Dear Miss Hart,

I am very grateful to you for your letter of the 10th. instant, which reached this Office yesterday, and for your very generous invitation to call and discuss with you the possibilities of securing the services of a District Nurse for the Fanad Area, about which question I have already had an enquiry from Miss Kavanagh, Inspector of the Queen's Institute of District Nursing.

It is true that I am very keen on seeing a District Nursing Association, or some such similar organization, which would employ a District Nurse, established in every Dispensary Area in the County, and, especially, in the poorer and more densely populated parts. Unfortunately, however, I have not, so far, been able to devote much time to the matter having, up to the present, organised only one district.

It will afford me great pleasure to call on you some day in the near future and discuss the whole question with you. I have no doubt in my mind that if we could succeed in interesting a dozen or so of prominent and representative people in the district, there would be little difficulty in forming and keeping alive a Nursing Association.



Dear Miss Hart,

I have to apologise for the long delay in replying to your letter received last week, and also for my failure to pay you a visit, as promised some time ago.

Owing to a family bereavement, I was obliged to absent myself from the County for a good portion of the month of August, and again for a week in September. In addition, the fact that some of my Staff were on holidays kept me more or less bound to the Office in the intervals. Had I not hoped that I would one day be free to pay you the long promised visit, I would have written you a word of explanation.

I am afraid that it will be impossible for me to leave my desk this week, and, next week, I have to attend a Public Health Conference in Dublin. There is, accordingly, little likelihood of my being able to see you earlier than the end of the month.

I succeeded, quite recently, in establishing a Health Club in the Parish of Carndonagh, to take the place of the old District Nursing Associations. It is the first Club of its kind in these Islands, the idea behind it being to interest the general public; to have, at least, one member of every household in the district belong to the Club, and so obviate, to some extent, the difficulty which is being generally experienced at the present time of collecting subscriptions. The response in the first instance was excellent and, since the 1st. September last, the Club has had the services of a fully qualified District Nurse. I am given to understand — though I have not been able to visit the place since she took up duty — that her services are being freely availed of, and are much appreciated. I have little doubt that the Club will be highly successful and that there will be no difficulty in raising the necessary monies (by means of Membership Fees, Public Subscriptions, and Entertainments)

to keep the Nurse employed. The approximate amount required to be collected locally would be between £70 and £80. One-fourth of the Nurse's Salary is usually paid by the Department of Local Government and Public Health in respect of Child Welfare Work, and the County Board of Health contributes about £45 in respect of Tuberculosis and School Medical Inspection work.

With intensive organisation at the start, and, especially, with the Clergy of the various denominations, School-Teachers, and others in a position to influence public opinion, actively interesting themselves in the matter, there is no reason that I can see, why even a poor area, such as Fannet, could not establish such a Club and collect sufficient money to employ a District Nurse.

Dear Miss Hart,

In reply to your letter of yesterday's date, I think it would be entirely against the idea underlying a "Club" that any charge, other than the membership fee, should be made in the case of the Nurse's attendance upon a member, or on the family of a member, of the Club. It is true that in those areas of the County where Jubilee and Dudley Nurses are employed fees are sometimes taken, but then, in those cases, they make no other contribution towards the maintenance of the Nursing Service. A Cottager should, then, be entitled to all the services of the Nurse on payment of the membership fee, except, perhaps, that a small sum might be charged for such things as dressings, etc., that would be provided. This latter is a point that could be gone into later but, in the meantime, it may be taken that the full services provided by the Club will be available to all members who have paid their annual subscription.

The question of maternity work is one that will require very careful consideration, as every effort must be made to prevent any interference with the work of the local District Midwife or Midwives. In Carndonagh, maternity nursing is not undertaken, and I, myself, feel very strongly that only in very exceptional circumstances should our new Nurses engage in the practice of Midwifery.

I am more than pleased to learn that you are holding regular Meetings and that the work of organisation is going on satisfactorily. The initial stages are bound to be slow, but we have got several months before us and it should be possible that by May or June the organisation will be sufficiently far advanced to permit of the Club's affiliating with the Jubilee Association and of our having the Nurses working in the District early in the summer. That, at any rate, should be your aim, and I have no doubt but that you will attain it.

Dear Miss Hart,

I am in receipt of your letter of the 30th.
ultimo, and am very pleased that your organisation is proceeding apace. I think it is a good idea not to start on the work of enrolling membership until the excitement of the Election has died down.

Unless I have misunderstood statements made verbally to me at headquarters, £100 per annum is all that need be subscribed locally. There will be a certain initial expenditure in the first year, as a bicycle and some small equipment will have to be provided for each of the Nurses, but I hope to be able to fix up that. It is my intention, in point of fact, to secure Grants from the various funds on the basis of your finding £80 locally, but there will always be some little incidental expenses to be met, and the aim of your Committee should be to bring your Membership Fees up to £100 per annum. If things plan out as I hope they will the only other worry you would have would be the finding of — not paying for — suitable quarters in a suitable centre for each of the Nurses. The Jubilee Institute, with which your Club will affiliate, pay great attention to that point. They are very averse to permitting their Nurses to reside in quarters which are neither comfortable nor healthy, though they do not always stick strictly to the letter of the law in this matter, as, in certain areas, it is almost impossible to find decent accommodation.



Dear Miss Hart,

I have been in negotiation with the Superintendemt for Ireland of the Queen's Institute of District Nursing on the matter of a subsidy to the Fanad Health Club towards the provision of two District Nurses for the Dispensary District, and have succeeded in securing what I consider, and what I hope your Committee will consider, to be quite generous terms.

The subsidy which it is proposed to allow your Club will be £50 for the first year, £40 for the second year, and £30 for the third and each subsequent year in respect of each of the Nurses. A subsidy equivalent to one-fourth of each Nurse's salary -- roughly £40 -- will be forthcoming from the Department of Local Government and Public Health in respect of Child Welfare Work, and the Board of Health allows £25 and £20 for work in connection with the County Tuberculosis Scheme and School Medical Service respectively.

