McLoskey dated 8th April 1922 stating he had inspected the premises of the Northern Bank, Miss Cassie Doherty, Robt A Dewers, Bernard Doherty, Philip Brampsey and found them all in good order. He also inspected the the Holes premises of Miss Doherty and found that from the water closet there is a pipe which discharges nuisance into this drain which is very disagreeable.

Read letter from the Manager National Bank Barndrough dated 12th April 1922 ~~and~~ acknowledging receipt of the intimation regarding the appointment of the Bank as Treasurer of Dushomen Union and ^{District} Council requesting sealed copy of the resolutions and copy of the minutes of Councils relative to same and stating the Interest on Credit balances of Public Bodies accounts is the published Deposit Rate (varying) at present 2%. The Rate applicable to overdrafts is $\frac{1}{2}$ % under Irish Bank's Rate (varying) minimum 4%, the present Rate would be 5%.

Read letter from Mr P.S. Waters, Clerk of Letterkenny R.D. stating that the changes in Valuations in Derry No 2 area are added at the end of Letterkenny list instead of Dushowen and being part of the Letterkenny list he could not send it here but that the rate books would show the changes.

Read letter from Mr Alec Perry Clerk of Union Londonderry dated 3rd June 1922 applying for a superannuation allowance of £60 as from 1st April 1921 in respect of his service as Clerk to the late Derry No 2 R.D. Council which ceased to function at 1st April 1921. He had written to Earl Curragh L.G. Dept and had been directed to lodge his claim with Dushowen R.D. Council to be dealt with. He pointed out that his salary at 31/3/21 was £154-10-0 that he had been put on a graded scale from 1st July 1920 prior to which his salary was £71 a year. That his average salary and emoluments for the three years ended 31/3/21 was £108-9-4 a year. He had 22 years service which, increased by the 50% the L.G. Ministry made 33 years for calculation purposes $\frac{33}{60}$ worked out roughly at £60 a year - Councillor.

John O'Donnell stated that Mr Perry Still acted as Clerk to Derry Guardians and No 1 Council and had a large salary, that he lived in the northern area and it would not be fair under the circumstances to saddle Ratepayers in the Free State with his pensions. He moved that the letter be marked "read". Councillor P. Buckley seconded the motion which was passed unanimously.

Read letter from Mr John McIntyre B.C. Letterkenny dated 15th May 1922 forwarding account for £119-16-0 for making valuations maps Reports and attending Courts to give evidence in connection with Criminal Injuring claims against Derry No 2 Council in 11 Cases. He had furnished his claim to Derry No 2 Council and they offered £30 without prejudice, exclusive of £5-5-0 allowed in one case by the Assize Judge, but had ceased to function before the claim was settled.

Councillor John O'Donnell moved, Councillor P.H. Doherty seconded that it was unanimously Resolved that the offer of £30 in full settlement, without prejudice be made to Mr McIntyre, as his bill seems very high, this to be exclusive of £5-5-0 allowed by the Judge of Assize.

The applicant stated he had vast experience in the building trade in all its branches both here ^{and} abroad. He had also held the appointment of manual Instructor from the Congested Districts Board for three years.

Mr Cole proposed and Mr Aughey seconded that Henry Doherty be appointed to do the work in accordance with the terms of the advertisement.

Mr E. J. Doherty proposed and Mr Canney seconded as an amendment that as the advertisement was for architects or engineers an advertisement be ^{issued} leaving the appointment open to tradesmen.

Mr Charles McFormick Solicitor appeared in support of the application and pointed out that the transfer suggested was equitable as it would tend to equalise the respective collection districts leaving the Moville district still the largest in valuation by £677, and further, that prior to the 1st Oct, Gleneely E.D. belonged to Malin.

Councillor Cole proposed and Councillor Mator seconded that it be recommended that Gleneely E.D. be transferred from Moville to Malin.

Sub Officer ~~was~~ is £48, as Sub Inspector of Dairies £14 and about £38 poundage on Cottage rents - In addition to this he earns £8 as Sanitary Sub-Officer for a portion of Derry No 1 R. District. The £10 bonus was granted as a war bonus to be paid until prices came back.

