refused, but gave them instructions to pay their rates before the next Court. I travelled Arran Islands four times, and gave them every opportunity to pay. The names of all the defaulters are in the hands of Mr. McMullin, Solicitor. I could not get a boat to go to Iniskeeragh. I tried Burtonport and Arran, but the boatmen refused. I then sent the demand notes by post, and offered to meet the islanders in Arran, but they abused the postman, with the result that he had to clear for his life, and returned the demand notes. On the last Court day I had over eighty defaulters summoned, so I think it is hardly fair for Mr. McNelis to say that I am slack in the discharge of my duties."

After considerable discussion, it was decided to recommend the Ministry to allow this Collector to continue in office to the 16th prox. the date fixed for next Council meeting, on the understanding that, in the meantime, he closes the collection for the year ended the 31/3/'24, this not to be considered as relieving him of his legal obligation in respect of previous arrears. The Council, however, would be prepared, on the lodgment of all rates covered by his warrant, to give exceedingly sympathetic consideration to all claims for refunds vouched by the Collector on the prescribed forms.

The

The Council's Solicitor, Mr. McMullin, who was in attendance, informed the Council that Mr. Logue had furnished to him the names of three defaulters only for the purpose of proceedings in the Courts. Civil Bills were issued by him against the parties, but the cases were adjourned, as the Collector stated he was making out a further list which, however, he had not supplied up to the present. Mr. McMullin informed the Collector that he (Mr. McMullin) would not put the County Council to the expense of being legally represented at Dungloe in putting through only three cases.

DISTRICT No. 19 - COLLECTOR MICHAEL O'DONNELL.

The Council's Solicitor informed the Council that there was no Civil Bill Officer for the Divisions of Kilcar, and Carrick, in consequence of which he was unable to institute proceedings against defaulters in the district of Collector Michael O'Donnell as instructed by the Council. On Mr. McMullin's recommendation, the Council unanimously decided to request the Clerk of the Peace, Court House, Lifford, to appoint forthwith a Civil Bill Officer for the areas mentioned.

In consequence of the delay in bringing defaulters to Court, Collector Michael O'Donnell made an application for a further extension of time for the completion of his collection for periods ended the 31/3/'24. The Council, in view of Mr. McMullin's statement in the matter, decided to allow Mr. O'Donnell to continue in office until the 16th prox., the date fixed for next Council meeting.

PAYMENT OF POUNDAGE.

The County Council, on the motion of the Chairman, seconded by Councillor Gallen, unanimously decided to recommend the Ministry of Local Government to sanction payment of ordinary poundage to all Collectors who had closed their accounts to the 30th May, 1925 in respect of years ended the 31/3/'24 and 31/3/'25.

TIME FIXED FOR LODGMENT OF WARRANTS FOR YEAR ENDED 31/3/'25.

The Council decided to extend the time for the completion of the collection of the rate for the above year to the 30/6/'25, subject to the sanction of the Local Government Ministry.

APPLICATION FOR REFUND OF £150 OVERLODGED - COLLECTOR MULHERN.

The Secretary submitted application from Mr. Robert Mulhern, Ardfarna, Bundoran, for refund of £150 overlodged in respect of his collection for the year ended the 31/3/'24. The Secretary stated that this was a duplicate lodgment, but no explanation had been furnished by either the Collector, or Deputy Checker, as to how it occurred. It was decided to refund the amount.

RESIGNATION OF COLLECTOR ROBERT MULHERN.

A letter was submitted from Mr. Robert Mulhern, Ardfarna, Bundoran, tendering his resignation as Collector for Bundoran Rural Electoral Division.

The Secretary intimated that all rates in this district to the 31/3/'24 had been lodged, and that the collecting books for the year ended the 31/3/'25 had not been issued. It was decided to accept the resignation and to advertise the vacancy at the present poundage rate with the view to making a new appointment under the Public Bodies Order, 1904, at the next Council meeting to be held on the 16th June, 1925.

It was decided to strike off as irrecoverable, and refund to Collectors, the rates on direct buildings and on ruins, and such other items as appeared from the evidence furnished to warrant the adoption of that course, the remaining items to be refunded, and carried forward for subsequent collection, subject to the sanction of the Local Government Ministry.

AMENDMENT OF RATE BOOK - SECTION 4 OF THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT (COLLECTION OF RATES) ACT, 1924.

The Secretary submitted correspondence from Collector Hugh McNulty, Knocknafeugh, Ballymore, Letterkenny, from which it appeared that Dr. McCloskey is the occupier of premises in the townland of Carrigart at present rated in the name of the Guardians of Milford Union, and as legal proceedings may have to be resorted to by the Collector to enforce payment of arrears of rates on the property, it would be necessary to have the Rate Book amended under the above Act.

On the motion of the Chairman, seconded by Councillor Bonner, it was decided to authorise the Collector, or his legal adviser, to make the necessary application in the case under the statute quoted.

ADDITIONAL PENNY POUNDAGE FOR YEAR 31/3/'24 - COLLECTOR MICHAEL DEERY.

The Secretary, at the request of Councillor McGoldrick T.D., again brought before the Council, Collector Deery's application for an additional penny poundage on his warrant for the year ended the 31/3/'24. Councillor Quigley stated that this was an exceedingly good Collector, and the Ministry should not withhold sanction of the proposed payment. He moved that the Ministry be again requested to re-consider their decision in the case. This was seconded by Councillor Lanigan, and passed unanimously.

The Secretary said that similar recommendations had been received from Inishowen Rural District Council but the time was too short to have them printed for submission at that meeting.

Councillor Lanigan said that consideration of all the recommendations should be deferred until next meeting.

PROPOSALS FOR WORKS.

Letters from Clerks of certain Rural District Councils in the county relative to the formulating by those bodies of Proposals for Works in view of the fact that their functions in the matter terminated on the 31st March last, were read.

LOUGHDERG ROAD.

A resolution passed by Donegal Rural District Council in regard to the present condition of the Loughderg road having been read Councillor Kelly (H.J.) said this road was in very bad need of repair and urged that something be done at once to have it put in order.

Mr. Caffrey, County Surveyor, suggested that an application be made to the Local Government Ministry (Roads) for a portion of the Trunk Road Grant.

Councillor O'Donnell (J.F.) proposed, Councillor Kelly (H.J.) seconded, and it was unanimously decided to request the Ministry of Local Government (Roads) to give a Grant of £1,000 towards the repair of the road in question. Copy of this resolution was ordered to be sent to each T.D. for Tirconail.

ADDITIONAL AGRICULTURAL GRANT.

The following letter dated 3rd June, 1925, G.26402/1925, Tirconail County, was read from the Local Government Ministry with reference to the additional Agricultural Grant:-

"The County Council should understand that the increase in the agricultural grant promised by the Government had not yet been given statutory effect, and that consequently they have no legal power to apply such grant (if advanced) towards the reduction of the current year's insufficient rates. The Council's resolutions of the 28th April and 26th ultimo are accordingly ultra vires. In the Bill which will shortly become law legalising increase in the grant the Government have decided to take powers not to advance the increased grant towards reducing the rates in counties where sufficient provision for the financial requirements for 1925 - '26 has not otherwise been made. This is the case in Tirconail, where a deficit of over £50,000 may be anticipated, and it should be clearly understood that the supplemental grant will not be advanced in relief of the insufficient rates struck. An immediate special meeting of the Council should forthwith be convened to reconsider the question, and the result should be communicated by telegram."

The Secretary said when he received that letter he wired to the Ministry stating that a meeting of the Council was to be held on the 16th instant. They wired back in reply that that would do, but that the new rate books must be ready by July 15th.

Councillor McGoldrick - It appears from that most confusing and conflicting communication that this season the agricultural grant will not be available for the benefit of this year's rates. When the labourer had got a free breakfast table, and the wealthy man had his income tax reduced, it was felt that a quid pro quo should be given to the agricultural ratepayer.

The Secretary - Between the Council's instructions and the Ministry I do not know what to do. You cannot hold up the rates. Should the Council pass a resolution going back on their original estimates?

The Chairman - I propose that we go back to the old estimates.

Councillor Gallan - Everything stands as it stood before.

The Chairman - Then we stand by the rates already set out.

ROAD CONTRACTORS CLAIMS re DEFERRED PAYMENTS.

Mr. T.E. Conaghan, Solicitor, Londonderry, appeared on behalf of six road contractors from the Fahan, Burt, and Burnfoot districts who, he said, had only received part payment for their work, a certain amount being deferred.

Councillor McGoldrick remarked that in some cases with which he was familiar the contractors had done their utmost to complete their contracts, but had been handicapped owing to their inability to obtain a steam-roller from the County Council. He thought in these circumstances no money should have been deferred.

Mr. Steadman, County Surveyor, said no contractor had been deprived of an opportunity of fulfilling his contract. Some contractors had provided a certain amount of metal, and they were well paid for what they had done. When the work was completed they would be paid in full.

Mr. Conaghan said his clients did not receive a proper opportunity of completing their contracts. Every application that was made for a stone-breaker had been consistently turned down.

Mr. Steadman - There is no obligation on the Council to supply a stone-breaker.

Mr. Conaghan said there was apparently only one way in which this matter could be settled, and that was through a court of law, with the County Surveyor in the witness box.

The Chairman - Take advantage of the court of law and go there.

Mr. Conaghan said he did not see why Mr. Steadman's word should be taken against the word of the contractors.

The Chairman - We have not heard the contractors. We have heard nothing yet but your statement.

Councillor McGoldrick suggested the appointment of arbitrators to consider the matter.

Councillor Myles - If these men have a grievance they will find the District Justice the cheapest arbitrator they can get. There is no reason why we should have a County Surveyor if we have to tell him he is wrong.

Mr. Steadman said it was most unreasonable that he should be called upon without a moment's notice to give information about particular road contracts.

The Chairman - It would be absurd to ask us to appoint an arbitrator over the head of the County Surveyor. I think the court of law is the best course.

Councillor McGoldrick said the County Council, he had no doubt, would have to pay the costs if the cases were taken into court, because he felt sure the contractors would be able to make out a convincing case.