The details of a District Nurse's salary and allowances are set out in another letter which I enclose herewith. Your Club would then be responsible for a sum of £19 - 10 - 0 for each of the Nurses for the first year, £31 - 10 - 0 in the second year, and £43 - 10 - 0 in the third — in addition, it will have to pay the rent of furnished rooms or cottage. For the first year also there are certain other expenses which you will have to meet, as each Nurse will have to be provided with a bicycle and a bag and her railway fare to the District must be paid. The total of these initial expenses should not, in my mind, exceed £10 per Nurse. The only other outlay will be the cost of affiliating with the Institute of District Nursing.

THE HEALTH CLUB.

Very Rev. Canon Gallagher, P.P., V.F., presided at a meeting of the Fanad Health Club held in the National School, Tamney, on Friday. Also present—Mrs. Barton and Miss Hart, hon. secretaries; Dr. M'Menamin, hon. treasurer; Rev. Father M'Glinchey, C.C., Rev. Father Coyle, C.C., Dr. O Deagha, Mrs. Neal Blaney, Mrs. Hannigan, and Miss Campbell. The Rev. President said their first business was to decide about getting their club affiliated under the District Nursing and Child Welfare Association. Dr. M'Menamin proposed the affiliation, Canon Gallagher seconded, and the motion was passed unanimously.

Dr. O Deagha announced that he had

Dr. O Deagha announced that he had secured two nurses, whose services would be available for Fanad from 1st June next. He submitted to the committee rules regulating the nurses' duties, their pay, emoluments, etc., and the committee's obligation to obtain for them suitable board and lodging, and to provide them each with bicycle, bag and other equipment. The secretaries reported having visited several places and one empty cottage in Fanad North and one district in Fanad South, looking for suitable accommodation for the nurses.

The Rev. Chairman suggested that before settling on any place, it would be
as well to define the areas allotted to
each nurse, and Dr. M'Menamin submitted a plan he had formed dividing the
dispensary area in two, and giving to
each nurse a certain number of townlands, and suggesting a suitable centre
for each. Kindrum for North Fanad,
and Ballynashanagh for South Fanad.
Mrs. Hannigan and Mrs. Blaney objected
to Ballynashanagh being settled on as a
place of residence for the nurse in the
southern area, and suggested Rossnakill
as being more suitable in many ways.

Dr. M'Menamin contended that Ballynashanagh was more central, but Mrs. Hannigan said in these days of wellkept roads the two miles made little difference to a young nurse with a good bicycle, that Ballynashanagh was out of the way and lonely, and Rossnakill much brighter

brighter.

Father M'Glinchey said in Rossnakill, when necessary, she would be within easy reach of a motor. Thank you for your letter. As Mrs Goodliffe raises so many points in her letter that may trouble you from time to time, I think it kinder to give you some facts for future use, should the occasion arise.

- 1. The Federated Superannuation Scheme in operation in England cannot be accepted here as Employers are much too poor to be able to pay 10% on total salary and emoluments of the nurse in to the fund - this Scheme is good for young nurses who contribute 5% and the Committee 10% of the total salary, but obviously that Scheme is useless for older nurses and it is the pioneer and senior nurses that we are working for just now.
- Our pension of £30. is insufficient to live upon, so our nurses must of necessity save for their own old age. They are all doing their own bit and most are insured with some society.

There is no overlapping - The Committee of the Institute in Scotland, England and Ireland all separately rejected the Scheme to get the nurses to contribute to the Pension we control, because of the labour involved in paying out each nurse who left the

All those various Committees considered the question from Service on marriage, etc., every aspect, and I am content to abide by their ruling on the

SUGGESTED CONSTITUTION AND RULES FOR A DISTRICT NURSING ASSOCIATION IN AFFILIATION WITH THE QUEEN'S INSTITUTE.

The Council of the Queen's Institute have prepared the following suggestions, model Constitution and Rules, in the hope that they may be useful to those about to start or to re-organise a Nursing Association in affiliation with the Queen's Institute. The Council, however, being aware that as local conditions vary considerably it is impossible to insist on absolute uniformity of rules or methods of working, do not seek to impose on affiliated Associations a fixed set of rules. While, therefore, they feel that uniformity on points such as minimum salary, hours of work, length of holiday of nurses, etc., is very desirable in order to secure equality of treatment of Queen's Nurses in all parts of the country, no regulations other than those set out under "Rules for District Nursing Associations in affiliation with the Queen's Institute" (p. 2) are deemed essential as a condition of affiliation.

It should be carefully considered whether the Association should be organised on a provident basis, with a scale of contributions suitable for all classes. If this be considered desirable provision should be made in the rules defining the subscriptions and the services to which the subscribers are entitled, it being understood that the nurses' services are given free in all cases of necessity.

It is desirable to obtain the co-operation of all the medical men in the district, and in the larger Associations, to obtain, if possible, the assistance of one or more of them on the Committee.

The following is suggested as a MODEL for a CONSTITUTION:-

- District Nursing Association," in 1.—The name of the Association shall be the " affiliation with the Queen's Institute of District Nursing.
- 2.—The object of the Association shall be to provide skilled nursing in their own homes without distinction of creed for those who are unable to employ a private nurse, the nursing being given free
- in cases of necessity. 3.—The Association shall consist of all annual subscribers of ——— and donors of ——— to the
- 4.—The control and management of the business of the Association shall be vested in the General Committee.
- 5.—A General Meeting of the Association shall be held annually in the month of A cleer the General Committee and Officers, and to receive the Report and Statement of Accounts.
- 6.—The General Committee shall consist of ——— members, together with a President, -Vice-Presidents, Hon. Secretary, and Hon. Treasurer, and shall meet at least — times during the year. — members shall form a quorum.
- 7.—The General Committee may delegate all or any of its powers to an Executive Committee
 members in addition to Hon. Officers. This Committee shall elect its own Chairman and
 members shall form a quorum. It shall meet once a month (or at such other intervals as may be arranged) to transact business and receive reports from the Hon. Secretary, Hon. Treasurer and
- 8.—The Chairman of the General or Executive Committee may at any time summon a Special

9.—There shall be — Trustees of the Association and the first Trustees shall be
Trustees may be appointed or removed by the Association in General Meeting. Temporary vacancies among the Trustees shall be filled up by the General Committee.