(2) The bonus was originally a war bonus and continued indefinitely after the war as his salary was small, prices were higher, and he had no other employment or source of income. (3) He devotes his whole time to the public service and has no private employment - Re Dairies Order 1908 D^{rs} Spruille and Rankin visit, inspect and report on Dairies, Cowsheds, etc., of milk sellers ... Kitson acts as Sub-inspector, goes round to see that the Dairies orders are carried out and reports accordingly. I enclose the last Sanction I got, which you might return to me in due course

This letter together with those of D^{rs} Spruille and Rankin and Mr Kitson enclosed herewith to be returned.

The Clerk drew attention to the fact that the information received from Letterkenny to the effect that Mr Kitson's temporary remuneration as Sub-inspector under Dairies order was £6 and his permanent £8, was wrong. From Mr Perry's letter herewith it appears the £6 is permanent and the £8 temporary. This he has verified by reference to the published abstract of Letterkenny R.D. Council for half year ended 30 Sept 1921. Similarly the letter of Mr Perry with L.S. B's Sanction - shows the last Sanction

Read Letter from Mr. Sean O'Farrell, L.G.D. Inspector, dated 22nd Sept. 1922, stating that he had under consideration replies to queries relating to the Superannuation of Union Officers whose offices have been abolished under the Scheme for the abolition of Unions. Some of the claims come under the head of "Cases in Dispute" and cannot be dealt with offhand, while others are submitted from Officers whose whole time was not devoted to the service of the Union. Read letter from the Minister for local government, dated 6th October 1922, (N^o. 221/7/22, Aontas Ince Eoghain) sanctioning the proposed payment of 14/11⁴ per week in lieu of rations to Nurses Mc Dermott, Rice and O'Donnell for the period ended 4th Sept. 1922.

Read letter from Mr. Bernard McFadden, Secretary of Sironaill Co. Council, dated 2nd October 1922, stating the County Council had adopted the District Council's resolution of 11th Sept. 1922, regarding the application to the English Government for a contribution of half the cost of maintenance of the road from Buncrana to Dunree and the road from Buncrana via Flonmany to Lenan, and had directed him to communicate with the proper authorities.

Read letter from Robert Moore, Clerk of the Council, dated 9th October 1922, applying for an adjustment of his salary as Clerk and Executive Sanitary Officer so as to have it in keeping with salaries paid for the same offices in other Districts of the County. A Circular letter (in duplicate) was submitted from the Ministry for Local Government, dated 28th Sept. 1922 (Ref. No. L.G. 4945) giving recognition to a label issued by the United States Government bearing the Statement "Pork from animals free from disease at time of Slaughter" as an official Certificate regarding all Pork exported from U.S.A. to Ireland.

Read Letter from the Executive Sanitary Officer of Belfast Corporation, dated 28th Sept 1922, stating that Mr. Francis Mercer, Main St. Moiville, is employed by Richard Lowry & Co. Ltd. St. Victoria St. Belfast, as an Outworker.

Read card from Mrs. S. Hutchinson of Farramullan Faham, dated 30/8/22, stating that as the house mentioned in the notice served on her by the Council will be vacant as soon as the present tenant gets suited she does not intend to have it repaired.

Read report of Moiville Public Health Committee dated 2nd October 1922, stating that they had decided that the street lamps be not lighted this winter, and complaining that they could not get into their usual Committee Room, the landlady having left and no arrangements made as to opening the room for the meetings.

On the motion of Councillor Smith seconded by Councillor McSheffrey the report was adopted.

A letter was read from Mrs. Gillen, the lessor of the room let to Moiville Public Health Committee for their meetings, dated 6th Oct. 1922 stating that through being absent in Dublin last month & change of residence this month she entirely overlooked having the premises open, but would see that the neglect will not occur again.

This was considered satisfactory & Ordered to be sent to Moiville Public Health Committee.

Councillor Cole moved pursuant to notice,
 Commandant P.H. Doherty (Chairman) seconded and it was
 unanimously Resolved that we apply to the Irish Government
 for a Grant of £2000 for relief of distress, to be applied
 towards the provision of a water supply for Carrndonagh &
 the District Hospital.

