

#### Queen's Institute of District Nursing

SUGGESTED CONSTITUTION AND RULES FOR A DISTRICT NURSING ASSOCIATION IN AFFILIATION WITH THE QUEEN'S INSTITUTE.

The Council of the Queen's Institute have prepared the following suggestions, model Constitution and Rules, in the hope that they may be useful to those about to start or to re-organise a Nursing Association in affiliation with the Queen's Institute. The Council, however, being aware that as local conditions vary considerably it is impossible to insist on absolute uniformity of rules or methods of working, do not seek to impose on affiliated Associations a fixed set of rules. While, therefore, they feel that uniformity on points such as minimum salary, hours of work, length of holiday of nurses, etc., is very desirable in order to secure equality of treatment of Queen's Nurses in all parts of the country, no regulations other than those set out under "Rules for District Nursing Associations in affiliation with the Queen's Institute" (p. 2) are deemed essential as a condition of affiliation.

It should be carefully considered whether the Association should be organised on a provident basis, with a scale of contributions suitable for all classes. If this be considered desirable provision should be made in the rules defining the subscriptions and the services to which the subscribers are entitled, it being understood that the nurses' services are given free in all cases of necessity.

It is desirable to obtain the co-operation of all the medical men in the district, and in the larger Associations, to obtain, if possible, the assistance of one or more of them on the Committee.

The following is suggested as a MODEL for a CONSTITUTION:

- I.—The name of the Association shall be the " District Nursing Association," in affiliation with the Queen's Institute of District Nursing.
- 2.—The object of the Association shall be to provide skilled nursing in their own homes without distinction of creed for those who are unable to employ a private nurse, the nursing being given free in cases of necessity.
- 3.—The Association shall consist of all annual subscribers of ——— and donors of ——— to the Association.
- 4.—The control and management of the business of the Association shall be vested in the General Committee.

- 7.—The General Committee may delegate all or any of its powers to an Executive Committee of members in addition to Hon. Officers. This Committee shall elect its own Chairman and members shall form a quorum. It shall meet once a month (or at such other intervals as may be arranged) to transact business and receive reports from the Hon. Secretary, Hon. Treasurer and nurse.

- 9.—There shall be ——— Trustees of the Association and the first Trustees shall be Trustees may be appointed or removed by the Association in General Meeting. Temporary vacancies among the Trustees shall be filled up by the General Committee.
- Io.—All the real and leasehold properties and all the investments belonging to the Association shall be vested in the Trustees and they shall have the custody of all deeds and documents of Title relating to the property of the Association and shall deal with and dispose of all the property of the Association, whether real or personal, for the time being vested in them and the income thereof in accordance with the directions of the members of the Association or of the General Committee, either of whom shall have power at any time to put an end to the Association and to provide for the disposal of its property whether real or personal.
- II.—The income and property of the Association whencesoever derived shall be applied solely towards the promotion of the objects of the Association without any profit to the members thereof.
- 12.—All Funds of the Association shall be paid into a Bank in the name of the Association, and all cheques shall be signed by the Hon. Treasurer, or in his absence or illness by such person as may be authorised on that behalf by the Executive Committee.
- 14.—The Constitution and Rules of the Association shall not be altered or amended except at the Annual Meeting or at a special meeting called for that purpose, not less than twenty-one days' notice of the proposed change being sent to each member of the Association.

As a general principle the rules should be as few and as simple as possible, but care should be taken to make quite clear the essential duties of the nurse. It is a condition of affiliation that the services of the nurse should be available without distinction of creed, that the nurse should not interfere with the religious views of her patients, and that the nursing should be carried out under the directions of the medical practitioners. Care should be taken to define as far as possible the hours of the nurse's work, and to ensure her punctuality. This is important in order to prevent overwork. Provision also should be made for the nurse being at home, if possible, at a fixed time once a week in order that the Hon. Secretary or other visitors may be sure of finding her.

Appended are rules embodying the main principles of the Queen's Institute, the adoption of which is a necessary condition of affiliation. They are followed by suggested bye-laws for one nurse, and with certain modifications, for the cases of two or three nurses living and working together.

\*The rules and the bye-laws marked with an asterisk are essential for Associations desiring affiliation with the Queen's Institute of District Nursing.