To.—All the real and leasehold properties and all the investments belonging to the Association shall be vested in the Trustees and they shall have the custody of all deeds and documents of Title relating to the property of the Association and shall deal with and dispose of all the property of the Association, whether real or personal, for the time being vested in them and the income thereof in accordance with the directions of the members of the Association or of the General Committee, either of whom shall have power at any time to put an end to the Association and to provide for the disposal of its property whether real or personal.

11.—The income and property of the Association whencesoever derived shall be applied solely towards the promotion of the objects of the Association without any profit to the members thereof.

12.—All Funds of the Association shall be paid into a Bank in the name of the Association, and all cheques shall be signed by the Hon. Treasurer, or in his absence or illness by such person as may be authorised on that behalf by the Executive Committee.

14.—The Constitution and Rules of the Association shall not be altered or amended except at the Annual Meeting or at a special meeting called for that purpose, not less than twenty-one days' notice of the proposed change being sent to each member of the Association.

As a general principle the rules should be as few and as simple as possible, but care should be taken to make quite clear the essential duties of the nurse. It is a condition of affiliation that the services of the nurse should be available without distinction of creed, that the nurse should not interfere with the religious views of her patients, and that the nursing should be carried out under the directions of the medical practitioners. Care should be taken to define as far as possible the hours of the nurse's work, and to ensure her punctuality. This is important in order to prevent overwork. Provision also should be made for the nurse being at home, if possible, at a fixed time once a week in order that the Hon. Secretary or other visitors may be sure of finding her.

Appended are rules embodying the main principles of the Queen's Institute, the adoption of which is a necessary condition of affiliation. They are followed by suggested bye-laws for one nurse, and with certain modifications, for the cases of two or three nurses living and working together.

*The rules and the bye-laws marked with an asterisk are essential for Associations desiring affiliation with the Queen's Institute of District Nursing.

RULES FOR DISTRICT NURSING ASSOCIATIONS IN AFFILIATION WITH THE QUEEN'S INSTITUTE.

*I.—The primary duty of the nurse shall be to attend, in their own homes and without distinction of creed, those who are unable to employ a private nurse, it being understood that free nursing is given in cases of necessity.

*2.—The general sick nursing of the patients shall be carried out under the direction of the medical practitioners.

*3.—Application for the services of the nurse may be made direct to her or otherwise. The nurse may attend a patient on application or in emergency, but must not continue to visit without informing a medical man and receiving his instructions, if any. Should a nurse advise that a patient should have a doctor and the advice be not accepted, the nurse may not attend this patent except in case of fresh emergency. She must report the matter to her Secretary.

*4.—The nurse shall not dispense for her patients any such drugs as should only be prescribed by a medical man.

*5.—The nurse shall in no case attempt to influence a patient in the choice of a doctor.

*6.—A midwife shall not accept an engagement without first asking the patient to state and herself registering the name of the doctor to be called in should any emergency arise.

*7.—The nurse is strictly forbidden to interfere in any way with the religious opinions of patients or of members of their families.

*8.—The nurse shall not act as almsgiver, or except in cases of urgent necessity, herself distribute nourishment or other relief. She shall at once report any such case to the Hon. Secretary or other proper authority. (When private gifts are received to assist a special case, the patient should be informed that this comes from a private source and not from the Association. All such gifts should be acknowledged in the Annual Report.)

SUGGESTED BYE-LAWS FOR NURSES.

*I.—The general sick nursing of the patients shall be carried out under the direction of the medical practitioners.

*2.—The nurse is strictly forbidden to interfere in any way with the religious opinions of patients or of members of their families.

*3.—The nurse shall not act as almsgiver, or, except in cases of urgent necessity, herself distribute nourishment or other relief. She shall at once report any such case to the Hon. Secretary or other proper authority. (When private gifts are received to assist a special case, the patient should be informed that this comes from a private source and not from the Association.)

*4.—The nurse shall not dispense for her patients any drugs as should only be prescribed by a medical man.

*5.—The nurse shall in no case attempt to influence a patient in the choice of a doctor.

6.—The nurse may not attend infectious cases unless with the sanction of the medical men and Committee.

7.—The nurse shall be responsible to the Committee of the Association, and shall keep in the form prescribed a register of patients, time and case books, and shall report regularly to the Committee upon her work.

8.—The nurse is not to be on duty more than eight hours daily, except under special circumstances. On Sundays she shall only attend cases requiring special or immediate attention. Night duty shall only be undertaken under exceptional circumstances, when due provision can be made for the other cases under her care. She shall be entitled to a month's holiday in the year, and shall have, if possible, half a day off duty every week and a week-end occasionally.

9.—The nurse shall be punctual in going to and returning from her district and shall leave word at her rooms where she is likely to be found. Any messages or instructions for the nurse should be given in writing, so as to avoid leaving verbal messages with patients or others. A slate should be provided at the nurse's rooms on which messages may be written when she is out. When the nurse has anything to communicate to the doctor she shall do so in writing, and it is hoped that the doctor will do the same to avoid leaving verbal messages with patients or their friends.

10.—The nurse shall be in her rooms from 3 to 4 o'clock on —— every week in order to meet the Hon. Secretary or any member of the Committee who may desire to see her.

11.—The nurse when on duty shall wear the uniform dress and no ornaments.