Mr. Steadman - What right have you to anticipate the result in favour of the contractors? Maybe I could make out a case. You have no right to decide the cases until they are tried.

Mr. Conaghan suggested that the County Council should allow their Solicitor to accept short service of a civil bill so that the matter could be decided at the forthcoming Court.

The suggestion was adopted.

STAFF ORGANISATION.

A letter dated 4th June, 1925, G 25790/1925, Tirconail County, was received from the Local Government Ministry, enclosing a copy of their Inspector's report regarding staff organisation in Tirconail.

The Secretary explained that this was just a technical report dealing with the duties of the staff, etc.. He and some members of the staff had a number of objections to lodge against some of the proposals made, and he suggested that he and some of the other parties concerned should take the matter up with the Ministry.

Advertising

Adverting to his report on January 27th last, in which he recommended that three officials, along with Mr. James Kelly and Mr. Patrick McGeehan, be superannuated, the Secretary recommended that Messrs James Dowds, Francis Dorrian, and Hugh Quigley be also superannuated, the superannuation to date from September 1st next. He suggested a scale of payment for any temporary staff that might be appointed.

Councillor Myles congratulated the Secretary on his report, but drew his attention to the fact that in some other counties the appointment of temporary officials had not had a very satisfactory result.

Mr. T. Conaghan, Solicitor, who appeared on behalf of Mr. Dowds, said he was one of the first men to enter the staff, and he had been in the employment of the County Council since its establishment in 1899. It was well defined law that as long as an officer of a County Council was not guilty of misconduct and was efficient he could not be dismissed, nor could he be suspended, unless and until he desired to be relieved of his position.

Councillor Gallen said the matter was not in order for consideration at that meeting as the Inspector's report had not been circulated and the Secretary's report was not on Agenda Paper.

Councillor O'Donnell (J.F.) suggested that the matter be left over for the new Council. Councillor McDermott seconded.

Mr. Conaghan said he had no objection to this course, but would point out that any attempt to oust Mr. Dowds would be strenuously opposed in every way possible within the limits of the law.

The Chairman - You don't mean to tell us that the County Council or any other body of the kind has not power to reduce their staff if they wish to do so.

Councillor McGoldrick proposed as an amendment that the Secretary's recommendations be adopted forthwith.

The Chairman seconded the amendment.

The Secretary remarked that in every other county, except Westmeath, most of the work in connection with the rates was done by temporary officials.

Mr. Thomas Elliott, Solicitor, announced that he appeared on behalf of one of the other officials concerned.

A vote was then taken.

COUNCILLORS Bonner, Lanigan, and McDermott did not vote.

The Chairman declared motion carried.

The Secretary was directed to send a copy of the Inspector's Report re staff organisation and a copy of his (the Secretary's) Report to each member of the new Council.

TIRCONAILL COUNTY COUNCIL SCHOLARSHIPS.

MISUNDERSTANDING REGARDING EXAMINATIONS.

Councillor Gallen referred to the confusion which existed in regard to University Scholarships granted by the County Council. No instructions, he said, had been given at the beginning of the year as to the basis of the examinations, and certain residents of the county who were in educational establishments in the Six Counties were in a quandary as to what examinations they should enter for. Some had entered for the matriculation, because that was the basis on which scholarships were awarded in Fermanagh, and he believed in Mayo. Others in educational establishments in the Six Counties had entered for the matriculation examinations in the Twenty-six Counties, and some had probably had gone on for the senior leaving certificate in the Six Counties. If the senior leaving

leaving certificate was to be taken as the basis on which scholarships were awarded, a number of people would probably be deprived of scholarships. Some action should be taken by the Scholarships Committee to remove the confusion which exists in the minds of students. It might be possible to bring about an arrangement whereby those who entered for the matriculation examination would be made eligible if that were not the proper examination.

The Chairman agreed with the suggestion which was referred to the Scholarships Committee.

COUNTY SCHEME.

A letter dated 24th May, 1925, was read from the Local Government Ministry, stating that the Minister deems it necessary, in view of the provisions of the Local Government Act, 1925, to amend the County Scheme by revoking certain articles and substituting other articles.

MECHANICALLY PROPELLED VEHICLES.

A letter dated 28th May, 1925, was read from the Department of Local Government (Roads) concerning the use of mechanically propelled vehicles on unsuitable public roads, and drawing attention to the provisions of Section 7 (4) of the Roads Act, 1920, and Article 5 (3) of the Heavy Motor Car (Ireland) Order, 1903.

Councillor Gallen - Heavy motor traffic and heavy rail traffic will have to come under one authority.

Councillor Myles - This is a very important subject, and we will have to be perfectly sure of what class of traffic we are dealing with.

The Chairman said they should do something to prevent the roads from being destroyed.

The matter was adjourned until the next meeting.

SICK AND DESTITUTE POOR, ETC..

A letter dated 25th May, 1925, was read from the Local Government Ministry stating that the Government of An Saorstát has established a Commission with the object of devising permanent legislation for the effective and economical relief of the sick and destitute poor, including the insane poor, and to enquire into the laws and administration relating thereto, and enclosing a list of queries which the Commission would be glad if the Tirconnaill County Council would take into consideration and furnish replies thereto as soon as possible. The matter was referred to the new Council for consideration.

PENAL INTEREST ON LOCAL LOANS.

Letter dated 2nd June, 1925, from the Department of Finance, on the subject of the Order made by the Minister under Section 80 (2) of the Local Government (Ireland) Act, 1898 as adapted, providing for the deduction from Local Taxation Grants payable to the Tirconnaill County Council of sums due to the Commissioners of Public Works by the Tirconnaill Mental Hospital Committee and Stranorlar Rural District Council in respect of Penal Interest on Local Loans was read and no action taken

PROPOSED SHELTER WALL AT NEWBRIDGE NEAR RATHMULLAN.

A letter dated 4th June, 1925, was read from the Department of Fisheries, stating that the Minister is prepared to recommend the Government to make a grant of half the cost of constructing a shelter wall at Newbridge, near Rathmullan, provided that such Grant does not exceed £400, and that the remainder of the cost will be met by

by the County Council, and that the plans of the work are approved by this Department.

On the motion of Councillor McGoldrick, seconded by Councillor Bonner, it was unanimously decided to direct Mr. Patrick Dawson, Assistant Surveyor, to prepare plans and an estimate of the probable cost which is not to exceed £700, and that of this amount the Council agree to contribute £350 towards the proposed structure. The latter amount to be obtained by a loan from the Board of Works, repayable, with interest, within a period of 15 years. Plans of the work to be sent to the Department of Fisheries for approval.

Council.

CONVEYANCE OF A PATIENT TO MENTAL HOSPITAL.

A letter was read from Mrs Bridget Gallagher, Meenlara P.C., Tirconail, relative to her claim for a refund of £2:17:0 travelling expenses incurred by her in the conveyance of her daughter (Kate Gallagher) to the Mental Hospital at Letterkenny in July, 1923, as was also a letter from the Superintendent, Civic Guard, Dungloe, stating that Miss Gallagher was committed on 13:7:'23 on Form D and the Gardai supplied the escort on request and that from the Medical Certificate on the Form D it would appear that the committal form for a dangerous lunatic would have been more applicable in this case than the form which was used. It was unanimously decided, on the motion of Councillor O'Donnell (J.F.), seconded by Councillor Gallen, to pay the amount, subject to the sanction of the Local Government Ministry.

HEAVY MOTOR TRAFFIC.

Mr. Steadman, in the course of a report regarding heavy lorry traffic, emphasised the fact that according as sections of the leading roads are improved by grants and county funds so is the speed of such vehicles increased, "and" he added, this factor is naturally augmenting their destructive effect upon roads. One frequently hears the statement that lorry traffic is come to stay. I have no doubt it will so long as the authorities, who might move with effect in the matter, remain apathetic. As pointed out previously, the ratepayers are paying stiffly for maintaining a track for such heavy lorries, and nothing is passed on to them for so doing. Were the heavy lorries taxed in anything like to the proportion of the destruction they cause then the most of such traffic would pass to the natural track already in existence for it -
namely

namely, railways - which have their track both to make and maintain, plus local taxation. Were this brought about, it would not only lessen the drain upon the ratepayers in any county, but the light traffic, which pays the greater proportion of the motor taxes, would reap the advantage of a better surface on roads."

It was ordered that a copy of Mr. Steadman's report be sent to the Roads Department, Dublin, as well as a copy of his former report on the subject, and also to each County Council in Southern Ireland.

LIMITING SPEED OF MOTOR CARS.

ROAD KINCASSLAGH TO CROLLY.

Councillor O'Donnell (J.F.) submitted a letter from the Mullaghduff Central Branch of the Cumann na nGaedheal with reference to the state of the road from Kincasslagh to Crollly, of which residents of the districts complained, as well as the main road from Gweedore to Burtonport and Dungloe. In some places one of those roads was only seven feet wide. Some defective parts of the road were deathtraps to strangers in the winter months. At the same time it was pointed out that money was being lavishly spent on another road. Last year £1,000 was given as a Government Grant for the road complained of, but not one penny was expended on the road. They were now informed that there was another allocation of £500 for this road from Kincasslagh to Crollly, and they requested that the money be devoted to the purpose for which it was given before all the men from the district had gone away to Scotland.

No action was taken, it being pointed out that no money was available at the present for that purpose. As soon as money would be available the road would be attended to.

DISTRICT COURT PREMISES FOR BUNBEG DISTRICT.

Mr. Maguire remarked that, notwithstanding the circumstances of Mr. Mulhern's dismissal, he had paid up everything he owed. He was appointed in the year 1901 and had 22 years service. The sealed order had been issued at a time when there was a little default, but that had been made good.