#### RULES FOR DISTRICT NURSING ASSOCIATIONS IN AFFILIATION WITH THE QUEEN'S INSTITUTE.

- \*I.—The primary duty of the nurse shall be to attend, in their own homes and without distinction of creed, those who are unable to employ a private nurse, it being understood that free nursing is given in cases of necessity.
- \*2.—The general sick nursing of the patients shall be carried out under the direction of the medical practitioners.
- \*3.—Application for the services of the nurse may be made direct to her or otherwise. The nurse may attend a patient on application or in emergency, but must not continue to visit without informing a medical man and receiving his instructions, if any. Should a nurse advise that a patient should have a doctor and the advice be not accepted, the nurse may not attend this patient except in case of fresh emergency. She must report the matter to her Secretary.
- \*4.—The nurse shall not dispense for her patients any such drugs as should only be prescribed by a medical man.
  - \*5.—The nurse shall in no case attempt to influence a patient in the choice of a doctor.
- \*6.—A midwife shall not accept an engagement without first asking the patient to state and herself registering the name of the doctor to be called in should any emergency arise.

\*7.—The nurse is strictly forbidden to interfere in any way with the religious opinions of patients or of members of their families.

\*8.—The nurse shall not act as almsgiver, or except in cases of urgent necessity, herself distribute nourishment or other relief. She shall at once report any such case to the Hon. Secretary or other proper authority. (When private gifts are received to assist a special case, the patient should be informed that this comes from a private source and not from the Association. All such gifts should be acknowledged in the Annual Report.)

#### SUGGESTED BYE-LAWS FOR NURSES.

\*I.—The general sick nursing of the patients shall be carried out under the direction of the medical practitioners.

\*2.—The nurse is strictly forbidden to interfere in any way with the religious opinions of patients or of members of their families.

\*3.—The nurse shall not act as almsgiver, or, except in cases of urgent necessity, herself distribute nourishment or other relief. She shall at once report any such case to the Hon. Secretary or other proper authority. (When private gifts are received to assist a special case, the patient should be informed that this comes from a private source and not from the Association.)

\*4.—The nurse shall not dispense for her patients any drugs as should only be prescribed by a medical man.

\*5.—The nurse shall in no case attempt to influence a patient in the choice of a doctor.

6.—The nurse may not attend infectious cases unless with the sanction of the medical men and Committee.

7.—The nurse shall be responsible to the Committee of the Association, and shall keep in the form prescribed a register of patients, time and case books, and shall report regularly to the Committee upon her work.

8.—The nurse is not to be on duty more than eight hours daily, except under special circumstances. On Sundays she shall only attend cases requiring special or immediate attention. Night duty shall only be undertaken under exceptional circumstances, when due provision can be made for the other cases under her care. She shall be entitled to a month's holiday in the year, and shall have, if possible, half a day off duty every week and a week-end occasionally.

9.—The nurse shall be punctual in going to and returning from her district and shall leave word at her rooms where she is likely to be found. Any messages or instructions for the nurse should be given in writing, so as to avoid leaving verbal messages with patients or others. A slate should be provided at the nurse's rooms on which messages may be written when she is out. When the nurse has anything to communicate to the doctor she shall do so in writing, and it is hoped that the doctor will do the same to avoid leaving verbal messages with patients or their friends.

10.—The nurse shall be in her rooms from 3 to 4 o'clock on —— every week in order to meet the Hon. Secretary or any member of the Committee who may desire to see her.

II.—The nurse when on duty shall wear the uniform dress and no ornaments.

12.—The nurse shall not accept any presents from patients or their friends.

13.—The nurse shall be responsible for all appliances, clothing, etc., lent to her patients, and shall see, as far as possible, that they are returned in good condition.

14.—The nurse shall be responsible for the personal cleanliness of her patients. She shall endeavour to improve their general surroundings, and when the relations of the patients can be taught how to keep the room in nursing order, they should be encouraged to do so.

15. The nurse if acting as a midwife or maternity nurse shall be responsible for the care of mother and infant during the lying-in period (i.e., during the time of labour and for ten days after, or for longer, if necessary). She should visit each case twice daily for at least three days and at the end of the month to see that the mother has made a good convalescence and the child is in good health.

