LCDC Annual Report 2024

Background

Putting People First – An Action Programme for Effective Local Government envisaged a range of reforms including an enhanced role for Local Government in community development. This enhanced role was provided for in the Local Government Reform Act 2014, which included a requirement to establish Local Community Development Committees (LCDCs) in each local authority area. Donegal LCDC was established in June 2014 in accordance with guidelines outlined by the Department of the Environment, Community and Local Government. LCDC's replaced the County Development Board structure and aim to enhance the strategic planning and coordination of local and community development activity.

Key Responsibilities for 2024 for Donegal LCDC

- Finalisation of the community element of the 6 year Local Economic and Community Plan (LECP) and adoption of same.
- Co-ordinate all community development programmes in the local authority area such as the management and overseeing of the Rural Development Programme (LEADER) and the Social Inclusion, Community Activation Programme (SICAP).
- Ensure effectiveness, consistency, co-ordination and avoid duplication of public funded programmes.
- Administration of Local Enhancement Programme 2024
- Administration of the Community Recognition Scheme 2023 and 2024
- Administration of Healthy Ireland Programme
- Administration of Sláintecare Healthy Communities Programme
- Prepare an annual report on the performance of the LCDC functions.
- Administration of DRCD supported funding schemes such as the Community Development Programme and the Empowering communities Programme.

Composition

LCDC's are required to comprise both public and private sector members, including local authority members and officials, State agencies and private sector local and community development representatives to work in partnership to achieve its objectives. Donegal County Council provide administrative support to the LCDC and Paddy Doherty is the Chief Officer of

the Committee. Donegal LCDC is made up of 19 representatives, with one position being vacant at the end of 2024.

Meetings

Donegal LCDC comprises both public and private sector members and members met nine times in 2024 and also hosted a Special joint meeting with the Economic, Enterprise and Emergency Services SPC at which the final draft of the Donegal Integrated Framework LECP 2023-2029 was approved for progression and consideration at a plenary meeting of Donegal County Council.

Key Achievements

Donegal LCDC has had a very busy and productive year continued deal with the challenges faced by addressing the issues arising from New Arrivals. To date, the Committee has in accordance with requirements overseen the following:

1. Review of the Local Economic & Community Plan

Development of the Donegal Integrated Framework LECP 2023-2029

One of the roles of the LCDC is the preparation of a six year Local Economic & Community Plan (LECP). The LECP's are a part of the overarching policy framework of Project Ireland 2040, which includes the National Planning Framework (NPF), the National Development Plan (NDP), the Regional Spatial and Economic Strategies (RSES) and County and City Development Plans.

Within this policy framework, the specific purpose of the LECPs is to set out, for a six-year period, the objectives and actions needed to promote and support economic and community development within the relevant Local Authority area, both by itself directly and in partnership with other economic and development stakeholders. In doing so, the LECPs are one of the primary mechanisms – at local level – to bring forward relevant actions arising from national and regional strategies and policies that have a local remit, and support collaboration to increase the quality of life in our communities.

Following a comprehensive programme of engagement across communities, cross, directorate, cross sectoral and across agencies, the Donegal Integrated Framework LECP was adopted by Full Plenary Council in March 2024.

The Donegal Integrated Framework LECP is a key document for County Donegal, providing a framework for advancing economic, community, social and cultural development in the county. It sets out a Shared Vision, informed by extensive consultations with community, statutory, and sectoral stakeholders, with Goals, Objectives and Actions to sustainably develop the county's natural, human, and capital resources, recognising the challenges facing the county in a volatile, uncertain and everchanging global environment, and seeking to address these challenges.

Even more importantly, the LECP recognises the advantages and the potential for sustainable development that County Donegal has to offer, and it seeks to capitalise on this potential for the benefit of the community. This Plan seeks to make the county an innovative, creative, accessible, and inclusive county, with opportunity and a good quality of life for all sections of the community.

2. LEADER Programme 2014 - 2022

Donegal LCDC delivers the LEADER Programme within Donegal with our four implementing partners, Donegal Local Development CLG, Inishowen Development Partnership, Údarás na Gaeltachta and Comhar na nOileán. The LCDC also acts as the Local Action Group (LAG) working in partnership with Donegal County Council as Lead Financial Partner.