It was stated that the Scheme was expected to cost
 £4000 which is entirely prohibitive if the Government
 do not assist, as such an outlay would entail
 a six shilling rate, while if the half were given as
 a Free Grant, the Scheme becomes possible, and the
 employment given would help to relieve distress
 in the coming winter and Spring. It was also
 stated that the Moville Waterworks were made in
 1880 as a Relief of Distress measure, when two-thirds
 of the cost was lent at the nominal rate of one
 per cent. There is no chance of a water supply
 for Carrndonagh ever being obtained unless by
 assistance such as is now applied for.

On the motion of councillor Cole seconded by councillor James Doherty, the application of Joseph Wilson was granted, and he was accepted as tenant, Wm. W. Glinchey of Newtownhamilton being his surety.

Read letter from Mr. Chas. McCormick, Soler Derry, dated 6th Sept. 1922, respecting the Council's action at last meeting in giving the vacant Cottage in Barrowhugh to a man named John Mc Gilloway who is employed in Glasgow, while his client, Michael McCormick, is a labourer in the District, and asking that the Council reconsider their decision which seems to have been given under a mistake as to the facts.

Councillor Cole moved pursuant to notice (which was also signed by Councillors Ed. Smith, P. H. Doherty, John Smith, Daniel Mc Mullan, & Dan. O'Hare), and Councillor James Doherty seconded,

Duffey's case will be before the Court in Derry on 6th Oct. 1922, when the ownership will be decided.

Action postponed for further report.

Read letter from Councillor John O'Donnell, Fuslamore, Tahan, dated 28th Sept. 1922, stating that he inspected the work done by Dan McLaughlin at Cottage, No. 5, Larickanee, Inch Island, which was very satisfactory. He cleaned out the drain one yard wide, 12 inches deep, 102 perches long, and put on grating. His charge, £3, he considered reasonable.

Payment ordered of £2.10.0 the amount agreed to by the Council on 14th August 1922.

Read letter from Mrs. Rachel H. Beattie, The Drum, Inch, dated 28th Sept. 1922, complaining that Wm. Whoriskey, tenant of Cottage No. 37 at Ballynathilly, Inch, is giving her family a lot of trouble, trespassing, cutting bushes, breaking down fences, & destroying crop with fowls and a goat. He has a dog and gun and shoots over her land and threatens her sons. She requested the ^{Council} to see that the annoyance cease.

Councillor Gallagher suggested that Wm. Whoriskey be requested for an explanation regarding this complaint, and the Clerk was directed to write to him.

Read letter from Mr. Robt. W. McNutt, farmshanagh, Burnfoot, dated 5th Sept. 1922, complaining that Daniel Doherty, tenant of Cottage No. 89, farmshanagh, is giving him annoyance by the trespass of fowls and a goat on his oats.

- and adding that these arrangements are temporary pending the adjustment of the financial clauses of the Abolition Scheme.

Read further letter from Mr. Sean O'Farrell, L. G. Inspector, dated 30th Oct. 1922, stating he will not raise any objection to the transaction of finance business at the Council's half yearly Meeting on 6th Nov. 1922.

Read letter from the L. G. Ministry dated 18th adh Deireadh Fochomhair, 1922, (Ref. No. 31/367, Coudac Thire Chonail) forwarding forms for Returns relative to the Names, Salaries, Districts, &c. of Medical Officers and Midwives of Dispensary Districts in Inishowen Union.

The Clerk stated he prepared & forwarded the Returns.

The Clerk stated that on 13th October 1922, he received forms from the Ministry for Local Govt on which to make returns of retail prices of certain commodities (food & clothing) in the towns of Bunceana, Noville, & Barndonagh, same to be received by Monday, 16th Oct, in Dublin. That being himself so busy at road work, he engaged Mr. Denis M. Cloakey, S.S.O., to visit the three towns, make the enquiries, & furnish the Returns. The expenses amounted to over £2, and he suggested the Council should pay it, a motor car being required on account of urgency.

On the motion of the Chairman a payment of £2 was passed (Sanction requested).

Councillor John O'Donnell drew attention to the proposed Boundary Commission which is to sit soon to get evidence with regard to the boundary between Southern Ireland & the Six County Area, and suggested that some persons should be selected to attend the Inquiry with a view to having the historic boundary at Derry restored.