This Board is preparing a scheme for providing houses for le press throughout the County. They are also willing to provide Cottages for some of the District Nurses provided arrangements can be arrived at as to Rents, etc.

The Cottages are to be built from funds to be raised by way of loan. Of this loan the Government will repay 60% of the principal with interest thereon on the first £300 of the all in cost of each cottage. It is expected that the all in cost of the ordinary Labourers' Cottage will be £300, including cost of Land, Engineering, etc. It is intended that the Cottages for District Nurses will be of a better class and more costly, but the Government Grant will not exceed 60% of the £300 before mentioned even though the Cottages cost far more than this sum.

I will thank you to let me have, for the information of the Board at their Meeting on the 20th instant, the views of your Association as to the Rent which you or the Nurse will pay for such a cottage in the event of the Board deciding to erect same. The repayment of Principal and interest works out at £3/6/8 each £100 borrowed for 35 years.

Dear Sir.

The Committee of the Fanad Health Club hereby request the County Donegal Board of Health to build a Cottage for the District Murse in the Lower Fanad Area, where the only lodgings available are very far from satisfactory.

The Fanad Committee fully realize that the Board of Health must consider this request on an economic basis, and extra care of expenditure is needed just now, when the financial problem is acute everywhere. The Committee however, wish to draw the attention of the Board to some important facts.

- 1. The Nurse will be a particularly good tenant of the property, taking care of the building, and so setting an example to all householders.
- 2. The presence of the Nurse in the Area saves much expense to the Board by \_
  - (a) Teaching the laws of health and hygiene to the people.
  - (b) Skilled nursing to sick people which shortens the period of illness.
  - (c) The observation of suspects and contacts in all infections cases which saves extensive outbreaks and limits epidemics.

It is not necessary to enumerate all the expense saved by having fully trained Nurses stationed in Districts, but we ask the Board to take those facts into consideration when fixing the rent required from the Fanad Committee for the House to be built for the Nurse. A minimum rent of 1/\_

weekly may not be possible, but will the Board kindly believe that 5/\_
weekly \_ £13 a year, paid quarterly is the utmost that the Committee can
possibly raise. The Committee are given to understand that land is
available, and will be gifted free of this purpose only. May we impress
on the Board the extreme urgency of this request, as the Nurse cannot
possibly remain in her present lodgings another winter.

An immediate reply will be greatly appreciated.

### RULES FOR ANNUAL GRANT.

The following shall be the Rules governing the Society's Annual Grant to Nursing Organisations in Ireland:—

- I. The Grant may be made annually in the month of August to Nursing Societies, Associations and/or Committees in Ireland which are affiliated to either the Queen's Institute of District Nursing in Ireland or to Lady Dudley's Nursing Scheme, and/or such other properly constituted nursing organisation in Ireland as the Society may, from time to time, deem fit to approve. A Nursing Society, however, shall not be eligible for the Grant until it has been affiliated, or in operation, for a period of at least 6 calendar months prior to the 1st January of the year in which the Grant is made.
- 2. A Nursing Society, affiliated as in Rule 1, which for any reason, ceases to be affiliated shall ipso facto become ineligible for the Grant; but such Nursing Society shall not be debarred from again becoming eligible if re-affiliated at any future time.
- 3. Every eligible Nursing Society shall be allotted a registered number, which together with its name and other particulars shall be entered in a Register kept at the office of the Society in London. In the event of a Nursing Society becoming ineligible for the Grant by reason of its having ceased to be affiliated, or for any other reason, its name shall be erased from the Register forthwith.
- 4. The amount of the Grant which each Nursing Society may receive shall be assessed each year in accordance with the scale of Grants approved by the Society. The method of assessment shall, however, be subject to revision or to replacement by any other method of assessment which the Society may, from time to time, deem fit to adopt.
- 5. On or before the 1st April in each year, a printed Form of Application for the Grant shall be posted to every eligible Nursing Society in Ireland which is on the Society's Register. The Hon. Secretary, Hon. Treasurer, or other official shall be required to enter on the Application Form correct figures indicating the working and true financial position of his/her respective Nursing Society during the last financial year.