12.—The nurse shall not accept any presents from patients or their friends.

13.—The nurse shall be responsible for all appliances, clothing, etc., lent to her patients, and shall see, as far as possible, that they are returned in good condition.

r4.—The nurse shall be responsible for the personal cleanliness of her patients. She shall endeavour to improve their general surroundings, and when the relations of the patients can be taught how to keep the room in nursing order, they should be encouraged to do so.

15. The nurse if acting as a midwife or maternity nurse shall be responsible for the care of mother and infant during the lying-in period (i.e., during the time of labour and for ten days after, or for longer, if necessary). She should visit each case twice daily for at least three days and at the end of the month to see that the mother has made a good convalescence and the child is in good health.

Apart from its central and convenient situation, the new Church occupies a position on an eminence from which scenery of unrivalled beauty and variety meets the eye. From whatever direction one looks from the church grounds, scenes of panoramic splendour are abundantly available. From one point, the placid waters of Lough Swilly, seeming in the distance to wash against the rugged sides of the mountains of Inishowen, may ben seen. Looking in the opposite direction, the breakers of the broad Atlantic are to be beheld. And just in front there is the incomparable scenic grandeur of the Peninsula itself. Here can be seen a vista of such loveliness as places Fanad amongst the most alluring of the attractive spots which make Donegal so popular with the seeker after natural beauty.

The Church, it can be truthfully said, is as much an object of beauty as is the delightful country in which it is set. But it is prized for something more than its chaste design and artistic finish. The people of the parish regard it primarily as a new Church of God more-and in many cases, very much more-accessible than either of the other two to which heretofore they were obliged to travel, Summer and Winter, to fulfil their religious obligations. Up to the present, those living in the more remote districts had to attend either St. Columba's Church at Massmount or St. Mary's at Fanavolty This, for many families, meant a walk of four miles or more, a severe strain particularly on elderly people, in the bitterness of Winter weather. Now these inconveniences and hardships may be regarded as only a memory. The people have had provided a Church of their own, and it dedicated to the National Apostle. No wonder, then, there was joy and jubilation in this extensive part of the parish yesterday when the hopes and expectations of, one might say, generations of Catholics, were so auspiciously realised.

Here can be seen a vista of such loveliness as places Fanad amongst the most alluring of the attractive spots which make Donegal so popular with the seeker after natural beauty.

I am very anxious to see the Nurses and have a chat with them about their work, and shall, accordingly, pay a visit to the District at the first available opportunity.

A letter recently received from Mrs. Barton contained the gratifying information that they were being well received in the Child Welfare branch of their work and made mention of a rumour, which she was not in a position to confirm, that you had been promised a contribution of £20 a year from the Irish Lights. I sincerely hope that this latter is true and that everything continues to go well.

I feel that the number of District Mursing Associations and Health Clubs in existence, or in process of formation, in County Donegal has now reached proportions when a good and useful purpose would be served by delegates from the various Health Organisations meeting together in the form of a County Committee.

While the immediate object of the various organisations is the provision and maintenance of a District Nursing Service, there are many other spheres of work in which they might engage to the great advantage of the public health; and it would be one of the aims of the County Committee to discuss and devise ways and means of extending their present activities and to secure that, as far as local circumstances would permit, any new projects undertaken would be worked or uniform lines. The formation of such a Committee would also have a very big influence in the establishment of fresh organisations and in the furtherance generally of Public Health work throughout the County.

Apart altogether from the ouestion of embarking on new schemes, I think it will be generally agreed that it would be well, and conducive to more efficient working, if the different organisations and clubs were to establish contact with each other and have the opportunity periodically of interchanging ideas on their several problems and difficulties.

I trust then that you will find it convenient to attend — or to be represented by some other member of your Committee — et a County Meeting, which it is proposed to hold at these offices on Saturday, the 24th. instant, at the hour of 4 p.m.

That the work of organisation and the onus of raising the requisite monies should be left on the shoulders of the few was, in his opinion, due to a lack of realisation of the nature and value of the services rendered by district nurses rather than to a disinclination on the part of the public at large to support a deserving cause; and it would be one of the duties of a County Committee to devise ways and means of stimulating a more general interest in the scheme. "There is no greater charity, no object more worthy of support." said Dr. O Deagha, "than the provision of district nursing for the poor people of isolated and remote areas." He felt sure that, if the public had a proper appreciation of the important role played by the district nurse in the life of our people and if they were fully aware of the struggle being made, year in year out, by a small band of voluntary workers to maintain and extend these services. the apathy, now so generally apparent. would soon give place to a sympathetic and practical interest.

He was glad to be able to announce to the meeting that, despite this general lack of support, good progress was being made in the county in the establishment of new health clubs and the placing of nurses. Within the last twelve months no fewer than five new districts had been opened up, and two more would have nurses installed in the course of a month or six weeks—making a total in all of seventeen Jubilee and Dudley nurses in County Donegal.

The resolution that a County Committee be formed was proposed by Miss Hart, Carrablagh, and seconded by Mrs. Fforde, Bruckless. On the suggestion of Captain Hamilton, Brownhall, it was agreed that the present membership be provisional and last until January of next year, by which time each club and association would have the opportunity of appointing representatives on the Committee. During the year 185 gardens were opened in 19 counties, and the gross proceeds amounted to £2.263.

After paying expenses, one-half of this goes to the endowment fund for nurses' pensions, and the other half realised in each county is divided amongst the affiliated District Nursing Associations within that county.

The President of the Institute in Ireland thanks all who so graciously gave their services to organise the "Gardan Scheme" in the various counties, for without this valuable and efficient assistance this result could not possibly have been secured. Grateful thanks are also extended to the 185 garden owners for all the trouble taken when opening their places to the public.

It was reported that the Garden Committee had decided to continue the Garden Scheme during 1933 on similar lines.

SATISFACTORY REPORTS.