Mr. H.J. Kelly said when that Council recognised the Dail and repudiated the authority of the British Local Government Department Mr. Mulhern's resignation was in the hands of the Secretary. At every meeting almost Rate Collectors' resignations were being handed in. Some may have been bona fide enough, but others were prompted by no other motives than cowardice. They nearly all refused to take the risks incidental to the collection of the rates at that time. Things were really getting so serious from the point of view of the ratepayers, as well as from the patriotic point of view, that he found it necessary to get a resolution passed to the effect that the Council would refuse to accept any further resignations from Rate Collectors at that time. At that time Mr. Mulhern's resignation was about to come before the Council. He was in ill health, but when it was explained to him that all the collectors were handing in their resignations, and that the Council were consequently in difficulties, like a patriotic man he agreed to continue in office. It would be very unfair to place him in a worse position than the cowards who had resigned, being afraid to face the music, and were now enjoying fat pensions. He proposed that the Secretary ascertain what would be a fair pension and that the Local Government Board be asked to pass it.

Councillor Lanigan seconded the motion which was passed unanimously.

The Secretary said that Mr. Mulhern's average salary and pensionable emoluments for the three years terminating on the quarter next preceeding the date of his dismissal was £49:17:6.

Mr. Maguire asked that 8 years be added to length of service and granted an allowance equal to half of his average salary and pensionable emoluments - £24:18:9.

The Council unanimously resolved that the Local Government Ministry be asked to sanction the latter amount.

A claim by Mr. Francis Dunnion of Stranorlar for a superannuation allowance for services rendered as Collector of Poor Rate in Tirconnah County was also submitted.

The Secretary said that at a meeting of the County Council held on 20th February, 1923, Mr. Dunnion having failed to lodge the outstanding Rates in his collection district for the half year ended the

the 31st March, 1922, and amounting to £831:0:3, and not being in a position to give an undertaking that the amount in question would be lodged with the Treasurer, it was unanimously decided to suspend Mr. Dunnion from Office under the terms of Article 89 of the Public Bodies Order, 1904. In a letter dated 30th March, 1923, the Ministry of Local Government confirmed the suspension.

Mr. P.J. Ward, Solicitor, Letterkenny, who appeared on Mr. Dunnion's behalf, said that Mr. Dunnion was appointed in the year 1906 and had 16 years' service. His average salary and pensionable emoluments for the three years terminating on the quarter next preceding the date of the termination of his duties was £243:0:11. He asked that Mr. Dunnion be granted an allowance equal to $\frac{16}{60}$ of the latter amount.

The Council unanimously resolved to grant a superannuation allowance of £64:16:0 per annum, subject to the sanction of the Local Government Ministry.

CLOSING OF ROADS TEMPORARILY.

A letter dated 23rd May, 1925, was read from the Ministry of Local Government, referring to Section 29 of the Local Government Act, 1925, and enclosing a copy of regulations made by the Minister with regard to the closing of roads temporarily.

APPOINTMENT OF RATE COLLECTOR FOR
No. 2 COLLECTION DISTRICT.

The only application for this appointment was received from Mr. John Gillespie, Ballyshannon, who is the existing Collector for Nos. 1 and 3 Collection Districts in the County.

On the motion of Councillor O'Donnell (J.F.), seconded by Councillor Myles, Mr. Gillespie was unanimously appointed Collector for No. 2 District, subject to the sanction of the Minister for Local Government and Public Health, conditional on his perfecting Personal and Guarantee Society Bonds in sums of £100 and £759 respectively.

Mr. Gillespie named as his Personal Sureties, Messrs George White and Nixon Anderson, Main Street, Ballyshannon, and these the Council considered acceptable on assurances given by members present at the meeting.

The Secretary stated that the Hibernian General Insurance Company Limited would issue the Guarantee Bond on the usual terms.

RATE COLLECTION.

The Secretary submitted return showing the state of the rate collection from which it appeared that sums amounting to £4,898:8:6 and £28,622:14:5 were outstanding on the 16th instant in respect of the years ended the 31:3:'24 and 31:3:'25 respectively. For the former period, Collectors Harvey, J.B. O'Donnell, Logue, Michael O'Donnell and James McGowan have not closed their accounts, and the warrants in these cases for the year ended the 31:3:'25 have not been issued. Collectors Holmes and E.C. O'Donnell, who have received the books for this year, are charged with the collection of previous arrears not recovered by their respective predecessors.

The present condition of the rate collection the Secretary considered exceedingly unsatisfactory, and none of the officers, he reminded the Council, to whom further extensions of the collection period had been given on the 26:5:'25 had closed their accounts. In one of these cases, namely that of Collector McGowan, a special report was being laid that day before the Council.

A letter received from Collector Harvey, in which he stated he had been ill, was read. Collector Logue made a statement regarding the difficulty of collecting, especially on the islands, arrears of rates which had accrued prior to his taking up duty, and which were included in his warrant for the year ended the 31:3:'24. He expressed his willingness to lodge the full sums due on the mainland for the year ended the 31:3:'24 if allowed a reasonable time within which to do so, but could give no undertaking as to the immediate collection and lodgment of rates for this year and previous arrears on the islands under existing conditions.

The Secretary pointed out that Collector Logue's present proposal fell far short of the undertaking given by him to the Council on the 26:5:'25, as recorded in the Minutes of that date.

No communications were received from Messrs J.B. O'Donnell or Michael O'Donnell; as regards the latter, however, the Council's Solicitor stated that legal proceedings were being taken by him against a number of defaulters in the district. For that reason he suggested this officer should be continued for the present. In the district of Collector Harvey, action was pending in the Courts in a specially selected number of cases for recovery of arrears due prior to the 1:4:'23 under the Council's Direct Collection Scheme. It might ultimately be necessary to resort to the Collection of Rates Act, 1924 in this area, and, therefore, he considered that the question of dispensing with Collector Harvey's services should be postponed until the next Council meeting.

After considerable discussion the Council, on the motion of Councillor O'Donnell (J.F.), seconded by Councillor Quigley,

unanimously

unanimously decided to make the following recommendations to the Ministry of Local Government and Public Health:-

- (1) To continue Collector Harvey in office until date of next Council meeting.
- (2) To call on Collector J.B. O'Donnell to lodge his full warrant for the half year ended the 31:3:'24 on or before date of next Council meeting.
- (3) To call on Collector Logue to lodge the total assessments on the mainland portion of his district for the year ended the 31:3:'24 on or before date of next Council meeting, and all previous arrears on the same area on or before the 31:8:'25; and to lodge the full amounts outstanding on the islands in his district for the year ended the 31:3:'24, and previous arrears on or before the 31:8:25.
- (4) To extend the time for the completion of the collection of the rate in the district of Collector Michael O'Donnell for the year ended the 31:3:'24, and previous arrears to the 31:8:'25.

SECRETARY'S REPORT re COLLECTOR MCGOWAN.

Mr. Henry McGowan, brother of Mr. James McGowan, Rate Collector handed in at the County Council Office on the 15:6:'25 the latter's Collecting Books for the year ended the 31:3:'24. I at once telegraphed Mr. Charles Callaghan, Clerk, Rural District Council, Strahorlar, who is the Deputy for the district under the Public Bodies Order, 1904, and on his arrival a careful examination of Mr. McGowan's accounts was made.

Mr. McGowan's warrant for the period in question amounts to £8,212:2:0, of this sum £7,042:0:2 has been lodged leaving £1,170:1:10 outstanding. The latter amount includes £619:8:2 for which the relative official receipts had been removed from the Books prior to their receipt in the Council Office. The official receipts for the balance, amounting to £550:13:8 have not been issued.

The Council hold a Bond in this case from the Hibernian Insurance Company Limited for £3,005, and a Bond under the Public Bodies Order, 1904 from Mr. Henry McGowan, Knock, Ballybofey and Mrs Margaret McGowan, Ballybofey for £1,008.

This morning Mr. Henry McGowan handed in a letter dated the 15th instant from Mr. James McGowan tendering his resignation as Collector.

I have reason to believe that the latter has absconded, and I recommend the Council to suspend him from office under the terms of the Public Bodies Order, 1904, and at the same time to authorise their Solicitor to take such action both civil and criminal, as may be necessary on behalf of the Council under the terms of the Personal and Guarantee Bonds in the case.

I desire to call attention to the fact that some time ago, the Council by resolution relieved the Collector's two original Personal Sureties of their obligations, but the Local Government Ministry has not sanctioned this change. I suggest that the Council's Solicitor be requested to advise the Council as to the present legal position of these former sureties in relation to the Collector's default.

COUNCIL'S DECISION IN THE ABOVE MATTER.

On the motion of Councillor Bonner, seconded by Councillor McGoldrick T.D., it was unanimously decided:-

- (1) To suspend Mr. James McGowan from office as Rate Collector under Art.89 of the Public Bodies Order 1904
- (2) To call on the sureties to lodge the outstanding rates in the district.

- (3) To instruct their Solicitor to take such action, both civil and criminal, as may be necessary under the Guarantee Bond and the two Personal Bonds referred to in the Secretary's report.
- (4) To authorise the Secretary to prosecute inquiries, and furnish all such evidence to the Council's Solicitor as the latter may require in the case.

EXTENSION OF TIME FOR COMPLETION OF
1924 - 1925 COLLECTION OF RATES.

A letter dated the 10:6:'25 (G26639/1925) was submitted from the Local Government Ministry sanctioning an extension of time to the 30:6:'25 for the closing of the 1924 - '25 warrants. No further leniency, the Ministry stated, should be shown to the Collectors who have not closed by that date. T.D.,

On the motion of Councillor Myles, seconded by Councillor Gallen, it was decided to further extend the time for the lodgment of these warrants to the 31:7:'25, this also to apply to the arrears for the period ended the 31:3:'24 in the cases of Collectors Wm. Holmes and E.C. O'Donnell.

re PROPOSED APPOINTMENT OF Mr. HUGH DORRIAN Junr.
AS RATE COLLECTOR FOR No. 29 DISTRICT.

A letter dated the 10:6:'25 (G26523/1925) was submitted from the Local Government Ministry enclosing form of Declaration under Section 71 of the Local Government Act, 1925, and stating that Mr. Hugh Dorrian junior, should be required to provide at least Personal Security in the sum of £200. The Ministry also called attention to Mr. Dorrian's answers to query 7 (a) and (b) in form relating to his proposed appointment, and intimated that it had been brought to the Department's notice that Mr. Dorrian is engaged in retail trade and resides on licensed premises.