- officials of the Nursing Society, and returned so as to reach the office of the Society in London not later than the 30th June of the year. A copy of the last Annual Report and a printed (or typed) copy of the audited Balance Sheet, Income and Expenditure Account, or other duly certified Statement of Account for the last financial year shall—unless these have been forwarded to the Society previously—accompany the application for the Grant.
- 7. Nursing Societies which do not show a reasonable subscription list from subscribers other than patients shall not be eligible to receive a Grant for that year. It is imperative, therefore, that subscriptions from patients and non-patients shall be shown separately on the Application Form.
- Non-observance by a Nursing Society of any of the above rules may render it liable to disqualification for the Grant for the current year. The decision of the Society shall be final in every case.

\* \* \* \* \* \*

Note: Wherever in the above Rules the words "The Society," "Nursing Society," or "last financial year" occur, their meaning shall respectively be construed as under:—

- (a) "The Society"—The Irish Peasantry Society.
- (b) "Nursing Society"—Nursing Society, Association, Committee, and/or other nursing organisation in Ireland.
- (c) "last financial year"—The last completed financial year prior to the 1st July of the year in which the Application is made.

\* \* \* \* \* \*

N.B.—In order to avoid unnecessary correspondence, postage, etc., Hon. Secretaries and Hon. Treasurers of Nursing Societies are earnestly requested especially to note Rule 6, and to comply with its requirements in every respect. # In Wildest Donegal

### THE DISTRICT NURSES AT FANAD HEAD

A VISIT to Fanad Head from Northern Ireland entails a change at Strabane from the Great Northern Railway on to the narrow gauge, single track route to Letterkenny, with an interview with the Customs officials included. The strange little car, with its single long compartment and luggage trailer, sways its way between the stubble of newly garnered cross, downward, always downward, to the level of the Swilly, and on across the road crossings, as often as not, by small children who brandish the green flag of

from Letterkenny the passenger must travel by road r nearly thirty miles, the mountains—purple with

eather-coming nearer and nearer, the road surfaces deteriorating, the villages becoming fewer and smaller, the arable land giving way to sheep pasture and peat fields. Primitive cottages, which house large families gleam whitely on the hillsides, and sheltered corners here and there bear the families' potato crops. By a tiny national school where the pupils were reading together in Erse, we stopped and enquired the way of a baker's van-boy.

"Keep to your right just ahead here," he told us, "then turn down a steep hill to your left, and you'll see Nurse's house standing alone out on the green, by the edge of a wee lough."

We thanked him, and came to the top of the hill. Below was the lough, surrounded by flat, open grassland. Down by

the water's edge, in lonely state, stood a whitewashed cottage with slate roof. A high whitewashed garden wall, reaching to the eaves, seemed to grow out of the side walls of the cottage, and protected a pretty little garden alike from relentless winds and inquisitive sheep. We buttoned our coat collars, closed the windows of the car, and looked beyond the cottage over a sandy road and a rough embankment to the cold rocks that stand immovable and somewhat scornful beneath the vain on-slaught of Atlantic breakers.

#### An Urgent Call


At the cottage disappointment awaited us, for Nurse O'Dowd was out, gone, as I learnt later, in answer to an urgent call from a lonely farmhouse. The screams of the black-headed gulls overhead were the only answer to my knock. Luck turned, however, for as we approached the hotel, some seven miles up the Swilly, where we proposed staying the night, we met Nurse O'Dowd's colleague, Nurse Clancy, who consented to come

in and tell me about the Fanad District Nursing Association.

District nursing, I learnt, is an activity of comparatively young growth in this part of Donegal, but of sturdy growth nevertheless. The first annual picnic this summer saw about thirty nurses from different parts of the county assembled together for an enjoyable afternoon.

### Very Kind People

The Fanad District Nursing Association has been formed for about three years, and from the start employed two Queen's nurses, Miss O'Dowd and Miss Clancy, who had previously worked together at St.

Lawrence's District Home in Dublin.

"Did you receive your general training in the Free State, too?" I asked Nurse Clancy.

"Yes, at Waterford County Infirmary, but I spent some time in London for fever training—at the South Western Hospital, Stockwell."