The Hon. Sec. stated that the inspectors' reports on visits paid to districts with nurses, and their interviews with the local parish priests, doctors, and committees were particularly satisfactory, and it was considered gratifying to know that the young nurses recently placed in districts were maintaining the high standard of efficiency and skill so long

ADY INCHIQUIN, Dromoland Castle, Newmarket-on-Fergus, presided at a public meeting in Ennis, convened by the local branch of the Women's National Health Association, to consider means by which the services of the local Jubilee nurse (Miss Boylan) could be continued.

Mrs. Vere O'Brien, Ballyalla, said that the Association of the W.N.H. was aided partly by public funds and partly by subscriptions, and since its inception they had had five Jubilee nurses in Ennis. They had every reason to be thankful for the devotion and attention these nurses had shown in their work. It was her earnest hope that the nurse would be continued in the town; the only difficulty was one of finance. She wished to make it clear that the nurse was not an extra doctor, but a help to every doctor who looked after the health of the people.

The total cost was £202 per annum, and the balance of £150 had to be obtained from the public, either in the form of subscriptions or otherwise. "Take the question of children," said Mr. Gleeson. "The hardships which poverty brings fall more cruelly on children than on their parents. COMMISSION TO INVESTIGATE.

BILL TO COME BEFORE DAIL.

MEANTIME, NO MORE "SWEEP" MONEY.

No more money is to be disbursed from IN sweepstake proceeds to the hospitals until a commission has been set up by the Government and has investigated the

entire position.
Dr. Ward, the Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Local Government and Public Health, made this announcement in Public Health, made this announcement in the Dail yesterday when he foreshadowed new sweepstakes legislation, which is to come before the House this session, pro-bably within three weeks. He was reply-ing to criticisms which had been made by Mr. T. J. Murphy, a West Cork Labour deputy, who had introduced a private bill to bring certain hospitals in Cork within the range of the "sweeps." This bill was given a second reading, after which Mr. Murphy, in view of the ministerial announcement, agreed to the postponement of its further stages until the Government bill had come before the House.

NO FREE BEDS FOR POOR.

Briefly, Mr. Murphy's allegation was that, while some of the hospitals which benefited from the sweepstakes had observed their obligations, others had not. It will be remembered that legislation provides that allocations of money are made on the understanding that twenty-five per cent, of the beds should be devoted to the free accommodation of the very poor. Mr. Murphy mentioned one hospital which, he said, had no free beds, and, as he had been told, had no intention

of providing any.

Dr. Ward sympathised with Mr.

Murphy's complaint, and explained that there was no statutory power to ensure that the hospitals which were beneficiaries should keep their obligations. Hence the

The proposal had a blessing from Mr. FitzGerald-Kenney, who, as the Minister responsible for the supervision of sweep-stakes under the late Government, remarked on the difference between the amounts that were expected to be realised when the sweepstakes were first legalised and the amounts that had actually been chained. The expectations of even the most sanguine people had been realised a thousand-fold, he declared.

AMALGAMATION OF SMALL HOSPITALS.

Had such a success been thought of, said Mr. FitzGerald-Kenney, the small Dublin hospitals would probably have been amalgamated into two or three large hospitals, a step which would have made both for efficiency and economy; and he was anxious that this should be accomplished under the new bill. Without committing himself on this point, Dr. Ward stressed the fact that the commission would go into all aspects of the heavier. l go into all aspects of the hospitals

With this matter out of the way, deputies settled down to discuss a demand for another commission, this time by General Sean MacEoin, who wanted an inquiry into claims for losses sustained as a result of military operations between 1916 and 1921. What the Government's attitude towards this question was the House did not learn; for the adjournment came before the debate had proceeded far.

Unfortunately for the Opposition, they have not the power to set up commissions. If they had, they would doubtless establish one to discover who is the eminent, but anonymous, legal authority upon whose advice Mr. MacEntee bases his argument that there is no legal obligation upon the Free State to hand over to Britain not only the land annuities, but also the R.I.C. pensions.

Her instruction and advice helped to prevent disease, and it would be a great pity if the town had to go without the much-needed services of such a highly-skilled nurse.

The meeting decided to include all the practising doctors in the town, also the clergy, on the Committee, and to make a house-to-house collection of the town at an early date. It was also decided to make

early date. It was also decided to make application to Mr. Meghen for an increased grant from urban funds.

COMMISSION TO INVESTIGATE.

BILL TO COME BEFORE DAIL.

MEANTIME, NO MORE "SWEEP" MONEY.

BY OUR SPECIAL CORRESPONDENT.

No more money is to be disbursed from sweepstake proceeds to the hospitals until a commission has been set up by the Government and has investigated the

entire position.
Dr. Ward, the Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Local Government and Public Health, made this announcement in the Dail yesterday when he foreshadowed new sweepstakes legislation, which is to come before the House this session, probably within three weeks. He was replying to criticisms which had been made by Mr. T. J. Murphy, a West Cork Labour deputy, who had introduced a private bill to bring certain hospitals in Cork within the range of the "sweeps." This bill was given a second reading, after which Mr. Murphy, in view of the ministerial announcement, agreed to the postponement of its further stages until the Government bill had come before the House.

NO FREE BEDS FOR POOR.

Briefly, Mr. Murphy's allegation was that, while some of the hospitals which benefited from the sweepstakes had observed their obligations, others had not. It will be remembered that legislation provides that allocations of money are made on the understanding that twentyfive per cent. of the beds should be devoted to the free accommodation of the very poor. Mr. Murphy mentioned one hospital which, he said, had no free beds, and, as he had been told, had no intention of providing any.

Dr. Ward sympathised with Mr. Murphy's complaint, and explained that there was no statutory power to ensure that the hospitals which were beneficiaries

that the hospitals which were beneficiaries should keep their obligations. Hence the new bill.

