Councillor T. Gorman (Sen), said that considering no bonus had been granted, the high cost of living and the qualifications of Mr Daly as well as the satisfaction

given, he proposed: "That subject to the sanction of the Ministry of Local Government, we hereby grant an increase of fifty pounds per year to the salary of Mr. Edward Daly, Clerk and Town Surveyor to this Council - Twenty five pounds in respect of his services as Clerk, and Twenty five pounds in respect of his services as Town Surveyor; the increases to date from the 1st of April 1924.

The Chairman suggested that an increment of Five Pounds per year for five years be also granted.

Councillor Caswell said he was not in favour of the Chairman's suggestion, but would agree to the terms of the resolution proposed by Councillor Gorman.

The resolution was seconded by Councillor John Carty, Vice Chairman, and passed unanimously.

The adjourned Application, dated 7th Feb, 1924 from Mr. Wm. McHugh, for permission to erect a Kero Petrol Pump on public footpath opposite his premises in Main Street was again read.

Both Applications were considered together.

Councillor O'Gorman opposed the erection of Petrol Kero Pumps in the public Street, on the grounds that they would create a nuisance and that Cars supplying tanks from them would cause obstructions on the public highway.

He said he did not oppose on personal grounds, but he believed if any application was granted that refusal cannot be made to any Applicant afterwards.

Council Hark said it would be in the interests of progress and for the advantage of the town that applications for permission to erect petrol pumps should be granted. He urged that Garage Owners be allowed to erect pumps which would cause little or no inconvenience to the public.

Councillor J. Gorman (Sen) proposed:-

John Surveyor submitted the following Report for the Half Year ended 31st March 1924

Chairman and members of
Bundoran Urban District Council.
Messrs,

I have to submit the following Report on the Public works in Bundoran Urban District, for the Half Year ended 31st March, 1924

Roads — The main Road has been subjected to extreme by heavy traffic during the past Half Year, and this fact coupled with the heavy rain fall has caused serious disintegration of the surface. Potholes as they formed have been repaired, but not effectively, in consequence of a Road Roller not being available, and if the heavy traffic continues, a different system of repair and maintenance must be adopted.

Main Road, No. 1, measuring about 332 perches is in a bad state of repair: the surface is potted to a large extent and requires to be scarped but unfortunately there is no machinery available for this purpose.

This road is held under Contracts.

Main Road No. 2, maintained by direct labour may be said to be passable though in some places potholes readily form.

The District Roads, except the Road leading from Bundoran to Keshlough are

in good condition but would require some side dressing.

The Contractor of Contract No. 31, District Roads - 176 perches - failed to supply the required quantity of metal, and consequently no payment has been recommended.

As you are aware £400 has been allocated from the Road Grant for the repair of Trunk Roads in the District. The Council is handicapped in consequence of its not owning Road making machinery. Locally unemployment is getting less and as many men will refuse to work at the wages fixed by the Local Government Ministry, the Council while adhering to the conditions governing the expenditure of the Grant, might consider the question of employing suitable men to supply certain quantities of Road metal each at a fixed price per ton, so that when the County Council Road Roller is available, no delay may arise in waiting for the necessary quantity of metal.

Water Supply

Leakages have been repaired in many places and the pressure has slightly improved. A general examination of the whole system is necessary, as I am of opinion that a serious escape of water is occurring and at some place which will be difficult to discover.

A stop valve ought to be fixed in West End of town, so that the pressure at East End could be increased when necessary.

Sewers

Generally the main Sewers gave little trouble, but the outlets to the Septic Tank were stopped up on a few occasions. A fairly large deposit of sludge is at present in tank, and will require removal at the earliest opportunity.

The provision of a Public Convenience is a necessity in a town of the importance of Bundoran to which thousands of excursionists and visitors come in the holiday season.

The broken flags in Footpaths are being taken up and replaced by sound ones.

It would be advisable to consider

Chairman commenting on the Report said if some parts of the main Road were in a bad state the Council could not be exonerated from blame. Surveyor reported time after time and were a bit slack in compelling Contractors to do their worst better. He said every pressure should be brought to bear in order that the Road Roller be got from County Council immediately.

Surveyor stated that according to the agreement the County Surveyor is to give the Roller on hire when available only.

Several firms have been asked to undertake the work of rolling the streets and replied that they were not in a position to do so.

The Chairman proposed that the Roads Department of the Local Government be asked to allow this Council, while adhering to the conditions governing the expenditure of the Grant, to employ suitable men to supply definite quantities of Road metal at a fixed price per ton, as we consider that this method of supply of material will effect a saving in the cost and ensure that the amount of metal will be ready when required; also that this method suits the circumstances of the locality.

Mr. P. E. Rogers, Solicitor, Ballyshannon, Mr. John J. Conlan, (representing Patrick Conlan surety of Ex Rate Collector, Michael Mulhern) and Michael Carroll, the other surety, were also present.

Arrears of Rates

Mr. J. Conlan said that he and Mr. Michael Carroll appeared before the Council to ask that service of writs already issued in connection with their liabilities as Sureties for Ex Collector Michael Mulhern ^{be stayed}. He asked that authority be given to some one to collect outstanding Rates before service of writs. When these rates accrued the times were abnormal and it was impossible to collect rates.