"And Nurse O'Dowd?"

"She went to London, to St. Andrew's Hospital, Dollis Hill."

"How do you like Donegal after city life?"

"Very well. The people are very kind, although they are sometimes a little difficult to manage as patients!"

"In what way? Do you find them superstitious?"

"Extremely; and some of them seem rather frightened, too, of going to a doctor. There are people who make quite a trade of selling charms and herbal concoctions. One man who had a septic finger was terrified that a doctor would operate, so he bought a plaster from one of these men, which he wore for nearly a month. The poison, of course, spread, and in the end he had to go

to a doctor, and he lost his finger, and very nearly his arm as well."

Another tale of a similar kind related to a tuberculous boy. His disease had reached an advanced stage, and Nurse Clancy had been visiting lim daily. On one occasion she was confronted at the door of the cottage, and told that she need not come any more. The parents had consulted a "doctor," bought a charm from him which the little patient wore round his neck, and no amoun of persuasion would shake their faith in their purchase.

#### Rare Flowers

Such an attitude among the peasants makes nursing an uphill task, and such incidents carry a full measure of discouragement; yet during the short life of the association an improvement has already made itself felt, so that the Fanad Health Club shows an increasing membership, and many a farmer's wife saves the pennies by rigid economy in order to contribute a share for the family. The countryside also turns out in force to support the honor ry secretaries and founders, Miss Hart and Mrs. G. Barton, when Miss Hart opens in aid of the funds her beautiful grounds and still more beautiful walled garden which, tucked away under the shelter of the hills, contains a profusion of rare oriental flowers and ferns, shrubs and trees and bamboos.

"How do you share out the work?" I asked.

"Nurse O'Dowd has the northern half of the district and I the southern. The Rathmullan district adjoins ours, and our aim is to link up the whole county in that way, but at present there are still a good many districts that have no nurse." "Do you have a cottage of your own, like Nurse O'Dowd?"

"No, I lodge at a farm with very nice people, who are extremely good about my comings and goings at odd hours, and produce meals for me whenever I want them. I think Nurse O'Dowd likes having a little home of her own, but I am not sure that I am not better off as I am. A cottage would make a lot of work for me when I am tired from nursing. And I don't think I could bear to live where she does. There is scarcely a tree to be seen out there; but I like this part. It is not quite so bleak."

"How does she like her beat?"

"Oh, she likes it, so we are both pleased!"

"Do you do any midwifery?"

"Very seldom, as there is a midwife in the neighborhood, but we do a certain amount of maternity number of the cases that book a doctor. Our work is most medical, and minor surgical dressings. Then there is school work, but the clinics are not held very often, as there is only one school doctor now for the whole county. We have clinics, too, for babies and children up to five years old."

#### Pedalling into the Storm

"And now," she added, "I have one more late call to make before I get home."

The rain had come, and the winc was blowing gustily, but Nurse Clancy smiled aside my suggestion that she should wait, mounted her bicycle and pedalled into the storm, one hand holding together the skirts of her water-proof coat.

### Donegal County Nursing Association.

#### PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

We have pleasure in presenting the first Annual Report of the Donegal County Nursing Association.

The Association, shortly after its inauguration, sustained a very severe set-back in the death of its late County Medical Officer, Dr. O'Dea, so that as much progress as was anticipated has not been accomplished.

The main objects of the Association are:-

- To found new nursing districts throughout the county, so that every village and town will be linked up and have a fully trained nurse within call.
- 2. To raise funds so that the Committee may have sufficient means to help new districts to open.
- 3. To provide an annual re-union for the nurses.
- 4. To keep a fully stocked "linen" cupboard, so that each nurse can draw upon this for supplies when necessary.

Two Annual Nurses' Re-unions have been held, in 1935 at Rosapenna, in 1936 at Lough Eske. These outings gave great pleasure to all the nurses who were thus able to meet and discuss their many difficulties, etc., and also to the Nursing Association Committees.

Our Annual Dance was held in Ballybofey in November, 1935. This was not as great a financial success as was anticipated, and it was, therefor, decided at the Bi-annual Meeting in October not to hold one in 1936. It was unanimously agreed that each Association should be asked to send 10'- (or more) instead to help the funds.