The proposal had a blessing from Mr. FitzGerald-Kenney, who, as the Minister responsible for the supervision of sweep-stakes under the late Government, remarked on the difference between the amounts that were averaged to be realized. amounts that were expected to be realised when the sweepstakes were first legalised and the amounts that had actually been obtained. The expectations of even the most canguine people had been realised a thousand-fold, he declared.

AMALGAMATION OF SMALL HOSPITALS.

Had such a success been thought of, said Mr. FitzGerald-Kenney, the small Dublin hospitals would probably have been amalgamated into two or three large hospitals, a step which would have made both for efficiency and economy; and he was anxious that this should be accomplished under the new bill. Without com-mitting himself on this point, Dr. Ward stressed the fact that the commission would go into all aspects of the hospitals'

With this matter out of the way, deputies settled down to discuss a demand for another commission, this time by General Sean MacEoin, who wanted an inquiry into claims for losses sustained as a result of military operations between 1916 and 1921. What the Government's attitude towards this question was the House did not learn; for the adjournment

came before the debate had proceeded far. Unfortunately for the Opposition, they have not the power to set up commissions. If they had, they would doubtless establish one to discover who is the eminent, but anonymous, legal authority upon whose advice Mr. MacEntee bases his argument that there is no legal obligation upon the Free State to hand over to Britain not only the land annuities, but also the R.I.C. pensions,


THE ANONYMOUS AUTHORITY.

As to his eminence there could be no question; for Mr. MacEntee grew quite lyrical when he dwelt upon it. His monymity is equally unquestionable. The Minister for Finance refused to give the slightest hint when he referred during the debate on the vote for various allowances, including the pensions, to requests which Mr. McGilligan had made for enlightenment when the debate opened the previous night.

The Government has secured advice through the usual channels. That advice has been fortified by a man whose competence and standing at the Bar is un-challenged, and unchallengeable by Deputy McGilligan." This was as far as the Minister would go.

"This man is so conscious of his standing as a lawyer that he has apparently stipulated that he must remain anony nous," was the terse comment of Mr. Fitzgerald. "The reason, and the only possible reason, why the Minister will not give the man's name is that the man who was paid by the Government agreed to give the Government the advice it wanted, but stipulated that his name must not be used in connection with it. Knowing now that the advice was wrong, and that it has landed the country in its present mess, he

is going to remain anonymous."
While on the subject of mysteries and inquiries, it is interesting to note that, for the first time in history, the vote for secret service purposes passed without discussion. Such are the results of a change of Government.



Hospital Facilities in Donegal.

Medical Inspector's Proposals.

FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT.

A scheme for the development of hospital facilities in Donegal was outlined by Dr. E. C. Lycett, Medical Inspector, Free State Local Government Department, to a meeting of the County Donegal Board of Health, which was held to-day at Stranorlar. The report is the result of the Board's application for the inclusion of their hospital in the benefits of the sweepstakes.

benefits of the sweepstakes.

Dr. Lycett advised the division of the county into two areas, each to be served by two large surgical and medical hospitals one at Letterkenny and one at Donegal. An increase in the number of beds in each hosp tal would be necessary, as both were overcrowded. In Letterkenny hospital there

hospital would be necessary, as both were overcrowded. In Letterkenny hospital there were from sixty to seventy beds, and in the Donegal institution there were sixty.

In regard to the Lifford hospital, he would point out that only its claim to be regarded as the county hospital justified its retent on as a surgical or even as a district hospital. He was absolutely opposed to any suggestion of its being developed as a surgical hospital. He advocated the construction of a Cottage Hospital at Gweedore, the most populous part of the county, for the treatment of medical, matern'ty and minor injuries cases. Such an institution should have a capacity of about fifteen beds, and might be put under the care of one of the religious orders. He also advocated the retention of the Carndonagh Fever Hospital.

REPORT OF THE INSPECTOR.

An important scheme affecting hospitals in Dongsal is outlined in the course of an exhautive report by Dr. E. C. Lysaght, me cal respector of the Department of Lo. Government, to come before the Lo Government, to come before the Don al Board of Health to be held at Stranoriar to-day.

The report is a sequel to an application from the Board for a contribution from the Sweepstake Fund for hospital improvements for the county.

The report is likely to cause onsiderable discussion in view of the revolutionary scheme outlined.

Dr. Lysaght recommended dividing the

scheme outlined.

Dr. Lysaght recommended dividing the county into two sections for the purpose of establishing two large medical and surgical hospitals, one at Letterkenny, serving the northern section, and another at Donegal serving the southern section.

These two hospitals at present are staffed with medical officers who have for years being doing surgical work and were well qualified to take on the work.

The scheme would necess tate increasing the number of beds available at Donegal and Letterkenny, which was already too small for the present needs. In he case of Letterkenny the number of beds was fixed at 62 to 70, and in Donegal the number was 60 beds.

Dealing with the Lifford Hospital, the inspector pointed out that the only point he could see for its retention was the state of the building, and its claim to be regarded as a county hospital. With the establishment of a big central hospital at Letterkenny he could see no reason for its retention as a surgical hospital, or even as a district hospital.

In envisaging the development of the central hospitals in Donegal and Letterkenny he recommended concentration on surgical cases, and the ultimate closing of Lifford Hospital.

He was absolutely opposed to developing it as a surgical hospital, and to any further expenditure on it as such.

Dealing with the Ballyshannon Hospital, the Inspector said he would recommend that it be cosed. It was convenient to Donegal, and moreover there was a voluntary hospital in the town, and all arrangements might be made in it to help the sick poor of the town, and a small part of the county, extending out towards Bundoran.

Dr. Lysaght further recommended the establishment of a cottage hospital of about 15 beds somewhere about Gweedore, a thickly populated and poor part of the county which was badly served. Provision could be made at this hospital for medical and maternity cases, and even surgical cases.