Donegal LCDC, in its role as the LAG approved the full allocation of LEADER funding awarded to the county for the 2014-2022 programme to projects recommended by the Evaluation Committees of the local Implementing Partners. The LAG also delivered the follow-on Transitional LEADER Programme and EURI (European Union Recovery Instrument) Programmes.

Transitional LEADER Programme and EURI (European Union Recovery Instrument) Programmes.

Both the Transitional & EURI Programmes were extended into 2024 which allowed the LAG to approve additional projects because of de-committed funds from projects previously approved and for partners to work with funded groups to complete local projects.

LEADER Programme 2023 - 2027

In its capacity as the LAG, the LCDC are again administering the new LEADER Programme through the LEADER Local Development Strategy 2023-2027. Donegal was awarded a €10.4m allocation for the delivery of the new programme to cover the period.

The new LEADER Programme opened for expressions of interest and applications in April 2024 following approval of the final Local Development Strategy developed via consultation events across the county in partnership with Implementing Partners and combined with the new LECP and PEACEPLUS programme consultations.

Following the opening of the programme, 13 projects were approved in 2024, with a total allocation of €454,656.58 approved by the LAG.

3. Social Inclusion Community Activation Programme (SICAP) 2024-2028

Donegal LCDC manage and oversee the implementation of the Social Inclusion, Community Activation Programme (SICAP) with 2024 the first year of the new four-year SICAP programme running from 2024-2028.

The SICAP Programme had a budget of €2,491,313.53 per year across the lifetime of the programme.

Two Local Community Development Companies deliver the SICAP Programme on behalf of the Donegal LCDC across the three Lots in County Donegal as follows:

Donegal LCDC worked to ensure the implementation of these plans and programmes at a local level ensuring the effective co-ordination of funding programmes for the benefit of local communities in the county.

In 2024 the core SICAP Programme again extended to include delivery of supports to New Arrivals with an additional budget allocation of €714,385.15 to the Programme Implementers for provision of supports.

4. The Community Recognition Fund 2023

The Community Recognition Fund aimed to support the development of community infrastructure and facilities in recognition of the contribution being made by communities

across the country in welcoming and hosting significant numbers of arrivals from Ukraine and other countries. The funding was specifically targeted at projects that are located in communities, towns and villages that are hosting the Beneficiaries of Temporary Protection and/or International Protection Applicants ('new arrivals') across Donegal.

The Fund aims to support the development of facilities that will be used in the future by all members of the community. It is separate in its objectives and scope to any other public funding streams which aim to support the development of public service needs arising from the significant number of arrivals from Ukraine and is administered by Donegal County Council on behalf of Donegal LCDC. Applications from 51 Community Groups seeking funding were successful, receiving award of funding totalling €3,014,395 in late 2023. At the end of 2024 the total amount drawn down from the Department was €2,439,588.46. This Programme will run into early 2025 with the remaining 9 projects due to complete at the end of Q1.

The Community Recognition Fund 2024

The Community Recognition Fund 2024 will again be administered by Donegal County Council on behalf of Donegal LCDC. This fund aims to build on the work completed in CRF 2023 and has a budget of €3,291,917 with all projects to be completed by November 2026. This fund was available to communities to apply across two windows in 2024, to allow for increased project development. The scheme will provide large capital grants ranging from €50,000 to a maximum of €500,000 and has the potential to impact communities greatly and the allocation to the County will result in the delivery of developments and projects in towns

and villages which will benefit the entire Community in recognition of the support they have shown to New Arrivals. Applications from 28 Community Groups seeking funding were recommended to the Department of Rural and Community Development under Window 2 of the Programme for funding and decision on these applications is expected in early 2025. This programme will run into 2026 with additional recommendations under Window 3 of the Programme due to be submitted to the Department in February 2025. The total value of awards under the Community Recognition Fund 2024 will be €3,291,917.