The following were suggested:- Mr. P. O'Doherty, P.P. V.F., Omagh, Messrs. Wm. Doherty, Bunceana, Jas. E. O'Doherty, Bunceana, and F.J. Harkin, Barndonagh.

Read letter from the Clerk, Londonderry Union, dated 31st October 1922, stating that under the Order dated 29th Nov. 1921, apportioning the amount of certain pensions payable by Derry Union and Letterkenny Union, it was ordered that Letterkenny Union pay in respect of these pensions the sum of £36:19:2 half-yearly. As Enishowen Union has now taken over the Derry No. 2 area, until lately joined to Letterkenny, he was directed to request payment of the said amount for the half year ended 30th Sept. 1922.

The Clerk stated he replied that the request should be made to the County Home Committee.

Read letter from the Clerk, Londonderry Union, dated 31st Oct. 1922, stating that under the Order dated 29th Nov. 1921, apportioning the amount of certain pensions payable by Derry Union and Letterkenny Union, it was ordered that Letterkenny Union pay in respect of these pensions the sum of £36:19:2 half-yearly. As Enishowen Union has now taken over the Derry No. 2 area, until lately joined to Letterkenny, he was directed to request payment of the said amount for the half year ended 30th Sept. 1922.

Malicious Injuries.

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Read Letter from the Ministry for Local Government dated 16th Oct. 1922, (N. 55/75/1922, Malicious Injury Claims), stating that as the whole code of Criminal and Malicious Injury Law is now under consideration with a view to amendment, it is desirable that no claims should be decided at present, and the Council's Solicitor should endeavour to have all such claims adjourned to the Hilary Sessions when it is hoped arrangements will be made to have them dealt with on an equitable basis.

The Clerk was directed to ask the Solicitor to attend to this and look after the interests of this Rural District as regards chargeable areas.

Read further letter from the L.G. Ministry dated 20th Oct. 1922 (N. 35/89/1922, Inishowen R.D.) re Malicious Injury Claims, stating with reference to entry on Minutes of 14/8/22, that no British Court will try these cases.

Councillor O'Donnell remarked that the Council meant "British Judge", & not "British Court".

Read Letters from Mrs. M. Colgan, Buldaff, dated 26th Oct. & 3rd Nov. 1922, applying for Compensation for a bicycle stolen and a furze overcoat & mufflers, & gloves lost by her son when he escaped from the Barracks at the Workhouse.

On the suggestion of Councillor Cole the letters were marked "Read".

Read letter from the Ministry for Local Govt., dated 3rd, Samhain 1922, (No. 4/11/22, Inishowen Union) with reference to the payment of Miss Margery J. Quigley for her services as temporary Matron of the Workhouse, pointing out that Miss Quigley was retained by the Guardians notwithstanding the letters from the Ministry intimating that she was not eligible for the office on account of age, and in the circumstances the payments to her will be dealt with by the Auditor.

Read letter from Miss Margery J. Quigley of Cross, Blountmany, dated 6th Nov 1922, applying for payment of £26 for salary as temporary Matron for quarter ended 30/9/22, (actual sum due £23.6.5, subject to sanction). She stated she was employed and re-employed by almost every member of the Board of Guardians one time or another at their various meetings, and the Guardians have admitted the work was done satisfactorily. Consequently she fails to comprehend why they as Catholics should calmly commit the 4th sin that calls to heaven for vengeance. The British Govt at one time tried to hold up the pay of people in their employment on account of their political views. Surely the new Govt. is not going to follow in their footsteps on the less technical point of one year of age when there was no age test in her appointment. She was known to the Guardians and was employed for what she was worth.

On the motion of councillor Cole, seconded by councillor John McCarron, the Council recommended that whatever body would be discharging the outstanding liabilities of the Guardians should settle this claim, as they think Miss Quigley should be paid for her work.

Union Pension Correspondence

The following correspondence from the Ministry for Local Government on the subject of compensation for officials of Inishowen Union whose offices have been abolished was read:-

Letter, dated 16/10/22, (No. 30/268/22 Inishowen Union) stating that calculating in accordance with Circular No. 53, Nurse Rice's pension would be £54.10.0, and her allowance should be fixed at that rate.