The Secretary stated that he had transmitted copy of the Ministry's communication to Mr. Dorrian whose reply dated the 13:6:'25 is as follows:-

"Your letter to hand on the 12th instant. The Minister for Local Government has been noticed that I am engaged in retail trade and reside on licensed premises. Well, as regards that it is my father who has the licensed premises and I am only there as a boarder for the present. My trade is motoring. I will attend at meeting on the 16th instant, and I will give you full particulars re above on that day."

Mr. Dorrian, who was in attendance, stated he was looking out for a house in which to reside, and was prepared to subscribe the required declaration and provide the increased personal security.

On the motion of Councillor McDermott, seconded by Councillor Lynch, it was decided to request the Ministry to sanction the appointment of Mr. Dorrian on the foregoing terms.

ADDITIONAL PENNY POUNDAGE FOR
YEAR 31:3:'24 - COLLECTOR MICHAEL DEERY.

A letter was submitted from the Local Government Ministry dated 26:5:'25 (G24823/1925) enclosing copy of communication addressed to Collector Michael Deery refusing to sanction an additional penny poundage on his warrant for the above year. The Council decided to take no further action in the matter.

CLAIM FOR POUNDAGE BY Ex-COLLECTOR McCOLE.

A claim by Mr. James McCole, Ex Collector of Poor Rate, for poundage on £1,588:4:6 rates collected and lodged for the half year ended the 31st March, 1922, was submitted, but consideration of the matter

matter was deferred until the completion of the collection of the arrears of rates in the district.

EMBEZZLEMENT OF COUNCIL FUNDS.

The Secretary suggested that the Council give him authority to swear, at any time, information against any officer of the Council whom he is satisfied has embezzled funds belonging to the Council. Under the existing procedure he has to submit information in the first instance to the Council, and await instructions, before taking action.

The Council recommended that the matter be referred to the new Council at their first meeting.

APPLICATION BY COLLECTOR FARREN FOR INCREASED POUNDAGE.

Collector John Farren, Buncrana, applied for an increase in his poundage from 8d to 1/-.. The matter was referred to the new Council at their first meeting for consideration.

FAILURE OF THE CLERK OF THE RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL, DUNFANAGHY, TO FURNISH RETURNS OF SEEDS SUPPLIED TO OCCUPIERS AND CULTIVATORS.

The Secretary stated that Mr. James Boyle, Clerk of the Rural District Council, Dunfanaghy, has not furnished returns of seeds supplied to occupiers and cultivators in Dunfanaghy Rural District under the Council's Scheme of last year. He was repeatedly called upon to supply these returns, and the matter had been reported to the Minister for Local Government and Public Health, and to the Local Government Inspector. The amounts due by the persons who received the seeds require to be inserted in the Rate Book for the current year, and it is absolutely essential that the returns be furnished without further delay. He recommended the Council to instruct their Solicitor to take such legal action as would compel the Clerk of the District Council to discharge his obligations in this matter forthwith.

On the motion of Councillor Kelly (H.J.), seconded by Councillor McGoldrick T.D., it was decided to adopt the Secretary's recommendation.

RATES ON HOUSES OF TOWN TENANTS, BALLYSHANNON.

The Secretary submitted the following letter dated the 12/6/'25 (H.457/10960/1925, Ballyshannon Town Commissioners) addressed by the Minister for Local Government and Public Health to the Town Clerk, Ballyshannon

With reference to the Memorial submitted to the Ballyshannon Town Commissioners by the tenants of certain houses provided by the Commissioners under the housing of the Working Classes (Ireland) Acts relative to the payment of the rates assessable on the houses, I am directed by the Minister for Local Government and Public Health to state that it is open to the Commissioners with the acquiescence of the County Council, to make arrangements for the collection of the Poor Rate in weekly instalments by the
Rent

Rent Collector. Such instalments, however, should not be included in the Rent and accounts should be kept by the Rent Collector for crediting the tenants with the instalments so paid. All sums collected by the Rent Collector in respect of Poor Rate should be lodged by him forthwith with the County Council.

It is also open to the Commissioners to increase the weekly rents so as to include the Town Rate.

The Council decided to acquiesce in the arrangement proposed, except that the instalments of rates received by the Rent Collector instead of being lodged direct with the County Treasurer, should be handed over to the Council's Rate Collector whose official receipt will be a complete discharge of each tenant's liability.

The Secretary was authorised to pay the fees prescribed under the Public Bodies Order, 1904 to Deputy Checkers in respect of Collection districts in which Collectors accounts had been completed to date.

COLLECTION DISTRICT No. 35.

The Council, on the motion of Councillor Bonner, seconded by Councillor McGoldrick T.D., directed the Secretary to issue an advertisement inviting applications for the position of Rate Collector for the above district at the existing poundage, the appointment to be made by the new Council on the 6th prox.

It was decided that the person appointed must provide security on the terms already fixed.

Re APPOINTMENT OF CIVIL BILL OFFICER FOR DISTRICTS OF KILCOR AND CARRICK.

Arising out of entry on Minutes of Proceedings of the Council on the 26/5/'25, the Secretary submitted letter from the Clerk of the Peace, Lifford, stating that the appointment of Civil Bill Officer did not rest with him, but with the Circuit Court Judge to whom he would mention the matter.

The Council's Solicitor advised that the matter be referred to the Minister for Justice, and the Council decided to adopt that course.

The Secretary submitted schedules of uncollected rates for the following Collection Districts:-

It was decided to strike off as irrecoverable, and refund to Collectors, the rates on derelict buildings and on ruins, and such other items as appeared from the evidence furnished to warrant the adoption

adoption of that course. As regards the claim made by Collector Sweeney to treat all items on his returns as irrecoverable, the Chairman intimated that this course could not be followed. He considered, however, that the rates on vacant District Council Cottages might be returned to the Ministry as uncollectible.

UNCOLLECTED RATES - DISTRICT OF COLLECTOR
J. B. O'DONNELL.

A letter was submitted from the Minister for Local Government and Public Health dated the 12:6:'25 (G.28353/1925) intimating that he was not satisfied with the reasons given for the non-collection of the amounts set out on the schedules furnished by Collector J. B. O'Donnell for the half year ended the 30:9:'23, and that he could not approve of the items being struck off as irrecoverable. He would not, however, object to refund the amounts provided the latter were carried forward for future collection, and the circumstances of the islanders further investigated.

The Secretary stated that the rates on Tory, and certain other islands in this Collection District had been treated as irrecoverable since the coming into operation of the Local Government Act 1898, and he was assured that the Grand Jury, in their time, had also failed to levy the amounts.

The question of resorting to extreme measures to recover these rates had been considered in 1913, and although arrangements were actually made, through the former Local Government Board, with the British Admiralty to provide a Gun-boat, or War-ship, to afford protection to the former Collector, the project was finally abandoned.

It was decided to return Collector O'Donnell's sheets to the Ministry with a recommendation that the Council's rulings thereon be sanctioned.

I beg to state that owing to the County Stone Breakers being engaged at Trunk Road Grants some of the contractors stone could not be broken in time for the Rural District meetings many payments had to be deferred. Since these meetings took place the stone breaker has been available and the contracts in many cases have been completed.

Pending the final transfer on 1st October next the Minister desires that the Boards of Health and the County Councils should consider the best and most economical course to be followed for the future to deal with the transferred business, having due regard to the number of existing officials, their capabilities and the possibility of substantially reducing the number of employees by suitable amalgamation of the remaining functions. The Secretary was directed to inform the Minister that the Council purpose appointing a Committee to deal with the matter.

ACCOMMODATION FOR ADVANCED CASES OF TUBERCULOSIS.

Extract sent to Councilor Myles 17/7/25

A letter dated 15th June, 1925, was read from the Local Government Ministry forwarding, for the information of the Tirconail County Council, copy of a letter which the Minister has addressed to the County Tirconail Tuberculosis Committee relative to the question of the provision of accommodation for advanced cases of Tuberculosis in connection with the County Tuberculosis Scheme, and requesting that a report may be obtained from the County Tuberculosis Officer regarding any existing premises which may be available at a suitable centre in the county for the purpose referred to.

The Secretary said that on receipt of the Ministry's letter he wrote to the Tuberculosis Officer on the matter and received a report which he (the Secretary) read.

Councillor McCreadie said he objected to Milford Workhouse being taken over for the reception of Tuberculous patients as there was not a water supply.

Councillor Gallen thought that patients could be treated at other institutions in the county, especially at Glenties, where an adequate water supply was now available.

On the motion of Councillor McCreadie, seconded by Councillor Gallen, it was decided to send the Ministry's letter and Tuberculosis Officer's report to the County Board of Health for consideration.

A letter dated 15th June, 1925, was read from the Local Government Ministry, Housing Department, relative to the Local Assistance Scheme of the Tirconail County Council under the Housing (Building Facilities) Act, 1924, and enclosing a list of persons to whom certificates of approval have been issued under the Act in respect of the erection of houses in the Council's area.

ROADS IN ARRANMORE AND INISFREE ISLANDS.

In connection with a letter from Mr. John Ward, Gortgara, Arranmore, relative to the condition of a road in the townland of Falgowan, Mr. Caffrey, County Surveyor, reported that this refers to the connecting up of two roads. One of these roads was made some few years since out of the White Cross funds; the other is the county road from Leabgarrow to the Lighthouse. FINANCIAL POSITION.

The Secretary submitted a statement showing the financial position of the Council. Against that there was a sum of £33,888:1:5, representing the outstanding rates, and a sum of £26,407:17:6 due in grants, leaving a debit balance of £9,348:16:8. The Secretary - We are not taking any account of the rates of the current year at all. Neither are we taking into consideration the expenses for the current year.

Councillor O'Donnell - There were some of the warrants never in the hands of the collectors.

The Secretary - For 1925 some of the warrants are not in the hands of the collectors.