DISTRICT NURSES GREAT WORK

MORE HELPERS NEEDED

SUCCESS OF GARDEN SCHEME

The great work that is being accomplished by the Irish Branch of the Queen's

plished by the Irish Branch of the Queen's Institute of District Nursing was emphasised at a meeting of the branch in the College of Physicians yesterday.

The Countess of Kenmare, who presided, in welcoming the delegates, said it was good for the Institute that many had travelled long distances to give the organisation their support. The Association had faced much work, and had overcome many difficulties. The steady progress was due to the devoted zeal and disinterested solicitude of the workers.

GARDEN SCHEME.

The outstanding features of the year were the success of the garden scheme and the work of the ladies at the hospital and the work of the ladies at the hospital supply depot. During the year 21 new districts in eleven different centres had been established and affiliated to the Institute. The ladies' depot had sent out 41 bales of dressings to nurses. A band of willing workers was to be found at 11 Merrion Sq. twice weekly, and there was 1,800 roller bandages, 45,100 surgical pads, 550 pneumonia jackets, 60 "many tail" bandages, 450 "T" bandages, 315 articles of baby clothing, and 60 cot quits.

Still more workers were needed. The Institute had 151 districts and 165 nurses all waiting for bales of dress-

NORTHERN IRELAND.

Miss Colburn, Superintendent for Ire-land, read the report of the Northern land, read the report of the Northern Ireland Executive, which stated that new associations had been established in Derry, Tyrone, and Fermanagh. In Belfast the long-established society for providing nurses for the sick poor had been a training home, where fully trained and State-registered nurses received their post graduate course in district nursing and public health activities.

The Garden scheme during 1932 proved most satisfactory, 89 gardens having been opened, and realised £721. Regret was expressed at the death of Sir T. Moneypenny, and thanks were expressed to Dr. C. S. Thomson, Belfast, for his help and courtesy.

WORK IN FREE STATE.

The report of the Free State Committee again appealed to the friends of the Garlen scheme to give their invaluable aid, and gratitude was expressed to the county organisers who had assisted in making the sceems the wonderful success it had been to helping not only the Nurses' Pension Fund, but also the funds of the local Nursing Associations.

SPLENDID WORK OF IRISH BRANCH.

The Queen's Institute of District Nursing ranks high among the active philanthropic bodies in the country. Founded in 1887, the Irish branch owes its existence to a thanks-offering fund raised by Irish women in celebration of Queen Victoria's jubilee in that year, and of her diamond jubilee in 1897. The accumulated interest on the fund provides for the long and thorough training undergone by the "Jubilee" nurses, as they are popularly known.

Throughout Ireland these nurses are doing good. There are more than 250 of them, and last year they paid over two million calls in all parts of the country. The Institute, in fact, employs the largest number of fully-trained and State registered nurses in Ireland, and is responsible for training all the nurses working under the Lady Dudley scheme, and in St. Patrick's and St. Lawrence's Homes.

The opening of beautiful gardens throughout Ireland is among the schemes which provide for the £4,000 annual cost of the branch's work; a sum of £10,000 has been raised in this way during the last three years. There has been inaugurated recently a scheme of penny-a-week contributions, and this idea has been adopted by very many of the new local associations which are constantly enlarging the scope of the Institute in Ireland. The scheme originated in Edinburgh, where the amazing sum of £3,000 in halfpennies was raised in the first year.

"At present only the strictest economy, the lack of that expensive red-tape, and the fact that nurses in their work do not expect an eight-hour day, make it possible for us to get along." Miss Coburn, the Institute's superintendent for all-Ireland, told an Irish Times reporter. Miss Coburn added: "Our dearest ambition is that every home in Ireland shall have within call a fully-trained 'Jubilee' nurse."

It is of interest to note that these curses, apart from sick-nursing, are qualified school-nurses, health-visitors, maternity and child-welfare workers, and tuberculosis nurses; in this way they earn from public authorities half of their salaries. The local associations provide the rest.





In the last three years Donegal had made great strides in this most important social service, and he was happy to be in a position to assure those ladies in the various districts of untiring devotion and enthusiasm had made possible the establishment and maintenance of the service in so many centres, that their nurses were discharging their arduous duties in the fields of preventitive medicine, as well as in sick nursing, in a manner which commanded the most cordial appreciation of the general pubic. They were winning respect and recognition in ever-increasing measure

in official as well as in unofficial cir-

cles. (Applause.) "When the formation of a County Committee was first resorted to some time ago," continued Dr. O'Deagha, "we had little idea of the nature of the activities such a body might engage in. or of any of the purposes it might ultimately serve. I am, accordingly, glad to have heard Miss Colburn outline s programme of work to which you migh set yourselves, and I am particularly mpressed by her plea, that while still ontinuing to devote yourselves in the ame whole-hearted fashion to local ffort. For, as an Association, should aim at the development of "county aindedness" in district nursing affairs When individual and isolated effort has succeeded wthin the space of three years in almost trebling the number of nurses operating in the county, there is every reason to hope that with the establishment of a county committee, full of zeal and enthusiasm for the success of the cause which they had all at heart and relying upon the encouragement and support of the Public Health Authorities both here and in Dublin, the time is not far distant when the entire county will be covered with a net-work of nurses. (Applause.) The twenty or twentyfive districts that yet remain to be organised will have the benefits of thi invaluable service. Whether in his official or unofficial capacity, he would be only too willing at all times to give the county committee every support in their efforts to achieve their desirable

From an intimate knowledge of the work of these nurses over a period of five years there was no aspect of the public services which had given him more satisfaction than the development and spread of the district nursing service in the county.

DR. SEAN O'DEA

Dr. Sean O'Dea, Medical Officer of Health for Councy Donegal, who recently had under-gone an operation for appendicitis, died yesterday in a Dublin nursing home, aged forty-three years. Born in Lallynacarry, County Clare, he acted for a time as a secondary eacher in County Limerick.