Letter dated 17/10/22 (No. 30/268/22, Inishowen Union), stating that Miss Maizey McElroy was only employed in a temporary capacity as Wardsmaid, and is not entitled to compensation, but in the exceptional circumstances the Ministry will raise no objection to the proposed gratuity of £20 in her case.

Letter, dated 16/10/22, (N. 30/268/22, Inishowen Union) pointing out that Brian Douglas, Porter of the Workhouse, would appear to be entitled to a gratuity of £487.10.0 if his duties terminated on 18/3/22. The Ministry would not however object to £450, if Mr. Douglas accepted it.

Further letter on same matter, dated 31/10/22 (N. 30/268/22, Inishowen Union) asking the observations of the Council on a letter received from B. Douglas, in which he stated his duties continued down to 4/9/22, and by accepting £450 he would be losing £65.1.2, but that he would be agreeable to accept the £487.10.0, and let the other half-year from Dec. 1921, to June 1922, drop.

The Council considered that as Mr. Douglas had agreed to the £450 on the first occasion, it should be adhered to.

Letters, dated 16/10/22 (N. 30/268/22, Inishowen Union) relative to the Superannuation allowances proposed to be given to Edw. Quigley, Master, Nurses M. Dermott and O'Donnell, Miss Fanning, Schoolmistress, and Mary Mc Bolgan, Caretaker of lunatics, requesting to be furnished with particulars of their appointments, & enquiring whether the item "attendance" was mentioned in the terms of their appointments, & whether it was merely help received from pauper inmates. They also asked whether commission on repayment of relief and farm profits, allowance for driving ambulance and value of Cow's grass, were included in the terms of the Master's appointment, & by whom Nurse O'Donnell was paid in respect of military patients.

The Clerk said he furnished the information on 25/10/22.

Letter, dated 17/10/22, (N. 30/268/22, Inishowen Union) stating that a claim for loss of office in the case of D. O'Fallaghan does not arise, as he has got a new appointment under the Amalgamation Scheme.

Letter, dated 17/10/22, (N. 30/268/22, Inishowen Union) stating that they are making enquiries in the case of the Clerk's compensation and hope to reply soon.

Ordered that notices to quit be served and action taken thereon as soon as the Courts are functioning properly and have a Summons Server. The worst cases are in the District of Mr. McBloskey Rent Collector, Barn-donagh, and Mr. P. Doherty Noville.

A certificate was read from Mr. Henry Doherty Superintendent of Cottages Repairs, dated 14th October 1922, that he examined the cottages complained of by Councillor Gallagher, and is satisfied that all the work specified has been completed by the contractors.

An account from Mr. Edward Barr Buncrana, dated 9th Dec. 1922, amounting to £2-15-0 for glazing 16 panes in the windows of each of two cottages in Inch (smashed during the period they were vacant) including return carfare from Buncrana to Inch + back, as ordered on 9th Oct last, was approved.

Mr Patrick Doherty, Rent Collector, Moville, reported that Wm. Doherty, tenant of Cottage No 59 Barnagarve, died on 10th December 1922, and the cottage is now vacant.

Ordered that applications be invited for same.

It is understood that the remuneration now allowed will cover the cost of all clerical duties of the Council.

Pokeen

On the motion of the Chairman, Commandant P. H. Doherty, seconded by Councillor P. Quigley it was Resolved unanimously that we the Inishowen Rural District Council beg to draw the attention of the Government to the urgent need for drastic action against pokeen making in Inishowen. Two deaths of men in the prime of life which occurred here recently are generally believed to be due to pokeen; the evil is so widespread that the civic guards are quite unable to cope with it, and the small fines struck in cases taken to Court are no deterrent. We recommend that treacle and sugar be controlled or stopped and that the Sligo restrictions as to punishment be applied here.

MINUTES of Proceedings of the Rural District Council, acting as the Rural Sanitary

Authority, under the above-mentioned Acts, at a Meeting held on MONDAY, the

Read Circular from the L.G. Dept. dated 15th Nov. 1922, (P. L. 215/59/1922 Miscellaneous) requesting to be furnished with a Return of operations under the Labourers Acts as at 1st April 1922, as required by Rule 65 of the Labr. Order 1908.