Councillor O'Donnell said that many people would pay the rates if they were demanded, but since the 1925 warrant would not be given to the collector until he completed his previous collection a large amount must remain outstanding, although the people were willing to pay.

DAMAGE BY HEAVY MOTOR TRAFFIC.

A letter dated 28th May, 1925, was read from the Department of Local Government, Roads, concerning the use of mechanically propelled vehicles on unsuitable public roads and drawing attention to the provisions of section 7 (4) of the Roads Act, 1920, and article V (3) of the Heavy Motor Car (Ireland) Order, 1905.

Councillor Gallen said that heavy motor traffic was damaging even the roads being worked upon under their trunk schemes. Even in the case of roads where the work was well done the roads were getting picked up by reason of this heavy traffic. Indeed, such was the damage that the Council would have to consider whether they should stop the work on the present trunk scheme and adopt some new scheme. The question of the diversion of this traffic would have to be considered, and whether there should be some common authority over the railways and the roads for the allocation of the traffic to the railways and the roads. Rolling which had been done recently, and which should have kept all right for a year or two, was all getting picked up. Of course, the extreme dry weather had something to do with this, but it did not account for all the damage.

In reply to Mr. Caffrey, Councillor Gallen mentioned a road in his district where this was happening.

Mr. Caffrey said all the traffic which was operating in that part of the county came from the Six-County area, and came along that road. It was altogether unsuitable for it. It was very narrow, and there was an alternative road across the Clady Bridge through Tyrone. He thought the Free State would be the responsible party for getting the traffic diverted.

Councillor McIvor said it was not a question of diverting traffic. For instance, in Inishowen they could not divert it. The roads were not fit to carry the 7 or 8 ton lorries that were using them. The diverting of traffic from one or two roads would not solve this problem. The question of the heavy lorry traffic would have to be tackled. It was too big a question for them to attempt to deal with it that day. With regard to the diverting of the traffic there were a few roads in his district where the Six-County traffic could be diverted. That would not solve the problem which extended from one end of the county to the other. The best thing to do would be to appoint a committee to deal/

deal with it in a level-headed, businesslike way. The ratepayers were paying rates for the railways, and maintaining roads which were being used by the heavy motors to oust the railways.

Councillor Gallagher (Francis) considered that too much stress was being laid on the damage done by the heavy motors, but there was no proof that the damage was being done by the heavy lorries. The Council should make certain that it was the heavy lorries that were doing the damage before taking any definite action. The ordinary cars did a lot of damage too.

Mr. Steadman, County Surveyor, said he thought the best way to get at the problem would be for the Council to get into communication with other Councils whose roads suffered much in the same way. It was only after these various County Councils had gone into the matter that they would get uniformity of opinion. Something should be done that would influence the Government to take action.

Councillor Baxter said the speed of the vehicles had much more to do with the damage than the weight. A reduction of speed would make a tremendous difference.

On the suggestion of Councillor Gallen it was decided to ask the Council's representatives to bring the matter before the General Council of County Councils, with a view to uniformity of action, and subsequently the Council's Road Committee, in consultation with the surveyors could deal with the matter.

GRANITE QUARRIES AT BALLYWHORISKEY.

Councillor Baxter referred to the Granite Quarries at Ballywhoriskey, Fannet, and said that at present this industry was greatly handicapped owing to the want of explosives; only a small quantity at a time could be procured. This did not enable the Company to carry on except at a substantial loss. In consequence there was a likelihood of the workers being paid off. Moreover, the Company had to bear the expense of transporting the explosives from Buncrana which is the nearest Depot at which explosives can be released. There were very few industries in the County, and those in existence should be fostered and helped in every possible way.

The Secretary submitted letters received from the Council's Solicitor and the Hibernian Insurance Company Limited, referring to the default of Mr. James McGowan, former Collector of Poor Rate in the County.

The former intimated that he had called upon the Personal Sureties to lodge the amount of their bond forthwith, and the latter stated that they had entered into an arrangement with Mr. McGowan's wife and brother under which they were prepared to send cheque for £620 approximately in settlement on the understanding that poundage, registration and jurors' fees be set off against the amount of the deficiency when the latter has been definitely ascertained.

The Council decided to accept from the Company named the sum of £683:0:8 in payment of sums for which official receipts have been removed from Collecting Books, and items paid by cheque or otherwise to McGowan for which official receipts have not been issued. This claim, it is to be clearly understood, is made on account, pending the completion of inquiries which the Secretary is instituting in accordance with instructions given at previous Council meeting.

As regards the balance of the outstanding rates in the district and amounting to £487:1:2, it was decided, subject to the sanction of the Local Government Ministry, to include in the warrant of the new Collector all sums of which evidence of payment to the former Collector has not been furnished to the County Office.

66 REVISIONS OF VALUATIONS AND CHANGES OF NAMES.

The Secretary informed the Council that all lists of tenements requiring revision and changes of names furnished by rate collectors ratepayers and others had been forwarded by him to the Commissioner of Valuation, Dublin. Four Collectors, one of whom only recently entered upon his duties, had not supplied returns for their areas. It was decided to request them to attend to this matter forthwith.

67 ARREARS OF RATES FOR PERIODS ENDED THE 31st MARCH, 1924.

The Secretary submitted return showing the state of the rate collection in the county which, as elsewhere recorded in Minutes of this date, was referred to Finance Committee for consideration. Collector Logue, it was pointed out, had not lodged his recent collections amounting to £87:16:11, as ascertained by the Deputy for Glenties Rural District, and the Council's proposal at their previous meeting regarding the lodgment of rates by him for the mainland portion of his district had not been carried out.

Collector Logue, who was in attendance, stated there was a misunderstanding with the Bank through which his remittances were usually made, and that he would comply with the Council's requirements/

I wrote to each of these demanding payment of the respective amounts due and after issued a number of Civil Bills, which I experienced considerable in having served - I had to get permission from the District Justice to employ Mr. Patrick Greene, Glenties, and I had to pay him special fees.

I obtained Decrees against all who had not settled at the last Killybegs District Court and as soon as I receive same back from the District Justice duly signed I shall lodge with the Sheriff for execution.

I have still a few Civil Bills to issue in cases where it will be necessary to apply to have the Rate Book amended, for which procedure I have not yet received sufficient particulars.

As a result of my efforts, I have collected to date a sum of £372-5-3, all of which I have passed on to the Collector".

The Council's Solicitor inquired if the Council desired him to take legal proceedings in additional cases of default but the Chairman considered that this was unnecessary and that the Collector ought now to be in a position to recover and lodge forthwith all outstanding Rates in his district. The Council concurred in this view.

Collector Michael O'Donnell proposed additional Personal Sureties for £400 in accordance with Finance Committee's recommendation of the 16th July, 1925, which was subsequently sanctioned by Ministry of Local Government and Public Health.

FAILURE OF CLERK, DUNFANAGHY RURAL DISTRICT
COUNCIL TO FURNISH REQUIRED RETURNS ETC., &
ACTION OF COUNTY COUNCIL THEREON.

A letter, dated 28th July, 1925, G.30371/25, Dunfanaghy Rural District, from the Local Government Ministry transmitting copy of a letter bearing same date and number addressed by the Local Government Ministry to the Tirconail County Board of Health regarding the conduct of the Clerk of the late Dunfanaghy Rural District Council and requesting that the matter be urgently dealt with, was read, as was also a letter from Mr. Vincent P. McMullin, Solicitor, Ballybofey, stating that a summons has been issued against Mr. James Boyle of Falcarragh for failure to make the necessary Returns under Seed Supply Scheme and that the summons is for hearing at Falcarragh on 25th August. Mr. McMullin stated that Mr. Boyle had been written to in regard to the matter and he had not replied.

Regarding the striking of the Seed Rate, Mr. McMullin wrote stating he had gone into the matter carefully, and in his opinion, the striking of the Rate cannot legally be held over until the Financial Year 1926 - 1927 in view of the conditions laid down by Regulation 9 of the Scheme which is mandatory and must be observed; also that it is impossible to strike a special Rate for the current financial year in the absence of the necessary particulars and for the reasons given above and adding that under Section 3 of the Seeds Supply Act, the Minister is given very wide powers and on his (Mr. McMullin's) interpretation of this section, he is of opinion that the Minister has power to sanction the striking of this special Rate for a year other than periods specified in the Act. He (Mr. McMullin) therefore advised that the Council should immediately seek the Minister's sanction to the striking of this special Rate for the financial year 1926 - 1927.

On the motion of Councillor O'Donnell, seconded by Councillor Cole, it was unanimously decided to act on their Solicitor's advice.

The Secretary read a report of the Department Inspector, who interviewed the Clerk in June last, in which reference was made to irregular and inefficient management of the duties of his office, and mentioned that the Ministry suggested the appointment of a small committee to consider, in the light of the circumstances, the question of dismissing Mr. Boyle.

The Council, having regard to Mr. Deery's satisfactory record, had, on several occasions, recommended the Ministry to allow him this additional remuneration, but the former refused to accede to this request, pointing out, at the same time, that this official's ordinary poundage had been increased in 1923 from 8d to 1/-.

It was explained that Mr. Deery had lodged by the end of July 1924, £4,338:2:11 out of a total warrant of £4,452:7:10. He submitted return of items making up the balance of £114:4:11, and requested that these cases he referred to the Under Sheriff for recovery under the Local Government (Collection of Rates), Act, 1924. This £114:4:11 included £80:16:2 due to Mr. Deery himself in respect of previous arrears which he had lodged to the credit of the County Council, the balance, amounting to £33:8:9, representing rates due to the Council for the year ended the 31:3:'24.

Collector Deery's application, with similar applications from other Collectors, was brought to the notice of the then Local Government Inspector (Mr. O'Farrell) who expressed the view that the Act applied to rates due to the Council, and not to rates due to Collectors only, and this interpretation of the statute was subsequently given by the Ministry. The Standing Committee of the Council on the 13:8:'24 directed, however, that Mr. Deery's application be brought specially before the Ministry by the Secretary and this was done later in the same month, but the Department intimated that the claim could not be entertained. The Standing Committee at their following meeting held on the 27:8:'24 were so informed, and decided to take no further action. On the following day (28:8:'24), the official receipts and summaries furnished by Collector Deery were returned to him with covering letter detailing the position.