5. The Local Enhancement Programme

The Local Enhancement Programme 2024 totalling €258,776.87 was allocated for award across 2024 including €105,000 in large grants and €105,000 in small grants and €43,129.48 for Women's Groups, supporting critical community infrastructure and groups, with a small amount retained for administration. The Local Enhancement Programme 2024 supported groups, particularly in disadvantaged areas to focus on small capital works/repairs/improvements, and the purchase of equipment for community use such as improved access for persons with a disability; enhancing community participation for disadvantaged and marginalised groups and improving energy efficiency of community facilities to reduce ongoing costs.

129 grants were awarded and administered by Donegal County Council on behalf of Donegal LCDC.

6. <u>Community Development Programme and Empowering Communities Programme.</u>

2024 also saw the LCDC continue to work with the Department of Rural and Community Development (DRCD) on the roll out of a number of schemes initially developed in 2022 on behalf of the Department.

- In 2021, the DRCD awarded seven applicant organisations funding under a €1 million, three-year pilot Community Development Programme to trial community led interventions that address poverty, social exclusion and inequality and promote human rights. The Donegal Intercultural Platform was approved funding under the theme "Migrants" to tackle racism and promote inter-culturalism, human rights, equality and inclusion across County Donegal. The LCDC has financial oversight of the development of the project locally and issued funding of €125,000 to Donegal Intercultural Platform in 2024.
- The Empowering Communities Programme targets a number of smaller areas experiencing challenges affecting the quality of life for those people living in them. Arranmore Island is a pilot location for the Programme and in 2024 Donegal LCDC administered the annual funding of €120,000 for the programme and continues to work closely with DLDC who are delivering a programme of activities to the community on the island.
- The DRCD has developed the **Dormant Accounts Action Plan 2023** to address measures to ensure that existing community infrastructure is inclusive and welcoming to LGBTI+ people. DRCD allocated funding of €13,366.70 to Donegal LCDC to transfer to the Donegal Youth Service to support the LGBTI+ across 2024 and to ensure that the funding would be used in the course of their work to implement the actions included in the National LGBTI+ Strategy.

7. Creeslough Together Initiative

The LCDC, on behalf of Donegal County Council, continued to support the Creeslough Community Association to deliver the Creeslough Together Initiative which was funded through the DRCD. 2024 saw the delivery of the second year of the three year funding programme which delivered on the group's Annual Plan for the year which included the continued development of a local Community Hub for the group and the employment of staff to manage and oversee Pastoral care of the Community, Community Activation (development, support and funding of small community activities) and Support future infrastructural development needs under the Creeslough Plan 2024-2027.

8. <u>Healthy Ireland – Healthy Donegal</u>

The objective of the Healthy Ireland Fund 2023 – 2025 is to improve the health and wellbeing of people of all ages and abilities living in Ireland through the implementation of the Healthy Ireland Strategic Action Plan 2021-2025. Donegal Local Community Development Committee (LCDC) with an approved budget of €233,000 is delivering a more evidenced-based outcomes led approach, within the 3-year timeframe.

In 2024, Donegal LCDC supported key priority target groups through local activities delivered under the Healthy Ireland Programme.

Civic Dollars Pilot Project

The Chair of Donegal Local Community Development Committee (LCDC), Cllr. Niamh Kennedy announced the extension of the Civic Dollars project for a further two-year period following on from the resounding success of its pilot launch in 2023.

The Civic Dollars Project uses a smartphone app, to encourage increased time spent in local outdoor resources; give people an incentive and support to create behavioural change; improve health, encourage increased physical activity, and help users to engage with their communities.

Balor Theatre Summer Academy Programme

Healthy Donegal in conjunction with Balor Developmental Community Arts and through the Healthy Ireland Fund first invited adolescents and young people to join the Balor Theatre Summer Academy Programme in 2023. In August 2024, the programme concluded for its second year with a musical production which ran for nine nights. The purpose of this programme is to bring young people, artists and educators together through drama, art, dance and music to promote positive mental health, decrease the sense of isolation and provide positive role models.