The Sureties will certainly make good any deficit which cannot be collected and which is irrecoverable. He suggested that if Council are unable to collect the rates, that they issue the necessary ^{authority} to him, as the Ratepayers are better able to pay small amounts than sureties to pay a large amount. He asked the Council to make a determined effort to have the arrears of Rate collected. Service of writs at the present time would mean disaster to the sureties who are business men.

Mr. Conlan further stated that it would be the greatest injustice to hold sureties responsible for arrears in Rent Collection, that the Council were at fault during the years of the no rent combine, sometimes by their action and some times by their inaction, and they allowed this business to drift. He said the

Sureties would defend any action against them in connection with rent arrears. Council at one time were negotiating a sale of houses to the tenants, with out any authority, and this led to the trouble.

Chairman stated that he had the authority of a T.D. that the sale could take place at the times.

Messrs Conlan and Carroll thanked the Council for their patient hearing and then withdrew.

Clerk informed Council that he served notices on every defaulting Ratepayer in respect of arrears and called personally on them afterwards on each of them. The total arrears collected amounted to £41.15.7½. but he required a warrant to proceed further. The amount collected was duly lodged.

Proposed by Councillor J. M. Judge seconded by Councillor Pat^l Connolly and passed:-

That a warrant for the collection of arrears of Town Rate made in respect of the year ended 31st March, 1923, be signed, and sealed with the seal of the Council and issued to Edward Daly who was appointed Rate Collector by resolution passed at meeting held on 29th October, 1923.

The correspondence read and the orders made

From Leitrim County Council stating that
they cannot hire out Road making machinery
as requested.

From Ministry of Local Government Ref. G.28891/
1924 dated 1st July, 1924, relative to Sureties of
Ex-Collector Mulhern.

Clerk was asked to inform Council how the matter
stood.

Clerk stated that the Collector was removed
from office on 1st October, 1923, and did not hand
in his Collection Books till 5th November 1923.

When these books which covered two years were
examined, it was found that for the Half Year
ended 30th September, 1921, the full amount of
Poor Rate and Town Rate due, had been lodged

The books showed that for the Half Year ended
31st March, 1922 and the Year ended 31st March
1923, Official Receipts, representing £423-11-6
Poor Rate and Town Rate had been issued but
this amount had not been lodged.

On a writ having been served, the Ex Collector
and his sureties paid this amount in to the
credit of the Council.

Of this amount (£423-11-6) a sum of £377-12-7
was sufficient to discharge the total liability for
Poor Rate collected but unlodged, together with Poor
Rate amounting to £188 outstanding, the difference
between the amount (£423-11-6) paid by Collector
and his Sureties and the amount (£377-12-7) paid
to discharge the total liability for whole of Poor
Rate

Rate being placed to credit of the Town Rates Collection
for Financial Year ended 31st March, 1922.

This difference amounted to £45-18-11.

There remains a sum of £231-7-3½ Town Rate for
which receipts are missing and this amount still
remains to be lodged by the Ex Collector.

The total amount of Town Rates due to Council
(including £277-6-2½ Rate collected but not lodged)
due to Council when Collection Books were examined
amounted to £536-5-0 leaving £258-18-9½ outstand-
ing and due by Rate payers.

Of the sum, £277-6-2½ collected but not lodged,
the sum of £45-18-11 was paid to credit of Council
by Ex collector and his Sureties in respect of year
ended 31st March, 1922 as stated, leaving a Balance
of £231-7-3½ in hands of Ex Collector but not
lodged as shown above.

Of the amount £258-18-9½ outstanding, £41-15-7½
has been collected and lodged since, by the Clerk
(Temporary Collector) leaving on the 30th June 1924
a sum of £217-3-2 Town Rate arrears still to be col-
lected.

The Chairman asked the Solicitor whether the
sum of £181 Poor Rate paid by the Ex Collector and his
Sureties on behalf of defaulting Poor Rate Ratepayers
to the credit of the Council, but which the Ex Collector can
recover as a personal debt could be attached, and
collected by Council in order to discharge the Ex
Collector's liability for payment in part of Town Rate
appearing collected but not lodged, as if this £181
were lodged there would only be about £50 to be
accounted for. This £50 or so is due Collector for
poundage fees and could be stopped from Collector
and both amounts would discharge the sum of
£231 collected but not lodged.

Mr. Rogers, Solicitor, stated that, the procedure
for recovery would be slow and costly as so many
defaulting Rate payers had to be dealt with.

The Council could issue a writ against the Ex
Collector for money received and not accounted for
in case he does not pay, or the Council might get

authority from him ordering those for whom he paid poor rate to hand over their respective amounts to the Council, or if the Ex Collector assigned to the Council the amounts due him by defaulting Rate payers, the Council would then be in a position to recover.

The Council decided to await the result of the notices served on Rate payers, and consider the matter at next monthly meeting, which would be held before the date appointed for the service of writ on Ex Collector and his Sureties.

The subject of the limitation of speed of motor vehicles to ten miles per hour in the urban area was discussed.

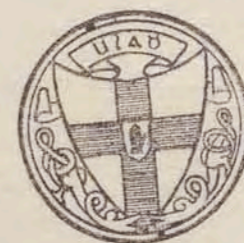