Councillor McIvor said that Collector Deery, who was a very efficient Collector, was not fairly treated in being deprived of this additional remuneration amounting to £18:11:0. Although his poundage had been increased from 8d to 1/- he would have received, under the Ministry's General sanction of September, 1924, this extra allowance had the balance of £114:9:11 been lodged at the end of August, 1924. He, accordingly, proposed that/

Extract sent to Local Govt Ministry

Councillor Clarke referred to the decision of the Local Government Ministry in regard to the Council's travelling expenses under Section 63 (I) of the Local Government Act, 1925. Councillor McNulty seconded.

Mr. Simms, Solicitor, Strabane, appeared in support of the Motion.

The Council's Solicitor made a statement in support of the course he had taken.

Councillor Baxter said the Council should support their officials and moved as an amendment that the Council allow the Law to take its course.

Councillor Gallen said it was a farce constituting that Council a Court of Appeal in connection with these cases. Councillor Quigley seconded the amendment.

HEAVY MOTOR LORRIES.

In accordance with Notice of Motion Councillor McNulty moved:- "That the County Council in accordance with the provisions of section 7 (4) of the Roads Act, 1920, apply to the Minister for an Order restricting the driving of motor lorries exceeding three tons laden weight, on certain roads throughout the County, to be selected by the Roads Committee, on the grounds that these roads are unsuitable for vehicles of this weight."

Councillor McNulty said this question of heavy traffic must be dealt with or they would never get the roads into condition. He/

He suggested that the roads to be selected be :-

Derry	to	Buncrana
"	"	Letterkenny
"	"	Stranorlar
Lifford	"	Stranorlar
"	"	Letterkenny

Councillor McIvor suggested that Councillor McNulty alter the weight from 3 tons laden to 4. The latter agreed.

Councillor Clarke said consideration of the matter should be held over until the Advisory Committee had given their decision in regard to it.

Councillor Mahony disagreed, and said anything they did might strengthen the hands of the Commission. They should make the resolution to apply only to lorries of the weight mentioned which had not Free State licences, otherwise it would be a hardship on the people of the county who had these lorries in connection with mills etc..

Councillor McIvor disagreed with Councillor Mahony as he held that it would cut both ways.

Mr. James Dunlevy, Solicitor, appeared on behalf of the employees of the Donegal Railway in support of the resolution. The roads of the county, he said, were being seriously injured by these heavy lorries, and the Council were deriving no benefit from them. Large petrol lorries belonging to English Companies, with agents in Derry, were using the roads. These companies paid no income tax on their sales or the profits they made in Donegal. All this heavy traffic was coming from the Six Counties. For the last nine months the expenditure on the railway exceeded the revenue. The result would be that if this continued the railway employees would be thrown idle.

Councillor Cole said the excessive railway rates had been the cause of the introduction of this motor traffic, as well as the delay and inconvenience occasioned in connection with the delivery of goods sent by rail.

Mr. Dunlevy said if the railways got the natural traffic the rates could be reduced.

Councillor Gallagher (F.) said he understood Councillor McNulty's object was to prevent heavy lorries from the Six Counties using Free State roads for which they paid no taxes. Now Mr. Dunlevy he introduced the railway aspect, and this would injure the motion more than anything else. It was the antics of the railway companies and their management that had been the cause of the development of motor traffic in Ireland. It was well known that railway companies gave preferential rates. Take the railway rate into Donegal: They gave a cheap rate to one business man and not to another, and the natural result was that the business man in the outlying districts worked the traffic within itself without reference to the railway company. Again, the railway company brought traffic from Derry to Donegal, a distance of fifty miles, at an 8s rate, while they charged a 7s 9d rate for traffic from Donegal to Mountcharles, a distance of three miles. They must recognise that motor traffic was a sign of advancing civilisation. It would be a serious thing if the Donegal County Council took this step, especially when they remembered the action of the Free State Government in asking the County Councils to consider the matter, and then made a general regulation that henceforth vehicles weighing nine tons and over would be prevented from using the roads. Mr. Dunlevy had gone the wrong way of getting the support of that Council for the resolution, for the railway companies' one aim and object seemed to be to keep Derry as the supplier for Donegal.

He/

He moved as an amendment that consideration be deferred for three months, and that in the meantime the matter be considered by the Roads Committee. Councillor Cole seconded.

Mr. Dunlevy said they could not make comparison in regard to rates for big traffic and those for very small traffic.

Mr. Steadman, County Surveyor, said if they strengthened the roads to enable the heavy motor traffic to use them they would have to find a sum running into millions, otherwise an alternative scheme would have to be produced.

Councillor Breanan said the railways deserved no sympathy.

Councillor O'Donnell said unless a stop was put to this traffic both the railways in the county would be white elephants, and that would destroy the fishing industry on the western seaboard for motors would be of no use to that industry.

Councillor Myles said the speed of the lorries did more harm than the actual weight.

The Secretary said that in the event of the County Council passing a resolution requesting the Minister to make an order, the Ministry would subsequently hold an inquiry.

ARTERIAL DRAINAGE ACT, 1925.

FORMING OF DRAINAGE DISTRICTS.

Petitions were submitted (accompanied by Ordnance Sheets) pursuant to section 2 (2) of the above Act to the Tirconail County Council from certain residents in the undermentioned areas, and also reports on the matter from Messrs Steadman and Caffrey, County Surveyors.

Petitions, Ordnance sheets & County Surveyors Reports sent to Board of Works 21/11/25

- (a) Residents between Churchhill and Kilmacrenan for the drainage of the rivers Glashagh and Lennon;
- (b) Residents of Magheracar, Bundoran, for draining of river Drowes;
- (c) Residents of Corry, Portsalon, for drainage of river between the points marked A and B on ordnance sheet.

It was unanimously resolved on the motion of Councillor Doherty (E.) seconded by Councillor MacCreadie, that this Council, having considered the reports of their County Surveyors, request the Board of Works to inquire into the foregoing schemes for forming Drainage Districts under said Act; further that this Council undertake to maintain the Drainage Districts if they are formed.

A Petition was submitted (accompanied by ordnance sheet) pursuant to section 2 (2) of the foregoing Act from certain residents in the townlands of Carrowcannon and Falcarragh. Mr. Steadman, County Surveyor, reported that when his Assistant went to inspect the place it was flooded consequently he was unable to submit a report re the scheme. It was decided to postpone consideration of the matter until next meeting.

281 FINANCIAL ACCOMMODATION OF LOCAL AUTHORITIES.

A circular letter, dated 23rd September, 1925, G.44428/25, was read from the Local Government Ministry re Financial Accommodation of Local Authorities, and letter from Manager, Hibernian Bank Limited, Letterkenny, in regard to advances in the accounts of the County Council.

The Secretary said that the Ministry in their circular letter pointed out that this question has been receiving careful consideration and has been the subject of protracted negotiation with the "Irish Banks Standing Committee" and that the latter have now agreed that, as from the 1st October, 1925, in cases where overdraft accommodation is granted with the sanction of the Minister, the normal rate of interest will be $\frac{1}{2}\%$ under the existing discount rate, subject to a minimum charge of 4% and that where debit and credit balances exist simultaneously in any case the credit balance will, within the limit of the overdraft, be set off against it prior to assessment of interest.

If the balance is in favour of the credit account, interest at the deposit rate will be allowed on the difference and this rate of interest will also apply to credit balances where there is no overdraft.

The Committee, however, make the stipulation that this arrangement is not to be applied in any case to more than two current accounts.

The Ministry also point out that such separate accounts as may be necessary or prescribed for the due conduct of the Council's business should continue to be kept in their own books, but in their relation with their Bankers it should as far as possible be the Council's aim to reduce the number of separate Bank Accounts so as not to exceed the number now stipulated by the Committee.

Councillor Gallen said it would be very necessary to have only two accounts and he moved a resolution accordingly which was seconded by the Chairman and unanimously passed.

282 ABOLITION OF RURAL DISTRICT COUNCILS;
PAYMENT OF DEBTS ETC..

The Minutes of previous meeting were unanimously confirmed.

COUNTY DONEGAL AND THE BOUNDARY AWARD.

Councillor Mahony moved the suspension of the Standing Orders
to bring before the Council a matter of grave and serious import-
ance. Councillor MacCreadie seconded and leave having been
granted Councillor Mahony moved :-

(1) "That this Council protest against the proposed dismem-
berment of this county said to have been contemplated by Judge
Feetham and Mr. Fisher, which would have been a violation of the
overwhelming wishes of the inhabitants, who have demonstrated at
every opportunity for generations their desire to be governed by a
Dublin Parliament, and would be a travesty of every geographic
and economic consideration.

That we approve Dr. MacNeill's action in retiring and putting
an end to a Commission that had clearly shown its disregard for
those terms of reference.

(2) That we beg to thank Monaghan Council for the moral
support they have given us by their protest against the suggested
partition of our county, and we protest with equal vehemence
against the proposed violation of the wishes of the inhabitants in
their county. We pledge them our support in any action that they
may be called upon to take.

Councillor Mahony said according to the 1911 census the Old
Strabane and Derry No. 2 districts which they presumed were going
to be dismembered by the Commission both showed a majority
Catholic population, and he believed this majority was considerably
increased since. A more recent test was that provided by the
County Council elections in July last. In the Letterkenny
district, which consisted of the largest portion of East Donegal,
the first preference votes recorded from what he might actually
call Nationalist members were 4,184, and the first preference votes
for what he might call Unionists 2,354. Amongst the latter he
had included Mr. Patterson, who had stood as an Independent and
who, he was sure, received a great number of Nationalist or
Catholic votes. Making allowance for that there was a clear two
to one majority in that district, which they were led to believe
was to be attempted to be tampered with by the Boundary Commission.