He played a prominent part in the Sinn Féin movement. In 1916 he was deported, and in 1921 he was interned in Ballykinlar. On his release he continued his studies, graduating M.B., B.Ch. and B.A.O., and taking the D.P.H. He served for a time as Medical Officer in the Free State Army, and afterwards was appointed as Medical Inspec-tor under the Department of Local Government. A fluent linguist, Dr. O'Dea held the

He was appointed Medical Officer of Health for County Donegal in 1929, and in the be-ginning of the following year took up his duties. Dr. O'Dea was one of the most popular officials in the county. He introduced a number of reforms in public health adminisration, and was the maugurator of a scheme which aimed at the provision, within a period of ten years, of adequate water supplies and sewerage schemes for every town and village with a population of over 200 in the county. Last Autumn Dr. O'Dea was married to Dr Halpenny, Pathologist to the Richmond

Nurses' Pension Fund. It was admitted that the Garden Scheme provided much pleasure to many, and it had proved to be one of the few ideal ways of raising money, giving pleasure to the garden owners, garden lovers and the general public.

A report on the Garden Scheme for 1935 shows there were 73 gardens opened in 10 counties in the Irish Free State, and the total

proceeds, including special donations, mounted to £778 2s. 11d.

Since the scheme was organised, in 1930, 1,067 gardens have been opened in the Irish Free State, and, in addition, 190 friends have given special donations in lieu of opening their gardens, and the total sum realised to date is £14,459, which is considered to be a

very satisfactory result.

LADY DUDLEY'S SCHEME

NURSING IN THE

WEST

DUBLIN ROTARY CLUB **ADDRESS**

THE work of Lady Dudley's Nursing Scheme for the establishment of district nurses in the poorest parts of Ireland was briefly reviewed by Mr. Conrad A. Pim, who acts as hon. treasurer, at yesterday's luncheon meeting of the Dublin Rotary Club in the Metropole Restaurtnt.

"I cannot but help feeling that, if the authorities knew and appreciated our work, they would say: 'Here is some money. Will you see that no part of the country requiring the services of a nurse is without it, " said

The scheme was established thirty-three years ago by Lady Dudley, who, when on holiday in the West, realised the need of providing district nurses in places where it was impossible to establish the usual Nursing Committee, under the Queen's Institute of District Nursing in Ireland. For this purpose she collected a sum of money from her friends. Six nurses were appointed in the first year, and there are now forty-five. The work is controlled by a committee in Dublin, the president of which is the Countess of Mayo. Nurses are stationed, mostly on the seaboard, from Donegal, through Sligo, Mayo, Galway, Cork and Kerry, with one in the mountainous district of Cavan and in Roscommon. The last appointment, just a year ago, was to Inisheer, one of the smaller Aran Islands. There the nurse is almost entirely on her own, the nearest doctor being about nine miles away. The Hospitals' Commission have provided enough money to pay her expenses. This nurse is an Irish speaker; purely Irish-speaking nurses being sent to Irish-speaking

COST OF SCHEME

Expenses at present, said Mr. Pim, amounted to about £9,500 a year, as it takes roughly £200 to finance each nurse. Expendi ture was exceeding income, the excess of outlay over income last year being about £1,300. This should not be allowed to continue. That could only be done by increasing their income or reducing their expenses. Reducing expenses meant the withdrawal of nurses; but they would not do that until they could do nothing else. Income, he said, was derived from various sources, subscriptions, grants from local authorities, income from investments, payment from the Department of Local Government and Public Health for Child Welfare, etc., and patients' contributions. The latter amount last year, he said, amounted to over £500.

As showing how fully the time of the nurses was occupied, Mr. Pim mentioned that in the year 1934 110,870 visits were paid, 6,964 cases were attended to, and 113,951 maternity and child welfare visits were paid. Most of the travelling was done by cycle as the scheme could not afford the expense of motor cars. Excellent relations expense of motor cars. Excellent relations existed with Government departments, local authorities, priests and doctors. The Lady Dudley Nurses, said Mr. Pim, were without the backing of a local committee to supervise and help them, as in the case of most of the nurses working directly under the Queen's Institute. The position of a nurse under such conditions, with possibly only the priest and the doctor to speak to outside her and the doctor to speak to outside her patients, was a very lonely one, and one calling for women efficient and self-reliant, of much courage and strength, both of mind and body.

FULLY TRAINED

In conclusion, Mr. Pim mentioned that all nurses working under the Lady Dudley nursing scheme were fully trained by the Queen's Institute of District Nursing in Ire land, and are inspected by the Institute's

inspectors.

THE DEFICIT

Mr. Telford said there was a deficit on the year's working of £372. That, with their ioss in the previous year, made their accumulated loss something like £1.000. Temporarily that had been made good out of capital, but this was not very satisfactory.

Mr. Conrad Pim, who spoke on the work of the nurses under the Lady Dudley scheme, said that six new nurses had been appointed, bringing their total number to 45. They were stationed from Donegal through Sligo, Mayo, Galway, Cavan, Cork and Kerry. Last year they got £200 from the Hospitals' Commission, and had established a nurse on the Island of Inishere, Galway. The neighbouring Island of Inishmann now also wanted a nurse, and would get her, but the only drawback was the want of money. She spoke of the work of Lady Wyndham Quin and Lady Maureen Brabazon in getting in subscriptions. The Institute spent £9,000 a year on their 45 nurses, but they had exceeded their income by £1,300.

THE GARDEN SCHEME

Sir Frederick W. Moore, Chairman of the arden Scheme Committee, said that when was decided to establish a pension fund or the nurses they collected about £4,000 towards it. As the result of the opening of the gardens throughout the country, the Pension Fund had now accumulated to £17,000. Not all the money collected went the fund; some of it went to help the strict nurses. About £3,000 more had to collected to make up the sum required. had been decided that £20,000 would be sufficient fund to accumulate for the unsion Fund.