The Clerk said he had forwarded the Return.

The application of James McLaughlin for the vacant Cottage, No. 59, Karnaagrove, being the only one received, & he being recommended by the Rent Collector, was unanimously accepted as tenant.

Read Letters from Mr. John Pitsoo, Rent Collector, Burnfoot, dated 4th & 6th Jan. 1923, stating that Manasses Coyle, tenant of Cottage No. 50, Bohillion, died in July last, and recommending that his son-in-law ^{John} Doherty, be accepted as tenant for the Cottage.

It was unanimously Resolved on the motion of Councillor James Doherty that ^{John} Doherty be accepted as tenant of Cottage No. 50, he to provide a surety to join in the agreement.

Read Circular from the Minister of Local Government, dated 23rd Dec. 1922, (Ref. No. L.G. 27/49) stating that the Board of Works is now authorised to exclude from Receivable Orders issued by them penalty interest from the period beginning 1920 up to 11th Dec. 1922, in respect of overdue instalments of local loans. As regards the future penalty interest will be waived provided instalments in arrears are discharged with reasonable expedition. The Exchequer Grants will be placed to the credit of the various Councils in respect of 1921/22 and 1922/23 as soon as the Guarantee Fund charges have been met.

Read letter from Mr. Hugh Doherty tenant of cottage No. 85, Ballylooney, dated 8th Jan. 1923, complaining that the pipe, which conveys the sewage from his yard through Henry Doherty's yard to the cess pool in Hugh McLaughlin's yard, is deliberately closed up by Henry Doherty's wife so that no water can get through. All the rain that fell for three weeks lay there and they had to wade through two feet of water. He showed it to the Rent Collector who had the obstruction removed, but if it is allowed to happen again he is not supposed to pay rent for such accommodation.

On same matter a report was read from Mr. Dennis McBloskey dated 8th Jan 1923, stating that the sewer pipe at Cottage No. 86 was blocked, causing flooding in the adjoining yard, and recommending that the pipes be lifted and the drain left open for some time, and that the cess pool be emptied.

It was ordered that the several tenants concerned be notified that if the drain or pipe is allowed to block up again that an open drain will be made so that it can be easily seen who is causing the obstruction.

Read report from Mr. Patrick Doherty, Rent Collector, Naville, dated 30th Dec. 1922, (in reply to letter of the Local Govt. Ministry of 4/12/22) (No. 270/1518/1, 2 (as shown)) stating that in every case in which 3 months arrears are due Notices to Quit were served, & summonses for possession afterwards. Three cases will come before the District Court at Naville on 9th Jan. 1923. The other defaulters have reduced the arrears.

Mr. D. McBloskey, Rent Collector, Farndonagh, mentioned that he cannot get summonses served in his district as no Court officer has been yet appointed.

Read report from Mr. Patrick Doherty, Rent collector, Noville dated 5th Jan. 1923, stating that Vincent Burns, who gave notice of surrender of the Cottage in Farrowburgh, which was allotted at last meeting, to Mr. John Mc Gilloway, is still in occupation, and has allowed Mr. Michael McCormick to store his van & egg boxes on the premises. So long as Burns is in occupation it is useless getting Mr Gilloway to sign the Agreement when he cannot be given possession. He had served a Notice to Quit on Burns with the result that he paid the arrears.

Ordered that proceedings be taken for possession.

Read report, from Mr. John Kitson, Rent collector, Burnfoot, dated 4th January 1923, drawing attention to the deplorable state of the Labr. Cottage occupied by John Clark, Mullaney. The upstairs back room is used as a privy & the other rooms as urinals. 12 panes of glass broken, skirting board taken off lower bedroom, all the rails pulled out of the stair bannister, sheeting taken off underneath stairs, locks & latches off doors & doors hanging off hinges. Snaeks off the windows & cords broken & a lot of plaster off the walls. Sometime ago this man was before the Magistrates for non payment of rent & destruction to house. He paid the arrears then & put in eleven panes of glass, but did nothing since. There is neither bed nor bedding nor furniture of any description. Two boys & a girl stop in this house, the father stops with his employer, and when the collector calls he is refused admission.

Ordered that proceedings be taken for possession & for wilful dilapidation & injury & arrears of rent.