Councillor Doherty (Edward) seconding the motion, said he
depreciated the introduction of politics into their meetings,
because/

because the ratepayers sent them there to transact the business of the county. This, however, was an economic question. If they lost East Donegal it meant the loss of £60,000 or £70,000 worth of rates every year, and they could not carry on the administration of their public bodies if they lost that sum.

The Chairman put the resolution to the meeting and declared it passed unanimously.

The consideration of a Notice of Motion by Councillor McFadden "That the rebuilding of the County House be put in hands at once" was deferred for a month.

359 COLLECTION OF RATES.

Councillor O'Donnell written to 26.11.25 to prepare a Report

In accordance with Notice of Motion Councillor O'Donnell moved - "That in view of the present financial state of this County and, the enormous amount of rates outstanding, which is principally due to the conditions under which the Rate Collectors hold their appointments, I will move at the next meeting of the County Council, or cause some other member to do so in my absence as follows:-

"That we the members of the Tirconaille County Council as representatives of the ratepayers request the Local Government Board, in the interest of the finances of this county, the ratepayers and economy to alter the present conditions under which the Rate Collectors are appointed and to revert to the system under which similar appointments were made before the passing of the Local Government Act, 1898; failing this the rates be collected on the same principal as the Land Commission Annuities."

After some discussion Councillor Gallen moved that the matter be referred to the Finance Committee, and that the question of Government Grants be also considered and be brought before the notice of the public Councillor O'Donnell having agreed to this course. Councillor MacCreadie seconded the amendment which was unanimously adopted.

360 SHELTER AT NEWBRIDGE.

MESSRS SAMUEL AND R. S. WATTERS.

Mr. William Kelly, Solicitor, Letterkenny, referred to the Committee's recommendations in regard to the pension claims of Messrs Samuel and R.S. Watters for services rendered as Clerks of Milford and Letterkenny Rural District Councils respectively and said that he appeared in support of these claims.

The former gave as the date of his appointment December, 1888 and the latter September, 1898. These are the correct dates of their appointments as Union Clerks, and he believed Executive Sanitary Officers. The Local Government Act, 1898, in its main provisions, did not come into force until 1st April, 1899, and as the Executive Sanitary Officership was a conjoint appointment with the Union Clerkship in respect of which they are already receiving pensions, he was of opinion that this is the date from which their pension claims as Rural District Council Clerks should be based, and he added that Mr. R.S. Watters informed him that some of the provisions affecting his duties in connection with the 1898 Act came into operation on 1st April, 1898 but he (the Secretary) was unable to verify this. If it is so his pension claim would be correct.

On the motion of Councillor MacCreadie, seconded by Councillor Mahony, it was decided to refer the claims back to the Finance Committee for reconsideration.

Mplhern, Town Clerk, Ballyshannon, stating that the Town Commissioners request the County Council to reconsider their decision in regard to the charges made by Messrs Myles and Company for the supply of Electricity for street lighting and to private consumers. No action was taken.

as the Judgment of the Court accords with the advice which the Minister has obtained on the question of an appeal to a Circuit Court from a Dismiss by a District Court in such cases he is not prepared to seek the authority of the Minister for Finance for the institution and carrying on of the further proceedings contemplated by the Council.

Dear Sir,

There was a prosecution by you, as the Local Taxation Officer, against Mr. Rock, under the Provisions of Section 13 of the Roads Act, 1920, and Section 14 of the Finance Act, 1922, for using a Motor Vehicle, RI 305, which was registered as a Hackney Vehicle, for Commercial purposes on the 14th December, 1923.

The case was heard by the District Justice at Wexford, on the 27th August last, when he dismissed the same on the merits, holding that there was not sufficient evidence of the user of the car for Commercial purposes.

Against this Dismiss, an appeal was lodged, and same was heard by the Circuit Court Judge on the 17th instant, when after fully hearing the case he delivered a considered Judgment, holding that he had no jurisdiction to hear an appeal from an Order of the District Justice, dismissing a Summons.

I send you a copy of the Judgment, and will be glad if you will lay the matter before your Authorities for their instructions thereon.

It appears that the only Appeal we have from the Circuit Court Judge under the Provisions of the Courts of Justice Act, is by way of Mandamus, and this would mean a good deal of expense.

WEXFORD CIRCUIT COURT.

JUDGMENT.

His Lordship:- I have come to the conclusion that I cannot safely entertain the Appeal. The reason is this, it is presented in/

in the first instance under the Old Statute of George IV. Machinery to give effect to that Act, I am sure does not exist and I do not know of any substitute Machinery for it. I am not going to the length of saying there is no substitute Machinery, I must therefore treat the Appeal under the Summary Jurisdiction Act and the 84th and 85th Sections of the Court of Justice Act, 1924. I am at once faced with the question whether it is of Civil or Criminal nature if it is of a Civil nature it might be possible to entertain it; if it is (as I hold it to be) of a criminal nature there is no appeal from a dismiss but only from an Order imposing a penalty or imprisonment, therefore, I am not justified in entertaining the appeal. The only feasible way in which I can deal with it is by striking it out or my marking it no jurisdiction. That can be tested if the Appellant so desires.

MINUTE - The Council's Solicitor was instructed to serve Notice of Withdrawal of Appeal.

A circular letter dated 18th November, 1925, No. 54325/25, was read from the Local Government Ministry on the subject of the taking over by the County Councils of the Assets and Liabilities of the late Rural District Councils which ceased to exist on the 1st ultimo and the transfer to the Council of the property and liabilities of certain Committees abolished under Section 15 of the Local Government Act, 1925.

The Secretary informed the Council of the arrangements made by him in the matter which were approved.

On the Secretary's suggestion Councillor Mahony agreed to make the necessary arrangements in conjunction with Mr. Charles L. Callaghan, Stranorlar, for the storage of books etc. in Letterkenny the property of Dunfanaghy, Milford, Letterkenny and Inishowen Rural District Councils.

422. re CLIFF ROAD AND LIMITING SPEED OF MOTOR CARS.

A letter dated 20th November, 1925, R/RV/7, was read from the Local Government Ministry, Roads, stating that with reference to the application by the Tirconail County Council under Article 17 of the Roads Act, 1920, for an Order prohibiting the driving of mechanically-propelled road vehicles on the Cliff Road or Promenade at Bundoran the Minister has made the Order sought for which comes into force on the 1st January, 1926.

As regards the applications by the Tirconail County Council for Orders under Section 9 (1) of the Motor Car Act, 1903, respecting the Urban District of Bundoran and the town of Ballyshannon, the Minister, having regard to the evidence given at the Inquiry does not consider that any order should be made in respect thereof.

The Secretary said that the Order would require to be published in the "Iris Oifigiuil" and once at least in each of two consecutive weeks in some local newspaper or newspapers circulating throughout the district concerned. A Warning Board would also have to be erected at either end of the closed road. He suggested that the

445 NEW WORKS

In accordance with Notice of Motion duly given Councillor Baxter moved - "That the County Council refrain from putting on presentments for new works at the forthcoming Roads meeting of the Council". He pointed out that the County Council owed £60,000 and they had that day passed payments to Road Contractors amounting to £35,000. They should therefore refrain from putting in presentments for any new works, such as new roads and fences. It was imperative that these should be postponed until the finances of the county were in a better state.

Councillor Hamilton seconded the motion and referred to the large number of new roads already put on. In view of the state of the finances at present he agreed it would be inadvisable to undertake any new works.

Councillor O'Donnell said the motion, if passed, would hit the people in the mountains who did their part to free the country and were they going to have to still do the horse's work? He held the new works should be considered in the ordinary way and those considered unnecessary rejected.

Councillor McPhelimy opposed the motion.

Councillor Gallen said he understood that the Irish Land Commission, as successors of the Congested Districts Board, were making roads that served no purpose and without consulting men who were in a position to advise them.

Councillor Sweeney said that was not so.

Councillor Brennan said the motion would hit very hard in the case of new roads recently made.

Councillor Baxter said his motion did not refer to existing roads but merely to new roads and fences.

The motion was therefore agreed to.

446 ROAD TAX ON FORD CARS.

Number of Councillors of County of Cork & Councillors of County of Wick

In the absence of Councillor Gallagher (Francis) Councillor Mulreany moved - "That the Council request the Government to introduce Legislation immediately to remedy the disability under which the Ford Motor Company at Cork is placed in the matter of road tax on the cars produced by it as compared with English cars and others. That the Ford Motor Company which gives so much employment in the country should be helped instead of crippled by a prohibitive tax, the tax being 12% of the value of the car as compared with a 4% tax ratio to purchase price of English cars and others, and that accordingly the tax on Ford cars should be reduced 50%." Councillor MacCreadie seconded the motion.

Councillor Brennan supported the proposal and pointed out the large amount of employment given in the Free State by the Ford Motor Company, who deserved the support and sympathy of the Council.

Councillor Baxter proposed that consideration of the matter be deferred for twelve months to see if Mr. Ford would meet them in regard to the prices charged for Ford cars in the Free State. The Free State Government had given Mr. Ford protection to the extent of 33 I.3 per cent., and in some cases to the extent of 22 per cent.. Mr. Ford took advantage of that by increasing the price of cars in the Free State. There was no reason why they should not be able to buy a Ford car as cheaply as people in Strabane, where Ford cars at present could be got at £25 each cheaper than in Donegal. Mr. Ford should bring the price down to the level of that ruling in the Six Counties. Councillor McIvor seconded.

Councillor Brennan said the difference in price was due to the taxes levied on the raw material.

Councillor Gallen said Mr. Ford was a very desirable man to have developing industry in the country, but he was very autocratic in his dealings. They should let him see that they were not prepared to be at his beck and call, especially seeing he would not give them the same advantages as he gave to the people in Strabane.

Councillor McIvor said every car Mr. Ford manufactured in the Free State the people of the Country had to pay £25 extra. Councillor Baxter - Because of the competition from English cars he sells cars in the Six Counties £25 each cheaper than in the Free State.

Mr. M.J. Flood, Ford Agent, Donegal Town, who was given permission to speak, said on all this raw material that came into Cork duty had to be paid.