In promoting participation-focused activities, like the Balor Theatre Summer Academy Programme, Donegal LCDC is helping empower adolescents and young people to develop interpersonal skills to communicate, build confidence and self-esteem while improving social skills, nurturing self-expression and whole-person growth.

Step Up Staff Walking Challenge

Donegal County Council Chief Executive, Mr. John G McLaughlin announced the winners of the annual Step Up Walking Challenge in September 2024. The campaign was rolled out over a four-week period, through the Staff Health and Wellbeing Office in conjunction with Healthy Donegal, to encourage staff to get more physically active and promote healthy habits.

Over the four-week challenge, teams collectively walked over 6,000km - the equivalent of walking around Ireland six times. Donegal County Council is committed to supporting and encouraging staff to make exercise a part of their everyday lives; as there is significant evidence that physical activity of moderate intensity promotes wellbeing, physical and mental health, prevents disease, improves quality of life, and has economic, social and cultural benefits.

<u>Alcohol Forum – Building Recovery Together</u>

Donegal County Council through Healthy Donegal was delighted to support the Alcohol Forum at their 'Building Recovery Together: Recovery, Diversity and Inclusion in Donegal' Seminar on 27th September in Letterkenny. The seminar included an inspiring line up of speakers including Senator Eileen Flynn, Jackie McBrearty – a recovery voice from the Blind Community, Tolulope Babatunde (MindEase), Fadl Mustapha and Barbara Ozga (Polish Alcohol Service, Dublin) and Mena McGinlay (Donegal Travellers Project).

The event highlighted and explored the disproportionate impact of alcohol harm on diverse communities, including ethnic minorities, LGBTQ+ communities and those with physical and sensory disabilities.



September was Addiction Recovery month, an all-important reminder that addiction can happen to anyone at any point in life.

Active Play

Donegal County Council in collaboration with Donegal Sports Partnership and funded through the Healthy Ireland Programme and Slaintecare Healthy Communities Programme launched the Active Play Donegal Programme on 7th November 2024.

The Active Play Donegal Programme aims to increase participation in physical activity for children through developing the capacity and skills of 'Play Leaders' within communities. Identified Play Leaders will receive training and support in how to encourage children in their domain to become more physically active through the medium of play. Being active through play helps children not only increase their physical fitness but also builds confidence and resilience while encouraging creativity and problem-solving skills - all of which benefit children's health and happiness as they grow.

Planting Seeds of Support among Rural Farmers

Ireland is undergoing an epidemic related to loneliness and social isolation within the population as a whole, with some 20% of the general population reporting to be lonely in an EU survey carried out in 2022.

The traditional sense of 'community' prevalent amongst rural farmers for many generations has suffered a significant decline in the past 20 years due to increased machinery use, intensive farming schedules, off-farm employment, health issues, technology, and the changing demographics of the group. This has led to a spike in isolation, loneliness, and hidden mental health challenges. Donegal Volunteer Centre in partnership with Healthy Donegal is aiming to promote personal and community development, upskilling and social network development in farmers aged 55+ who are only working/living on the farm and have no off-farm employment and who lack other social outlets.

Civic Play Project







Healthy Donegal in partnership with Foróige works to enable young people to involve themselves consciously and actively in their personal development and in the development of society. Using outdoor recreational areas - 'Earn Zone' sites identified as part of Healthy Donegal's Civic Dollars Project, this project aims to help participants

- Build self-esteem and confidence through challenging experiences,
- Develop the ability to manage personal and social relationships.

Participants recently took part in a one day Be Wild Be Free Forest skills workshop at a specially designated camp at Ards Friary Forest and Beach. The workshop was facilitated by Wild Awake and activities provided an opportunity for young people to connect with green

spaces while using the Civic Dollar App. The group participated in animal tracking, beach games, tree/holly bush care to support a newly developing forest, camp fire safety, how to source kindling, set up a heat/cooking source to allow for the cooking of a curry infused picked nettles for dinner which was consumed by the campfire with hot drinks as members moved onto tool use, forest roaming and quality time with one another which encouraged a natural disconnect from gadgets.

