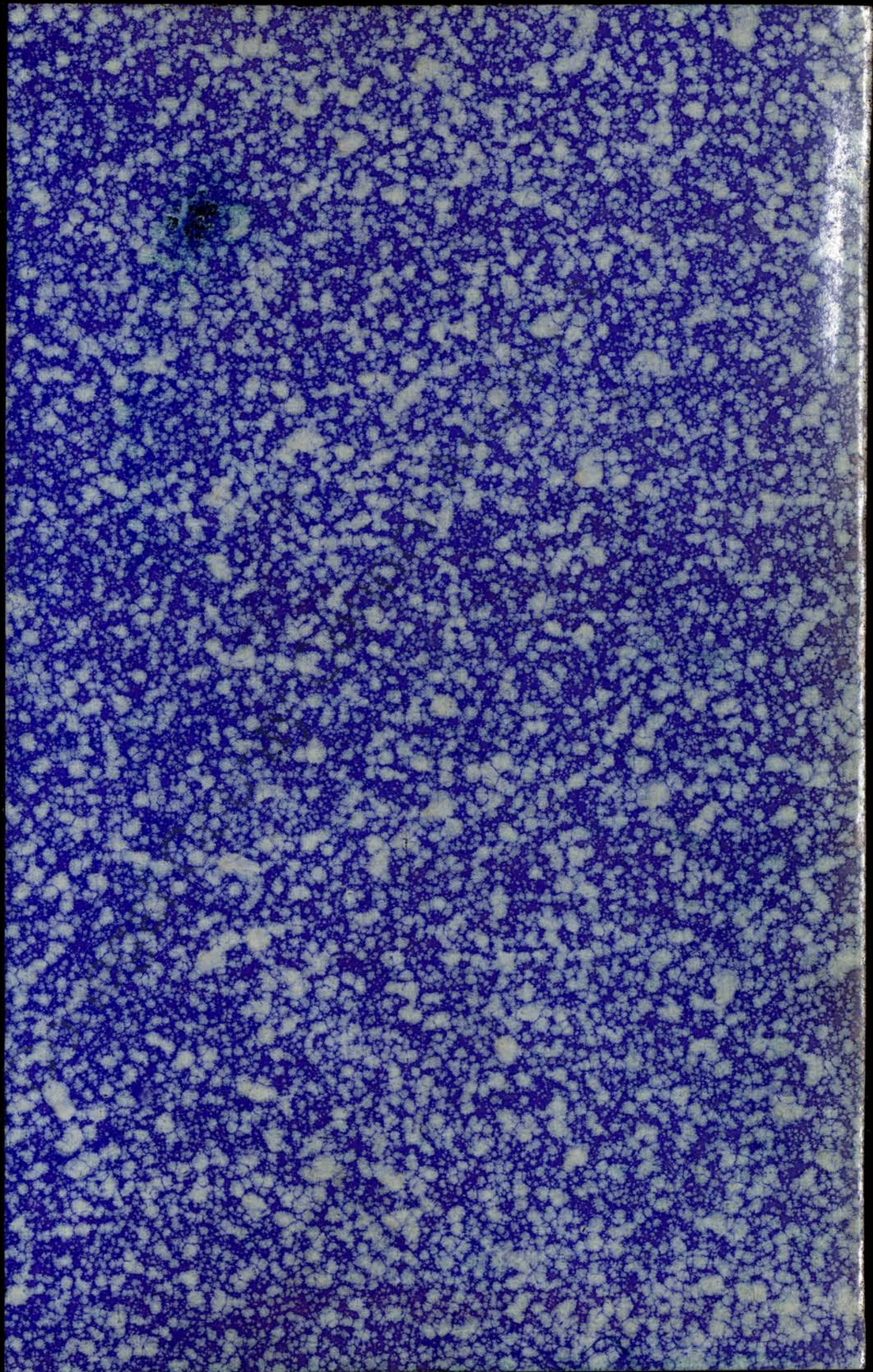

The following report was read from Dr. O'Callaghan, Medical Officer of the Workhouse, dated 8th April 1916, in response to the request of the Guardians on 13th ult:-

Gentlemen In reply to your request for a report on the accommodation for consumptives in the wards of the Union Infirmary, I regret very much to say there is none in the true sense of the word. The Infirmary, as the Guardians are aware consists of four wards, two male and two female, with a small maternity ward in addition. These four wards as a rule are occupied more or less the whole year round, the lower ones on each side are practically taken up with bedridden patients. The top ones are principally used for urgent medical and surgical cases. Very often it is in these wards patients suffering from Tubercular disease have to be treated. At the present time there are such patients in the male side. This is a most regrettable state of things and, in the interests of suffering humanity, should not be allowed. It is established beyond doubt that consumption is an infectious disease, that is, the germs of it can be communicated or conveyed to another. I ask you then is it right to have other patients occupying the same wards. I most respectfully ask the Board

of Guardians to give this matter their serious consideration and provide the necessary accommodation for isolating them. Sufficient accommodation can in my opinion be found in the House. The male and female Idiot Wards, on either side of the Infirmary could be utilized, or, failing this, two small wards could be cut off the Dining Room to the rear of the Surgery. The cost would not be excessive and suffering humanity benefited.

Ordered that a copy of this Report be furnished to each Guardian, and the matter considered at the Annual Meeting on 1st June next.

On the motion of Mr. P. McLaughlin, seconded by Mr. E. Kearney, the Seal of the Union was ordered to be affixed to two contracts of Mrs. McDonough of Carrondoneagh for Clothing and Boots.