Councillor Baxter said the same car had to meet the same duty in the case of England.

Mr. Flood said not, because most of the raw material was produced in England.

Councillor Gallen said there was no duty on raw material.

Mr. Flood said this was a matter where the Council should support Irish workmanship. The Ford Company paid £400,000 annually in wages in the Free State. They had spent a million of money in Cork, and their buildings covered six acres.

Councillor McIvor - When they meet us we will meet them.

Mr. Flood said the Council should pass a resolution now, because the duty would be assessed in the Dail at the beginning of the year. Similar resolutions were being passed by the County Councils throughout the Free State.

Councillor Baxter said if the recommendation in the resolution for the reduction of the road tax were put into operation it would mean an immediate saving to Ford car users of a considerable sum, and under the circumstances he would withdraw his proposal.

The motion was passed unanimously.

On the suggestion of Councillor Gallen it was unanimously decided to strongly protest against discrimination in favour of the people of Northern Ireland.

McIvor said Carrickaroy Pier was handed over by the Grand Jury to the Derry Harbour Board; also that the customs at Moville Pier were collected by the Free State Government while the Harbour Dues were collected by the Derry Harbour Board.

In accordance with Notice of Motion Councillor McIvor moved -
"That we call upon the Free State Government to make arrangements with the Government of Northern Ireland for the immediate transfer to this Council of the Lough Foyle Piers at present under the control of the Derry Harbour Commissioners."

Councillor McIvor said that Carrickaroy Pier was handed over by the Grand Jury to the Derry Harbour Board; also that the customs at Moville Pier were collected by the Free State Government while the Harbour Dues were collected by the Derry Harbour Board.

Councillor O'Donnell seconded.

Councillor McCauley said he considered the matter premature and moved that consideration be deferred for three months.

Councillor Doherty (Patrick) seconded.

In accordance with notice of motion Councillor McBride drew attention to the bad condition of the road leading from Derrybeg to Bloodyforeland and moved that

(a) Mr. Dawson, Assistant Surveyor, inspect the road and furnish a special report for consideration by the Roads Committee;

(b) That extra money be allowed for the purpose of putting this road in repair.

Councillor McClafferty, in seconding the motion, asked that the road from Dore School to Bloodyforeland be also included in Mr. Dawson's report. This was unanimously agreed to.

Councillor O'Donnell suggested that the foregoing contracts be rescinded and brought forward by the County Surveyor in "Provisional Road Works Scheme" and extra money allowed for their future upkeep. Agreed to.

170 ERECTION OF A FENCE.

Councillor O'Donnell in seconding asked that the County Surveyor be directed to include this item in the "Road Works Scheme". Agreed to.

151 Dr. PATTERSON : SUPERANNUATION ALLOWANCE.

A letter dated 24th November, 1925, M50713/25 was read from the Local Government Ministry enclosing the Minister's consent under Seal dated 19th instant to the payment of a superannuation allowance of £12:1:10 a year to Dr. Patterson, Ramelton, in respect of his services as Medical Officer of Health of the Ramelton Dispensary District.

152 BOARD OF HEALTH : PROPOSED LOAN OF £9,000.

A letter dated 24th November, 1925, L55128/1925, was read from the Local Government Ministry with reference to the application of the Tirconail County Council for sanction to the raising of a loan of £9,000 for the purpose of meeting a deficiency in the funds of the Board of Health at the end of the current financial year and stating that the particulars now furnished showed that the amount expended by the Board of Health up to the 30th September, 1925, was £2,474:7:7 in excess of the amount supplied by the County Council in respect of the half-year's estimate and demand and that being so, the need for a temporary loan to the extent of £9,000 was not apparent at this stage. The Minister would be prepared to consider the application early in the New Year, when the position at the end of this year was known.

Councillor Gallen questioned whether the figures quoted by the Department represented the real position.

The Secretary said he had forwarded a copy of the letter to the Board of Health.

153 WITHHELD GRANTS.

Councillor O'Donnell proposed that the Deputies of the county be asked to approach the Local Government Ministry with a view to releasing, with the least possible delay, withheld Grants.

Councillor Mahony seconded the motion which was passed unanimously.

Councillor Gallen said that Government Grants should be on fixed basis and that the present system should be changed from Assigned Revenue to fixed Annual Grants. If this were done it would enable the Secretary, when preparing his annual Budget, to arrive at a closer estimate under this head. He suggested that the Council's representatives on the Council's General Council make representations to the Ministry to that effect. Agreed to.

154 TURNPIKE ANNUITIES.

A letter dated 25th November, 1925, R/IR/101, was read from the Ministry of Local Government, Roads, in regard to the adoption of a resolution relative to Turnpike annuities and stating that the Minister is not in a position at present to introduce legislation which would empower County Councils to redeem the annuities payable under the Turnpike abolition Commissioners Award of 1956, but the matter will receive consideration as soon as it is practicable to introduce such legislation.

155 PUBLIC ANALYST.

A letter dated 3rd December, 1925, PH5685/1925, was read from the Local Government Ministry relative to the proposed appointment of Dr. John Keane as Public Analyst for County Tirconail, as was also a letter from the latter thanking the Council for appointing him as their analyst and stating that he had complied with Section 71 of the Local Government Act, 1925 and that he would be pleased to receive samples for analysis as soon as his appointment was sanctioned by the Local Government Department, adding that he would analyse certain samples each quarter and carefully supervise the samples which he hands on to his assistant Miss Ryan M.Sc., and would be personally responsible to the County Council for the proper analysis of all samples received by him.

The Secretary said he had forwarded a copy of the letter to the Local Government Ministry.

A letter was read from the Department of Local Government and Public Health asking for suggestions as to any changes or alterations which the County Council might think advisable to make in existing standards.

The Secretary said he wrote to the Department on the matter but had not yet received a reply.

156 PROPOSED SHELTER WALL AT NEWBRIDGE.

A letter dated 30th November, 1925, D/7/17 was read from the Department of Fisheries on the subject of the proposed erection of a Shelter Wall at Newbridge near Rathmullan and stating that the place of the work has been approved by the Minister of Fisheries and that he is accordingly recommending the Minister of Finance to sanction a contribution of one moiety, not exceeding £400, towards the cost of the work, adding that until such sanction is given a contribution cannot definitely be promised.

157 REEF OF ROCKS ON EAST AND SOUTH SIDE OF HARBOUR.

A letter was here read from Mr. Hugh Gallagher, Newbridge, stating that as some intending contractors propose, as a matter of convenience, to blast away the reef of rocks on the east and south side of the harbour for building purposes the fishermen request the Council to give preference to those contractors who are willing to take the building material from inside the harbour where, in the opinion of engineers and some contractors, there is plenty of the best building material to be had.

On the motion of Councillor O'Donnell, seconded by Councillor Hamilton, it was unanimously resolved that it be a condition of the contract that the reef of rocks referred to be not interfered with by the contractor whose tender may be accepted.

CLAIMS BY MESSRS S. WATTERS AND R.S. WATTERS FOR SUPERANNUATION ALLOWANCES.

Mr. William Kelly, Solicitor, Letterkenny, appeared on behalf of the Messrs Watters and referred to the recommendation of the Committee, that certain emoluments included in the claims be not treated as "Pensionable Emoluments". He wished to know if the Council would allow these cases to be reopened.

Councillor O'Donnell said the Committee went carefully into both claims. He proposed that their recommendations be adopted. Councillor Cole seconded. Passed unanimously.

re MISS SARA WALLACE.

Mr. Malseed, Solicitor, Letterkenny, appeared on behalf of Miss Sara Wallace, Letterkenny, in regard to the recommendation of the Committee re her claim for a superannuation allowance and said she was dissatisfied with the amount recommended to be granted.

On the motion of Councillor O'Donnell, seconded by Councillor Cole, the Committee's recommendation was unanimously adopted.

501 COURTHOUSE AT CARNDONAGH.

The Secretary reported that Messrs Crawford and Eakin, Victoria Road, Buncrana, who were accepted as contractors for building the Courthouse at Carndonagh had declined to execute the Bond. He also read letters from Messrs Edward Doherty, Carndonagh and Sam Henderson, Milltown, Carndonagh, withdrawing, for certain reasons, their tenders in connection with this work.

Councillor Mahony said that there were a number of buildings on their hands throughout the county which were vacant as a result of the amalgamation scheme. These buildings were not put to any use. They were white elephants on their hands. At present the District Court was being held in the Boardroom, or what was formerly the boardroom of Carndonagh. He was informed that by the expenditure of £150 the place could be made suitable and adequate for the purpose of the District Justice. The latter had been speaking to him on the matter, and he said he was fully satisfied with the boardroom but that a bar parlour was required. He (Councillor Mahony) suggested that the Architect inspect the premises and make out an estimate of what it would take to make them suitable for Court purposes.

Councillor McIvor proposed that owing to the great want of employment in the district the work be proceeded with at once. Councillor Cole seconded.

The Secretary was asked if there was a reinstatement clause in the award. He replied in the affirmative, adding that if the Council decided not to build they would be entitled to the market value of the building.

Councillor Gallen moved as an amendment that the matter stand adjourned until next meeting of the Council, meanwhile that Mr. Wm. Doherty, Architect, be asked to report as to the market value of the premises and the cost of making the necessary alterations.

Councillor Mahony said that in law Houston was entitled to the Scholarship and in equity Miss Harte was entitled to it, however, he thought there was a way out of the difficulty, as there still remained 3 years of Mr. Conigley's Scholarship which would not be availed of he proposed that the unexpended portion be awarded to Miss Harte and the Scholarship already awarded to Miss Kelly and for which she was ineligible be awarded to Conal Houston. Councillor Gallen seconded the motion which was passed unanimously. The remaining recommendations of the Committee were adopted.

307 PURCHASE OF QUARRIES.

The Solicitor to the Council referred to the purchase of land for quarrying purposes from the undermentioned persons and asked that the Paying Orders for amounts agreed upon be issued in his favour for disbursement as soon as both parties have completed the conveyances.
