





Chairman believed that he took the proper action and considered his duty done.

That the Council were taking all the measures they could to meet debt.

That Council did not deny liability to Ballyshannon Rural District Council.

That Collections are extremely difficult in present conditions and in the circumstances ask for a stay of proceedings.

As all the business could not be got through, the Council left over important matters till next evening at 8 o'clock making them separated.

The following Report of Town Surveyor for Half Year ended 31<sup>st</sup> March, 1923 was read.

#### Roads.

The roads in the District, with the exception of the main Road - Contract no. 20, (Wm. Doherty, Contractor) were well maintained during the Half Year.

The increased traffic of heavily laden Commercial and Army motor vehicles caused unusual wear on roads especially those leading to Finnes Camp, and before long it will be found necessary to

to adopt new methods of repair and maintenance which will entail additional initial cost but will in the end be a saving to the Community.

The military Authorities have cleared the main Road of the stones used by them for barricades but the obstructions still remain on the District Road leading to Ardara, opposite the Bandon Boys' National School, part of the Boundary wall of which was pulled down and the stones placed in the roadway.

#### Scavenging.

The scavenging of the Streets has been carefully looked after.

#### Footpaths.

The flagged footpaths have been broken in many places by the large stones thrown down for barricades during the troubled period.

Some of the sets for crossings have been delivered and a workman has been engaged for the work of making them.

A new paved vennel with edge cut has been laid in Drumacrin, and I am awaiting the order of the Council to complete the footpath in concrete, now as the danger of severe frost is over.

#### Water Supply.

Since the main Supply Pipe has been blown up, though repaired, the water pressure has been lessened, and stricter supervision of private taps will be required to ensure that a supply to the higher

levels will be maintained when the Tourist Season arrives.

The Rose Head at the Intake, and a leaking joint in the main, will be attended to at first opportunity of subsidence of the floods.

#### Sewers

On the whole the Sewerage has worked well, only one or two stoppages, which were seen to immediately, occurring during the six months.

#### Road Metal

The Quantity of Metal now ready under Contract no. 20. Main Road (Wm Doherty Contractor) is 140 tons, leaving 37 tons to be supplied. A sum of £30-12-0 has been depured in respect of this Contract to 31<sup>st</sup> March, 1923.

Under Contract no. 22, District Road to Kurlough, (Wm Doherty, Contractor) 67½ tons metal have been supplied, leaving 30½ tons deficient. A sum of £15-19-6 has been depured under this Contract.

Two hundred tons of metal for main Road no. 2 have been delivered by four Contractors, the total cost being £63-15-0.

Shannon Rural District Council dated 30/5/23 stating that he could not delay Service of writs and asking if Council has instructed Solicitor to accept service on its behalf.

Council directed Clerk to instruct Mr. P. E. Rogers, Solicitor, Ballyshannon, to accept the service of the writs.

Clerk was directed to reply to Mr. Maguire's letter stating, (1) That Council regrets that the writs are to be served, (2) That conditions in the country prevented the collection of Rents (3) That two Half Yearly Instalments have been paid Ballyshannon Council within the last two months and another Instalment was about to be paid and (4) That Council considers the service of writs, a harsh proceeding as it will involve heavy expense on Ratepayers.

Rent Collection

Mr. Michael Mulhern Rent Collector was called on for an explanation of the state of the Rent Collection. He said that he took no action against the tenants as he was legally advised that action for the recovery of possession of the Council Houses should be taken by the Urban Council. He could not recover £12 or £15 from those who hadn't it.

The Chairman said that Council must face the question of evictions in the absence of any other remedy.

Councillor O'Gorman said that it was the duty of Council to see that the public would be at no loss. Houses should not be erected out of public money for everyone to walk into

and pay no rent. Private feelings should not be allowed to interfere with business of the Council. I have sympathy with any poor man and am willing to subscribe my share to help to pay his rent. A clean sweep should be made to recover either possession or arrears of rent, and that immediately.

Councillor Harte said Bundoran, owing to the conditions of the district, was handicapped and rent could not <sup>have</sup> been collected.

Councillor Barty said he knew of one House of the working class where weekly wages amounting to £5-19-7 were going into, but in many cases the tenants had no means.

Councillor Connolly said he had no sympathy with those who can pay and will not.

Clerk stated that if Ballyshannon Council succeed in their legal proceedings it simply meant a change of landlord for the tenants as a Receiver would be appointed.

Councillor Blaney said if Ballyshannon Council were in debt to us, we would have to take same steps to recover. Clerk reported £395-2, due.