9. Sláintecare Healthy Communities Programme

The Sláintecare Healthy Communities Initiative is an interagency plan to improve the health and wellbeing of the most disadvantaged areas of society. The 3-year programme, which was administered by the LCDC and initiated in 2022 covers two areas in Donegal: Inishowen and Gaeltacht North West. Two Community Development Officers deliver the programme in the pilot areas, with respective Seed funding of €75,000 per area annually as well as funding to cover staff costs. A new 5-year SLA has also been signed with the Department of Health, starting in 2025 that will build on the work to date. Projects delivered in 2024 included a mobility bus, Health and Wellbeing programmes for men, Mens Sheds, Grow Your Own initiatives in National Schools and the development of raised beds in 8 community-led day centres.

10. <u>Donegal County Council PEACEPLUS Programme 2022 -2027 - Investment Area 1.1 1 Co-designed Local Community PEACEPLUS Action Plan</u>

PEACEPLUS is a new, ambitious cross-border funding Programme totaling €1.1bn and is a partnership between the European Union, the Governments of the United Kingdom and Ireland, and the Northern Ireland Executive and will be administered by the Special EU Programmes Body (SEUPB). Match-funding for this element of the PEACEPLUS Programme has been provided by the Executive Office in Northern Ireland and the Department of Rural & Community Development in Ireland.

PEACEPLUS will continue to provide investment to Northern Ireland and the border counties. It comprises six themes, which encompass 22 individual investment areas.

Under Theme 1, Investment Area 1.1, a total of €110 million has been designated for the co-designed Local Community PEACEPLUS Action Plans as part of the 2022-2027 Programme.

The specific allocation for Donegal amounts to €7,635,395.

Donegal Co-designed Local Community Peace Action Plan is center around three established themes:

- Community regeneration and transformation.
- Thriving and peaceful communities
- Building respect for all cultural identities.

The action plan for Donegal was formulated through a three-stage local co-design engagement and consultation process that began in 2023. This process involved consultations with essential community stakeholders, engagement sessions, thematic workshops, an online survey, project development, and a comprehensive application and assessment procedure. These collective efforts led to the final approval from the SEUPB in June 2024.

Peace plus Consultation Launch

Donegal PEACPLUS Action Plan aims to foster positive relationships within local communities that will affect meaningful attitudinal change across the County through enhanced diversity awareness, increased levels of social inclusion, and cross community and border interaction.

The Plan will see the creation of six countywide transformative, sustainable and accessible community shared spaces, and deliver 26 local social impact programmes that will stimulate and support peacebuilding and relational work, strengthen the capacity and skill sets of community-based organisations, and deliver initiatives and activities on a cross community, intercultural and cross border basis, helping to elevate and address social and economic challenges which have, and continue to, impact Donegal's communities.

This plan will directly benefit **7,635 participants**, providing them with opportunities to engage in a more inclusive, equitable, and sustainable community ecosystem. It is focused on building peace and prosperity for all citizens, and its impact will be felt across all our communities.

The tables below contains summary information regarding projects included in the application to the SEUPB. Most of the projects will be advertised by open, competitive tender. Relevant organisations and local community groups are encouraged to submit tender bids, to win the various contracts once the process goes live later this year .

Theme 1: Local Community Regeneration & Transformation

Designed to empower local people to transform and regenerate communities through infrastructure investment on a cross-community basis.

Donegal's specific objective, to create six co-designed accessible, transformative, and sustainable community shared spaces, that facilitate communication, connection, co-operation, and interaction among users & stakeholders. The spaces are catalysts for bringing communities together and drive intercultural, cross-community & cross-border interaction to build lasting relationships and contribute to peacebuilding.

The new, multi-purpose, environmentally positive community developments include:

- Newtowncunningham Playpark, Sensory Garden & Multi Use Games Area.
- The Boat Yard Project Ballyshannon
- Loughanure Community Playpark
- Fintown Community Playpark
- Glencar Outdoor Community Recreation Facility
- Drumboe Community Park Development.

The Community Regeneration and Transformation Theme makes up 40% of the programmes and includes six countywide projects. It will target 2500 participants.
