Craigtown Quarry

The Secretary submitted the following letter read
from the Cllr. to the Council.

Transcript from Joseph Craig, Transcript from Wm. W. Wickie,
agreement between the above mentioned and the
Council in triplicate

The purchase money originally agreed upon was £14.
of which £4 was payable to Mr. Wickie, £4 to the
Irish Land Commission to reduce the annuity on this
part of the holding, and £6 to Mr. Craig, but owing
to a hitch which arose by reason of Mr. Craig
not having his annuity reduced by the Irish Land
Commission, and with the sanction of the County
Surveyor, an additional sum of £7 has been paid
to Mr. Craig, and he thereupon completed the deed.

Please obtain the County Council's sanction to
this additional sum of £7 and include a paying
order for it when arranging for the rest of the money.

The Council approved of the action
of their Cllr. and Mr. Stedman Co. Surveyor, in the matter,
and directed that the Council's seal be affixed
to the documents above referred to.

re Collector James P. Fallagher

Letters from the C.D. Board and Messrs. Bell, Macken
and Coy. Barrow, apprising, intimating that they had
made payments, amounting to £13.16.2 and £15.10.3
respectively, during months of Nov. and Dec. 1915. to
Mr. James P. Fallagher, Rate Collector, in respect of Rates
were read, and the Cllr. having stated that these
amounts had not been lodged to the credit of
the C.D. Fund by Collector Fallagher till February
1916, and a letter from the S.F. Board on the
subject, having also been read, it was decided
to take no further action, the Council having
already

already confirmed the minutes of the Finance
Committee recommending Fallagher's suspension
from Office.

re Securing Rate Collectors in Co. Downgal

The Secretary submitted proposals received from
certain approved Guarantee Societies for
Securing the Poor Rate Collectors in the County.

Councillor Blake proposed that
the terms, viz: 9/6%, offered by the Benham Fire and
accident Insurance Society, St. Michael's House, Postey,
London E.C. be accepted, and that in the
event of this Coy. not completing the arrangement
that the business be given to the National
Benefit Life and Property Insurance Coy.
Ltd., on the terms, viz: 9/6%, offered on their
behalf by Messrs. Frank Gibson, Lloyd and
Coy. Ltd., Insurance Brokers Dublin, Councillor
Kenna seconded the motion, who agreed.

re Damage to old Road

Mr. Stedman, Co. Surveyor, reported re damage
done to a road near Barnes Gap,
an road between Kilmacrenan & Breealoug, &
from whom it appeared that the Railway Coy.
(Burlington Extension) are responsible for
the damage. Mr. Kenna proposed that Mr.
Stedman confer with the Cllr. and that the
latter write the Railway Coy. Councillor
Dunlevy seconded and the matter was
unanimously agreed to.

re Condition of a County Road

A memorial, signed by the Ratepayers of
Cloughlaan, Buncrana, re condition of road
from near Bradley's Corner to Newry Mr. Dees
having been read, Mr. Stedman Co. Surveyor stated
that proposals were brought forward several
times to have said road repaired but no
person tendered for the work and that he
told the Assistant Surveyor for the District
to get something done to the road by
some person interested, but he could not
get a man except by paying him an exceptionally
large sum. The Council directed Mr. Stedman
to have some repairs carried out
by
